Township mourns death of Alexander Jegdic, 14-year-old refugee from war

Funeral today for boy struck by hit-and-run, Massive police work brings a speedy arrest

"They ran for their lives, hoping they would find a better future. Instead, they found death."

The Rev. Giordano Belanich spoke of the family now grieving the loss of their son, Alexander Jegdic, 14, who died at 12:30 p.m. Monday at Clara Maass Medical Center as a result of massive injuries sustained when he was struck by a car at Union Avenue and Little Street, at 6 p.m., Thursday.

Alexander had been on life support systems from the time he arrived at the hospital. Police said he had been thrown 150 feet by the impact.

Injured with him was his friend, Rafad Bosnjakovicz, 15, who was carried some 450 feet on the hood of the same car that hit Alexander.

He has been recuperating from his injuries, which include a broken leg, at University Hospital in Newark.

The driver of the car, Alberto Hernandez, 32, of Belleville, was arrested the following day, and now faces a charge of aggravated vehicular homicide.

Alexander was born in Mostar, in Bosnia, on April 23, 1983, to Alenko and Snezana Jegdic. The father practiced veterinary medicine. The couple has two daughters, Tatjana, 17 and Vedrana, 12.

When civil war broke out, the family fled its home for Italy.

"The oldest daughter still has nightmares of bombs dropping on them," Father Belanich said.

The family was now penniless, living on aid from welfare organizations. Under the auspices of United States Catholic Conference, the family was brought to America and settled in Belleville in September.

Alexander had registered as a freshman at Belleville High School on Monday, last week.

His friend, Rafad, had come to Belleville two years ago, and he was scheduled to be Alexander's "English language buddy", to help him through his English courses.

The boys had been at a girls' soccer match when they were returning home. They lived near each other on Washington Avenue.

A driver behind the Hernandez car witnessed the accident, obtained a partial number of the license plate and telephone police.

Mrs. Mario Drozd, wife of the Mayor, was behind that car.

"I saw the body in the street, and I was so overcome, I began screaming. Then someone came running into the street and yelling, 'Where is the second one?'"

Mrs. Drozd said that this led to the search for Rafad, who had been carried on the car for some 450 feet. "Without the witness, we would not have found him," Mrs. Drozd said.

The first police officer at the scene was Paul Long. He was joined by other officers as well as the Fire Department emergency squad, the Nutley Rescue Squad and the Clara Maass Mobile Intensive Care Unit.

While Long gathered evidence at the scene, police mobilized to find the vehicle.

Detectives James Giuliano and Mark Minichini led the investigation which enlisted the services of 14 detectives and police officers.

"We had 1,000 license plates to work on," Minichini said. "It was the 17th that turned up."

At 7:30 p.m., Friday, the detectives arrested Mr. Hernandez. They said he had replaced the front windshield of his car.

But there were shards of glass and specks of blood in the car, police said.

At Monday's meeting of the Township Council, praise was given the police for their effective effort to find the driver.

Police said Mr. Hernandez told them he had panicked, when he fled the scene.

A Funeral Mass was scheduled for today, Thursday, at 10 a.m. at St. John the Baptist Church, 239 Fairview Ave., Fairview in Bergen County. Entombment will be at Wood-Ridge Memorial Gardens.

Change of government rejection

The margin of defeat widens

Examination of a defective voting machine has resulted in additional votes against the proposed change of government.

The machine in the Fifth District of the Fourth Ward had not registered the vote on Public Question 4 - Municipal Change of Government, for a reason not yet explained.

After a court order to examine the machine was obtained by Township Clerk Mary Lou Hood, the vote was found to be 104 in favor of change back to commission government, and 153 opposed.

This made the final tally, except for provisional votes which are yet to be counted, 3,039 opposed and 2,763 in favor.

Mrs. Hood said the provisional votes could not change the outcome.

The number of voters who took the trouble to vote for or against the proposal was about two thirds of those who cast votes for government.

The voter turnout was given as 52.43 percent of the registered voters. In 1993, the previous gubernatorial year, the turnout was 60 percent.

The rejection of the proposal means it cannot be put on the ballot again for five years, township officials said.

The outcome preserved the job of Township Manager Raymond Kimble, who became an issue in the election. His \$105,000 a year salary, and the salaries paid to members of his office staff, were given as reasons to abolish his job.

The 53-point increase in the municipal tax was also expected to result in voter discontent.

The proponents of the change were Zoning Board of Adjustment member Jerry DeGuariso and former Board of Education member Robert Fuscaldo.

Political activists such as former

Council Member Joseph Scaperrotta and Richard Yanuzzi were more visible in the petition drive that put the proposal on the ballot.

Mayor Mario Drozd, who had campaigned a decade ago to have the mayor-council government adopted by Belleville, argued that commission government would be corrupt and inefficient.

Council Member William Escott said the aim of the change was to get rid of Manager Kimble.

The Times opposed the move editorially, arguing that it would turn the administration of the township's departments to politicians.

At the first meeting of the Township Council since the election, the defeat of the change in government was barely mentioned.

The sparse audience included few of those who had supported change. Former Commissioner Vincent Frantantoni was present, and his remarks dealt with safety conditions on the streets.

On the Council itself, there was little self-congratulation.

Councilman Vincent Canning urged direct election of the mayor, a suggestion that brought vigorous opposition from most of the

Council.

Canning argued that selection of mayor - which is supposed to be a ceremonial position - resulted in a "blood bath" which produced enmities and divisions on the Council.

Council Members Jim Messina and Escott disagreed strongly, and the proposal was tabled, pending a hearing at the next work session.

Belleville detective honored for bravery

Detective Dante Pasquale of the Belleville Police Department received the Knights of Columbus Shield Award for bravery on the job, last Monday night at the Knights Hall.

Pasquale was awarded for his arrest of an armed robber.

The undercover patrolman responded to a call that a grocery store was held up by gunpoint.

He picked up pursuit of the suspect vehicle and followed him into

Newark.

After several miles, the suspect crashed his car and ran away on foot with Pasquale running after him.

The suspect had a .357 cal Magnum in his hand and ran up to an occupied car and tried to carjack the car while waving the gun and yelling to the occupants, according to police.

After an unsuccessful carjack attempt the suspect fled on foot with Pasquale in hot pursuit, police said.

Pasquale closed the gap on the suspect who gave up his gun and was placed under arrest.

"This was a terrific job by Detective Pasquale displaying distinctive courage in the face of a clear and present danger," Belleville P.D. Captain Leonard Burrell commented.

For some kind of record in holding the line for a telephone call, we cite the tale told us by the **Rev. David Stinson** of the **Glen Ridge Congregational Church**. It seems, he said, that **New College of Oxford University** was built in the 17th century, which makes it pretty modern by British standards. "The ceilings of the refectory, or dining hall, are held up by huge oak beams, and the passage of time has finally made them unsound. To replace them is not easy, because few lumber stores have beams that size. So someone called the Royal Forester, who has charge of **England's** parks, and asked if there were any huge oaks available to do the job for New College. 'We have been expecting your call,' the Royal Forester person said. 'When the college was built, the architect ordered the planting of oak trees just to be replacements. They are just about ready now.'" * * * * The **Rev. Joseph Martin Hanly** has called from **San Francisco** to tell us of his latest peregrinations. Father Hanly, who spent much of his 72 years working with the poor as a member of the **Paulist Fathers** is in retirement of sorts - "Thrown on the heap of yesteryears" is how he puts it - and in residence at **Old St. Mary's** - "The original cathedral for **California**, built in 1854 by a **Bishop Alemany**, the first Bishop of California" - which survived the earthquake and fire of '06 and then the earthquake of '87, but sustained a severe fire in the latter disaster, and is still being refitted. The church is in the predominantly Chinese-American part of town, and its school population is made up of children, a large part of them non-Catholic, who are given an education in Chinese culture as a standard school subject. There is some poetic justice in that, because much of the granite stone used in the Cathedral was quarried and cut in **China** and brought as ballast by the Clipper ships that plied the Pacific * * * * Father Hanly tells of his recent visit to **Rome** where he preached for a week at **Santa Susanna Church**, which is popularly known as the American church because it caters to Yanks. His topic was "What's the purpose of your life", which should have brought any number of angry replies from the tourists. "A lot of the people who come aren't Catholics. They slide the door of the Confessional and say 'Father, I'm not a Catholic, but could you tell me where I can get an American hamburger?' He sends them to the right place with his blessing. At least one minor miracle occurred. On his first night of preaching, a lady approached him and

Father Hanly was happy to inform her that his very own grandmother, **MaryLou Dorsey**, was born in Belleville in the 1860s, that his father was a Belleville policeman as were his brothers, **Michael Hanly, 82**, of Belleville and the late **John Regis "Brud" Hanley**. She was happy to inform him that her father, **William Beck**, had been prominent in the **Belleville Knights of Columbus**, and perhaps we shall hear more from Mrs. Bianchi. Free oral cancer screening at Belleville Health Department

The Belleville Health department will offer a free oral cancer screening to Belleville residents on Wednesday, Nov. 19, from 10 a.m. to 12 noon.

The screening will be held at 50 Newark Ave., Suite 207.

Pre-registration is required. Please call 450-3393 to register.

Oral cancer is a highly curable cancer when diagnosed and treated early, the department said. Oral cancer is most common in males over the age of 40 and risk factors include use of tobacco in cigarettes, cigars, pipes and smokeless tobacco, as well as excessive consumption of alcohol, the department said.

The department said that squa-

mous cell carcinoma is the most common malignant oral tumor, accounting for 90 to 95 percent of all oral cancers, and most of these cancers occur on the lower lip rather than intraorally.

A major factor in lip cancer, the department said, appears to be intense sunlight.

All chronic ulcerative lesions that fail to heal in one to two weeks should be examined by a physician and biopsied, if necessary, in order to be properly diagnosed, according to the department.

Thomas Longo, health officer, urges Belleville residents to take advantage of this free screening offered by the Belleville Health Department.

And remember, we love Silver Lake.

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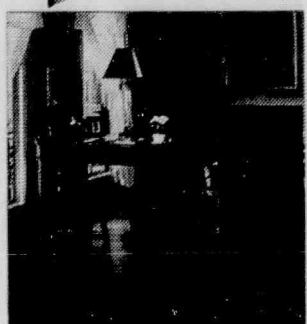

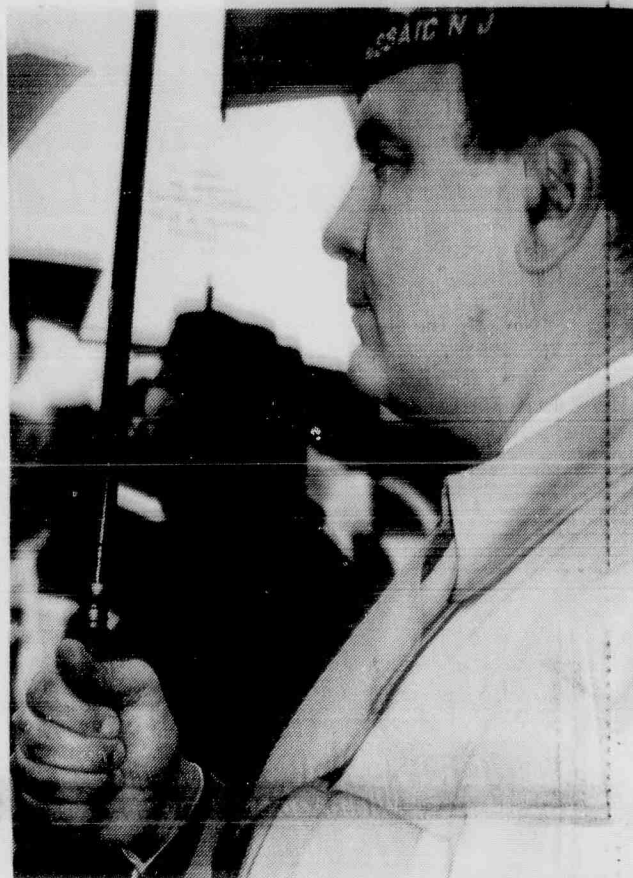

Governor Whitman's re-election

We supported the re-election of Governor Christie Whitman because we believed she compiled a four-year record as a competent chief executive governing a scandal-free administration. Except for the multi-billion dollar bond issue, we thought her overall record was worth supporting.

Since the New Jersey constitution prohibits Whitman from running for a third term, she probably will have less control over the Legislature than she enjoyed during her first term. A couple of legislators already have their eyes on the prize — the Republican gubernatorial nomination in the year 2001.

The front runner for the next Republican gubernatorial nomination is the likeable Senate President from Union County, Donnie DeFrancesco. Former Senate

Presidents served a maximum of four years. DeFrancesco will probably end up serving at least ten years — quite a tribute to his leadership.

On the Democrat side, Senator Jim McGreevey who lost his Democrat gubernatorial bid by one percent of the vote, says he will seek the nomination four years hence. On the Democrat gubernatorial horizon, we see the faces of the new Democrat Senate Minority Leader Dick Codey and Congressman Robert Andrews who was elected in 1990 to complete the unexpired term of Jim Florio who resigned after he was elected governor.

Concern over school crossings

I contacted the county several times. On my eighth or ninth conversation with them, they said it was a town problem. In turn, I contacted Mr. Raymond Kimble, town manager. He said he would correct the problem.

He did send police officers to the 4 corners during school hours, which I applaud him for, but only for four days. What happened? In my petition, I ask for these corners to be fixed (put the necessary signs up).

I leave work three hours early to pick up my children so they don't get hit by a car. Also, in the petition, I've stated our (Belleville-America) crossing guards should have (1) walkie talkies to call police in case of an emergency; (2) whistles; (3) larger signs for those who fail to see or pay attention to these signs.

Now, for example, a crossing guard in Nutley was killed. I care very deeply for all of our crossing guards, especially Mario, our 4 corners crossing guard.

To me, he risks his life every day to cross our children. Do we have to wait until he or a child, maybe my child, gets hurt or killed?

I voted for the first time in 16 years to change from manager to commissioner because I feel someone who lives in my district and drives down the streets sees with his own eyes what is happening. Please, for all your readers that read the town paper, make a phone call to the town manager or police department (whoever), make some noise before one of our children, crossing guard, family member, etc. gets hurt or even killed.

Don't blow this off. This is important to me and you.

So to you, Mr. Kimble, I am willing to take a day off from work and meet with whomever I need to to show him the problems, not just there but also with the lack of concern by the town for "our" crossing guards.

The present Essex County executive, James Treffinger, a Republican, is expected to seek a second four-year term in the November 1998 general election.

Tough decisions for Buc football

Following the Bucs 28-0 loss to Paterson Eastside last Friday night, head coach Pat Dowling took a hard look at his 0-7 team and realized that the future has to begin now.

Belleville will host Don Bosco tomorrow night, at 7 p.m. It's the final home game for the Bucs this season.

The Eastside game was a contest the Bucs felt they could win, but once again, the team was victimized by turnovers and penalties.

"It's the same story, we shot ourselves in the foot too many times," Dowling said. "Our offensive line didn't play well, either. We started a sophomore quarterback (Marquis Talmadge) and he will need time to learn the varsity game."

"These things will come with experience, but right now, we're suffering with growing pains."

Belleville trailed at the half, 21-0 and never really threatened in a game played before the smallest crowd in, perhaps, the history of Doc Ellis Field.

"It wasn't one of our better games, that's for sure," Dowling said. "Their first touchdown came on an interception return, and that

was my fault. I shouldn't have made that call in that situation."

"But then we fall behind by three touchdowns, mainly because of turnovers and penalties. At our stage, it's tough to rebound from that kind of deficit."

Talmadge played well on occasion, throwing a very good ball.

"He needs to learn the reads and, of course, become more experienced at the position. Right now, these next few games will give him some experience."

What Dowling is most interested in is the future of the program. He was not hired until June of 1997 to take over the team, thus he didn't have much time to work with the kids before school ended.

It will be different this time.

"We're going to emphasize the weight room," Dowling said. "Right now, we have an in-season weight training program. Once the season ends, the returning players have to learn that weight lifting is a mandatory thing."

"There's no down time. If the kids don't want to put in the time, they won't be a part of the team. It's that simple."

Dowling has been pleased with

the play of the freshman team, which has put together a 5-2 mark so far this year. The J.V. players have struggled, but Dowling is happy with their enthusiasm and continued improvement.

"The optimism starts with the freshman program," the coach said. "After that, we have young kids who have played varsity most of this season. This year will be a learning tool for them. What they do once the season is over will determine how successful they can be next season."

"The younger kids will get the chance to play these last few games. It's nothing against the seniors, but they understand our situation."

Dowling was very pleased with the play of Mike Abidelli last Friday night, saying "Mike played his best game of the season."

"John Farina has been very consistent all season long and Chris Michelle gives us a real good effort every game. These kids have battled all season long."

The offensive line, which has three juniors starting, give Dowling hope for next season. He also is pleased that the starting offensive backfield will be back next season.

As for Don Bosco, the Bucs will

be facing a very good team. After years of struggling the program there has turned things around, putting together a 5-2 record this year. Don Bosco did hit a snag last week, losing to Paramus Catholic. The loss pretty much eliminated them from a spot in the upcoming playoffs.

"We'd like to get to where Don Bosco is," Dowling said. "They've put in the time and have turned that program around. This is something our kids can learn from."

NOTES: Bucs are 7-4 in the overall series with Don Bosco. The series began in 1984 and has been continuous since 1988. Don Bosco has won the last two games, both at Don Bosco. Belleville had won five straight in the series from 1990-94.

"They're very disciplined," Dowling said of Don Bosco. "They run and pass well. Last year, they beat us mainly on the throw. This year, their running game has to be a concern, too."

After Don Bosco game, Bucs will get ready for the season finale, on Thanksgiving, against Nutley in the Oval. Belleville has not won at Nutley since 1983.

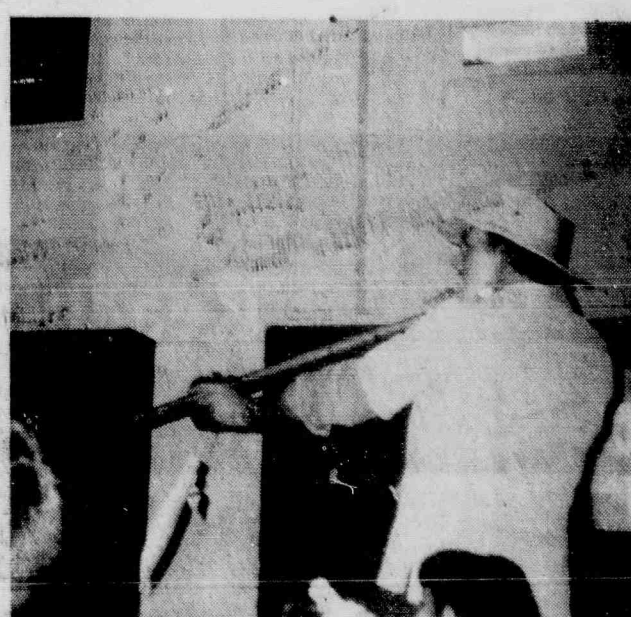

(NAPS)—Water heating is the second largest energy use in your home, so how you choose to heat it is a very important decision.

According to the U.S. Department of Energy, the average annual operating cost for electric water heaters is about 45 percent higher than for those fueled by propane. That means gas units heat almost two gallons of water for the same cost it takes to heat one gallon with electricity. It also means you could be paying \$200 to \$300 more each year to run your electric water heater.

Propane also produces hot water faster and more efficiently than its electric counterpart. "A 30-gallon propane water heater recovers up to 55 gallons an hour while a 52-gallon electric tank is needed to produce the same amount in the same time," says a spokesperson for Suburban Propane, a leading residential supplier of propane. "If you have two adults and two children using the shower every morning, you know how important that is."

Gas units can also be easier to maintain since they don't rely upon electric heating elements that often must be replaced more than once over the life of the appliance.

The two most common types of propane water heaters are storage and instantaneous systems. Storage systems, which are found in most homes, hold heated water

In a cost-efficient combo system, water brought to the desired temperature is pumped through a heating coil that heats air blown over it by a fan. Water runs to the water heater to meet household needs, while the fan circulates warm air to the house. Units are 94 percent energy efficient.

Expensive Missing Heir

Soon after the sale, a man appeared—claiming he was the son of the late owner by a former marriage. As it turned out, he

indeed was the son of the deceased man. This legal heir disapproved of his father's remarriage and had vanished when the wedding took place. Nonetheless, the son was entitled to a share of the value of the home, which meant an expensive problem for the unwary couple purchasing the property.

Although the absence of a will hindered discovery of the missing heir in a title search of the public records, ALTA said that owner's title insurance issued at the time of the real estate transaction
