Proposed tax hike hovers at 53 points

Council decides against cuts hitting Seniors, firefighters

In a work session that was planned to reduce the proposed budget, the Township Council could not bring itself to go ahead with drastic cuts in services.

A major cut in library funding of \$121,642 was vigorously opposed by the Library Director, Adrea Cohen, and members of the Library Board.

Director of Public Works Charles Cerami warned that repair jobs being delayed by budget cuts would become major reconstruction jobs.

"The Borough of Glen Ridge has only three less workers than I do," Cerami said. "I need more manpower."

The Council saved the jobs of eight firefighters who were scheduled to be laid off and saved the Dial-A-Ride and Senior Busing programs, which were due to be axed.

It left the library's budget in

doubt, but with the possibility of a restoration of some of the cut.

Township Manager Ray Kimble presented two proposed budgets to the Council.

The one with sharp cuts, would have limited the tax increase to 34 points. The other left the tax increase at 53 points.

The 34-point budget included the dismissal of eight members of the Fire Department.

The Dial-A-Ride program allows elderly persons to get rides to reach doctor's offices, clinics or occupational centers. The bus program gives free transportation to the Senior Citizens Center and to shopping areas.

Tom Longo, director of the Health Department, reported that 5,000 people are served by the buses, and over 11,000 trips were provided by the Dial-A-Ride program.

"Some of our Seniors are well into their 90s," Longo said. "They

can't get to the Senior Citizen club any other way. But they can still stay active."

Cohen said the cut would damage the library's computer program and probably close the Shafter Library Branch in Silver Lake.

Library Board President Joseph Casale told the Council, "You are about to destroy one of the best things in Belleville."

Mayor Victor Canning responded that the decision not to seek a 34-point tax rise might leave the Township Manager with more flexibility in meeting the library funding needs.

Kimble said that the state mandated a \$470,000 fund for the library while he had given it \$550,000.

He did not indicate any change in his position.

Some hope was expressed that a new scavenger contract due in July might bring savings as much as \$500,000, but no one would give further information on that idea.

A life enhancing environment

Clara Maass opens assisted living center

The Clara Maass Continuing Care Center was open last week in Kearny to provide medical assisted

care for the elderly.

A variety of residential facilities offers independent living to senior citizens, backed up by available medical resources.

Various stages of care are available to the residents, as needs change.

Among the speakers at the ceremony opening the facility was Helen Wagner, who portrays Nancy Hughes McCloskey on the daytime series "As The World Turns."

Now 79, Ms. Wagner has been in that role since April 2, 1956 when the show began. She is the only member of the original cast who still performs on the program.

In her role, she has become familiar to tens of millions of viewers.

"Your assisted living residence

will allow older adults who may require minimal assistance to continue to live full, productive lives," she told the audience.

Ms. Wagner noted that in her own profession, few performers acted past the age of 65 in past years. "But now, we even have actors performing in their 90s," she said.

Robert S. Curtis, president and Chief Executive Officer of Clara Maass Medical Center, said the facility will offer 30 assisted living residences and 90 skilled nursing beds.

"The outcome of this revolutionary approach is a resident-oriented system, which provides a seamless transition through various levels of need associated with the natural process of aging," he said.

School Nine honored by State

School Nine Principal Pat Forte and Second Grade teacher Salvatrice Lombardo will be honored Friday at the Annual Equity Hall of Fame Dinner at the Landmark Inn in Woodbridge.

The dinner is sponsored by the New Jersey Department of Education as part of its Pride in Who We Are Initiative.

In a school which has pupils of many ethnic backgrounds, Mrs. Lombardo developed a number of programs to enhance children's understanding of their own backgrounds and the cultures of others.

On Monday, the school celebrated Cinco de Mayo, the date celebrated by Latin Americans as the start of the revolution against Spain.

The *Celebrity Read* program brought visitors of African and Hispanic heritage to the school, to read literary selections exemplifying achievements of people of their ancestry.

They ranged from Ms.

Margarita Roig, Assistant Professor at Essex County College, to Al Sorvey Jr., field director for Congressman William Pascarelli.

Journey to Foreign Places utilized a "passport" allowing pupils to accompany one of their number to visit their nation of origin.

Art materials, visual aids, maps and reading materials were used to assist in the voyage.

The children have also brought food to school prepared by their families to show their home cus-

oms, and the children are encouraged to respect those customs.

At the same time, the diversity is taught as making up a tapestry of America, one to which each immigrant group has contributed.

"The program will promote the positive aspects of Multiculturalism in our school," Forte stated.

"It will also help develop self esteem and pride in our students and create a greater understanding and tolerance of one another."

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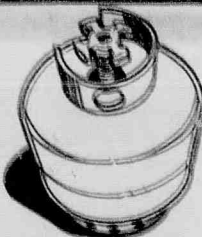

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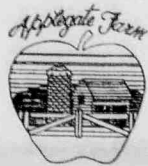

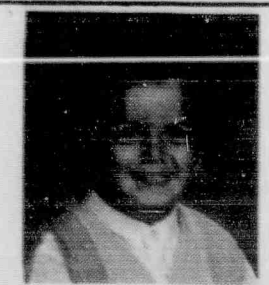

Performing poet Charles Mosler at library

A graduate of Brown University with a degree in English, he has performed at the New York Public Library, the Painted Bride Art Center in Philadelphia, the Arts Center of Princeton, the Pen and Pencil Club, the Stone Soup Poets' Series, the J.C.C. of Metropolitan, N.J., the County College of Morris Great Swap Series, Borders Books and Music in Paramus, Lehigh University, and Passaic County Community College, just to name a few.

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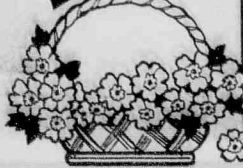

"It's a perfect family activity, allowing all ages to enjoy an afternoon or evening of creativity and fun. We get a lot of families working on group projects that they give as gifts to grandma and grandpa. And we do all the hard and dirty work for you, like preparing your piece to paint and cleaning up after you're finished. All you have is the fun!"

Here's how it works. Choose a piece of clay pottery, called "bisque," and decorate it to your taste, using color glazes, sponges, stencils, stamps, stickers and a variety of other supplies provided by the studio. Trained staff answer questions and offer occasional coaching. They also finish each piece with a high gloss clear glaze and fire it in a kiln at temperatures close to 2,000 degrees, making all

the items food-safe.

"We've chosen a line of functional items," commented Bob Carney, vice president and kilnmeister. "We have wine coolers, vases, planters, dog bowls, cat dishes, trivets, plates, pasta bowls, etc. Get some friends together, bring a bottle of wine and make a night of it."

The colorful studio, located in the heart of Montclair, cultivates a bright, casual, cafe atmosphere with televisions and a coffee bar that serves cappuccino, latte, espresso, coffee and bottled water.

Memories of Mother

It was at the beginning of the 20th century - she was illiterate and 14 years old - when her 16 year-old sister and she departed from the shores of Naples, Italy, to the promised dream of America. Her father, mother, and younger brother waved goodbye to the daughter of a member of Garibaldi's vaunted cavalry. Her three older brothers arrived in America a year earlier.

The ship was a freighter - the frightened teens didn't exactly go first class - for there was no class to describe conditions aboard the freighter during that five-week stormy trip bridging the Atlantic.

A woman, recommended by a family friend because she allegedly had influence with the immigration department and thus, could help the teenage immigrants through the difficult and demeaning experience at Ellis Island, met them inside the quarantine area - took their bags and told them she would meet them after they cleared immigration, for the horse and buggy trip to North Newark.

Well - they cleared immigration - but their erstwhile "friend" was nowhere to be found - she had vanished with all the valuables and gifts these two teenage immigrants had - the little girls were left with only the blouses on their backs.

A sympathetic and affluent fellow passenger - aware of their crisis, volunteered to help. (The young girls could only speak Italian.) A contact was made with a brother in New Jersey. This brother was more than a brother - he was a pal - his name was Generoso Cocchiola.

He didn't have much money - working for \$1 a day, there wasn't much he could save, but, nevertheless, from his meager savings, he bought clothes for the two sisters he loved so much and put them up in his North Newark apartment. And this is how this 14 year-old immigrant was introduced to America.

Did she lose faith in America? Did she ask this country to become bilingual - and, thus, make her tongue America's second language?

No - with renewed courage - she picked up her shattered dream and moved on to the future - resolved to make it in America.

And so, it came to pass that the "match-maker" played out his role and she married a

young, handsome, ambitious fellow countryman who turned out to be the greatest of the great.

They married - happy but broke. Their kitchen table and two chairs were loaners. But - this beautiful couple shared the American dream - freedom, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. Happiness meant raising a family, a home, a steady job, moonlighting jobs - and a business on the side.

In time, one daughter and three sons came along - four more mouths to feed. The financial burden was more than offset by the reciprocal love of parents and four children.

When the great depression of 1929 descended upon her household, this is what she and her husband faced - a mortgage and a home completed at sky-high prices three months before the crash, four children, ages two, five, eleven and fourteen to feed, dress and send off to school.

She never despaired - even when her husband's work week was cut to one day. Neither did she seek alms nor visit the Nutley Welfare Department. Pride, self-esteem, courage and self-confidence - qualities shared equally with her husband, sustained her family over the rough times.

This teenager - who came to the shores of America unable to read, write or speak English - learned to speak and

understand the language of her adopted country - never going to school but being tutored by a son and listening to people around her, thus acquiring the language of a new country.

She taught herself to identify and work with figures. And with this limited knowledge - limited funds - but unlimited courage, she up and opened a neighborhood grocery and vegetable store. After all - she reasoned - even in a depression people must eat - and at the very least, the store would provide the family food "at wholesale".

But for all her attributes, the tie that was precious to her was love of family. She is remembered in many ways, the most important, mutual love and respect. She was our mother, Rose Orechio. She is in our prayers every day.

Troopers have already interviewed people connected with the organization known as the Displaced Homemaker Program of Passaic County. The organization was founded in July 1995 by Bubba and his wife, Pat, along with Deborah Karamanol, the women's advocate. The money was to provide money for training and career counseling services for divorced and widowed women who were trying to enter the job market. The nonprofit group of which Bubba was one

of the organization's corporate officers, originally was awarded a \$100,000 state legislative grant.

A staff member of the state Department of Community Affairs reviewed the grant, and when he saw Bubba's name, he heard a lot of bells and whistles. Christopher Wolf, the DCA spokesman, pointed out to Bubba the relationship raised questions of impropriety. Wolf said, "What we did was to contact the senator and we communicated our uncertainty, and subsequently the articles of incorporation were amended, and he was no longer a member of the corporation." The department's concern was heightened because Bubba had approved the grant while voting on the state budget in his capacity as a senator and at the same time he was also an officer of the group that was going to benefit from the grant. Bubba disputes the state's version of the event.

• **A RESTRUCTURING** of the county municipal pension fund is resulting in savings to the municipalities because of a decreased contribution to the pension fund according to Senator Robert Littell, Chairman of the Senate Budget and Appropriations Committee.

Treffinger appeared at a public session with Governor Whitman to bolster the bond proposal that would raise \$3 million to be used to replenish the depleted fund which resulted from Whitman's tax program.

Treffinger's appearance was to put a favorable spin on her proposed bond issue. Threats by the Governor's Office against legislators who refused to buy

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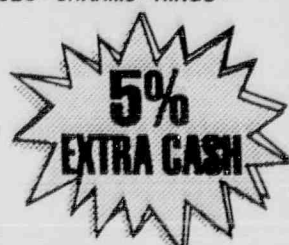

Treffinger appeared at a public session with Governor Whitman to bolster the bond proposal that would raise \$3 million to be used to replenish the depleted fund which resulted from Whitman's tax program.

Treffinger's appearance was to put a favorable spin on her proposed bond issue. Threats by the Governor's Office against legislators who refused to buy

her bond program includes a proposal to cut State Police securities in outlying counties. Her treasurer warned senators that if the bond proposal doesn't pass, local projects wanted by senators may not be funded. State Treasurer Brian Clymer stated, "It will not be possible to accommodate any election-year additions that the Legislature may like." Threatening senators with a retaliation is a dangerous measure. For example, Senator Littell observes, "She's not squeezing me. Anybody that relies on the State Police for security isn't going to be happy with that kind of comment coming out of the mouth of the state's chief executive."

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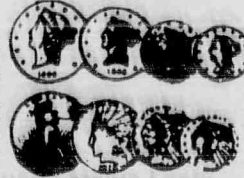

Clearmon Field looking pretty good

If you grew up in Belleville and had any type of affiliation with sports, then Clearmon Field has to be familiar to you.

My first experience on that field came in 1970, when, as an 11 year old, I played Farm League baseball in the spring and Recreation football (my team was sponsored by the Fountain Restaurant) in the fall.

In the mid 1970's, there was the summer basketball leagues on the courts adjacent to Clearmon. We had a lot of fun playing in those leagues from '74-'78. Former Belleville boys' basketball coach **Danny Grasso** ran the league.

The Buccaneer soccer team plays its home games there in the fall. The team has enjoyed enormous success at Clearmon for most of the 90's.

Since 1984, Clearmon Field has been the exclusive home of the Lady Buc softball team. Some will argue it's been longer than that, but the teams from 1980-'83 played a lot of its home games at Belleville High School.

Recently, Clearmon went through a bit of a face lift, with a standout paint job on the softball stands. This was done courtesy of the Belleville Softball Commission.

"It cost us about \$1,000 to get it done," said **Maryanne Lopreato**, a member of the Commission. "It was paid for by the parents, rec coaches and volunteers. We're very happy with the way it came out."

Lopreato notes that Clearmon has quite a nostalgic them to it.

"These kids begin their softball careers here when they play recreation softball in grade school. They end their high school careers here.

"Many come back after high school and help coach and umpire in the recreation leagues. This place means a lot to the players and coaches."

Whether you're going to a Belleville softball game, or just driving down Union Avenue, stop by and see the face lift. It's a first class job.

May 9, 1975

I know, I know. Once a year, I have to write a little something about one of my favorite high school baseball games, albeit a loss.

Tomorrow is 22 years to the day that Belleville and Irvington played an epic baseball game at Belleville High School.

I began to think about that game last Sunday while at the Belleville-Montclair Kimberly Academy G.N.T. contest. **George Zanfini**, now assistant coach for the Bucs, was the head coach of the Bellboys back in '75. It was his first year on the varsity.

Irvington was undefeated heading into that game 22 years ago. They were ranked number one in the state. Belleville was on a roll, having won ten straight games since losing its season opener, at Irvington. (Back then, Belleville and Irvington played each other twice a year because both teams played in the Big 10 Conference).

It was a warm afternoon when the two teams played and you could tell right away that this would be a special game.

Belleville scored first and held a 1-0 lead until the sixth, when Irvington scored a tying run off of Belleville starter **Greg Petite**.

The game would remained tied for another eight innings. It was a marvelous pitching performance by both teams. Petite hurled the first 11 innings with **Bobby Giordano** pitching the next three.

Irvington would eventually win the game in the 14th inning on a three run homer, 4-1. (The game lasted almost four hours).

Neither team would be the same after that game. Belleville would win a game at Wayne Valley the following day, but struggled after that, losing eight of its last 11 games and finishing 14-10.

Irvington would lose its first game a week later and eventually, faded in the final two weeks of the season.

For pure drama, you're not going to find a game with more sub-plots than the Belleville-Irvington game had on Friday, May 9, 1975.

"It was something special," Zanfini tells me from time to time. "You remember more about that game than I do. But you're right, it was the type of game that doesn't come around too often."

Four run rally in seventh clinches berth

Lady Bucs return to Final Four

Carl Corino is now in his 17th season as Lady Buc softball coach. For an amazing 14th time during his tenure, the team has qualified for the county semi finals.

Belleville advanced to the "Final Four" in wild fashion last Sunday, stunning Montclair 12-11 with a four run rally in the last of the seventh inning.

The win capped a week in which Belleville lost some tough games. The Lady Bucs were defeated by Paramus 2-1 and Hackensack, 4-2. They did win an intra conference game over Eastside, 12-2.

Belleville took a 15-5 mark into this weeks action. The team was at Paramus Catholic yesterday and will host Nutley tomorrow afternoon, beginning at 4 p.m. There is a good possibility the two teams could meet again the following day in the county semi finals.

Belleville will be at Pulaski Park in Bloomfield this Saturday for the county semi final, playing the winner of last weeks Nutley-Caldwell game. Game time was yet to be announced, but it's either 5 p.m. or 7 p.m.

Next Monday, it's off to Immaculate Heart for a 4 p.m. start.

"We gotta take it," is how Corino put it following Belleville's unlikely win over Montclair last Sunday. "We knew if we could get to the top of the order, we had a chance to win. Their pitcher was a little wild and we never lost hope."

Belleville was trailing 11-8 heading into the last of the seventh, but scored four times without benefit of a hit.

Actually, the inning started with a single by Marissa Rotino, but she was out at second on a fielders choice by Anabelle Rodriguez.

Melissa Brodo followed with a walk and Nikki Lopreato walked to load the bases. Both walks came on 3-2 counts.

"Our kids showed patience at the plate," Corino said.

Kim Mahoney grounded to the second baseman, but she could not handle the ball and a run scored, with Mahoney safe at first, keeping the bases loaded.

At 11-9, Chrissie Crescenzi reached safely on an error by the shortstop, Brodo scoring and the bases remaining loaded.

Joelle DellaVolpe hit a sacrifice fly that scored Lopreato with the tying run. Gennifer Piscatowski then grounded back to the pitcher, but the pitcher could not handle the ball and the winning run, Mahoney, scored from third base.

The wild ending reminded Corino of a game ten years ago, a contest his team finished on the short end of.

"We lost the (1987) county final in a similar way. We were up 2-0 in the bottom of the seventh and Caldwell scores three times with just one hit, and that was a blooper. Those things happen in this game."

"I have a great deal of respect for Montclair. They're well coached and have a solid ball club. They hit the heck out of the ball against us (17 hits), but we battled, too. We had 12 hits and earned our runs."

Belleville took a 3-0 lead in the first inning when Mahoney, Crescenzi and DellaVolpe singled, DellaVolpe's hit driving home Mahoney. Jessica Rotino then blasted a long double to drive in Crescenzi and DellaVolpe.

Montclair came back and led 4-3 heading into the last of the forth. There, Belleville scored five times to take what appeared to be a comfortable 8-4 lead.

Brodo walked to start the rally and Lopreato tripled her home. Mahoney followed with a home run and Crescenzi walked. DellaVolpe doubled home Crescenzi, but DellaVolpe was out at third trying to stretch a double into a triple.

Piscatowski doubled and later scored the eighth run on a balk.

Montclair scored five times in the sixth and twice in the seventh, setting the stage for the heroics in

the last of the seventh.

DellaVolpe led Belleville with three hits and three ribbies. Crescenzi and Mahoney had two hits each.

Crescenzi was the winning pitcher, gaining her 13th win of the season.

Earlier in the week, the team lost a 2-1 decision to a good Paramus team, ranked 15th in the state. Crescenzi hurled a complete game, fanning two and walking one.

Belleville's only run came in the top of the first when Mahoney singled, went to second on an error, third on a ground out and stole home.

Paramus tied it in the fourth and won the game in the fifth.

Against Eastside, the Lady Bucs won easily 12-2. The team only had four hits but took advantage of 18 walks.

Nicole Russell improved her record to 2-0 with a complete game effort.

The week started with a tough 4-2 loss to Hackensack.

"We didn't play well there,"

Corino said. "We had a load of errors and we were sloppy."

Belleville scored once in the fourth and fifth innings to tie the game at two. In the fourth, Jessica Rotino walked and later scored when Marissa Rotino reached on an error.

In the fifth, Mahoney singled and later scored when DellaVolpe grounded out.

"One of our goals was to reach the county semis," Corino said. "But we're not happy just getting there. We have an experienced club and we hit the ball."

"We feel we can do well there. We're looking forward to the challenge."

NOTES: As mentioned, this is the 14th time in Corino's 17 seasons as coach that the team has advanced to the county semi finals. The first time was 1980, Corino's first season. The last time, prior to this year, was in '95.

Belleville will be looking for its first county title since the '89 team beat Livingston 1-0 in ten innings.

Should Belleville win that game, it would go a long way in helping the team qualify for the state tournament.

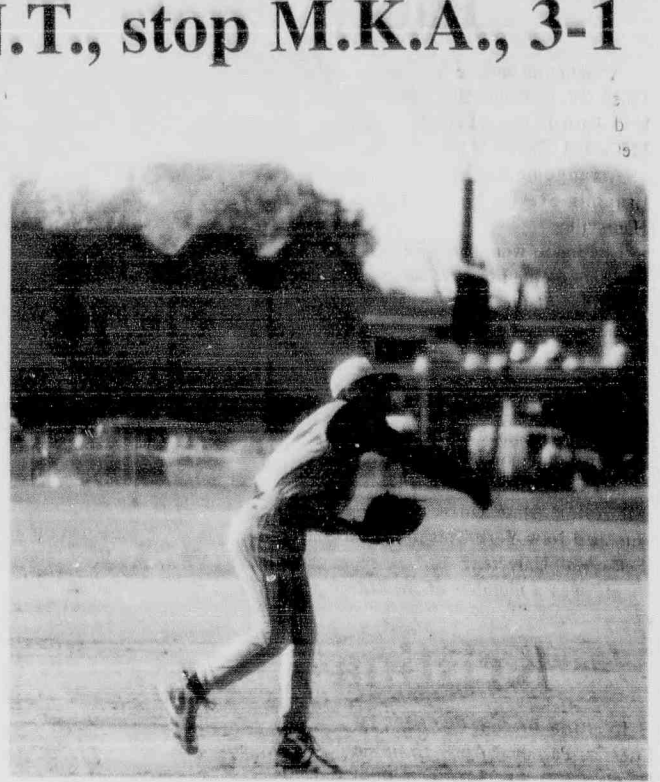

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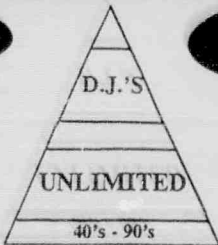
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Eddie is on the mound, they'll be in the game, but we've got to start making plays in the field and getting key hits."

'Clothes bank' formed to assist job seekers

The chairperson of the newly reorganized Essex County Advisory Board on the Status of Women has announced plans to assist the county's "welfare-to-work" efforts through the creation of a "clothes bank" for welfare recipients.

Chairperson Dorcas O'Neal stated that the group plans to collect business attire which would be made available to clients preparing for job interviews and actual work experiences.

"County Executive James Treffinger asked the members of the Advisory Board to join him in helping women make the transition from public assistance to the work force," said O'Neal.

"The board is committed to an action-oriented agenda that will allow us to provide services and programs of benefit to women in need of life skills training and career counseling. With welfare reform legislation putting a five-year limitation on public assistance, it is important that groups such as ours reach out and provide essential help during this critical time of transition for women," she said.

The Advisory Board members, appointed by the county executive and approved by the Board of Freeholders, intend to work with

local colleges and training programs to assist women in acquiring the job skills needed for employment. In addition to their focus on skills training, the board has established the "clothes bank" to provide women the business attire they will need for job interviews and for the actual workplace.

When a job interview has been arranged for a client, she can contact the "clothes bank" and receive two business outfits which they can use for the interview and keep. When women have accepted an actual job offer, two additional business outfits will be available to them.

"In this way, they will not only learn how to dress for the business world, but will have a free week's wardrobe to get them off to a good start," explained the chairperson. Advisory Board members are soliciting business attire throughout the county. Donated clothes must be clean and suitable for business wear.

Dropoff centers have been established around Essex County and anyone wishing to donate clothes may call 733-3340 for the dropoff location nearest to them.

The "clothes bank" project is expected to be fully operational by May 1.
