### Wanted... 'Home Depot' on the range

Company representative comes to discuss a cooperative WalMart site

The future face of the 24acre former-Walter Kidde site on Main Street in Belleville is starting to take

At Monday night's work session of the Belleville Township Council, Attorney Mitchell Abrahams of Cole, Schotz, Meisel, Forman and Leonard PA, which represents Home Depot, came before the council to present a preliminary site plan.

Though he said it was by no means a finished plan, the sketch showed a  $13\overline{5},000$ square foot WalMart at the eastern end of the property, and a 115,000 square foot Home Depot store at the western end. A large customer parking lot may be in the southern portion of the property with space for approximately 1,380 vehicles.

According to Township Manager Raymond Kimble the proposed WalMart is not a Super WalMart, which usually sells groceries along with its department store goods.

### Belleville rescuers coordinate for happy ending

Last Wednesday, the Belleville fire and police departments assisted in the rescue of a baby fawn trapped in the Second River canal along Mill Street.

Associated Humane Society of Newark dispatched two units to assist in capturing and rescuing the fawn. Firefighters lowered a cage to the animal control officers, who were finally able to safely rescue the fawn from the river.

The deer was taken to Associated Humane Society animal shelter in Newark where it was examined for injuries. It will be relocated in a rural area. Firefighters credited Animal Control Officers Tywan Diggs and Michael Fowler for their efforts to corral the deer.







They conducted a total of 1,286 investigations. Of those, 26 were "dwellings with possible zoning or occupancy violations," according to the report.

Transfers out of the district because of non-residency status totaled 72, and registrations denied were 25.

On a regular basis, both investigators monitored 22 designated areas regarding possible illegal students, Mazzuca said.


As of June 30, the student enrollment per school was: School 3, 376; School 4, 334; School 5, 393; School 7, 464; School 8, 469; and School 10, 122. The middle school had 810 students and the high school 1,406.

The total number of students was 4,519, according to the report.





Gov. James E. McGreevey — oops, he's back to calling himself Jim McGreevey came into office 18 months ago with a state budget collapsing and huge financial problems created by his Republican prede-

Many supporters expected the former Woodbridge mayor to be a stalwart leader who would rectify the graft, nepotism, patronage, and financial sleight-of-hand tricks prevalent in New Jersey.

Unfortunately, McGreevey has committed numerous gaffes and outrages during his brief tenure. He has made headline news for using a state helicopter for personal trips, and using taxpayers' earnings to frolic in Ireland. He reimbursed the citizenry for both abuses. Now, McGreevey and his family prematurely returned from a jaunt to Puerto Rico that was paid for by a union whose president just acknowledged is being investigated for mob ties.

The scandal involving his closest cohorts and their multi-million-dollar profit from erecting private billboards on public land appalls ethical citizens. A federal grand jury is now examining the aides' deal-making. During the past 18 months, McGreevey has appointed numerous people to prominent state positions who quickly resigned or were fired.

The only solace for McGreevey and his staff is the likelihood that the Republican Party will nominate an unelectable candidate, failing once again to recognize that the vast majority of New Jersey residents are political moderates.

Nonetheless, it's vital that our governor recognize the inappropriateness of so many of his actions and appointments. Whenever he finds himself in a compromised situation, he should tell himself: "Don't do it, Jim." Or is it James E.?



A few weeks back this column talked about the battle between the Agovernor and the casino operators about increased state taxes for Atlantic City's hotels/casinos. If you recall, this column decided to stay neutral in the battle of big business and big government because, "It really doesn't matter who's right or wrong or who wins or loses because whatever the outcome, we the "low rollers of the world" eventually pick up the tab.

I'm sorry to say that once again this column had it pegged right, as some of you already realize. Parking has increased from \$2 to \$3 and more, depending on what each casino decides to charge. There's also an amusement and room tax increase.

If you wish to complain to the casino people about these increases, they will tell you, or lead you to believe, that it's a mandatory state law. That is not so. What is so, is that the State of New Jersey has increased taxes on those casinos doing business in the state, and the casino operators spin it to seem that they have no choice but to charge these taxes to their patrons.

Before this latest increase in parking fees, the state taxed all the casinos \$1.50 per car to park. That's what the casinos had to pay the state. Most of them decided to charge you and me a minimum of \$2 and more for every car they parked. When I asked what the extra 50 cents was, they said, to pay for the costs of having a booth attendant collect the parking fee. Now I don't know what it cost them to put up a small booth with an unskilled employee in it, certainly not 50 cents a car.

I do know that whatever it cost, the casinos have not only turned their personal casino tax over to the rest of us, but have, and continue to make, a tremendous profit on their parking policy. Imagine the thousands of cars that roll into each casino day and night and multiply that by 50 cents gross profit and you can see that apart from people ever gambling a nickel. They have put themselves into the immensely profitable parking garage business. Now they have been taxed again and again they have passed it on to us with an even greater profit picture.

I put it to you casino operators, why can't you level with your guests on this matter. I had to check out the law itself to gather this information. All businesses are taxed in some form or another by the cities, municipalities or states they conduct business in. The gaming industry isn't any different from any other business, but they have a distinct advantage over other businesses in that they don't have to give their customers anything if they choose not to for their patron-

Gamblers understand this and accept the fact that they proceed at their own risk and very often go home empty handed, but it smacks of greed and arrogance to ask their guests not only to pay to beautify their casinos and surrounding properties, but also to make a profit on top of it.

Imagine any other business owner asking their customers to pay for the beautification of their business and the surrounding grounds. So, please give us a break. If you can't, then heed the words of a man of the people, a low roller I'm sure, in his day. He identified with enough of the common folk to get himself elected president of these United States. He said, "You can fool some of the people some of the time, even fool most of the people most of the time, but you can't fool all of the people all of the time." Thanks Abe.



#### Health and Lifestyle **Risk Factors**

The temperature does not have to hit 100 degrees for a person to be at risk. Both one's general health and/or lifestyle may increase a person's chance of suffering a heat-related illness.

Health factors, which may increase risk, include:

- Poor circulation, inefficient sweat glands, and changes in the skin caused by the normal aging process.
- Heat, lung, and kidney diseases, as well as any illness that causes general weakness or fever.
