Treffinger's new alternative proposal combines the 110-acres linear Reservation with the 95 acres that had been reserved for a golf course, thus creating a 205acre Reservation on the 300-acre Hilltop proper. The remaining 95 acres would then consist of the 50 additional acres of wetlands not within or contiguous to the Reservation which also remain green and undisturbed, and the 45 acres of proposed development of large low-density single-family homes - thus meeting Treffinger's objective that development should not exceed 15% of the total 300-acre Hilltop proper

### 'Leff'

A friend passed away last week.

He was just 50 years of age and left a wife and family way too early.

Robert Leffelbine, a teacher in the Belleville school system for over a quarter century, departed this life on April 14.

He taught english and literature both at the Belleville junior high and senior high school. Lord knows the number of students he taught, but I'm sure he made an impact on those who were fortunate enough to have had him in class

I was one of those, albeit my class with him was just home room. It was in the fall of 1972 that I first met Bob Leffelbine. He was my home room teacher in my freshman year of high school. Back then, freshman still attended the junior high school.

Like most high school freshman, I knew more than the teacher. Fortunately, Bob was around to let me know that he was a little more knowledgeable than I.

As I continued through high school, I began to learn the value of writing and the talent needed by people to perform on the stage.

It was Bob who produced and directed most of the senior plays, including my senior year, when our class performed "Hello Dolly" in 1976.

It was Bob's tireless effort in helping produce that play that made it such a memorable performance.

After I graduated from Belleville High School, I continued writing and had many occasions to speak with Bob about his various productions in the school system. One play that I'll never forget was one he produced in the Fall of 1979

It was 'The Wizard of Oz' and featured Jackie Wis as 'Dorothy.' I remember watching play practice a lot that fall, mainly because Jackie was the center of my universe. Bob pretty much knew that, but he went along with me when I told him I was doing extensive research on the logistics of putting a play together.

It sounded good, and since Bob was such a great guy, he let me pretty much watch the rehearsals, which of course meant that I could drive Jackie home after play practice.

Years after that production, I would still speak with Bob about that particular year.

"That was a lot of fun," Leffelbine said to me a few months back. "Those were great kids. We were able to do so much with those productions. You and Jackie were characters. Whatever happened with you two?", he would ask me.

Bob Leffelbine was a true gentleman in every sense of the word. I respected him as a teacher in the 70's, enjoyed his work as a producer in the 80's and will miss him terribly now in the late 90's.


