Lauren Rosenfeld, now a Senior at Belleville High School, was selected in her Junior year to attend a college level course in science at Stevens Institute of Technology.

She was among 40 high school students across the nation to be so honored.

"We studied bio-medical engineering," she said. "It included everything from orthopedic implant to testing an enzyme that exists in both plants and the human body. It was wonderful,"

At school, Lauren, 17, attends three college level classes in biology, history and English, which may qualify for college credits when she passes them.

She is also on the girls varsity volleyball team and she enjoys driving the car given her on her recent obtaining of a driver's license. It was the gift of her mother, Patricia, who is a teacher of autistic children at the Community Mental Health School in Belleville, and her stepfather, the Rev. William Moheit, Pastor of the Belleville Reformed Church, the oldest existing religious congregation in New Jersey.

Lauren is a High Honors Student, and was named Bausch & Lomb Scholar last year, an award which entitles her to apply for certain scholarships and grants from Rochester University, for which she has applied for enrollment.

Her hope is to become a Doctor of Medicine, she said. "I want to help people, hands on,"

She noted that support for her dreams has come from all her teachers in the Belleville school system - "For one of them has turned me off. They have all given me encouragement." - and she credits Science Supervisor Bruce Kemlitz in particular for "opening my eyes to biology."

She accompanied a group of teachers and students led by Kemlitz to the rain forests of Belize in Central America last year.

"I just loved it. Visiting the rain forest opened my eyes to nature. And being there made me realize how fortunate I am. I don't take things for granted any more,

"When I came home, I found myself conserving water and not wasting food. I'm a lot more fortunate that so many people, I found."

Anyone can grow nine-foot high tomato vines, as Fire Captain Chuck Aughenbaugh can testify. Just get 300 pounds of cow manure, a high school student named Joe to turn over the turf and ladle in the compost, throw in the seeds and jump out of the way. A photograph in the Times will attest to it. But Captain Aughenbaugh knows there is more to life than tomatoes. Well, a little more, anyway. In the comfortable, photograph-lined confines of his rambling frame house on Smallwood Avenue, a tree-shaded redoubt bounded in the rear by the Second River and the railroad, Captain Aughenbaugh pursues his many interests outside of his first love, the Belleville Fire Department, which he joined 31 years ago. "If my wife brings home any more strays, I'll need a zookeeper license," he said. Barbara Aughenbaugh, nee Higgins, brings home any stray or homeless creature that comes into her ken. "My son, James, found some baby falcons that had fallen out of their nest. Barbara nursed them until they could go on their own. She has taken care of baby raccoons, squirrels, chipmunks, rabbits. Everything." At one time, she was looking after James' boyhood pet, a boa constrictor, "We finally talked him into trading it for a puppy, a small puppy." The puppy grew, and grew, into a Doberman, able to lean on Aughenbaugh's shoulders. . . . James has forgotten such childhood fancies as a boa constrictor. He now owns a five-foot iguana, which he keeps in his bachelor apartment, along with the iguana owned by his fiancee, Christine DaCunzo of Belleville. The couple was married this past Sunday at St. Thomas Church in Bloomfield. The Pastor put his foot down on having the iguanas in attendance. With James out of the house, the Aughenbaughs are left with two rabbits, three dogs, one cat and no iguanas. Daughter Janice Huber keeps an active business life, operating the Total Eclipse tanning salon on Washington Avenue and operating an ice cream truck in warmer weather. Captain Aughenbaugh's grandfather came from Pennsylvania to open a tavern in Jersey City. The captain's father, Charles, operated the bar at the old Harborside Restaurant in Jersey City, where he became the confidante of every captain who sailed for American Export Lines and a host of celebrities and seafarers. The ability to like people and deal with in a friendly way was passed on to Chuck Aughenbaugh, who likes all creatures, great and small, and does what he can to keep them from becoming fire statistics. He is head of the state Deputy Fire Chiefs Association, and he has written a great deal of the legislation which now codifies fire fighting operations in New Jersey. "Our biggest problem was cooperation in emergencies. We have now accomplished a great deal in providing that." Among his immediate ambitions is to complete his Doctorate studies in Education. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree from New York University in Business, and he has a Master of Arts degree from Montclair State College in Adult Education. He also holds two teaching certificates for Business Studies and Computers, and has taught at Passaic County Community College and Jersey City State College. When last we heard, he had topped the Civil

"I stuck my hand in the wedding cake." Molnar credits Milt Goldfarb, owner of Milt's Photo in Belleville with his going professional. "Miltie was crucial to my career. He encouraged me to make money with photography. He sent business my way. He has grown with me." Molnar also credits Milt's brother, Daniel Goldfarb, owner of a photo store in Elizabeth, and Milt's son, Howard Goldfarb, with aiding him. Ten years ago, Molnar joined the Gabelli Studio - "The best on the East Coast" - a prize winning portrait photography firm operated by Gene Gabelli in Verona. Molnar prides himself on keeping his appointments, regardless of weather or health. Some of his more pleasant jobs have been aboard yachts. "I'm treated like a guest." "It helps those that do not know the story to learn about the Lady of Sorrows and pass on the tradition," Father Zaccardo said.

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

"Apparently we're not the only ones who have noticed the increase in unsafe and over-aggressive behavior being exhibited by drivers on local streets and highways. After our recent editorial 'Summer Stupidity', we have heard about a program begun last week in New York in which state troopers will target aggressive dri-

According to recent reports in the tri-state area, battling motorists have resorted to throwing objects from their cars, driving other motorists off the road and even firing shots at one another. Just such an incident resulted in the tragic death of a Queens woman who was fatally shot on Christmas Day, 1992, as she rode with her husband. The shooting is believed to have arisen from a dispute between her husband and another driver who wanted to pass.

Whether it is caused by the hot weather, the increased traffic or simply drivers' lack of patience we don't know, but it has definitely made driving more dangerous than ever before.

And not only are we faced with violence-prone drivers, we must also deal with the drunken drivers who kill 17,000 people a year, teenagers - statistically the most dangerous drivers on the road and the growing number of motorists who use cellular phones when they drive, posing a distraction for some drivers and a threat to oth-

But our biggest concern and our most dangerous threat is what state police are calling the 'temper driver'. Determined to stop such drivers, state police have launched a summerlong program to focus on those who speed in excess of the traffic flow and who change

While protections are few from such over-aggressive drivers, the American Automobile Association, has some tips on how to avoid

being the victim of road rage: 1. try not to make mistakes which irritate other drivers, such as clogging the passing lane.

2. if you drive more slowly, ride in the right lane or pull over and let others pass on roads with no passing lane.

3. do not respond to aggressive acts with obscene gestures or

4. don't anger other drivers by changing lanes without signaling, tailgating or unnecessary use of your high beams.

5. leave yourself enough time when traveling. Running late is a primary cause of aggressive driving.

6. try to be courteous no matter what.

These tips may not slow down the traffic around you, but hopefully will make your commute or vacation a safer trip this summer." Happy birthday to Debra Restaino.

Rev. Bakal takes pulpit at Grace Episcopal

Answering a timeless call to serve God and follow the prepared path, the Rev. Pamela Brownlow Bakal has embarked upon a spiritual journey that has led her to Grace Episcopal Church, Nutley

Replacing the Rev. Wade Renn, who retired earlier this year, Bakal will be installed officially in the Nutley church on Saturday.

In the few weeks Bakal has lived in the township, she said she already feels comfortable at her new spiritual home.

"This church is a very warm, welcoming and loving church,"

Bakal said of Grace Episcopal. The pastor is a native of Brooklyn Heights, N.Y., and entered the ministry 10 years ago.

She said she is interested in establishing and continuing children's programs

Bakal said she is also very interested in outreach efforts to help the needy.

She has helped impoverished peoples in other parts of the world, including Haiti and Africa. But Bakal says the need can sometimes be found right next door

"Outreach can be to your neighbor," she said. "I think we are often called to give and not make a judgement."

Bakal hopes people will fight off the temptation to look upon needy people as different or inferi-

She said the homeless in particular have the same desires and tastes in food as the average middle-class American.

"We must learn to come out

from the slim perimeters of our lives," she said.

Bakal called the Episcopalian faith a "bridge church" between Catholicism and the Protestant Church

She said her faith tries to strike a balance between the two.

The Episcopal Church maintains many of the traditions of the Roman Catholic Church, she said, while offering a unique indepen-

dence to each individual pastor.

Episcopal bishops can request that a minister undertake a certain endeavor, but they cannot make demands

"Our ultimate authority is Jesus Christ," she said.

Bakal noted many ongoing archaeological discoveries in the mideast have enhanced the historical perspective of Jesus, which she called "exciting.

This week, Bakal is beginning a Bible study focusing on the the Psalms

Bakal expressed great pleasure that Grace Episcopal Church already boasts a variety of children's programs and a dance com-

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'Hands on Health'

Arthritis: a common problem with a therapeutic solution

If you were asked to name the leading cause of physical disability in the United States, what would be your response? Auto accidents? On the job injuries? Birth defects?

As you have probably guessed from the title of this article, the correct answer is arthritis

An estimated 40 million Americans suffer from the disease, half of whom seek medical relief. Many must endure limits on their activity due to a condition defined as "joint inflammation.

Though the term actually comprises over 100 separate identifiable maladies, this article will attempt to address the two most

Dr. Robert Ruffalo common forms: rheumatoid and osteoarthritis. In both, as in all other forms, connective tissues joining bones become stiff and swollen, sometimes to the point that movement is painful at best, excruciating at worst. But beyond this basic commonality,

the two are quite different. Osteoarthritis, the more frequent form, is a degenerative disease found most often in the elderly; its prevailing cause seems to be that the joints merely wear down with age. However, it can also result from infection, injury or surgery, so it is hardly restricted to the aged population. It regu larly occurs in athletes and others whose activities create skeletal stress and is marked by persistent pain and stiffness in one or more joints, espe cially in the morning hours.

The rheumatoid variety is the most common form of crippling arthritis It affects as many as 2.1 million Americans and is more common and severe in women. The onset of this progressive ailment usually comes between the ages of 30 and 50. Unlike ostcoarthritis, which can be limited to one area, rheumatoid arthritis is systemic, influencing the entire body Fatigue, poor appetite, and weight loss are among its frequent additional

The pain and swelling, which may cause visible deformation if unchecked, are usually symmetrical, occurring in the same place on both sides of the body. Most alarmingly, it can spread beyond the joints into surrounding tissues and organs

Though its exact cause is unknown, it appears to be autoimmune related; researchers do not think everyone who becomes infected with the 'virus" will develop the illness

One thing these two conditions share is that the earlier they are diagnosed and treated, the better. Physical therapy is one of the most important components of treatment that can also include rest, application of heat and cold, weight loss to lessen the stress on weight-carrying joints, regular exercise, orthotics (splints, braces or arch supports) and medication.

In some cases, surgery to replace the joint with an artificial one may be required. But physical therapy can often help strengthen and restore range of motion to arthritic joints, making surgery less likely. If surgery is needed, physical therapy is involved in the post-surgical treatment to restore joint motion, increase strength and help improve ambulatory ability, if the knee of hip is involved.

As the population of the country continues to mature, more individuals will have to deal with arthritis in one form or another. Fortunately, that prospect now is not nearly so daunting as in the past.

A little nepotism?

One of the more interesting debates on the Superintendent of Schools Michael Lally. Board of Education recently was a discussion of nepotism - the hiring of relatives.

Board Member Ralph Mazzuca, whose integrity is a lot better than than that of other officials we could name, took the position that nepotism is not all bad.

Prohibitions against hiring a family member, he said, would keep good people from seeking office, particularly if they had an aspiring teacher among their children.

The Board's Policy Committee, chaired by John Notari, is working on a flat ban against hiring relatives.

As far we can gather, the Board has operated without a formal ban on the hiring of relatives since the time of Noah.

But an unwritten policy has prevented the hiring of relatives for at least the past four years, under the administration of

Mr. Lally has prided himself on obtaining teachers and administrators who are "clean" which is to say, not there by influence.

It is true that a ban on hiring relatives would have deprived the school district of some outstanding teachers.

It is also true that there was abuse of the system, in the bad old days when politics had a lot to say in the school system.

A flat ban on the hiring of relatives of Board Members will probably lose us some good people, as Mr. Mazzuca fears.

At the same time, it will reassure taxpayers to some extent that their money will not be channeled to political appointees.

Today, the safeguards against favoritism in the selection of teachers are working.

The perception that we have the best teachers available is reality.

In closed session

One aspect of the legislative process that is the Municipal Office Building. kept from public view, legally, is the closed session of the Township Council in which personnel and litigation matters are dis-

Often, personnel and litigation are tied into each other, because there are any number of issues among employees - and contractors which wind up in the courts.

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
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
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Baseball continues to be a key part of so many lives

(Last in a series on baseball memories)

When I first started writing this feature a few weeks ago about baseball memories, I didn't realize it would last this long. However, looking back on my earliest memories of the game as a nine year old in 1968 and now, 29 years later, the game continues to be a big part of my leisure time.

I guess I'll always be a St. Louis Cardinals fan. No question about that. I've rooted for them for 29 years now and still get mad when they lose and am a little happier when they win.

The 80's were a good time to be a Cardinal fan, thanks to three National League championships and one World Series title. Even when they didn't win, they were close, such as in 1981, '84 and '89. I remember the first time I went to a Cardinals-Padres game in '84 at Jack Murphy Stadium.

It was the famous "Chicken's" tenth birthday party at the Murph and a sell out crowd was on hand. The Padres had a good team that year, they would go on to win the National League title, and the fans were really enjoying the ride.

Anyway, the Cardinals had a young pitcher named Rick Horton on the mound that night. There were 50,000 crazed fans on hand and I thought, for sure, that San Diego would cruise in this game. But the Cardinals hit the ball well and Horton was doing a good job. He was so good that he had a no-hitter going until two outs in the eighth inning. He then gave up a double to Kevin McReynolds and ended up with a two-hit shutout, winning 5-0.

I still have the newspaper from the day following that game. I became a Rick Horton fan from that day in 1984. Horton had a pretty decent career, pitching with St. Louis until 1987, then playing for the Chicago White Sox and Los Angeles Dodgers before returning to St. Louis in July of 1989.

I liked Horton so much that I have one of his cracked bats in my sports bar. I have a Cardinals jersey with his number on it.

After Horton retired from the game in 1991, I decided I wanted to interview him, so I called the Major League Office, and they said they would relay the message to him. Lo and behold, an hour later, I get this phone call at work and it's Ricky Horton.

I go on to tell him that I was at the Chicken game in 1984 and he asks me if I can help get him a tape from that game. I had a customer who does video tapes of all major league games and this customer sent him the tape of that game.

I ended up doing a great interview with Ricky and a few days later, he sent me a few autographed photos, one of which he wrote. "to Mike, the best Cardinal fan I know."

Not only was I a big Rick Horton fan, but also a huge fan of his manager, Whitey Herzog. When I spoke with Rick in 1993, I decided to try and get in touch with Herzog, who at the time, was an executive with the California Angels.

I'll never forget it. I called Whitey, left a message for him, and he called me back about an hour later. Later on during the summer of '93, I was in California on vacation and called Herzog's office to see if I could meet him at Anaheim Stadium.

He said no problem and on July 28, 1993, I spent a few hours in his office, talking baseball. It's a day that I'll never forget. We spoke about Cardinal baseball, he showed me letters from his family back in Missouri and he went over his entire farm system with the Angels, telling me who the top prospects were. He even told me the players the Angels wanted to keep and who they probably

Earlier on that trip. I had spent a few days in Denver, and got field passes for the Cardinals-Rockies series at Mile High Stadium. For three games, I was on the field, in the photographers box, taking pictures of the Cardinals and talking to the players

I remember that Joe Torre was the Cardinals manager then and Don Zimmer was the Rockies third base coach. Today, those two are the brain trusts in the Yankee dugout.

These are events that are engraved in my life. They're good times. My baseball fantasy was to be a relief pitcher for the Cardinals and to warm up in the bullpen during a game. Herzog would then go to the mound and make the signal for me to come in and pitch to one batter.

I would get to the mound. Herzog would hand me the ball and say 'just get this guy out'. And, in my heart, I know I could get one

Baseball memories will last in the hearts of many people, regardless of age. I'm almost 39 years old, but still a little kid when it comes to watching a ball game. I remember being at Dodger Stadium in 1990 when Fernando Valuenzueia pitched a no-hitter against my Cardinals. Even though I didn't want my team to lose, I knew I was watching history when a pitcher threw

I started watching baseball because my mother was in a World' Series pool in 1967. I became a big fan and loved the game because of all the games my father and I would go to together in the late 60's and 1970's. Hopefully, I'll be able to share those times with my own kids one day.

I have wanted to write a book for a long time, and the theme is basically the "Wonder Years" of growing up as a sports fan. I'm not talking just about baseball, but the other three major sports.

It's a project that I hope to begin soon, and these columns cer-

tainly helped in getting some ideas together.

Thanks for letting me share some memories with you and thanks for your input during these past few weeks.
