'Disenrolled' figure falls to 0, as families prove residency

School officials were proven right when they ridiculed the idea that more than 100 students in the schools were not legal residents.

Proofs of residency came from the families or guardians of the students, who were in the seventh, ninth and tenth grades.

This followed the vote by the Board of Education to expel the students because proof of residency

had not been provided.

School officials said they had misgivings about the expulsion order, which came in the week of a continuing drive to find and expel illegal students.

Teachers and administrators have said that no more illegal students have been found under the present drive than were found when normal, low key efforts were made.

The Board has added a part-time residency officer at \$18,000 a year to seek non-residents.

Lawsuits have been filed against some parents to recoup "tuition" money allegedly owed.

So far, the money regained has not equaled the money being spent to look for non-residents.

Teachers have said that searches for illegal students have been disruptive, rather than productive.

Series of crashes stuns community

Belleville med student victim of road accident

Maria Bautista, 29, of Belleville, died Saturday night as a result of an automobile accident.

Miss Bautista, a native of the Philippines, was a resident of Belleville for the past nine years. She was due to complete her residency requirement to become a doctor next year.

Miss Bautista was in the front passenger seat of a 1992 Mazda travelling north on Washington Avenue when it was in a collision with another car at the intersection of Joralemon Street, shortly before 9 p.m.

Police said the driver of the Mazda, David Johnson, 23, of Lyndhurst, was making a left turn at the intersection when the car was hit on the right side by a 1997 Volkswagen Jetta operated southbound on Washington Avenue by Albano Ferreira, 26, an off-duty Newark police officer.

The Mazda was carried to the sidewalk on Washington Avenue by the force of the collision. Belleville Fire Department personnel had to remove the doors before they could get to those inside the car.

Miss Albano was taken by ambulance to Clara Mass Medical Center, where she was pronounced dead at 9:36 p.m.

Mr. Johnson and another passenger, Miss Bautista's sister, Ana Marie were taken from the car. Mr. Johnson was taken to West Hudson Hospital, where he was treated and released. Ana Marie Bautista was taken to University Hospital in Newark, where she was treated and released.

Mr. Ferreira, was treated for his injuries at University Hospital. A

passenger in his car, Rosalinda Perez, 26, of Union City, was treated for injuries at University Hospital.

No summonses were issued, pending further investigation by Belleville Police Officer Paul Long. The Essex County Prosecutor's office is also investigating.

Miss Bautista came with her family to the United States in 1971, settling first in Newark.

She was received her medical degree from Midwestern University in Chicago in 1994. Family members said she chose Saint Michael's Medical Center in Newark for her residency in order to be near her parents and family members.

A funeral Mass will be offered at 10 a.m. Friday at the Cathedral Basilica of the Sacred Heart in Newark.

Visitation hours at The Megaro Funeral Home, 263 Union Ave., are 2 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. today, Thursday.

The tragedy that took the life of Miss Bautista was preceded by a series of collisions involving a 66-year-old Newark man who has been charged with driving while under the influence.

Police said that Joseph Tingoli of Newark was first involved in two collisions in Nutley, on Franklin Avenue, at Centre and Harrison Streets.

Mr. Tingoli reportedly continued down Franklin Avenue into Belleville.

He drove in the opposing lane of traffic, and an oncoming driver, Alexander Topacio, 37, of Belleville, swerved to his right to avoid a head-on collision.

The Tingoli car sideswiped Mr. Topacio's car, sending it into an obstacle. Mr. Topacio was knocked unconscious, and was taken to University Hospital for treatment. A passenger in the Topacio car, Annalee Dellapena, 30, of Belleville, was treated for minor injuries.

The Tingoli car then struck the side of an oncoming car operated by Anthony Vaughan, 63, of Bloomfield. Mr. Vaughan declined treatment at the scene.

After that collision, the Tingoli car struck a car operated by Franco Genicarelli, 35, of Bloomfield. The Genicarelli car was spun around. Mr. Genicarelli was taken to Clara Maass Medical Center for treatment of his injuries.

Two other cars were halted for a red light at the intersection of Belleville Avenue and Franklin Street. The Tingoli car sideswiped both of them.

Avant 36, of Belleville, reported no injuries. The driver of the other car, Laura Greenberg, 30, of Lodi complained of back injuries but declined aid.

Traffic was closed to northbound traffic on Franklin Street for two hours, while cars were towed and debris was removed.

Fire Department, Police Department and ambulance personnel worked to remove the injured.

Mr. Tingoli was arrested at the intersection by Nutley police, who found him unconscious. He was on life support systems at Clara Maass Medical Center.

Nutley police released him to Belleville police. He reportedly had two packets of a white powder substance, found at the hospital.

'Reformed Church is history of Belleville'

Historian urges federal restoration of cemetery

New Jersey historian and author John T. Cunningham told the 300th Anniversary Celebration of the Belleville Reformed Church that federal and state funding should be available to restore the church cemetery, and make it a properly maintained historic shrine.

"This is where Belleville began," he said. "The church is one of New Jersey's most vital historic sites."

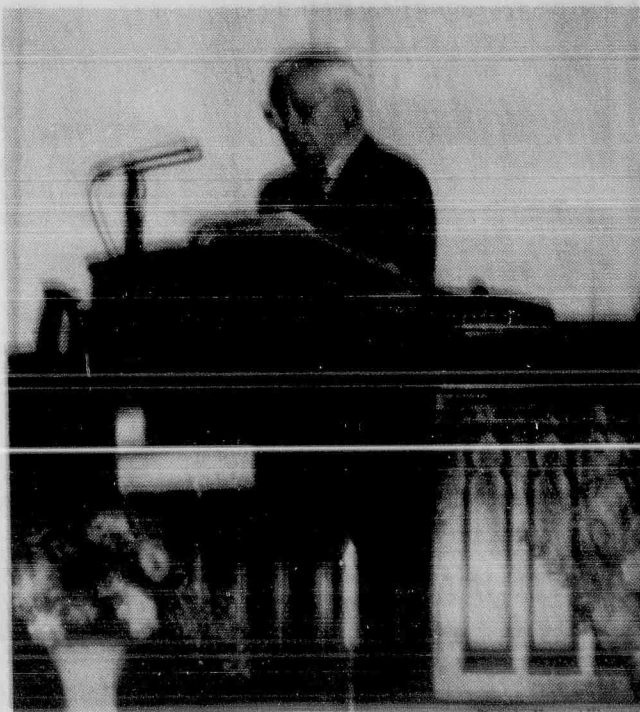
"Look at the pews you inhabit, the stained glass windows, the girders upholding the roof. This is an architectural gem."

The cemetery holds the remains of 62 Revolutionary War soldiers, he said. "I have never seen a place where that many Revolutionary dead are together."

Speaking of the cemetery, he said, "It ought to be reconstructed, put back into shape that will make Belleville proud. Money could be found, from government or other sources, I am sure."

His remarks brought responses from Essex County Executive

Aside from That

When noted author and historian **John Cunningham** told addressed the 300th anniversary celebration of the **Belleville Reformed Church**, he urged a concentrated effort on the part of the whole nation to preserve and restore the historic graveyard which, he said, told the history of **Belleville**, and indeed the history of this country. He also asked if any direct descendants of the Dutch founders of the church were in the audience. None were, but a descendant of one of the later pillars of the church - Engineer **Josiah Hornblower** - would have been in the audience had he not been indisposed at the moment. That is **Joseph Hatch**, who is a fifth generation descendant of Josiah, the man who brought the steam engine to the New World in 1753. • • • The church cemetery has more than a little interest for Joe Hatch. It is his family cemetery as well. The last actual interment there was in 1938, when Grandmother **Katherine Morgan Stevens** was laid to rest there. Since then, only the ashes have been permitted for burial. Grandmother Stevens was married to **Albert Stevens** in 1883. On his passing, she married his brother, **Joseph Hornblower Stevens** in 1914. Her daughter, **Mary Stevens**, married **Nelson Brown Hatch**, and they are Joe's parents. Joe's son, **Eric Jordan Hatch**, and Eric's wife, **Carol**, are both practicing psychologists in **Boone, North Carolina**, where Eric is affiliated with **Appalachia State College**.

Eric's children are **Douglas**, an attorney; **Matthew**, a linguist who specializes in Russian, and **Katie**, who works at being 11 years old. So the descendants of Josiah keep active in the public interest, just like their glorious ancestor. • • • The gathering at the Reformed Church celebrating the 300th anniversary of its founding brought out family information from some of the dignitaries in attendance. State Senator **John Scott** noted that his paternal ancestors were of early Dutch settler stock. "If they hadn't decided to move into **New York State** instead of **New Jersey**, they would have been part of the founding congregation here," he said. Scott wore an orange ribbon signifying his membership in the **Orange Society**, made up of descendants of the early Dutch in **America**. He also wears the green for the Irish side of the family, his mother, **Essex County Executive James Treffinger** invoked the name of **John Calvin**. "Both the Reformed and the Presbyterian movements trace their origin to Calvin," he said. He noted that his adoptive father was a staunch Presbyterian, which made Treffinger at home in the Belleville church. Both Scott and his opponent in the election, **Nutley Mayor Garry Furnari** presented Senate resolutions to the Pastor, the Rev. **William Moheit**, memorializing the anniversary. Furnari was representing Senator **James McGreevey**, who just happens to be running for Governor. Scott said he was representing the Republicans. • • • As the election comes to its climax on Tuesday, at least area candidate seems to be heading for a record of some kind. **Kenneth Sorkin**, Democratic candidate for the State Assembly, claims he has spent time in Belleville every day for the past two months, and that over all he has shaken hands of 30,000 District voters. When last seen, he was headed into **Silver Lake** to press the flesh there. Such is the spell of public office. • • • **Fifth Ward Councilman Harry Zilch** says that people who think a change of government will solve the town's problems are entitled to their opinion. "They are the same people who think a change of uniform will improve a team's standing. But it's the player, not the uniform, that makes the difference." • • • Zilch's political supporters, **The Kool Kucumber Boys**, nearly lost their savings in the recent Market drop. Fortunately, they had spent the eight dollars on beer. "Our solution to these October market collapses - 1929, 1987, 1997 - is simple. Abolish October!" • • • Our Copy Cat, **Baldassaro Di Vincenzo Mitten**, says that the big money in the Senate-Assembly race is coming from the Republicans who are financing Democrats to defeat Scott. "Strange, but true."

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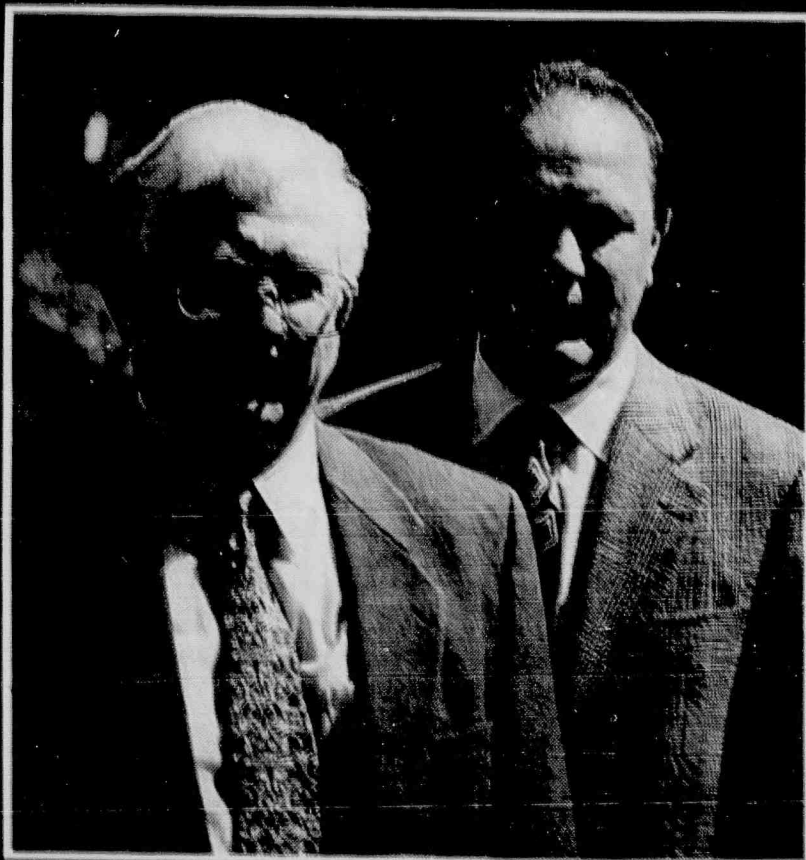
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Book on Newark's 'Little Italy' brings pride to family

The recent publication of Michael Immerso's book, "Newark's Little Italy: The Vanished First Ward" has sparked a wave of pride among Belleville Italian-Americans, but it has special meaning for the Zanfini family, who reside in the Silver Lake section. Jerry Zanfini, the author's uncle, inspired him to write the book.

Mr. Zanfini passed away prior to the publication of the book, and Immerso dedicated it to him.

Immerso's book tells the story of Newark's legendary "old First Ward." His book was the basis of the recent "Caucus New Jersey" documentary, which was televised on PBS Channel 13 and cable stations throughout the state, as well as an exhibit last year at the Newark Public Library.

The First Ward once was home to more than 30,000 people. Countless Italian-Americans, scattered throughout the United States, trace their roots to the legendary neighborhood.

It was the scene of spectacular Italian feasts and processions which drew thousands, and was famous far and wide for its restaurant row on Eighth Avenue, where Joe DiMaggio and other celebrities frequently dined.

In 1953, urban renewal uprooted the heart of the neighborhood. Today, hardly a trace of the First Ward exists, but former First Warders remain loyal to Saint Lucy's Church and thousand return each year for the annual Feast of Saint Gerard.

Immerso explains, "I grew up listening to my father and uncle Jerry telling stories about the First Ward. He always said that I should

Navy Seaman John A. Voss, son of Allan F. and Arlene M. Voss of Belleville, has participated in several community relations projects overseas while assigned to the guided missile cruiser USS Hue City, which is currently on a six-month deployment to the Mediterranean and Arabian Seas.

First Ward families from as far away as Texas and California sent photographs, combing through photo albums and shoe boxes, and photographs and eventually selected 500 photographs that are now part of a permanent collection at the Newark Public Library named after Immerso's uncle and father. More than 10,000 people visited the photo exhibit last year.

"My dad loved the old First Ward," said George Zanfini, a teacher at Belleville High School. "My mother, Mary, and our whole family came from there. Dad told great stories around the dinner

table, and he always knew someday that Michael would write that book. I'm sure he must be very proud."

The First Ward was a great place to live," said Mary Zanfini. "We all felt like one big family. It was special. And we still go back there for the Saint Gerard Feast. I always walk in the procession."

Immerso will sign copies of his book on Saturday, Nov. 1, at 2 p.m. at Daniel's Den Book Store, 313 Glenwood Ave., Bloomfield.

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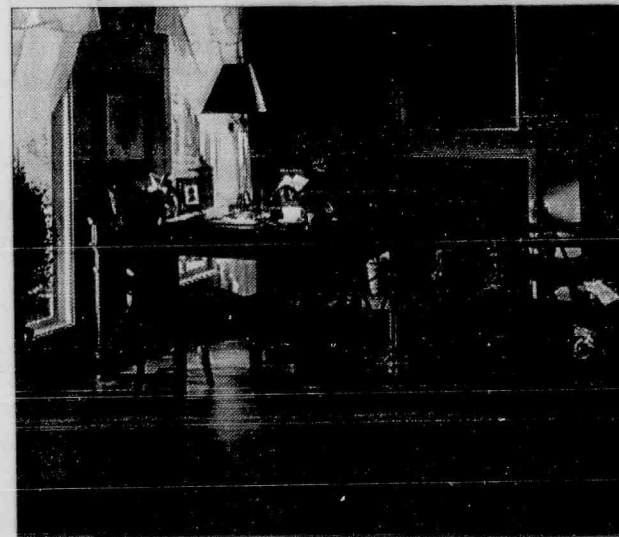

"The feast helps to keep alive the Italian traditions of the old neighborhood," he explained.

For Immerso's book, First Ward families from as far away as Texas and California sent photographs, combining through photo albums and shoe boxes. Immerso examined more than 60,000 images.

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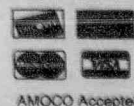

Democracy at work

Vote Tuesday

Americans are unique among the peoples of the world. Wars are fought and men and women died for their privileged right to vote – or not to vote. Tuesday, November 4th, polls are open for everyone of us registered voters to close the curtain behind us and pull down the levers of people best able to handle problems that only legislation can solve.

Voters have been inundated with messages via television, radio, newspaper advertising, and last but not least, sometimes the most vicious – last minute mailings by candidates desperate to clinch the victory. All the candidates seeking re-election, Governor Whitman, Senator Scott, Assemblymen Kelly and DiGaetano and Sheriff Fontoura have enjoyed a good public reputation for

four years, eight years and more. Suddenly, they cannot be labeled dishonest, disloyal and discredited. They have personal reputations built over years and families who adore, love and admire them. Unfortunately, negative campaigns, distorted half truths and some that border on lies are too much of a common occurrence in the 11th hour of Election Day. Re-elect Governor Whitman

True, we pay a salary to the manager, and the manager has considerable leeway in doling out jobs.

But replacing the manager with five politi-

cians who would have the job of administering departments is somewhat like turning the asylum over to the inmates.

We need an expert to manage the town.

We need a competent Council to keep an eye on the manager. And that is the real key to the matter.

Changing the government is not the answer. Putting good people in office is the answer.

We urge a No vote on the change of government.

Fontoura for Essex County sheriff

To repeat our Oct. 23 endorsement of Armando Fontoura in the Essex County sheriff race:

Fontoura has devoted more than 30 years of his life to protecting people and property from others who try illegally to steal the hard-won fruits of labor.

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Free or reduced meal program for eligible children

The Cerebral Palsy Center of Essex & West Hudson has announced that meals/milk will be available to all children enrolled, and will be provided free to children from households whose gross incomes are at or below those shown on the income scale below. Applications were sent to households of all enrolled children.

Foster children are also eligible for free or reduced price meals and/or free milk.

Application forms are available at your child's school and application can be made at any time during the school year. If a household member becomes unemployed, or the household size or income

changes during the school year, parents should contact the school so that all children receive the proper benefits.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the application: names of all household members; household income listed monthly by the amount received by each household member and the type of income it is; the signature and social security number of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct. Households are required to report increases in household income of over \$50 per month, or \$600 per

year and decreases in household size.

The information provided by parents on the application will be kept confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

The school will advise parents of their child's eligibility within 10 working days of receipt of the application. Any parent dissatisfied with the eligibility determination may contact the school to request an informal conference or may appeal the decision by requesting a formal hearing.

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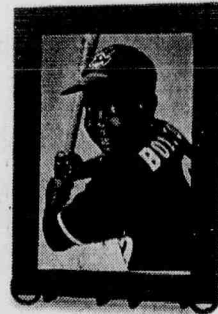
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DEAR FELLOW REPUBLICANS,

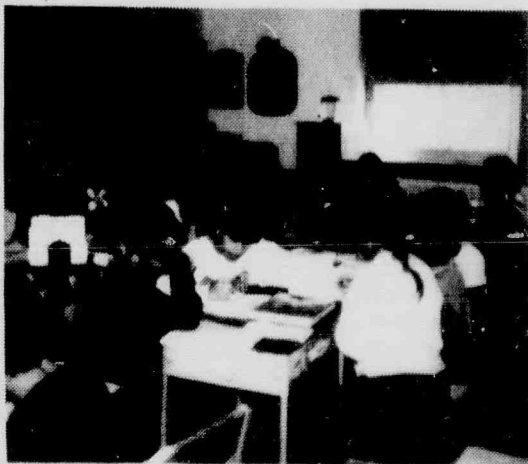

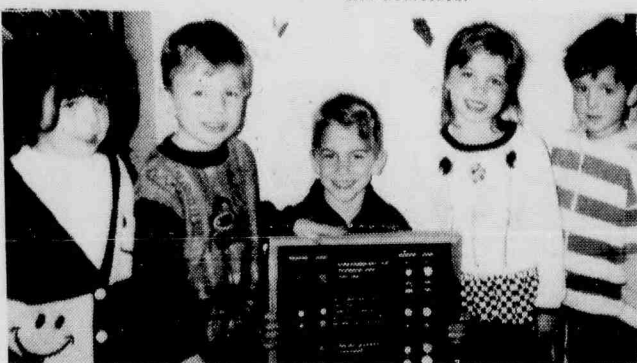

James Treffinger, State Senator John Scott, Mayor Mario Drozd and Council Member William Escott, as well as Senate contender Gary Furnari, promising support for the proposal.

Mr. Cunningham spoke about the importance of the Dutch in settling America, and this part of the nation in particular.

Crucial to the development of the Belleville area was the church itself, which founded the first grammar school and acted as a rallying point - and occasionally as a fort - for the Patriot cause, due to its location by the strategic bridge that crossed the Passaic River.

Cunningham noted the "ecumenical spirit" that led to the reconstruction of the church after a disastrous storm in the 1830s, and noted that Episcopalians and Dutch Reformed congregations used each other's facilities when necessary.

The church welcomed government officials, former pastors and the general public to this historic service.

"You who signed the guest lists," the Rev. William Moheit said, "are now part of history."

Letters came from President Bill Clinton and Governor Christine Todd Whitman, from United States Senators Frank Lautenberg and Robert Torricelli, from former members and former pastors, and from more people than could be recounted by the Pastor.

Treffinger, Scott, Drozd, Escott, a spokesman for Representative William Pascrell, and others spoke, among them the Rev. Robert Shaver and the Rev. Roland Perez.

Members spoke of their love for the church, and their memories of it. The organ - described by Cunningham as possibly the best organ in the state - reverberated through the building and the choir sang "How Great Thou Art" and "God Bless America" while the congregation sang "The Church is One Foundation" and "God Be with You".

The church then looked forward to the next 300 years, and the coming millennium.

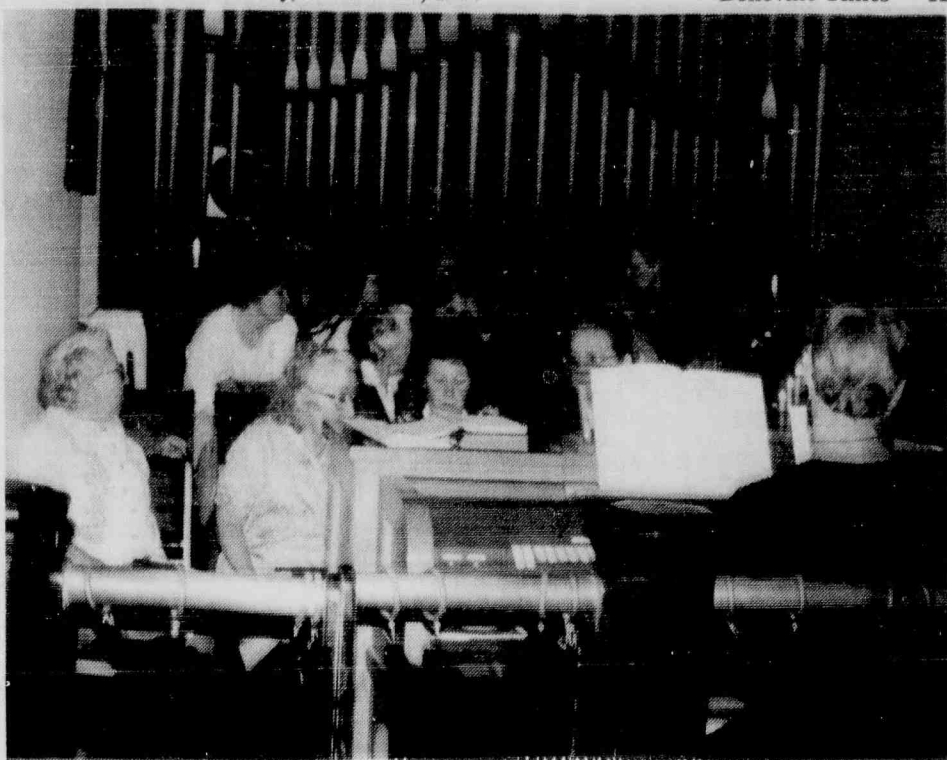

new business. They will also highlight current growth industries and share projections on future business growth and workforce needs in the region.

Topics will include how to develop a business plan and where to find available financing. Representatives from leading financial institutions will assist with financial planning strategies.

A special workshop will focus on doing business with Essex County government and will cover the bidding process and performance bonds, and will outline the types of goods and services the county purchases on an annual basis.

Job seekers will find help with resume writing and interviewing techniques from employment training specialists. A new computerized, on-line employment service that provides lists of current job opportunities will be available for hands-on exploration. Known as "One-Stop Career Centers," this free computerized service from the state Department of Labor is available at sites throughout Essex County.

Fitts is the son of Edna Fitts of Belleville, and Ronald Fitts of Irvington.

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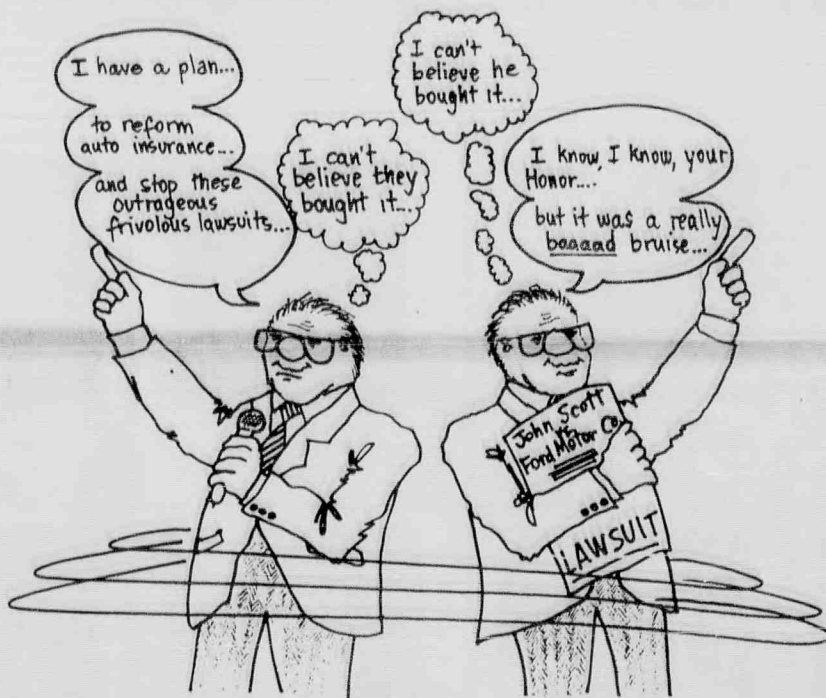

Two memorable Belleville-Union games

(First of a two part series)

In last Sunday's *Star Ledger*, Union High School's football program, from 1978-1993, was voted the greatest high school football dynasty in New Jersey history.

If you consider the magnitude of that statement, knowing the talent that has passed through this state in the sport of football, then you have to say that that is quite an accomplishment.

During that 16 season span, Union was coached by **Lou Rettino**. Sadly, Rettino succumbed to cancer in 1996. His legacy will live forever in the hearts of people who played at Union or were fans of the program. Rettino was well respected throughout the state, not only for his accomplishments on the field, but for his class off it.

I got to know Rettino a little in 1979, when Belleville and Union played a Group IV, Section II semi final game at Giants Stadium. I'll never forget that day, mainly because of the anticipation attached to it.

Belleville, coached by **John Senesky**, had won seven of its first eight to gain its first-ever playoff berth. Union had also gone 7-1, and on paper, it looked about even.

Union had a little more size, but Belleville compensated with speed in the backfield, led by **Lenny Mendola**, a talented and brilliant quarterback in **Ed Aulisi**, two future Hall-of-Famers in **Phil Cerza** and **Frank Fazzini**, both of whom were sophomores that fall and a line led by **Joe Garofolo** and **Russ Pagano**.

Union had two refrigerator size running backs and a quarterback who could run and pass with the best of them.

The hype leading up to the game was incredible. The fact that it was being played in Giants Stadium just added to the aura of the contest.

The game was scheduled to start at noon. The fans were in the parking lot by 9:30 a.m. For the people of Belleville and Union, it was a Super Bowl type of event.

Even the warm-ups had a certain flare to it. It was a perfect autumn day. The sun was shining brightly. I remember the players running out on the field for the opening introductions and the sun glaring off their helmets.

Belleville wore their home blue jerseys that day, which was somewhat of a good luck charm because the Bucs had not lost in that uniform all season long.

The team also had a motivational lift that day because its star running back, **Mike Nicosia** gave a stirring pre game speech in the locker room.

Nicosia, a senior that year, could not play because of a knee injury incurred earlier in the '79 season. He had just undergone arthroscopic surgery a few days before and would have given anything for the opportunity to play in that game. Remember, Nicosia was one of those players who, as a sophomore, went through the rebuilding mode, mainly that 63-0 loss to Seton Hall Prep.

Now, he was in prime time and couldn't play in the biggest game of his life.

Nonetheless, he would be there to offer support, and it meant volumes to his team.

Next week, we'll look back at that game and also, we'll take a look at a Belleville-Union game played three years later, in 1982, at Belleville High School, also in the Group IV, Section II playoffs.

To give you a little background on that contest, once again both teams were 7-1 and were pretty even on paper.

Belleville was the top seed in the Group IV, Section II playoffs that year. That team had, in essence, come out of no-where to make a run at the playoffs.

The '82 team had a core group of seniors, but many of the premier names had been graduated and this team was made up of some hard nosed players, minus the glamour that was attached to the '80 and '81 seasons.

Dave Grant, **Craig Mack**, **Joe Borrello**, **Robbie Cancelliere** and **Jimmy Castelli** were some of the mainstays on that club.

Most memorable of the '82 regular season was **THE GAME OF ALL TIME**, the 3-2 Belleville victory in week two of the season over Passaic.

Passaic was the number one ranked team in the state that fall and was ranked in the top ten, nationally.

The victory propelled that team to greatness in 1982 and set the state of a memorable playoff game with Union.

We'll continue this feature in next week's issue, looking back on two great games against a team that has been determined to be the greatest dynasty in the history of New Jersey high school football.

Bucs defeated at Hackensack

Despite the final score, there were some good things that happened for the Buc football team last Friday night at Hackensack.

"If that play stands, we have a shot at cutting the lead to 21-7," Dowling said. "But once again, mistakes were costly."

Dowling was happy with his teams effort, especially in the second half.

"They didn't quit," the coach said. "We stopped Hackensack late in the game when they had a first and goal on our five. The kids

showed pride."

The bye week comes at a good time for the Bucs.

"We're two-thirds of the way through our season," Dowling said. "We've got to get ready for Eastside, who has some good athletes and team speed."

"In a way, they remind me a lot of ourselves this year. They've been hurt by mistakes, but have the ability to make big plays."

NOTES: Bucs are 5-2 against Eastside in series that started back in 1982. Bucs wins came in 1982, '84-'86 and last season. In the '96

game, Bucs won 19-18, rallying in the second half.

Eastside's victories came in 1987 and '89.

Freshman team is 4-2 so far this season. J.V. team has one win, but has been very competitive in a few other games, losing by 6-0 counts.

Dowling plans on making the most of the week off.

"We might make some changes in personnel," the coach said. "It will give the coaches and players a chance to see where we've been and what has to be done to improve."

Rules of sportsmanship

It can be said that sportsmanship is on the decline at lower levels of sport. This is painful to us, the recreation professionals, coaches and sports officials, who are charged with the responsibility of teaching the ideals of sportsmanlike behavior and fair play.

The issue of sportsmanship is so prevalent that it is emphasized in the Rutgers S.A.F.E.T.Y. Clinic, a training program for volunteer recreational coaches, as well as being featured as a "Point of Emphasis" in the 1997 National Federation Football Rule Book.

"Sports Awareness For Educating Today's Youth", the Rutgers program, implores coaches to enhance sportsmanship by teaching the rules and game/league standards, using the coach and parents as role-models, rewarding and disciplining players/participants for their behavior, and setting performance-based goals. It is incumbent upon the coaches to address problems associated with wrongful acts by players and to tell them that any such behavior is unacceptable.

The National Federation is emphasizing sportsmanship, saying that it "permeates virtually every aspect of our culture. The ethics of fair play may be witnessed in all facets of life. Athletics and its companion, competition, may be the last stronghold of discipline in our society."

The fundamentals of good sportsmanship need to be stressed:

2) Exercise representative behavior at all times.

6) Display pride in your actions at every opportunity.

Many high school athletic conferences have specifically addressed the issue of sportsmanship and have incorporated regulations governing the conduct of non-game personnel into their respective "Codes of Ethics" for sporting events.

Furthermore, the National Association of Sports Officials has taken a stand on sportsmanship by trying to curtail abusive behavior in sports.

Players, as well as coaches, parents and spectators, must be taught what is and what is not acceptable behavior. Unlike most areas of education, athletics are played before spectators with young people placing their self-esteem on the line with every play.

We must all work to maintain and exhibit good sportsmanship. The administrators, coaches, student-athletes and contest officials have distinct responsibilities to this end. Willful compliance by all concerned is necessary to achieve the goals of sportsmanship.

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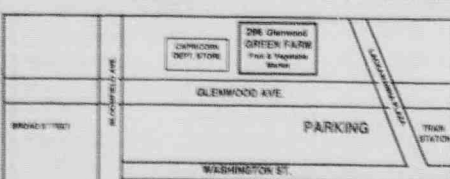
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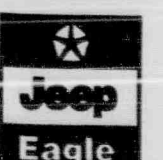
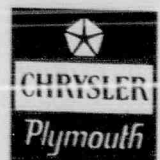

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL OF THE TOWNSHIP OF BELLEVILLE, NEW JERSEY:

WHEREAS, the Township Council of the Township of Belleville has reviewed the Administrative Code, Chapter II of the General Revised Ordinance of the Township of Belleville, and

1. Chapter 2-6.9, Division of Buildings and Grounds is amended as follows:
By deleting Paragraph d. in its entirety and replacing it with new Paragraph d.:
d. Perform those functions as required and directed by the Director of Public Works.

2. Delete Section 2-6.10 in its entirety.

3. Delete Section 2-7.8 Advisory Health Council in its entirety.

4. Delete Section 2-8.5 Building Development Advisory Council in its entirety.

5. Amend Section 2-7.13, Senior Citizen Advisory Board as follows:

Delete Section 2-7.13 in its entirety and replace with new Section 2-7.13 as follows:

2-7.13 Senior Citizen Advisory Board. There shall be a Senior Citizen Advisory Board within the Division of Human Services. The board shall consist of seven members to be appointed by the Municipal Council, each for a term of three years, except that of those first appointed, three shall be appointed for a term of one year, two shall be appointed for a term of two years and two shall be appointed for a term of three years. The members of the board shall include the Presidents of the Senior Citizen Clubs known as the Tuesday Club, the Friday Club, the Belleville Chapter of the AARP and the Old Guard, or other organizations at the discretion of the Municipal Council. The members of the board shall serve without compensation. The board shall:

a. Consult with the Director of Human Services on matters involving senior citizens concerns.

b. Study the needs of the senior citizens of the township and make reports and legislative recommendations to the municipal council for action.
