Proposed tax hike hovers at 53 points

Council decides against cuts hitting Seniors, firefighters

By Howard Klausner
In a work session that was planned to reduce the proposed budget, the Township Council could not bring itself to go ahead with drastic cuts in services.

A major cut in library funding of \$121,642 was vigorously opposed by the Library Director, Adrea Cohen, and members of the Library

Director of Public Works Charles Cerami warned that repair jobs being delayed by budget cuts would become major reconstruction jobs

"The Borough of Glen Ridge has only three less workers than I do," Cerami said. "I need more manpower.

The Council saved the jobs of eight firefighters who were scheduled to be laid off and saved the Dial-A-Ride and Senior Busing programs, which were due to be

An immigrant's dream realized

Memories of Mother

It was at the beginning of the 20th century young, handsome, ambitious fellow country-- she was illiterate and 14 years old - when her 16 year-old sister and she departed from the shores of Naples, Italy, to the promised dream of America. Her father, mother, and younger brother waved goodbye to the daughter of a member of Garibaldi's vaunted cavalry. Her three older brothers arrived in America a year earlier.

The ship was a freighter - the frightened teens didn't exactly go first class - for there was no class to describe conditions aboard the freighter during that five-week stormy trip bridging the Atlantic.

A woman, recommended by a family friend because she allegedly had influence descended upon her household, this is what with the immigration department and thus, could help the teenage immigrants through the difficult and demeaning experience at months before the crash, four children, ages

Ellis Island, met them inside the quarantine area took their bags and told them she would meet them after they cleared immigration, for the horse and buggy trip to North Newark.

Did she lose faith in America? Did she ask this country to become bilingual - and, thus, make her tongue America's second language?

No - with renewed courage - she picked up her shattered dream and moved on to the future - resolved to make it in America.

And so, it came to pass that the "match- ens - "Mom, I love you!" Do it today. maker" played out his role and she married a

man who turned out to be the greatest of the

They married - happy but broke. Their kitchen table and two chairs were loaners. But - this beautiful couple shared the American dream - freedom, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Happiness meant raising a family, a home, a steady job, moonlighting jobs - and a business on the side.

In time, one daughter and three sons came along - four more mouths to feed. The financial burden was more than offset by the reciprocal love of parents and four children.

When the great depression of 1929 she and her husband faced - a mortgage and a home completed at sky-high prices three

> two, five, eleven and fourteen to feed, dress and send off to school.

> She never despaired even when her husband's work week was cut to one day. Neither did she seek alms nor visit the Nutley Welfare Department. self-esteem, Pride, courage and self-confidence - qualities shared equally with her husband, sustained her family over the rough times.

> This teenager - who came to the shores of America unable to read, write or speak English learned to speak and

aware of their crisis, volunteered to help. understand the language of her adopted counby a son and listening to people around her, thus acquiring the language of a new country.

She taught herself to identify and work with figures. And with this limited knowledge - limited funds - but unlimited courage, she up and opened a neighborhood grocery and vegetable store. After all - she reasoned even in a depression people must eat - and at the very least, the store would provide the family food "at wholesale".

But for all her attributes, the tie that was precious to her was love of family. She is remembered in many ways, the most important, mutual love and respect. She was our mother, Rose Orechio. She is in our prayers every day.

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



Clearmon Field looking pretty good

If you grew up in Belleville and had any type of affiliation with sports, then Clearmon Field has to be familiar to you.

My first experience on that field came in 1970, when, as an 11 year old, I played Farm League baseball in the spring and Recreation football (my team was sponsored by the Fountain Restaurant) in the fall.

In the mid 1970's, there was the summer basketball leagues on the courts adjacent to Clearmon. We had a lot of fun playing in those leagues from '74-78. Former Belleville boys' basketball coach Danny Grasso ran the

The Buccaneer soccer team plays its home games there in the fall. The team has enjoyed enormous success at Clearmon for most of the 90's.

Since 1984, Clearmon Field has been the exclusive home of the Lady Buc softball team. Some will argue it's been longer than that, but the teams from 1980-'83 played a lot of its home games at Belleville High School.

Recently, Clearmon went through a bit of a face lift, with a standout paint job on the softball stands. This was done courtesy of the Belleville Softball Commission.

"It cost us about \$1,000 to get it done," said Maryanne Lopreato, a member of the Commission. "It was paid for by the parents, rec coaches and volunteers. We're very happy with the way it came out."

Lopreato notes that Clearmon has quite a nostalgic them to it.

"These kids begin their softball careers here when they play recreation softball in grade school. They end their high school careers here.

"Many come back after high school and help coach and umpire in the recreation leagues. This place means a lot to the players and coaches."

Whether you're going to a Belleville softball game, or just driving down Union Avenue, stop by and seen the face lift. It's a first class job.

May 9, 1975

I know, I know. Once a year, I have to write a little something about one of my favorite high school baseball games, albeit a loss.

Tomorrow is 22 years to the day that Belleville and Irvington played an epic baseball game at Belleville High

I began to think about that game last Sunday while at the Belleville-Montclair Kimberly Academy G.N.T. contest. George Zanfini, now assistant coach for the Bucs, was the head coach of the Bellboys back in '75. It was his first year on the varsity.

Irvington was undefeated heading into that game 22 years ago. They were ranked number one in the state. Belleville was on a roll, having won ten straight games since losing its season opener, at Irvington. (Back then, Belleville and Irvington played each other twice a year because both teams played in the Big 10 Conference).

It was a warm afternoon when the two teams played and you could tell right away that this would be a special

Belleville scored first and held a 1-0 lead until the sixth, when Irvington scored a tying run off of Belleville starter Greg Petite.

The game would remained tied for another eight innings. It was a marvelous pitching performance by both teams. Petite hurled the first 11 innings with Bobby Giordano pitching the next three.

Irvington would eventually win the game in the 14th inning on a three run homer, 4-1. (The game lasted almost four hours).

Neither team would be the same after that game Belleville would win a game at Wayne Valley the following day, but struggled after that, losing eight of its last 11 games and finishing 14-10.

Irvington would lose its first game a week later and eventually, faded in the final two weeks of the season.

For pure drama, you're not going to find a game with more sub-plots than the Belleville-Irvington game had on Friday, May 9, 1975.

"It was something special," Zanfini tells me from time to time. "You remember more about that game than I do. But you're right, it was the type of game that doesn't come around too often."

Four run rally in seventh clinches berth Lady Bucs return to Final Four
