## Confusion exists over status of project Frantantoni says asbestos removal was voted in 1990

**By Howard Klausner** 

The Belleville Board of Commissioners voted on April 24, 1990, to remove asbestos from the Municipal Building, according to a resolution produced by former Commissioner Vincent Frantantoni.

Frantantoni said this proved that the Commission had responded to a State Department of Health order to remove asbestos from the building

The work coincided with the installation of a new boiler in the building, according to Township officials.

The work, according to the resolution, was contracted to a firm, Guardian, Inc., which was experienced in asbestos removal, and was to be monitored by Testwell Craig Testing Laboratories, Inc.

According to Frantantoni, a partial removal of the asbestos was ordered, on the assumption that the rest of the job would be done later.

A change of government had been voted, and the new Council-Manager government was to take office in July, 1990.

What work on asbestos removal was done by the new government is still to be reported.

The question of what action the State Department of Health took to follow up its order of Jan. 16, 1988 is also unanswered

The question of asbestos in the Municipal Building was raised when the Gaglioti Construction Co. suspended work on its \$1.2 million interior reconstruction job when asbestos was discovered in the building.

Built in 1912, the building had asbestos in its plaster as a fire retardant

The danger posed over the years by the asbestos embedded in the plaster is unknown

Frantantoni said that it probably posed little danger.

"Unless it is friable - or flaking the asbestos would not be a danger." Frantantoni said.

The Township Council discussed plans to remove the asbestos so that work could proceed on the reconstruction.

The Council is expected to give the job of asbestos removal to Niram Contractors of West Paterson, at an estimated cost of \$285 000

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

Born on a farm in Aughnacliffe (she is one of the few persons who can pronounce it correctly) in County Longford, she decided to better her economic situation farming being what it was at the time - and betake herself to America - "It was the money" - doing it on her own. She landed at LaGuardia Airport in 1947 and went on to the home of her aunt, Helen Sullivan, who lived in Jersey City. She also found her way to Schrafft's, the restaurant chain in New York City, where she worked for a year, before meeting Bartley Corcoran at an Irish dance and subsequently marrying him. Mr. Corcoran was employed by a utility company and the couple first made their home in New York, and then in Jersey City, where they bought a house. The family lived 30 years in the house, raising three children, and it was upon Mr. Corcoran's death that his wife decided to move to Belleville to be with daughter Elizabeth McFadden. 

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## The plot thickens, or something

In response to the inference that the Township Commissioners made no response to a 1988 State Department of Health order to remove asbestos from the Municipal Building, former Commissioner Vincent Frantantoni has produced a resolution of the board authorizing asbestos removal in April 1990.

He added that a partial removal was ordered at that time, on the assumption that further work would be done to remove asbestos - either by the Police Department itself, or by the new administration that was due to take office in July, 1990.

According to Mr. Frantantoni, the failure to remove all the known asbestos was not the responsibility of the old Board of Commissioners, but of the new Council-Manager government.

So far as is known, some parts of the Municipal Building were rid of asbestos by a contractor who presumably used safety precautions to do the job. No further work was done until this year, when the Gaglioti Construction Co. of Belleville went to work on the interior of the building and discovered more asbestos.

The January 1990 resolution would show that some effort was made to remove asbestos. One question remains is about the length of time, a full year, before this work was contracted out.

Another question is whether or not the work was done only because a new boiler was to be installed in the Municipal Building in 1990.

There is also a third question which arises. It has nothing to do with anybody's culpability in the matter. It has to do with the necessity of virtually gutting the old building to get rid of asbestos in the plaster.

The School District faced similar problems in removing asbestos from its older buildings, but it did not demolish walls. It covered the asbestos with layers of other materials, which apparently were sufficient to meed the State safety requirements.

Is it really necessary to spend \$285,000 more or less - to get rid of the asbestos danger?

Of course, there is no price limit on safety. But there is a price for ignorance. The public needs to know more about the asbestos situation, and why it was not cleared up years ago.

## The theory of relativity

Unless there was a rush of relatives of School Trustees to get on the School District payroll, it is hard to understand the necessity for a "nepotism" rule enacted by the Board of Education.

Under the administration of Superintendent of Schools Michael Lally, no close relative of a Trustee has been hired by the District in the past four years.

Under the newly enacted rule, no spouse, child or niece or nephew of a Trustee will be allowed to get near a school job.

It means that the last person ever to have been voted into a job by the school board will have been a relative of Frank Montagna, who was given a minor temporary job. But the vote brought a reprimand from the State Department of Education.

That may have galvanized Montagna into action. If his kin cannot get a job, neither can anyone else's. Fine.

The only question we have is whether accident of birth, even to a collateral relative. should bar anyone from a school job.

We can see the right of the Board to police its own members, by prohibiting them from voting on appointments. How do you go

after a nephew or a niece.

This is particularly surprising when you consider that in every wave of immigration, the newcomers have always seemed to go for large families. How many of us can trace ourselves back to families of eight and nine and a dozen siblings?

In some families, right here in Belleville, the number of cousins can be in the scores, all of them denied school jobs if Uncle Fred or Aunt Hannah happen to have been elected to the Board.

Should we stop at nieces and nephews?

How about in-laws, and second cousins, and divorced brothers-in-law? If blood relationships are now a factor, what is to prevent their being extended to relatives of chronic traffic violators, or people who talked back to their teachers?

A nepotism rule is an act of grandstanding, with no more value than a rule prohibiting space aliens from voting. Of course, there is a theory that a lot of space aliens are voting in Belleville, or how would you explain some of the people we have in office?

In the past, Trustees may have stolen with both hands. Why punish their relatives now?
