Neither Belleville nor Bloomfield will be enjoying a 140,000 square-foot mall.

After seven sessions on the topic the Belleville Planning Board rejected the proposal from Newel's Realty Co. Inc. of Southport, Conn. in a 6-3 vote last Thursday night.

The project to build a retail mall with three stores at the site of the old Macy's warehouse, located at 8 Frankfin St., started last fall. The mall would have been on 3.6 acres in Belleville and 10.6 acres in Bloomfield.

Due to safety, environmental and traffic concerns Mario Drozdz, Judy Piscatowski, Victor Canning, Jay Bouker, Charlie Cerami and Allen J. Nappi voted against the proposal, while Rick Dombrowski, James Hogendyk and Sam Papa voted in favor.

In the public session, residents' testimony in favor of the development-was not enough to change the board's opinion.

Family must pay tuition. judge rules

Administrative Law Judge Ken R. Springer made an initial decision that a Honiss Street family pay \$35,466 in tuition reimbursement to the Belleville Board of Education and that their four children be transferred out of the dis-

The commissioner of the Department of Education will then have 45 days to either adopt, modify or reject the initial decision.

Until that decision is made the family's four children will remain in the district. The family has two children in the elementary schools and two in the high school.

Springer found that the family was not domiciled in Belleville and not entitled to a free education in the township. He instead ruled that the proper domicile of the family is in Newark where the property taxes are paid.

The family was renting a condominium at 2 Honiss St. since February of 1993, During this time the families' four children were attending the Belleville Public Schools, said the Board of Education's attorney Frank Pomaco of Gaccione, Pomaco and Beck in Belleville "The apartment building has a Belleville address, but a survey of the property shows that the buildjing is located 91 percent in Newark and that the owner pays taxes in "Newark," Pomaco said. The board then sent a disenrollment letter to the family which subsequently appealed the disenrollment to the Commissioner of Education, alleging that the children were eligible for attendance at the Belleville district schools, said







Belleville Health Department offers healthful holiday tips

The Belleville Health Department offers some tips for reducing holiday stress. While the holidays can be fun, they can also be mixed with extra work and pressure which can contribute to high levels of stress. Stress can be physical as well as mental. Everyone experiences stress differently.

Some people look forward to holiday parties, and others view them as social obligations. You may need to set priorities for your time. It is O.K. to stop by a social gathering for a short time or decline an invitation altogether. Consider delegating some of your responsibilities if you are feeling overwhelmed. Holidays encourage poor eating habits. Foods high in cholesterol, salt, and fat are common in holiday meals. Holiday feasts can be festive without being fattening. Includevarious fruits and vegetables and low calorie dips. Breads, pasta, poultry and lean meats are good choices.

Modify recipes – use margarine instead of butter, egg whites instead of whole eggs. Choose low fat dairy products such as skim milk. 1 percent milk or yogurt, and low fat cheeses. Use oils that have less saturated fat. These include canola, corn, saftlower, sunflower seed, sesame seed, soybean and olive oil. For desserts, serve more fresh fruits. To avoid gorging, don't fast before a feast. Eat a healthy snack between meals. Avoid eating every type of food to please the host. At office parties, offer to bring a large salad or fresh fruit instead of a high calorie dessert. Limit portion sizes.

Don't turn to unhealthy habits to cope with stress such as alcohol. Many people drink more alcohol than usual during holiday parties. If you drink, do so in moderation. Limit your daily intake to no more than one or two ounces of alcohol. An ounce of alcohol equals two ounces of whiskey 100 proof, 8 ounces of wine, or two 12 ounce Adequate rest and sleep are important during the busy holiday season. The ideal amount varies, from person to person, but seven to eight hours is about right for most people. Exercise helps relieve stress

for many. Try a brisk walk. Keep gift giving simple. Many budgets are stretched during the holidays. Gift giving should be an expression of love and friendship. If this element is mssing, consider limiting your list. Small tokens can communicate, "I'm thinking of you."

"I am very disappointed because the developer did everything to accommodate us and they voted it down...I am very upset because about three or four years ago we lost Home Depot...We lost tens of thousands of dollars in ratables and now the burden falls on the taxpayer," she said.

Bloomfield's planning board approved the plan in one session last spring.

Bloomfield Mayor James Norton supports the shopping center, saying it would bring in more ratables.

But Bloomfield 3d Ward Councilman Gary lacobacci said he agreed with the decision of the Belleville Planning Board.

"It is a victory for Belleville and Bloomfield, especially the Silver Lake section of Belleville and the Ampere and Berkely sections of Bloomfield," lacobacci said.

"It would have been a trafficnightmare and would have fosteredlittering, lottering and increasedcrime in addition to putting a burden on both towns police and firedepartments," he said.


"When Home Depot is in place and Orange Street is vacated, all that traffic will be diverted to Watsessing Avenue," he added.





Water commission adopts budgets

The North Jersey District Water Supply Commission on Nov. 15 ananimously adopted its 1997 budgets.

The budgets will reflect lower wholesale water rates for many municipalities, including Nutley and Bloomfield, while at the same time holding increases to less than a third of a percentage point for the remaining municipal participants in the state's largest water supply operation, commission officials said.

The water cost decrease will benefit municipalities drawing supplies from the Wanaque South Project which completed the Monksville Reservoir in 1987. Wholesale water costs for Nutley and Bloomfield will drop from the current \$913.19 per million gallon rate to \$911.98, beginning in January.

Besides Nutley and Bloomfield, the other Wanaque South municipalities where rates will drop include Bayonne, Kearny, Newark, Wayne and Cedar Grove. Bayonne won an additional advantage when the North Jersey Commission, under a new public water management contract offered as an alternative to privatization, pledged to the cze existing rates for the next several years.

An increase of .007 percent in wholesale water rates will be paid

by those cities and towns which financed construction of the Wanaque Reservoir which was completed in 1930. With construction bonds now retired, the original partners in the Wanaque system by far pay the lowest water costs in New Jersey, with the new 1997 rate set at \$422.02 per million gallons, up \$3.32 from the current charge of \$418.71, commission officials said

The original municipalities which now contract with the Wanaque North project are Newark, Paterson, Påssaic, Clifton, Kearny, Montclair, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge. Collectively, the participant which contract with the state regional agency distribute water to one of every four residents in New Jersey.

No one objected to the adoption of the commission's budgets at the public hearing, held in Wanaque. Michael Restaino, executive director of the commission, said a series of preliminary meetings were held with municipal finance officers and other officials as the budget figures were finalized.

"Numerous questions and issues were raised in these discussions, but there was complete consensus

as we finalized the budget and projected expenditures for this year," Restaino told the hearing.

The budgets for both the

Wanaque North and South projects total \$33,704,558, up from last year's \$33,523,201.

Two major capital improvement programs are underway at the commission include a \$19 million facility now nearing completion which would convert residuals collected by water filters into environmentally safe construction materials. The second project slated for completion in 1998 is designed to add a corrosion control agent to help curb the leaching of lead from antiquated plumbing inside older buildings.

Salary accounts are up 3.9 percent, which includes a 4 percent increase negotiated by labor unions, commission officials said.

The commission, which by law is prohibited from making a profit, announced that surpluses from its 1995 budget are being returned to the municipalities.

Municipalities benefitting from the surplus return include Newark, \$88,843; Paterson, \$43,873; Passaic, \$24,130; Clifton, \$14,807; Kearny, \$26,324; Montclair, \$10,968; Bloomfield, \$8,775, and Glen Ridge, \$1,645. Ridding Prostitution

An appreciation of Ed O'Neil

To the editor:

Of the many tributes that were paid to Ed O'Neil in his lifetime, none touched on one of his greatest dreams, which was to see the citizens of Belleville truly appreciate the greatness of their community.

As Town Historian, he delved deep into the history of Belleville, and he recognized its unique place in American history. The son of immigrants, he had a deep love of America, and it was not an exclusionary kind of patriotism. The miracle of America was that it proved the success of freedom for all, and not for just a few

He saw the ethnic makeup of Belleville change several times over the near-century that he lived here, and he saw that the end result was always the same - new Americans were created out of old strains, from whatever part of the world they came.

A proud Irish Catholic, he labored to preserve the resting places of Dutch and English settlers in the old Dutch Reformed Church yard. He worked to preserve the history of the Essex Regiment, which had stood guard at the Passaic River during the American Revolution. He laid out routes of historic interest in the community, from colonial times to the recent past

He was particularly interested in the historic fact that it was in Belleville that the first American steam engines were manufactured, that one of the first American steamboats was launched and that the founders of American industry were partners here in the earliest development of steam, making Belleville the birthplace of the American Industrial Revolution.

He sought no personal glory. He sought only the glory of his community, his county and his state. And more important than that was his goal of instilling pride in our children and all our people that they lived in a place on this earth where the concept of individual worth and freedom was put into practice. In a world where tyranny had been the universal rule, Belleville, with all its faults, showed that democracy works.

Coach, 'Boles' and 'Roos'

It seems like they've been on the sidelines at Belleville High School forever. In the case of the student class of B.H.S., it's been forever, because the three of them have been patrolling the sidelines for the Blue and Gold long before the current senior class was born.

As most of you now know, **John Senesky** tendered his resignation as head football coach at Belleville High School on December 2. With that resignation came the end of the Belleville coaching careers of two of Senesky's top assistants, **Joe D'Ambola** and **Gennaro Russo**.

D'Ambola, known to his friends at the school as "Boles", has been associated with the program since 1971 and has served as Senesky's defensive coordinator and top assistant since Senesky became head coach in 1977.

"You won't find a more loyal and dedicated professional," Senesky said recently of D'Ambola. "He has meant so much to these kids. I don't think people really understand the contribution he continues to make to the school system and to our program over the past 25 years."

I've known Joe since I began covering this team back in 1978. I probably remember him most for his somewhat gruff personality, but his always caring and heartfelt attitude to his players and coaches.

In a way, I'm glad that Joe will have his autumns to himself next fall. His wife **Patty** has lent Joe to us for a quarter century. Now she gets to listen to him every Saturday.

Joe has already said he plans on going to high school and college football games next fall. Now that his two daughters are out of high school, he should be able to do more leisurely things.

I always enjoyed Russo's sense of humor and somewhat dry wit. The three instances which best remind me of him occurred in the 80's.

The first instance was when he was talking about the Kearny High School football team and how it would be a difficult game on Thanksgiving. (This was before the Nutley game was moved to Thanksgiving). "They'll be wearing their red pants for that game, so they should be all fired up," Russo said.

Later in the same conversation, while talking about the assistant coaches who had served at B.H.S. over the past few years, he said "they come and go like gas station attendants."

Russo's best line at the opponent came in 1984, when the Bucs and Passaic Indians were playing at Municipal Stadium. Belleville was on the verge of a major 7-0 upset, and Russo, with seconds left in the game, screamed at the opposing team, "you wanted a war, you got a war", in reference to Passaic's pre game ritual of warming up and chanting "war".

Gennaro started coaching at B.H.S. in the Fall of 1980, the "glory days" if you will. He gave 17 solid years of production to the program. I'll miss not seeing him on the side-





Astigmatism and contact lenses

This week's article is about contact lens wear if you have astigmatism and what options are available

Last time, I wrote about the four modalities of soft lenses, so now it's appropriate to fit that into different visual requirements

Astigmatism is when your visual correction is not spherical. Either due to the shape of the front surface or some internal reason, the visual correction is not round but more elongated. In other words, there is a cylinder or tonic component to your eyes

Depending on the amount of astigmatism, there are three choices to be made when using contacts. The simplest and most commonly done is to use a standard spherical lens with the thought that the lens will give good enough vision to wear. This can be done with small amounts of astigmatism to a point and some lenses will by nature give better vision than others. The doctor can select one brand over another, based on optical quali-

Secondly, there are astigmatic or tonic soft lenses. These have the correction in the lens rather than relying on the optics of the lens. These become more specialized because they require more effort to fit, but the vision and contrast a patient gets usually are much better. There's more trial and error with these lenses because not all are equal and each indiidual is unique

Lastly, the best vision will come from using a rigid gas permeable or hard lens. These will take longer to adjust to, but once done, will hands down give clearer, sharper vision. They correct better because the lenses are a hard plastic rather than a gel like soft leases.
