Series of crashes stuns community

Belleville med student victim of road accident

Maria Bautista; 29; Belleville, died Saturday night as a result of an automobile accident.

Miss Bautista, a native of the Philippines, was a resident of Belleville for the past nine years. She was due to complete her residency requirement to become a doctor next year.

Miss Bautista was in the front passenger seat of a 1992 Mazda travelling north on Washington Avenue when it was in a collision with another car at the intersection of Joralemon Street, shortly before

Police said the driver of the Mazda, David Johnson, 23, of Lyndhurst, was making a left turn at the intersection when the car was hit on the right side by a 1997 Volkswagen Jetta operated southbound on Washington Avenue by Alband Ferreira, 26, an off-duty

Newark police officer.
The Mazda was carried to the side walk on Washington Avenue by the force of the collision. Belleville Fire Department personnel had to remove the doors before they could get to those inside the

Miss Albano was taken by ambulance to Clara Mass Medical Center, where she was pronounced dead at 9:36 p.m.

Mr. Johnson and another passenger, Miss Pautista's sister, Ana Marie were taken from the car. Mr. Johnson was taken to West Hudson Hospital, where he was treated and released. And Marie Bautista was taken to University Hospital in Newark, where she was treated and

Mr. Ferreira, was treated for his injuries at University Hospital. A

Perez, 26, of Union City, was treated for injuries at University Hospital.

No summonses were issued: pending further investigation by Belleville Police Officer Paul Long. The Essex County Prosecutor's office is also investi-

Miss Bautista came with her family to the United States in 1971; settling first in Newark.

She was received her medical degree from Midwestern University in Chicago in 1994. Family members said she chose Saint Michael's Medical Center in Newark for her residency in order to be near her parents and family

A funeral Mass will be offered at 10 a.m. Friday at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart in

Visitation hours at the Megaro 2 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. today. Thursday.

The tragedy that took the life of Miss Bautista was preceded by a series of collisions involving a 66year-old Newark man who has been charged with driving white under the influence

Police said that Joseph Tingoli of Newark was first involved in two collisions in Nuitey, on Franklin Avenue, at Centre and Harrison Streets.

Mr. Tingoli reportedly continued down Franklin Avenue into Belleville

He drove in the opposing tane of traffic, and an oncoming driver, Alexander Topacio, 37, of Belleville, swerved to his right to avoid a head-on collision.

The Tingoli car sideswiped Mr Topacio's car, sending it into an obstacle. Mr. Topacio was knocked unconscious, and was taken to University Hospital for treatment. A passenger in the Topacio car, Annales Dellapena, 30, of Belleville, was treated for minor

The Tingoli car then struck the side of an oncoming car operated by Anthony Vaughan, 63, of Bloomfield, Mr. Vaughan declined treatment at the scene.

After that collision, the Tingoli car struck a car operated by Franco Gencaretti, 35, of Bloomfield. The Genearelli car was spun around Mr. Gencarelli was taken to Clara Maass Medical Center for treatment of his injuries

Two other cars were halted for a red light at the intersection of Belleville Avenue and Franklin Street. The Tingoli car sideswiped both of them

Avining 38, by Belleville, repulled no injuries. The driver of the other car, Laura Greenberg, 30, of Lodi complained of back injuries but declined aid.

Traffic was closed to northbound traffic on Franklin Street for two hours, while cars were towed

and debris was removed. Fire Department, Police Department and ambulance personnel worked to remove the injured.

Mr. Tingoli was arrested at the intersection by Nutley police, who found him unconscious. He was on life support systems at Clara Maass Medical Center

Nutley police released him to Belleville police. He reportedly had two packets of a white powder substance, found at the hospital.

'Disenrolled' figure falls to 0, as families prove residency

School officials were proven right when they ridiculed the idea that more than 100 students in the schools were not legal residents.

Proofs of residency came from the families or guardians of the students, who were in the seventh, ninth and tenth grades.

This followed the vote by the Board of Education to expel the students because proof of residency had not been provided.

School officials said they had misgivings about the expulsion order, which came in the week of a continuing drive to find and expel illegal students.

Teachers and administrators have said that no more iffegal students have been found under the present drive than were found when normal, low key efforts were

The Board has added a part-time residency officer at \$18,000 a year to seek non-residents

Lawsuits have been filed against some parents to recoup "tuition" money allegedly owed.

So far, the money regained has not equaled the money being spent to took for non-residents

Teachers have said that searches for illegal students have been disruptive, rather than productive

'Reformed Church is history of Belleville'

Historian urges federal restoration of cemetery

"This is where Belleville began," he said. "The church is one of New Jersey's most vital historic


"Look at the pews you inhabit, the stained glass windows, the girders upholding the roof. This is an architectural gem.'


The cemetery holds the remains of 62 Revolutionary War soldiers, he said. "I have never seen a place where that many Revolutionary dead are together.'


Speaking of the cemetery, he said. "It ought to be reconstructed, put back into shape that will make Belleville proud. Money could be found, from government or other sources, I am sure.'

When noted author and historian John Cunningham told addressed the 300th anniversary celebration of the Belleville Reformed Church, he urged a concentrated effort on the part of the whole nation to preserve and restore the historic graveyard which, he said, told the history of Belleville, and indeed the history of this country. He also asked if any direct descendants of the Dutch founders of the church were in the audience. None were, but a descendant of one of the later pillars of the church - Engineer Josiah Hornblower - would have been in the audience had he not been indisposed at the moment. That is Joseph Hatch, who is a fifth generation descendant of Josiah, the man who brought the steam engine to the New World in 1753. * * * * The church cemetery has more than a little interest for Joe Hatch. It is his family cemetery as well. The last actual interment there was in 1938, when Grandmother Katherine Morgan Stevens was laid to rest there. Since then, only the ashes have been permitted for burial. Grandmother Stevens was married to Albert Stevens in 1883. On his passing, she married his brother, Joseph Hornblower Stevens in 1914. Her daughter, Mary Stevens, married Nelson Brown Hatch, and they are Joe's parents. Joe's son, Eric Jordan Hatch, and Eric's wife, Carol, are both practicing psychologists in Boone, North Carolina, where Eric is affiliated with Appalachia State College.

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

Eric's children are Douglas, an attorney; Matthew, a linguist who specializes in Russian, and Katie, who works at being 11 years old. So the descendants of Josiah keep active in the public interest, just like their glorious ancestor. The gathering at the Reformed Church celebrating the 300th anniversary of its founding brought out family information from some of the dignitaries in attendance. State Senator John Scott noted that his paternal ancestors were of early Dutch settler stock, "If they hadn't decided to move into New York State instead of New Jersey, they would have been part of the founding congregation here," he said. Scott wore an

orange ribbon signifying his membership in the Orange Society, made up of descendants of the early Dutch in a America. He also wears the green for the Irish side of the family, his mother. Essex County Executive James Treffinger invoked the name of John Calvin. "Both the Reformed and the Presbyterian movements trace their origin to Calvin," he said. He noted that his adoptive father was a staunch Presbyterian, which made Treffinger at home in the Belleville church. Both Scott and his opponent in the election, Nutley Mayor Garry Furnari presented Senate resolutions to the Pastor, the Rev. William Moheit, memorializing the anniversary. Furnari was representing Senator James McGreevey, who just happens to be running for Governor. Scott said he was representing the Republicans • • • • As the election comes to its climax on Tuesday, at least area candidate seems to be heading for a record of some kind. Kenneth Sorkin, Democratic candidate for the State Assembly, claims he has spent time in Belleville every day for the past two months, and that over all he has shaken hands of 30,000 District voters. 

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Book on Newark's 'Little Italy' brings pride to family

The recent publication of Michael Immerso's book, "Newark's Little Italy: The Vanished First Ward" has sparked a wave of pride among Belleville Italian-Americans, but is has special meaning for the Zanfini family, who reside in the Silver Lake section. Jerry Zanfini, the author's uncle, inspired him to write the book.

Mr. Zanfini passed away prior to the publication of the book, and Immerso dedicated it to him.

Immerso's book tells the story of Newark's legendary "old First Ward." His book was the basis of the recent "Caucus New Jersey" documentary, which was televised on PBS Channel 13 and cable stations throughout the state, as well as an exhibit last year at the Newark Public Library.

The First Ward once was home to more than 30,000 people. Countless Italian-Americans, scattered throughout the United States, trace their roots to the legendary neighborhood.

It was the scene of spectacular Italian feasts and processions which drew thousands, and was famous far and wide for its restaurant row on Eighth Avenue, where Joe DiMaggio and other celebrities frequently dined.

In 1953, urban renewal uprooted the heart of the neighborhood. Today, hardly a trace of the First Ward exists, but former First Warders remain loyal to Saint Lucy's Church and thousand return each year for the annual Feast of Saint Gerard.

Immerso explains, "I grew up listening to my father and uncle Jerry telling stories about the First Ward. He always said that I should

First Ward families from as far away as Texas and California sent photographs, combing through photo albums and shoe boxes, and photographs and eventually selected 500 photographs that are now part of a permanent collection at the Newark Public Library named after Immerso's uncle and father. More than 10,000 people visited the photo exhibit last year.

"My dad loved the old First War," said George Zanfini, a teacher at Belleville High School. "My mother, Mary, and our whole family came from there. Dad told great stories around the dinner table, and he always knew someday that Michael would write that book. I'm sure he must be very proud."

The First Ward was a great place to live," said Mary Zanfini. "We all felt like one big family. It was special. And we still go back there for the Saint Gerard Feast. I always walk in the procession."

Immerso will sign copies of his book on Saturday, Nov. 1, at 2 p.m. at Daniel's Den Book Store, 313 Glenwood Ave., Bloomfield.







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Two memorable Belleville-Union games

(First of a two part series)

In last Sunday's Star Ledger, Union High School's football program, from 1978-1993, was voted the greatest high school football dynasty in New Jersey history

If you consider the magnitude of that statement, knowing the talent that has passed through this state in the sport of football, then you have to say that that is quite an accom-

During that 16 season span, Union was coached by Lou Rettino, Sadly, Rettino succumbed to cancer in 1996. His legacy will live forever in the hearts of people who played at Union or were fans of the program. Rettino was well respected throughout the state, not only for his accomplishments on the field, but for his class off it.

I got to know Rettino a little in 1979, when Belleville and Union played a Group IV, Section II semi final game at Giants Stadium. I'll never forget that day, mainly because of the anticipation attached to it.

Belleville, coached by John Senesky, had won seven of its first eight to gain its first-ever playoff berth. Union had also gone 7-1, and on paper, it looked about even.

Union had a little more size, but Belleville compensated with speed in the backfield, led by Lenny Mendola, a talented and brilliant quarterback in Ed Aulisi, two future Hall-of-Famers in Phil Cerza and Frank Fazzini, both of whom were sophomores that fall and a line led by Joe Garofolo and Russ Pagano.

Union had two refrigerator size running backs and a quarterback who could run and pass with the best of them.

The hype leading up to the game was incredible. The fact that it was being played in Giants Stadium just added to the

The game was scheduled to start at noon. The fans were in the parking lot by 9:30 a.m. For the people of Belleville and Union, it was a Super Bowl type of event.

Even the warm-ups had a certain flare to it. It was a perfect autumn day. The sun was shining brightly. I remember the players running out on the field for the opening introductions and the sun glaring off their helmets.

Belleville wore their home blue jersies that day, which was somewhat of a good luck charm because the Bucs had not lost in that uniform all season long

The team also had a motivational lift that day because its star running back, Mike Nicosia gave a stirring pre game speech in the locker room.

Nicosia, a senior that year, could not play because of a knee injury incurred earlier in the '79 season. He had just undergone arthroscopic surgery a few days before and would have given anything for the opportunity to play in that game. Remember, Nicosia was one of those players who, as a sophomore, went through the rebuilding mode, mainly that 63-0 loss to Seton Hall Prep.

Now, he was in prime time and couldn't play in the biggest game of his life

Nonetheless, he would be there to offer support, and it meant volumes to his team.

Next week, we'll look back at that game and also, we'll take a look at a Belleville-Union game played three years later, in 1982, at Belleville High School, also in the Group IV, Section II playoffs

To give you a little background on that contest, once again both teams were 7-1 and were pretty even on paper.

Belleville was the top seed in the Group IV, Section II playoff's that year. That team had, in essence, come out of no-where to make a run at the playoffs.

The '82 ream had a core group of seniors, but many of the premier names had been graduated and this team was made up of some hard nosed players, minus the glamour that was attached to the '80 and '81 seasons.

Dave Grant, Craig Mack, Joe Borrello, Robbie Cancelliere and Jimmy Castelli were some of the mainstavs on that club.

Most memorable of the '82 regular season was THE GAME OF ALL TIME, the 3-2 Belleville victory in week two of the season over Passaic

Passaic was the number one ranked team in the state that fall and was ranked in the rop ten, nationally.

The victory propelled that team to greatness in 1982 and set the state of a memorable playoff game with Union

We'll continue this feature in next weeks issue, looking back on two great games against a team that has been determined to be the greatest dynasty in the history of New Jersey high school football.

Rules of sportsmanship

It can be said that sportsmanship is on the decline at lower levels of sport. This is painful to us, the recreation professionals, coaches and sports officials, who are charged with the responsibility of teaching the ideals of sportsmanlike behavior and fair play.

The issue of sportsmanship is so prevalent that it is emphasized in the Rutgers S.A.F.E.T.Y. Clinic, a training program for volunteer recreational coaches, as well as being featured as a "Point of Emphasis" in the 1997 National Federation Football Rule Book.

"Sports Awareness Educating Today's Youth", the Rutgers program, implores coaches to enhance sportsmanship by teaching the rules and game/league standards, using the coach and parents as role-models, rewarding and disciplining players/participants for their behavior, and setting performance-based goals. It is incumbent upon the coaches to address problems associated with wrongful acts by players and to tell them that any such behavior is unacceptable.

The National Pederation is emphasizing sporsmanship, saving that it "permeates virtually every aspect of our cuiture. The ethics of fair play may be witnessed in all facets of life. Athletics and its companiron, competition, may be the last stronghold of discipline in our

sportsmanship need to be stressed: 'D' beats Bloomfield 12-6

1) Gain an understanding and appreciation for the rules of the contest.

2) Exercise representative behavior at all times.

3) Recognize and appreciate skilled performances, regardless of affiliation

4) Exhibit respect for the officials

5) Display openly a respect for the opponent at all times.

Many high school athletic conhave ferences specifically addressed the issue of sportsmanship and have incorporated regulations governing the conduct of nongame personnel into their respective "Codes of Ethics" for sporting

Furthermore, the National Association of Sports Officials has taken a stand on sportsmanship by trying to curtail abusive behavior in STIOUS

Players, as well as coaches, parents and spectators, must be taught what is and what is not acceptable behavior. Unlike most areas of education, athletics are played before spectators with young people placing their self-esteem on the line with every play.

We must all work to maintain and exhibit good sportsmanship. The administrators, coaches, student-athletes and contest officials have distinct responsibilities to this end. Willful compliance by all conthe fundamentals of good cerned is necessary to achieve the
