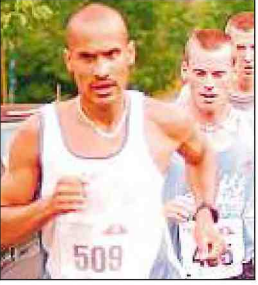

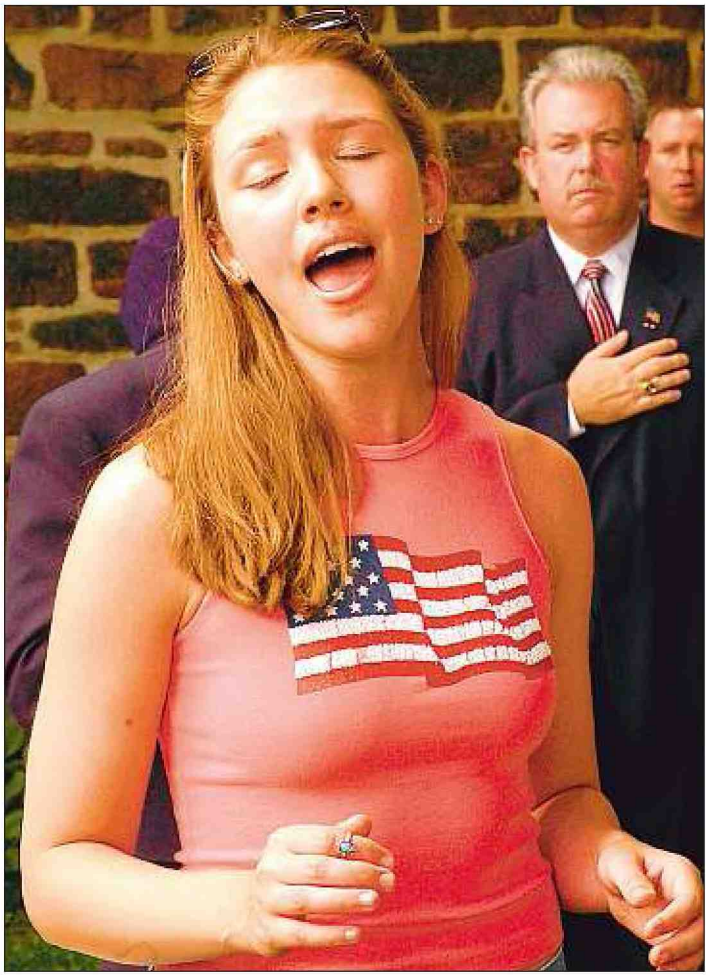

State threatens crackdown on violence cheats

A new announcement by the New Jersey Board of Education may lend credence to a claim made by the Belleville district regarding violence — other schools are not being as honest about reporting it. According to a report in the Herald News last week, the state Board of Education is going to start cracking down on teachers and districts that aren't reporting the accurate number of incidents in their schools. Penalties can be as severe

as the loss of one's job.

In June, the Belleville Times reported that the Belleville district ranked third last year in the number of reported violent incidents.

While administrators made no excuses for the incidents that did occur, several complained that their compliance with the state's reporting rules landed the district at that spot. For instance, the seven weapons incidents reported included items like pen knives, (See Violence on Page A8)

Police reign-in drunk drivers

Belleville police are trying to keep you from drinking or taking drugs and driving this weekend by putting up DWI sobriety checkpoints.

Tomorrow, July 11 and Saturday, July 12, checkpoints and roving patrols will be going on in the township, according to police Sgt. Gerard Campanella, who works in administration in the police

chief's office. He is in charge of sobriety checkpoints.

Starting in June, the Safe and Sober Campaign has gone through Essex County towns. Now, the program is finishing up in Belleville.

"We want to get the word out so that people have a designated driver," Campanella said.

Same sex marriage an issue from the world stage to local homes

In November, a Belleville father will give his daughter away to another who has promised to love and cherish her until the end of their days.

It's the scenario that every father dreams of as he watches his little girl grow up — that one day she'll find someone who'll continue to take care of her when dad may no longer be around. But what happens when that child reveals that the person she loves is of the same sex?

Last week, Newsweek's cover story asked the question, "Is Gay Marriage Next?" It was a lead-out from the recent Supreme Court decision that decriminalized gay sex. Gay issues have led the news over the last two weeks — from the stepping down of a gay bishop in England, to Monday's firing of pundit Michael Savage from MSNBC for anti-homosexual remarks on air.

If anything, the period has been a strong reminder that gay issues are still en-

twined in our culture — from the institutions of law and values, right down to a simple Belleville home.

"The bottom line is happiness," said the father, who shared his story anonymously so the family's special day wouldn't simply become grist for local rumormongers. The wedding will take place at a banquet hall with

the ceremony being performed by a minister.

"The only reason I felt so bad is because she worried so much about telling me," he said. The family still hasn't told him how long he was kept in the dark, but he said a lot of their anxiety could have been allayed if they had just felt comfortable talking about it before.

His wife said that she knew her daughter's preferences, but her husband was soon to retire when she found out and he was under a lot of stress at the time. But now that they know their child is in a loving relationship, the family stands

behind her 100 percent, she explained.

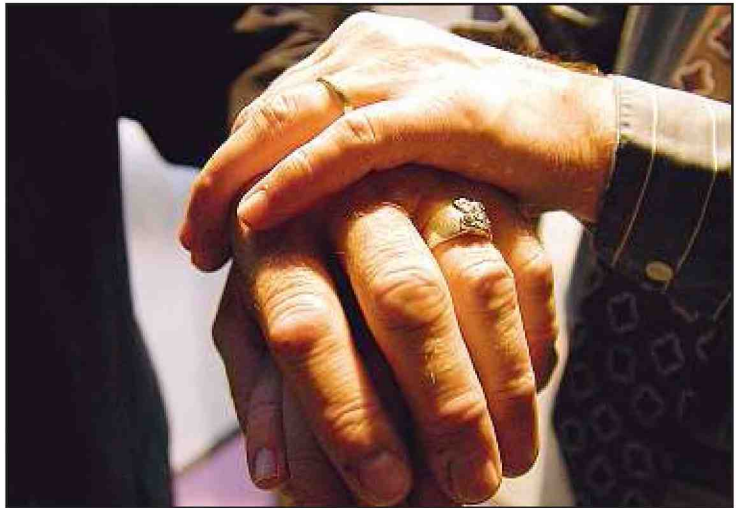
"My daughter always wanted a wedding," said the mother, "ever since she was a little girl. She deserves to be happy like anyone else."

Gay men and women are marrying regardless of the

fact that current law in most places doesn't automatically recognize it on a lot of plateaus.

Oftentimes, it simply amounts to a public affirmation of commitment, and rights such as power of at-

Route 21 drivers are on edge

It was dark and wet. Trucker Joao Pinto was driving down Route 21 with a trailer full of pastries when something startled him.

He had been jiggling the knobs on his radio and jerked his head just in time to see the flash of an object on his windshield.

"I can't recall what hit it, but it had to be about as big as my hand," said Pinto, of Kearny. "I'm assuming it came from above because there is a small overpass that goes onto the highway. I put my arms up. It was a normal reaction. You don't know what to expect."

That was on June 3, one of several incidents that still have law enforcement agencies baffled - and worried that someone could be seriously injured or killed the next time.

Since April, seven drivers on Route 21 in Clifton have reported being pelted by rocks or some other objects. And a dozen other people have reported being struck along the same route in Nutley, Passaic, and Belleville.

Publicity about the rock-throwing has set local residents who use the highway regularly on edge. Last Friday, someone reported being hit by a rock - but police said they weren't sure if it was tossed from above or if perhaps another car kicked it up. One man called police to report a possible rock-throwing incident that happened 10 years ago.

Catching the rock-throwers in action hasn't been easy. They strike at different times of the day and the areas along Route 21 are isolated, with factories and buildings shrouded by trees. Police say it's hard to find good surveillance points since there are few high buildings in the area.

The person - or people - throwing the rocks may

think that what they're doing are innocent pranks, police said, but they could have serious, even fatal, consequences.

"We don't know if they're all related or not and luckily nobody's been killed or severely injured yet," said Clifton Police Detective Capt. Robert Rowan. "But there is always that potential because anytime you break somebody's windshield while they're driving there is a possibility of them losing control and the results could be tragic."

In fact, tragedy struck Tuesday when a landscaping block fell from an overpass and crashed through the windshield of a car on an Omaha, Neb., highway, killing a passenger. Police believe the block was dropped deliberately.

A Rochester, N.Y., woman is still in serious condition after a 70-pound boulder hit her car a few weeks ago and smashed her in the face. Newlyweds Daphne Gipson, 30, and her husband Brian Gipson had been driving along Interstate 95 from Disney World, where they spent their honeymoon.

And in 1994, 8-month-old Natalia Rivera died after a 16-pound bowling ball was dropped from an overpass in Jersey City, bounced once, then rocketed into her parents' car. They were on their way home to Brooklyn. A Jersey City man was convicted of reckless manslaughter and sentenced to 10 years in prison.

To prevent deaths like these, Clifton police have worked with police from Belleville, Nutley, and Passaic, and have also asked for extra patrols from the Passaic County Sheriff's Department and the New Jersey State Police.

Last week, Clifton police met with NJ Transit officials and discussed posting signs on railroad overpasses warning trespassers that

they will be punished if caught. At least one rock-throwing incident took place near a train overpass, police said.

But the intersection of Routes 3 and 21 has been the main staging area. That's where Pinto and several other drivers were struck. The object someone threw toward Pinto's tractor-trailer didn't kill him - but he did lose control of the giant vehicle, hitting a wall. He suffers through sleepless nights, and had to shell out thousands of dollars to rent a truck while his was being fixed.

"I couldn't sleep for two days," said Pinto who was beginning a trip to Virginia that night. "I was just in shock ... I was thinking what could have happened. Besides just losing control, hitting the wall, I could have hit the car next to me."

Pinto is not the only one who is afraid. Some residents of Passaic and Clifton along Main Avenue said that since the rock-throwing incidents, they are more fearful when getting on Route 21.

"My niece, she's afraid to come out that way now," said Clifton resident Josephine Daniels as she walked with two friends along the Main Avenue shopping district. "I guess it's kids. Don't they realize the accidents they could cause?"

"It's just the shock of it happening to you. You could lose control," said her friend June Schweininger of Garfield.

Sixteen-year-old Sadie Mirabal said that since her parents saw the story on Spanish-language newscasts, they are more fearful as well.

"They're scared to go on Route 21 at night now," said Sadie, a student at Passaic High School. "I think the kids who are doing it just don't have anything else to

do. I don't like hanging out with kids like that."

Carolyn Mitchell lives in Passaic Park on River Road, which runs parallel and adjacent to Route 21. She thinks the people throwing rocks are older kids who should know better. "I think they should stop before they get somebody killed. It's not these little-bitty kids either, it's the big kids," said Mitchell, 42. "Go read a book or something."

Those residents who pay attention to their surroundings could help police the most, said Detective Jeffrey Shom, who is leading the investigation.

"The people are the eyes and ears of the police department," Shom said. "We have a lot of people calling with information. The people are being very good citizens. Right now we have a couple of leads."

Shom said that Clifton police officers working regular patrols in the area of Route 21 have been interviewing anyone they can - business owners, hitchhikers, people stuck on the highway with broken down cars.

One thing that may be holding the investigation back, Shom said, is people who think they see something suspicious along the highway but wait until they get home to call police.

"Then they can't pinpoint exactly where this occurred, which makes it very difficult as far as gathering evidence," Shom said. He recommended that motorists with cellphones pull over safely and dial 911.

Had Joao Pinto had the chance to do that, he would have. Still, the experience taught him an important lesson.

"You just had dinner, you kissed your wife and your child. Next thing you know, you could be six feet under over, I guess, a practical joke," Pinto said. "All you have to be is alive to be dead."

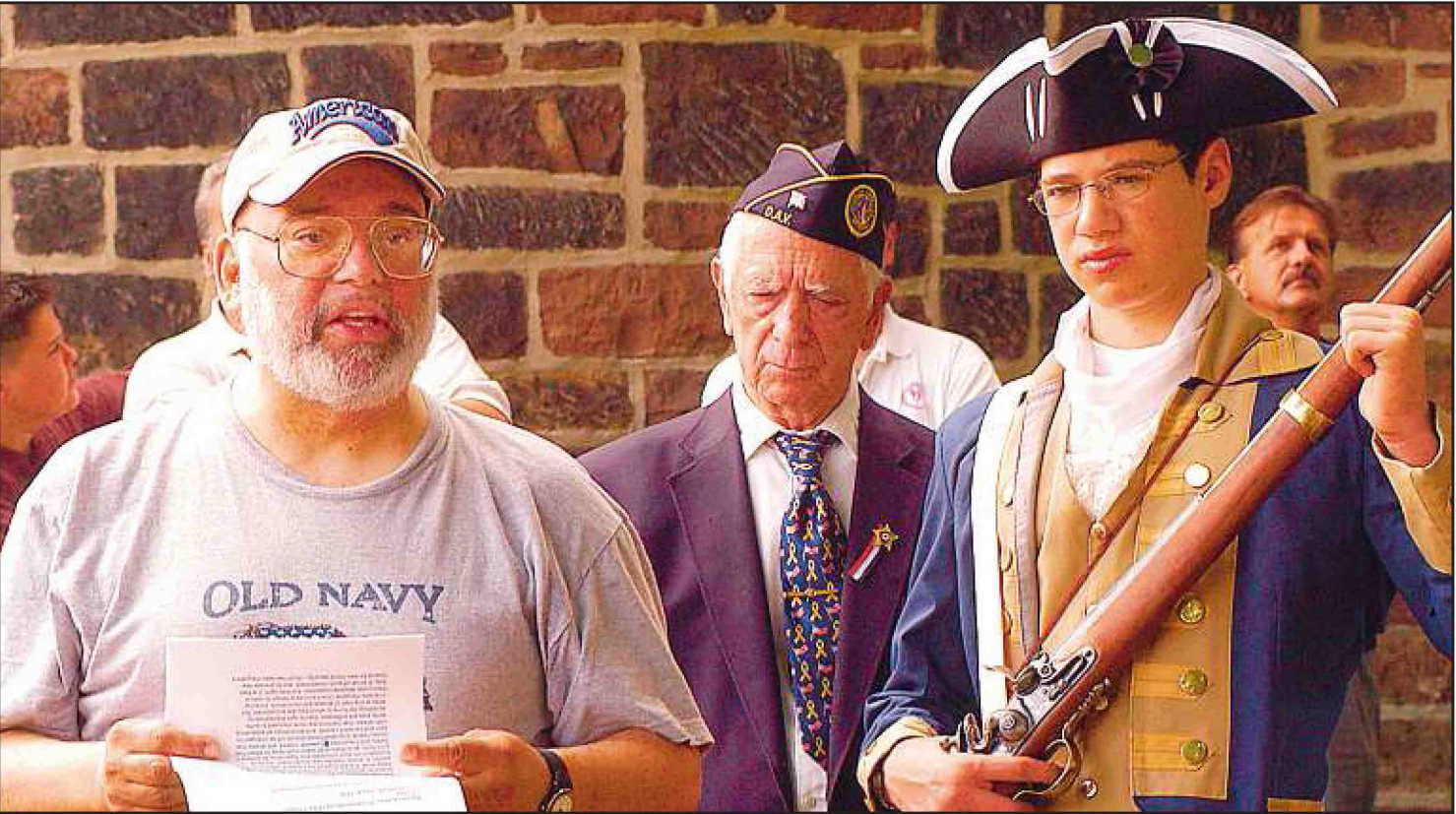

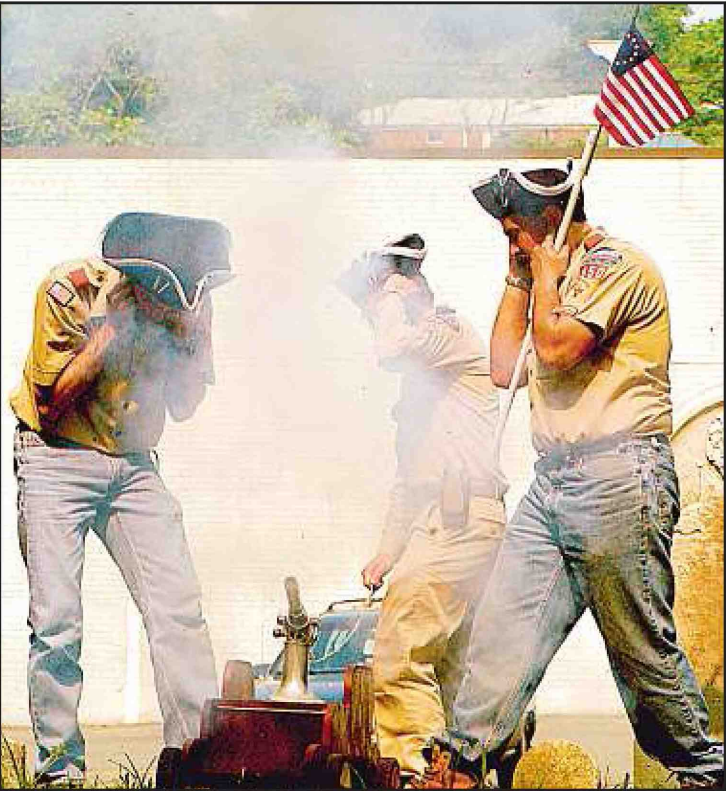

Clean communities grant not always cleaned out says resident

Belleville should be a little cleaner thanks to more than \$25,000 in federal money, but not all residents are happy with the program's administration.

The Clean Communities Grant comes from the U.S. Department of Justice. It pays for purchasing garbage and recycling containers, street sweepers and maintaining trees through proper pruning, according to Second Ward Councilman Thomas Fuscaldo.

The amount of funds the town gets is based on garbage tonnage from the previous year.

Fuscaldo said criticisms that the township has not always spent all the money in a given year are valid.

"We've taken steps to get

the money spent, and get the community clean," he said. "We should never have money left over."

Former commissioner Vincent Frantantoni was in office when the grants started, from 1987 through 1990. The money is supposed to be spent in certain percentages on publicity, equipment, and cleanup.


"There is supposed to be a yearly report that tells where every penny goes," Frantantoni said. "The municipal audit shows that in the late 1990s, there was \$16,000 to \$17,000 left over."

He said during his tenure, he bought better, heavier garbage cans and paid to have the trash picked up each week from town receptacles. Now he says cheaper wire cans are

being bought.

In the last several years, Frantantoni said he has seen no press releases on clean communities. During his time, he sent releases regularly to the newspapers.

He even had a bumper sticker that said, "Make Belleville glitter, can the litter."





You thought your towns were slow?

State’s budget session a lesson in procrastination

Last week’s budget squabbles in Trenton were anything but a civics lesson. The process, which began more than four months ago when Governor McGreevey first proposed his plan for fiscal year 2004, had lawmakers working well past the midnight June 30 deadline even though they had months to deliberate.

What’s more, as The Record reported last week, the final last-minute negotiations were held behind closed doors and involved party leaders, a few administration officials, and lobbyists for billboard companies and the casino industry - special interests that would be affected by the proposed tax and fee increases.

When both houses of the Legislature convened Tuesday morning to vote on the cobbled-together \$24 billion budget, lawmakers had to declare an emergency to get around a rule that requires a minimal opportunity for public review. The legislators

then proceeded to vote on budget bills they had not even read.

Naturally, the usual suspects in Trenton are pointing fingers at one another - and blaming part of the problem on a “perfect storm” of complications.

All 120 seats in the Legislature are up for election this fall, and Republicans and Democrats sometimes seemed more interested in coming up with campaign ammunition than in passing a budget on time. What’s more, the Senate is evenly divided, so no budget measure could get passed without wrangling. Finally, with state revenues still suffering from the economic slump, no budget could be passed without fees and taxes or spending cuts - or both.

That’s all true. But it’s still no excuse. Trenton had months to hammer out a budget and opted for a fire drill instead. Good government it’s not.

In a place so diverse

Taboo has a shorter life span

We’re aware that not everyone is comfortable with the issue of gay marriage as talked about on the front page of this week’s paper.

We’re aware that the notion of same sex couples acting like heterosexual couples is an idea that is foreign, and sometimes repelling to many.

We’re aware that it definitely isn’t the entire population of Belleville that is in support of extending full marital recognition to gay couples or that everyone accepts homosexuality as a chosen lifestyle.

If we believed anything to the contrary, there would be no point in doing the story in the first place. When’s the last time anyone’s done a news story on the struggle of heterosexual couples to find acceptance in society? It’s not a very frequent topic since most of us are allowed to love whomever we want without being penalized either by church or state.

The point of the story is not to enforce some political agenda, but to note the fact that oftentimes the issues that are being volleyed on the national level are happening right in our own backyards.

Sometimes when our only exposure to a certain facet of society is through the evening news, we have no attachment to the subject matter. Therefore, whenever the issue of gay pride comes up, we associate it with images of young men and women marching in a New York City parade, dressed in flamboyant ways that may seem completely outlandish.

Often, we forget that homosexuals are also people in our own community. Some

are leaders who have tried to make a difference for their town and haven’t worn their heart on their sleeve. Others are extremely spiritual people who often struggle to keep their need for human contact in check with what they expect their God wants from them. Still others are our sons and daughters, suffering behind our backs, fretting over our perceived reaction to their feelings for another person.

It’s interesting to see how the issue is playing out in the religious community. Many of us remember a time when it was wholly acceptable to wish the cruellest pain and suffering on a gay person, thinking that God’s destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah in the Bible was testament to his own spite for gays.

And, as evidenced by right wing pundit Michael Savage’s comments that homosexuals should “catch AIDS and die,” some apparently still feel that way.

However, AIDS doesn’t choose victims based on sexual preference, as evidenced by the staggering death toll of men, women and children in Africa. And many churches are now trying to reclaim the image of their God from that of a murderous homophobe to that of a being who sees all people as potential vessels for unconditional love.

But the fact that these issues can be brought to light in Belleville is further testament to the town’s proclivity to openness, rooted in its diversity. Its residents may or may not accept the notion of gay rights and gay marriage, but in a place so diverse, the issues cannot exist “in the closet” for long.

Giving blood is safe and easy. All materials are sterile, used only once and safely destroyed. The entire procedure takes less than an hour and the actual donation takes less than 10 minutes.

The Elks are asking citizens of Belleville and the surrounding communities to roll up their sleeves at this time to donate blood to this special type “O” blood drive and do their part to eliminate this critical blood shortage.

Although this special blood drive is for type “O” positive and type “O” negative, they will also be collecting donations of all blood types. Just drop in and donate your blood; no appointment needed.

To be eligible to donate blood, there must be at least 56 days since your last blood donation, and you have to weigh at least 110 pounds. In addition, remember to eat a good meal before donating.

You also must have a signed form of identification, such as a driver’s license or blood donor’s card. All donors will be given a mini-physical including temperature, blood pressure, pulse and iron count. A cholesterol screening will also be taken and the reading will be mailed to the donor’s home. Parking is available in the rear of the Elks Hall on Valley Street. There is also metered parking on Washington Avenue and in the parking lots of two nearby banks. As always, all donors will be covered for any blood emergencies for one year.

Blood also may be donated at the Regional Blood Center at 401 Pleasant Valley Way in West Orange, Tuesday through Thursday from noon to 7 p.m., Friday from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Call the donor center at (973) 66-9898 for an appointment. When donating at the regional blood center, you may use the Belleville Elks account 2272 and the Belleville Elks will receive credit for your donation.

Everyone donating blood during this special type “O” blood drive will receive a special commemorative T-shirt courtesy of the New Jersey Blood Center.

Status quo remains in first council appointments

The message sent by the Township Council’s reappointment session July 1 appeared to be, ‘if it ain’t broke, don’t fix it.’

The annual meeting, where the council fills expired terms on the planning and zoning boards, selects a deputy mayor and chooses the township’s legal representatives, saw no major shake-ups. That’s partially due to the fact that planning and zoning appointments were actually put off to this week for lack of agreement on the candidates.

Angelo Risoli was unanimously appointed deputy

mayor for the third consecutive year. Thomas Murphy was re-appointed as township attorney; Emil Nardachone was re-appointed as assistant township attorney/prosecutor; Marc Calello was re-appointed as assistant prosecutor; Anthony Iacullo was re-appointed public defender and Alfonso DeMeo was re-appointed as assistant public defender.

“I look toward moving the town forward on redevelopment,” Risoli said. “We will work very hard in the coming year.”

Other council members used the meeting as an opportunity to also look to the

future, as well as the past.

Mayor Jerry Digori reflected on how long he has been on the council.

“It’s hard to believe this is my 10th reorganization. Time just goes by,” he said.

Of the professional staff, which includes five attorneys and two municipal judges, he said, “You’ve all done a great job. That’s why you’re getting a repeat performance.”

Third Ward Councilman Bill Escott thanked the professionals for “an outstanding job,” and made special mention of the judges.

“Without you, we’re not able to move forward,” he

said. “I expect the same fine job this year.”

Second Ward Councilman Thomas Fuscaldo called the professionals’ performance “beyond all our expectations. I’m truly happy we’ve chosen the wisdom of reappointing all of them, as we continue to try and work for the best for the township.”

Annual Sunset Classic raises funds for charity

THE RACE:
The race began with 600 competitors at the starting line. But it didn't take long for a group to break out ahead of the pack.

At first it was a group of 50. It was shortened to 20 and then 10. At the halfway point, it became a three-man race.

Hector Rivera, Rob Defilippis and Oskar Nordenbring battled for the honor of being the winner of the 16th Annual Sunset Classic 5K Race. Fierce competitors until they crossed the finish line, they all congratulated each other when the race ended in the confines of the Foley Field track. Rivera was the winner with a time of 26:24, with his two competitors finishing seconds later.

"It's a great feeling," said Rivera. "There is nothing like crossing the finish line after a race."

Rivera, battling back from a joint injury, said he was pleased that he could win the race after lack of training time, although he said he was displeased with his time.

"I've run better," he said. "And I will run better in the future."

A competitive runner since 1995, he has won a large number of races, including the 21st Annual Montclair Run held last month. An outstanding marathon runner, he is cur-

rently training for Boston and Chicago. His weekly training regimen consists of running 80-100 miles a week, rain or shine. He never runs indoors.

After his win, Rivera offered advice to those eager to get involved in competitive running. "The keys are consistency and determination," but he warned, "Racing is very addictive. Be cautious."

THE EVENT:
The Sunset Classic took a five year hiatus but returned three years ago due to the hard work of the Bloomfield Runner's Club. The proceeds (\$20 to run in the five-mile race, \$10 to run in the one-mile race and \$5 for the children's race, plus donations) are given to the V.E.S.T. program. The Vocational, Education and Special Training program serves children of need in the Essex County area. The program, which is run out of Bloomfield Middle School, helps members of the community who are between the ages of 15-21 to become independent and prepare for the future.

Paul Giuliano, one of the race organizers, said the event could not have taken place if it wasn't for the sponsors and volunteers. "It's a true team effort," he said. "It's a great day of everyone in the community working together. And it's for a great cause - education."

The race is sponsored by American Savings Bank, ABB Lummus Global Inc., Pharma Chem, Brookdale Shoprite, St. Valentine's Athletic Club, Fleet Feet Sport, Pinnacle Rental Realty Inc., Bloomfield PBA, Guiliano's Luncheon, Obal's Inn, Sea Breeze Auto and Tire Clinic, Grand Rental Station, Snap20, Decker Tape, Gaccione, Pomaco and Beck, Bloomfield Center Alliance, Propel Fitness Water, Town Pub, Bloomfield FMBA, Nevada Diner, Provident Savings Bank and McCarthy Appraisal Services, Inc.

The turnout was a little lower than expected, but Guiliano credited that to the rough winter.

"The weather was so poor, a lot of runners didn't train as much as they usually do."

But he said this event was outstanding compared to last year, when heavy rain and lightning complicated the event.

"We weren't sure where to put people and some of our equipment was down, but we still had over 500 finishers of the race last season. That just proves how dedicated people in this area are to aiding these types of causes," he said.

"It's a great day for Bloomfield and the surrounding towns," he added. "We need more community events to bring people together."

NL Central: I've been a Cardinals fan since 1967,

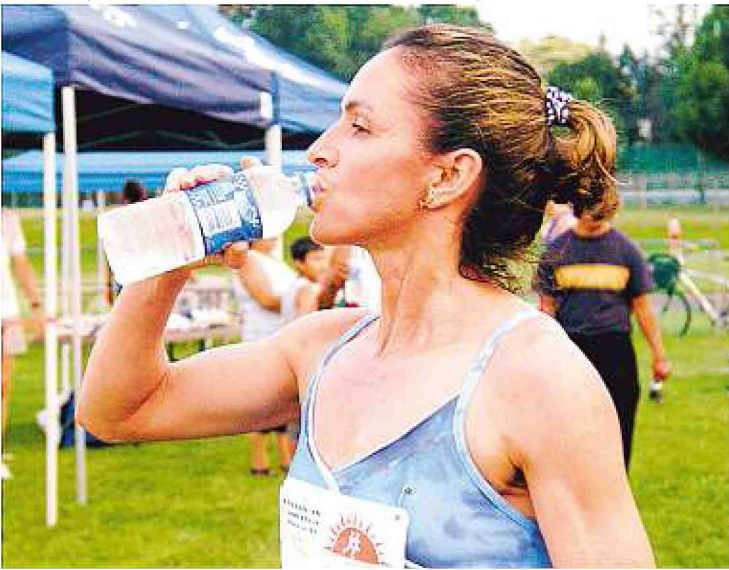

Neighboring Nutley gives a big hug to controversial native

The folks who choose the members of Nutley's Hall of Fame want to be clear as a windowpane hand washed with white vinegar and buffed with a fresh cotton bird's-eye cloth.

They spent hours - long evenings, in fact - debating the nominees. Even on the last night, after they had left Ruth Bedford's house for good, not everyone agreed on one name in particular.

But Martha Stewart had made the cut.

Uh-oh. Martha Stewart, the woman who could go to jail over a stock deal? The eager entrepreneur portrayed in books and on television as egotistical and greedy?

No, no, no, selection committee members say, not that one. They're honoring the other Martha Stewart, the one who grew up on Elm Place as Martha Kostyra, graduated from Nutley High School, worked as a model and stockbroker, married and started a family, set up a catering business, and established a multimillion-dollar lifestyle company. The one who taught the world how to wash a wood salad bowl, turn tea towels into window treatments, and make dispensers for gift-wrapping ribbon.

Their decision is turning

out to be stickier than a hot-glue gun.

"There was much discussion about it, I'll tell you that," said Bedford, a lifelong Nutley resident and chairwoman of the judges' panel. "We talked about what she has managed to accomplish."

Dolores Capalbo, a judge, called the nomination "a little difficult."

"She has not been convicted of anything," Capalbo said. "I'm not here to defend or condemn her. I'm in business and have occasion to talk to people in other states. When I mention our original headquarters are in Nutley, the first thing they talk about is Martha Stewart. She's put us on the map."

Eight others - among the living are two college professors, a supermarket magnate, and a pharmaceutical president - were named last week as the first inductees. They had to be born in Nutley, graduate from its high school, or live in town at least 10 years and were chosen from ballots submitted by Nutley residents.

Media attention had been the bane of one other honoree. Annie Oakley, sharpshooting star of Buffalo Bill's Wild West Show and 1890s Nutley resident, won a libel suit against newspapers that had sullied her

name with false reports of drug use and robbery spree.

Stewart - who at www.marthataalks.com rails at what she says is inaccurate media coverage of her legal troubles - has said she looks forward to proving her innocence at a trial scheduled to begin Jan. 24.

She became the subject of an insider-trading probe after selling 3,928 shares of ImClone Systems stock in December 2001. The transaction - a day before federal regulators disclosed they would not approve an ImClone cancer drug - netted Stewart \$228,000.

On June 4, she pleaded not guilty to the charges, including obstruction of justice. She stepped down as chief executive of Martha Stewart Living Omnimedia, which controls magazines, television and radio shows, a furnishings line, and the Everyday products sold at Kmart. The company reported sales of \$295 million last year.

Stewart's spokeswoman did not return a phone call for comment on the Hall of Fame matter. Meanwhile, hometown Martha watchers are debating whether she's suitable for a place of honor.

"It would be wise for the powers that be to postpone a decision on Martha Stewart's induction," said Patri-

cia Farrenkopf, whose son attends Nutley High School.

She compared Stewart to Pete Rose, who has been banned for life from Major League Baseball for betting on games, including those of the Cincinnati Reds, which he managed. Rose, one of the best players ever, cannot be considered for the Baseball Hall of Fame.

Others said Stewart's accomplishments far outweigh whatever prosecutors have to say.

Joseph LoRe, a lifelong resident, called her "a woman who made it on her own terms and created an empire of jobs ..."

"Nobody lost their jobs or their lives from her alleged actions," he said. "When

compared to the actions of Enron, WorldCom, Arthur Anderson, and ... other white-collar hoodlums who destroyed tens of thousands of lives in the blink of an eye, how can anyone justify the federal government's case against Martha Stewart?"

Some of Stewart's fellow inductees suggested the media would do well to focus not on Stewart's troubles, but on the positive aspects of the Hall of Fame.

"In a sense, you can lose sight of what Nutley is about and what it is trying to do," said inductee Eileen Poiani, mathematician and vice president for student affairs for St. Peter's College in Jersey City. "I would hope that one way to look at

this is to say that Nutley recognizes people who have accomplished things."

Another honoree, Geerat Vermeij, a University of California geology professor, said, "I do not follow her career and I don't follow her business dealings. I don't care about them. My feeling is she's accomplished a lot."

Organizers don't know if Stewart, 61, will show up at the induction ceremony in September. But some are fretting about what kind of menu would please America's foremost fan of the Meyer lemon.

"Luckily I'm not on the committee for the food for the little reception. Otherwise I'd probably be in a stew," Capalbo confessed.

Belleville Health Department on diabetes

Type II diabetes, which was once considered a disease of older adults, is now affecting children and teens. Up to 85 percent of youth with type II diabetes are overweight. Type II diabetes usually develops more slowly and with less visible symptoms than Type I diabetes. Undiagnosed and uncontrolled Type II diabetes can have devastating consequences. Complications can include damage to kidneys, heart, eyes and blood vessels.

Major contributing factors to the rising rate of obesity in children are lack of physical activity and poor eating habits. Time spent in front of the television and on the computer contribute to this in two ways: it is a sedentary activity; and the media markets high fat foods to children through commercials. Obesity is linked to other health problems as well, such as hypertension, coronary heart disease, stroke, sleep apnea, osteoarthritis and certain cancers.

A child with weight problems not only faces serious medical consequences but can face emotional and social consequences as well. Families can have a great deal of influence on a child. Parents can help their children overcome weight problems by being a positive role model with their eating habits and physical activity level.

Weight management programs for all but the severe-

ly overweight children should focus not on weight but on weight maintenance while the child gets taller and more muscular over time. A child has a much better chance of success when the whole family adopts a healthy lifestyle.

The American Diabetes Association recommends screening high-risk children at age 10 or onset of puberty if earlier than age 10 and repeating every two years.

High-risk factors include those who are overweight for age and gender, having a first or second degree relative with type II diabetes, ethnic background of African-American, Hispanic, American Indian or Pacific Islander, or signs of insulin resistance such as high blood pressure, polycystic ovaries, or a darkening and thickening of skin fold especially on the neck.



Belleville Health Department advises on child medication

Over-the-counter medicines or prescription drugs can prevent illness or treat symptoms in someone or speed recovery in kids with illnesses.

The many choices available for treating illness can make administering medicine safely a complicated task. It can be a little frightening to give your baby or young child certain medications because you know that too much or too little can cause serious side effects. Fortunately, though, with a little knowledge and a lot of double-checking, you can help treat your child's illness while you prevent dangerous reactions.

Using medication safely

Using medications safely means knowing when they're necessary, and when they're not. Always check with the doctor if you're unsure whether your child's symptoms require medical treatment.

In many cases, nonmedical treatments may be your child's best bet for a quick recovery, especially with mild cases of the flu or the common cold. Resting can help the body fight a virus, and plenty of clear fluids such as water, juice, and broth will help your child avoid dehydration from body fluids lost through vomiting, diarrhea, perspiration and nasal secretions.

If your child suffers from congestion and a stuffy nose, saline drops can thin nasal secretions. A cool-mist humidifier or a warm-air vaporizer keeps moisture in the air, helping to loosen your child's congestion. If you use a humidifier or vaporizer, though, be sure to clean it thoroughly every day because bacteria and

mold can develop if it isn't kept clean and dry.

To ensure the safe use of prescription or over-the-counter medicines, you should discuss your child's symptoms with your child's doctor and pharmacist. When it comes to giving your child medicines, you'll need to know:

- The name and purpose of the medication
- How much, how often and for how long the medicine should be taken
- How the medicine should be administered (whether it should be taken by mouth; breathed into the lungs; inserted into the ears, eyes or rectum; applied to the skin, etc.)
- Any special instructions, like whether the medicine should be taken with or without food
- How the medicine should be stored
- How long the medicine can safely be stored before it needs to be discarded
- Common side effects or reactions
- Interactions with other drugs your child may be

taking

- What happens if your child misses a dose.

Because the dosage of prescription and OTC medicines depends on your child's height and weight, make sure the doctor and pharmacist have updated information about your child's size. Too little medication can be ineffective and too much medication could be harmful to your child. Also, if your child has allergies or takes other medications regularly, make sure the doctor and pharmacist know about your child's history.

Sometimes medicines should be given on an as-needed basis (meaning they are given only when your child needs them for certain symptoms, such as pain or discomfort. For many medications, though, your child will need to finish all of the medicine as prescribed by the doctor, even if he begins to feel better beforehand. For example, antibiotics help to kill bacteria in the body and prevent it from growing, so it's important to finish all doses of prescribed

antibiotics even after symptoms disappear. But over-the-counter drugs that relieve symptoms like aches, pains or fever (such as Tylenol or Advil) should be taken as your doctor recommends.

Never give aspirin to children younger than 12, and all children and teens under age 19 should avoid aspirin during viral illness. Using aspirin during an illness caused by a virus (such as the flu, chicken pox, or an upper respiratory infection) can cause Reyes syndrome, a potentially life-threatening disease with symptoms such as an enlarged liver, nausea and extreme fatigue.

Because some over-the-counter medicines (such as some headache or antinausea medicines) contain aspirin, you should always read labels and check with your child's doctor before using OTC medicines. Also, be on the lookout for labels. Some aspirin-containing medications have labels that use other words than aspirin (such as salicylate or acetylsalicylate), so avoid those

medications, too.


Other tips for safe medication use

- Don't try to diagnose your child's problem yourself. Always check with your child's doctor if you're unsure whether symptoms require medical treatment.
- Never use leftover medications to treat your child's symptoms. For example, pharmacists will sometimes dispense more liquid medication than is needed in case the medication is spilled or measured incorrectly. If you have liquid left over after your child has completed the course of treatment, throw it out. Unless otherwise instructed by your doctor, do the same for leftover as-needed medications. Saving medications for next time is dangerous because they can expire.
- Never give your child medications that have been prescribed to someone else, whether it's an adult or child. Even if two people have the same illness, they may require different drugs with different directions. If you're purchasing over-

the-counter medications, check the medicine's packaging for possible tampering, and don't use medications in cut, torn or sliced packages. Be sure to check the expiration date, too.

- Develop a relationship with a local pharmacist so that your child's medication history is in a central location. Feel free to ask your pharmacist any questions you may have about your child's medication, and don't hesitate to ask for more information about possible side effects or reactions.

torney, inheritance and say over hospital care have to be wrangled through attorneys, according to one Belleville clergy member.

Father Paul Walker and Randy Lee Webster of Christ Episcopal Church on Washington Avenue consider themselves legally married. Before moving to Belleville four and a half years ago from Rochester New York, they exchanged vows through the bishop's office of that region.

In Rochester, said Walker, the city actually recognized gay married couples as having the same beneficiary rights as heterosexual married couples, providing they were city employees. The city recognized Walker and Webster's marriage with a certificate of domestic partnership. "A lot of cities do that," said Walker, who explained that the paper carries no weight with their former home state of New York, though.

In Belleville, the couple has lived quite openly as married, though it's never been their intent to force their lifestyle upon anyone. It was the church's executive committee that first approached the idea of reaching out to gay men and women in the community and displayed the rainbow-colored gay pride flag at the church's entryway.

The couple's openness hasn't affected their standing in town either. Walker was president of the Belleville Chamber of Commerce before it joined with Bloomfield, and he and Webster work closely with the Belleville Police Department on a number of annual events.

Walker said that gay couples who live openly are the ones fostering acceptance of homosexuality in society as a whole.

Despite the fact that religious institutions have traditionally been stereotyped as preaching the severest judgement against homosexuals, some are actually making a complete about face on the issue.

Walker said that since there is no official policy on gay marriage in the Episcopal Church, decisions on the

blessing of gay marriage have been left to the regional powers.

But even that much leeway can be frustrating for Walker, especially since he left the Roman Catholic Church over two decades ago, drawn to Episcopal progressiveness on issues such as the ordination of women and sexuality.

"Here we are 20 years later and we still have to resolve this issue of gay and lesbian couples," said Walker. "Instead, it's left up to the diocese, though most diocese support the blessing of gay relationships and their recognition in general."

A visit to the Anglican Communion News Service will show that it's an issue that is being wrestled with in the worldwide church as some diocese are electing gay leaders while others are raising their voices in protest.

Walker said he thinks gay marriage will be a major topic at the Episcopal church's general convention in Minneapolis later this month.

Another Belleville church that has an open policy for gay couples is Bethany Lutheran Church on New Street.

Bethany advertises itself as a "reconciling parish in Christ" which extends welcome to anyone, regardless of sexual orientation.

Like the Episcopal Church, decisions by Lutherans on gay marriage are made on a regional basis, said Moore.

"It's not universal. Everyone's working on it in their individual synods," she said. "Lutherans are a little more slow; we're a little more conservative."

A lot of the ambiguity comes over different people's interpretation of the Bible, she explained. Some feel that the Bible expressly calls homosexuality a sin, while others feel that the Bible's message is love, and that love is supposed to be inclusive of all.

Moore also leads the Belleville Clergy Alliance. She said the issue of gay marriage has not been brought up there, so she has no idea what the town's religious leaders as a whole feel on the matter.

"The Catholic Church has always taught that marriage

is a sacramental bond between a woman and a man," said Reverend Joseph Girone of St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church on William Street. Therefore gay marriage could not receive a blessing.

Girone said that the church welcomes people who are gay to be part of the community; however it does not advocate a gay sexual lifestyle, just as it wouldn't advocate a non-marital sex life for heterosexual parishioners.

"Sex is reserved for married couples that include a man and a woman," said Girone. The church teaches a policy of chastity for any parishioner, gay or straight, who is not married. He said that, occasionally, believers who are dealing with their own homosexual tendencies have approached him in a "semi-confessional" manner. The diocese offers ministerial services to parishioners with same sex attractions.

Pastor Randy Nichols of River of Life Assembly of God Church on Holmes Street said that his church doesn't have a policy on blessing gay marriage. He said that the Assembly of God Church approaches all issues from a scriptural point of view, and gay marriage is not mentioned in scripture.

"We would be uncomfortable taking a stance on gay marriage when we don't have the scripture to back it up," said Nichols.

The church, which often-times uses contemporary music in its services along with pop culture references to teach its message, recently taught a series on the family. The series revealed that God's scriptural plan for the family is one man and one woman in a monogamous relationship.

That sanctioned form has been decaying in modern times, said Nichols. Gay marriage wasn't God's revealed plan for that institution, just as divorce wasn't, he explained.

However, like Girone, Nichols said that everyone — gay or straight — is welcome to worship at the church.

"God loves everybody," he said. "I'm a heterosexual, and that doesn't make me any better than a homosexual in the eyes of God."

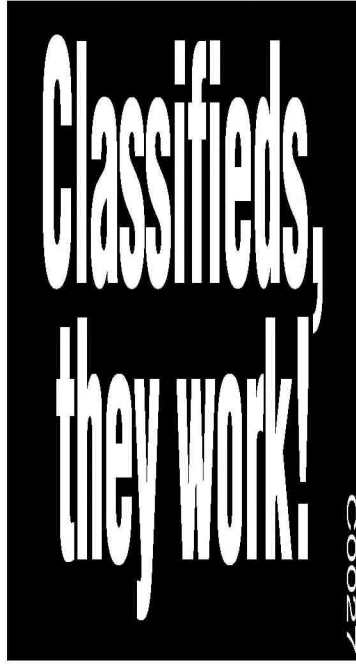

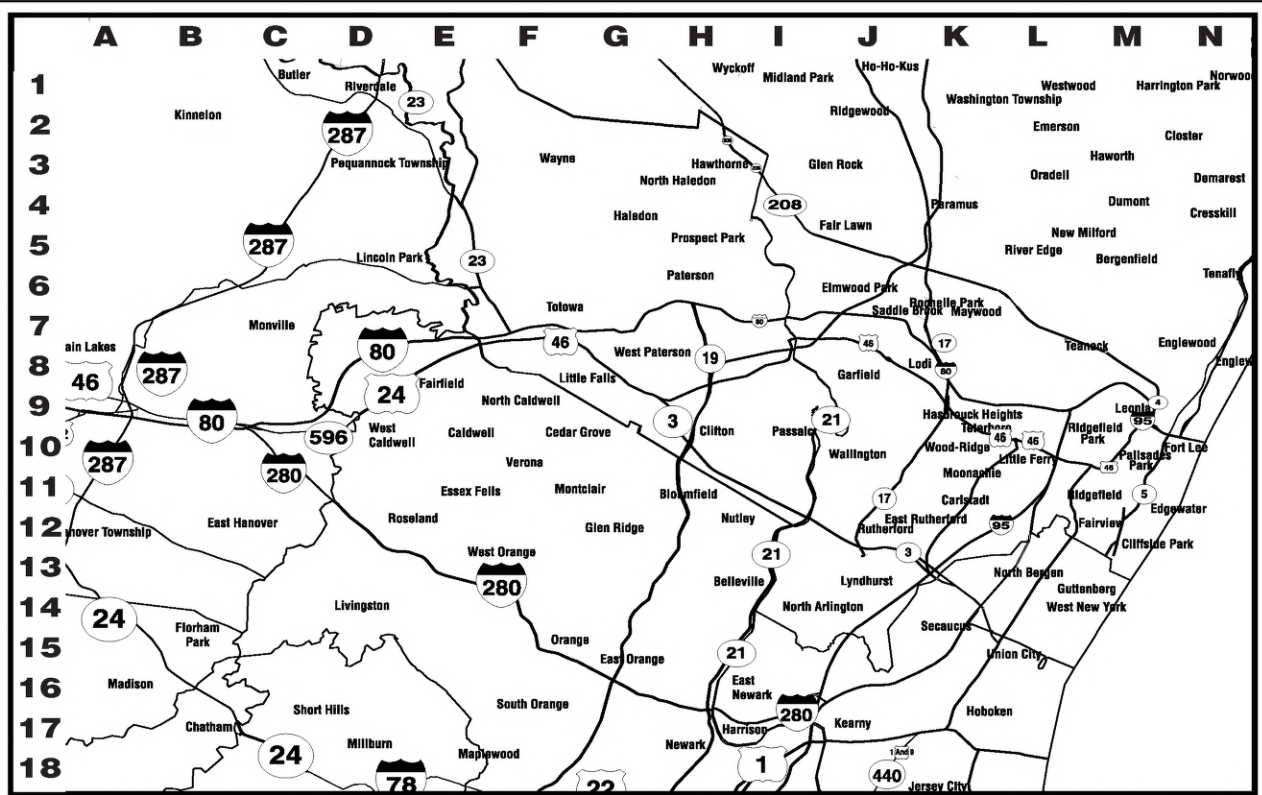
