New Jersey's first free standing ancer research facility opened its doors Tuesday. The Garden State Cancer

Center's mission is to foster clini cal research for new technologies in the diagnosis, detection and treatment of cancer with linkage to a network of affiliated hospitals.

a network of armiated nospirals. Currently the center occupies about 25 percent of the 200,000 square foot hospital that was con-structed by the county in 1930, which was the nation's first isolation hospital for the treatment of infectious disease particularly tuberculosis.

The cancer center was founded in 1991 by its president Dr. David Goldenberg, as the clinical arm of the Center for Molecular Medicine and Immunology (CMMI). It was established in 1983 at the University of Medicine and Dentistry in Newark. Since the former site was too small and had an increasing rate of

site of the former Essex County Geriatric Center on the corner of Franklin and Belleville avenues. "We began the long, arduous

process of acquiring this public facility in 1991, with funds received from the U.S. Department of Energy under the efforts of for-mer Congressman Robert Roe and Senator Frank Lautenberg," said Dr. Raymond Menard, the center's vice mediate for Administration

Dr. Raymond Menard, the center's vice president for Administration. "The hospital was empty and in disrepair, being an eyesore for the community," he added.

The renovation of the building will take place in phases over the next four years, costing about \$56

Phase one was financed thr a start-up construction grant of \$10,500,000 from the U.S. Department of Energy, an equity contribution of \$500,000 from GSCC/CMMI, Essex County bond proceeds of \$3,600,000, a Community Development Block Grant of \$500,000 from the

Department of Housing and Urban Development, and a contribution of land from Essex County valued at \$2,400,000. The nearly \$42 million needed

for phases two through five is pro-jected to come primarily from pri-vate philanthropy, with some limit-ed support from federal and state

Senator Frank Lautenberg said, Senator Frank Lautenberg said, "the opening of the Garden State Cancer Center is a milestone for New Jersey. All of us are pleased that this new facility is located in our state where there is so much concern about susceptibility to can-cer and the availability of advanced treatment. Now the Center can expand on its accomplishments and develop into one of the premier cancer research facilities in the nation."

He added, "they are one of the highest funded institutions in New Jersey receiving peer-reviewed grants from the National Cancer

Teachers rally for closure in contract negotiations

Pouring rain did not stop more than 300 teachers from gathering last Thursday night inside the high school to show their unity regard-ing the negotiations of their contracts.

Since June the Board of Education and the Belleville Education Association have been negotiating on this issue.

negotiating on this issue. Thursday night, a state mediator was called in to help break the deadlock between the two parties. "They should not have been picketing inside the school...It was a fire hazard. They were wall to wall. You can't block hallways like that," said Board member Frank Montagena

Carol Amato, chairperson of the negotiating team for the Belleville Education Association, said the out-come was "a move in a positive direction."

direction."
"Even though we did not reach a settlement last night, there was an improvement in the tone and focus of negotiations," she said. Montagna responded, "of course they thought the meeting went pos-tively. They did not give anything up. We have reduced our demands remendously, and they are not tremendously, and they are not

budging." Louis Pallante, chairman of the Board of Education's teacher's contract negotiating committee said, "in the sense that both parties

Giving the gift of life

Man thanks police, fire and emergency personnel for saving his life

Saving a life is a precious gift

that often goes unappreciated. But Peter Arancio, 63, knows the significance of CPR because it saved his life. On the morning of Oct. 5, Peter

Arancio woke up and had a serious

asthma attack. Peter's wife Lucille urged him to use his asthma machine and then

he opened a window for aiz Since he was still having trouble breathing he called Lucille to help

Lucille quickly called 911 for

help. Ironically his 33-year-old son Larry — who has been a member of the Belleville Police Department for more than six years- was working the desk at the time of the

incident and he dispatched the call. Minutes after the call was dis-patched, Belleville Police officers Anthony Tucci and George Geyer arrived at the scene and found Peter Arancio, to be blue with no The two officers then started

doing CPR on him.

Members from the Belleville Fire Department Anthony Labruzza and James Coponi arrived at the scene and continued performing CPR on Peter. Seconds

CPR on Peter. Seconds later, Vincent Cisternino and Deborah Ebling from the mobile intensive care unit of Clara Maass parametics, arrived and used the defibilitators.

They then got a pulse and trans-ported him to Clara Mazss Medical

Institute, thus providing our citi-zens with new investigative meth-ods to treat cancer without our

ods to freat cancer without our patients having to leave the state." The center is the only New Jersey institution to twice receive an Outstanding Investigator Grant for Goldenberg's research, totaling more than \$20 million since 1985, and to hold a Program Project Grant awarded to Dr. David Gold for the iniliaisciplinary research on the development of better meth-ods to detect and treat colorectal and pancreatic cancers, totaling about \$11 million.

"Considering the economic costs of current treatments that are available, I am highly encouraged by the specialized research, diagno-

by the specialized research, diagno-sis and treatment taking place at the Garden State Cancer Center," said Congressman Robert Menendez. The center has an advanced imaging center devoted to diagnos-ing and detecting cancers at an early stage. It also has an outpa-tient clinic for therapy trials, and eight major research laboratorices voted to studying cancer for the perspectives of molecular biology, genetics, and immunology.

"The Center has been successful in rapidly transferring the results of our laboratory research to the clin-ic, where patients who have failed all other forms of therapy come all other forms of metapy come under our clinical research trails, approved by federal and institution-al committees, as a last hope. Ultimately, we hope to use these new cancer detection and treatment new cancer detection and treatment methods at earlier times when the disease is not so advanced,'

disease is not so advanced," Goldberg said. He added, "in addition to being able to handle more patients by acquiring these new clinics and support laboratories, we are expanding our network of affiliated research hospitals throughout the region, so that cancer patients can have access to the methods devel-oped at our Center while they remain closer to home." nain closer to home.
