# Council winnowing out the contractors bidding on Municipal Building project

The Township Council reviewed 13 bids by contractors seeking the job of renovating the interior of the Municipal Building, Monday night.

The proposals ranged from a low bid of \$1,026,375 by U.S. Contractors Corp. to a high bid of \$1,998,000 by Arkay Construction.

Only three bidders submitted timetables for completion of the job, Mayor Victor Canning said.

This provision of the contract was considered essential by the Council.

One of those who provided a timetable was Nicosia & Sons of Belleville, whose principal, Ken Nicosia, told the Council, "As a taxpayer of Belleville, I suggest you reject all the bids, and let us sharpen our pencils for another round."



# My best bets on lens options

Over the last two months, I have been writing about ophthalmic lenses Today, I'd like to sum up the important ideas and give you my best bets in eyeglass lens options. Hopefully, this will (1) make you an informed consumer, and (2) get you to realize value and function outway price in glasses.

Initially, I stated that you should decide on lenses first before selecting frames. This is important because some types of frames will be inappropriate for certain lenses. Bifocal lenses need certain depth to be cut, especially progressive lenses. It's a waste of time to find out after the fact that your choices were wrong and you need to start again.

My best bets in lenses are just a collection of my favorite recommendations. Hope you take this as advise the next time you need eyewear.

In 1997, glass is virtually not used and plastic is quickly becoming an old hat. The high index or polycarbonate lenses are quickly becoming standard. These are thinner, lighter and safer to the patient.

As for lens design, if you need bifocals, progressive addition lenses are being used more and more. These have no line and allow a variable focus. The best lens brand is Varilux Comfort. All the others measure themselves up to Varilux, so why not use the best?

Once you select the style and material, your best option to enhance your glasses is an anti-reflection coating. This is best for glare at night and on computers. It looks nicer too. I for one will never get a new pair of glasses without it. A large percentage of my patients get it too because I like it so

So when I'm presented with the individual who wants quality and value, I find it easy to help them. I just think of myself and what I would do for me or my family. It usually is successful.

In coming weeks, I want to focus on frames as well as the other health issues, like dry eyes, cataracts and glaucoma. Please let me know what you think at 667-0331

# **Fillings** are not inevitable!

Q. What is preventive dentistry and what does preventive treatment consist of?

A. Preventive treatment is extremely important. Fillings are not inevitable and cavities can be prevented in the first place. Since our aim is to avoid pain, discomfort and the need for fillings, we must eliminate the cause first. The best strategy is to prevent a problem before you have it. Cavities in the teeth are caused by bacteria that is always present in your mouth. Eliminate the bacteria and you'll eliminate the cause of cavities.

Q. How do you get rid of the bacteria in the mouth?

A. First, you have to see the bacteria, then clean it away. In our office, we use a special process that colors the bacteria. Then we clean it away. If you do this procedure several times a year, there will be less opportunity for the bacteria to attack the tooth and form cavities.

Studies were conducted involving professional cleaning using dental engine. Over a three-year period, children in the experimental group, aged 7-14, received meticulous cleaning in intervals of once every two weeks in the first two years and four to eight weeks in the third year. The children in the control group had only supervised cleaning, using a tooth brush. The results were dramatic. During the 3-year period, the 84 control subjects developed 790 new carious surfaces, while the 93 experimental subjects developed only 42 new carious surfaces. There were equally positive results in the study on adults.

Q. Are there ways to stop cavities, already formed, from going any deeper?

- A. Yes, cavities may not go any deeper under these conditions:
  - · absence of bacteria · abundant saliva
  - · use of fluoride (as found in toothpaste)
  - · reduced sugar consumption

Q. Once there is a cavity in a tooth, is it necessary to treat it?

A. Yes, cavities are traps for bacteria and they cannot close by themselves. In the cavity, there is infectious material that, if left alone, will irri-

tate the nerve inside the tooth, causing pain.

After the cleaning of the cavity, a filling must be inserted to protect the nerve inside the tooth and to restore the integrity of the tooth. However, fillings do not prevent further cavities. The treatment of the cavities goes hand-in-hand with preventive efforts. The best filling is always the natural tooth material. The most beautiful filling or any restorative work will not last for long if further disease is not prevented.

I stress again the importance of early diagnosis of caries

Q. Why is finding the caries in the early stage so important? A. Not all caries will develop into the form of cavities. Preventive treatment such as proper cleaning and the use of fluoride will stop them and there will be no need to do any filling. Small carrious spots can close

In our office, we teach proper oral hygiene and motivate the patients to cooperate in their own oral health. Fillings are not inevitable during the course of our lives. Caries can be easily controlled. We can prevent and eliminate the caries with preventive treatment and cooperation from both



# Non-feasance, misfeasance, malfeasance

The Consolidated Association of wrongful intent. Billeville, representing the parents and teachers of the district, have sent a letter to the Belleville Board of Education requesting sanctions against Board Member Frank "The Finger" Montagna.

It cannot be said that the board has welcomed the letter. Board President Ralph Mazzuca, whose personal decency is beyond question, promptly sent the letter to Board Attorney Frank Pomaco.

In the usual order of things, the letter will either stay buried in Mr. Pomaco's files, or will be sealed from public view.

It is unlikely that the Board itself will ever consider, or even read, the letter.

The Consolidated Association is not a group of the usual irresponsibles who plague the public meetings. Its membership, unfortunately, rarely attends the public

There are good reasons to demand the airing of the letter.

The Consolidated Association is entitled to know just where the Board members

In legal parlance, there are three grades of official misbehavior.

In "non-feasance", the failure to act to prevent or correct a wrong is the offense.

In "misfeasance", the offense is committed through error, willful or otherwise.

In "malfeasance", the offense is the outright commission of a wrongful act with

It is very rare for any of these acts to be committed in full view of the public.

Yet we have witnessed all three offenses committed by an unwitting Board of Education and a witless member of the

The act of misfeasance occurred when a board member, Mr. Montagna, made an obscene hand gesture at a public meeting, directing it to three teen-age girls who were addressing the Board.

That took place on March 10.

The act of malfeasance occurred when the same Board member issued a deliberate lie, a denial that he had made the gesture seen by a hundred people - a lie he later modified by saying he did it "to illustrate a point".

This occurred on March 24.

A deliberate lie made by a public official in the course of conducting public business is, in our opinion, malfeasance.

The non-feasance, of course, can be charged to the Board members for taking no action on either action. The letter from the Association puts the board on notice to take

Failure to censure Mr. Montagna is tantamount to acceptance of his behavior as

We do not think the majority of the Board does tolerate such behavior in public or pri-

Neither, we believe, do the courts.



# Noted author Inez Bull to speak April 18

Noted author, Inez Bull, Norwegian ambassador, will be honored at a tea and reception at 12 p.m. at the library, followed by a discussion of her books, "Ole Bull Returns to Pennsylvania," the biography of a Norwegian virtuoso and pioneer in the keystone state: "Oakeside: A Loving Tribute to Jean Doswell Oakes"; "The Girl on the Medal," a portrait of Julia Jones Pugliese, first women's intercollegiate fencing champion; "Ole Singstad's National Historic Landmark: The Holland Tunnel," just to name a few. Inez Bull has written approximately 15 books, with more

Internationally known coloratura soprano, concert pianist, editor, dedicated teacher of the retarded, director of music for the North Jersey Training School, a state institution for retarded girls, and special education and music coordinator for the Union City public schools, Bull is a graduate of Julliard School of Music with a bachelor of music degree from New York College of Music and a master's and doctorate in music education from New York University. She is the founder of the Ole Bull Music Festival, the Ole Bull Museum in Pennsylvania, and the founderdirector of the Ole Bull Music School. In 1993, the Royal Norwegian government named her Norway's Olympic gold winner for culture, music and art. In addition, she has received the Eisenhower Freedom Medal, the Sterling Silver Plaque from King Olav V of Norway and was named United States Goodwill Ambassador to the United States by King Haakon VII of Norway, as well as receiving the Gov. John S. Fine plaque and Pennsylvania senate citation.

She was named to the 1996 Marquis edition of "Who's Who in American Education" and "Who's Who in the World."

She is listed in The Piano in Concert, a National Endowment for the Arts, Washington, D.C. publication, of "great pianists in history" as a duo-pianist with Vladimir Padwa, a founder-member of the world famous The First Piano Quartet.

Giving over 10,000 concerts in voice throughout the world, she was acclaimed "the greatest coloratura soprano to have sung in France and Norway in history." Nominated for an Academy Award, Judy Garland portrayed Dr. Bull's life as a teacher of the handicapped in the United Artists film, "A Child Is Waiting" which premiered at the White House during the administration of President John F. Kennedy. The National Research Council in Washington, D.C., named her "the outstanding teacher of the handicapped in the United States.'


"Nature flaunts its pregnant beauty and we are awestruck," he said, "and yes, I am certainly included.
