(Continued from Page A1) senior citizens, several residents asked a number of questions about how each of the candidates would attempt to lower taxes and deal with the sewer tax.

"There are many places we can reduce costs to make the town run more efficiently," town council candidate Gary Hinton said. "If they (the board) had to raise taxes, don't cover them up with these fees and call it a sewer tax."

Drozdz has also expressed discontent about the use of the sewer tax and the additional burden the fee places on taxpayers. He said that he favored holding the sewer referendum from the start and said that gets to be a quarter million he thought the taxpayers

should be able to decide how to pay the fees.

Whatever the approach, residents are calling for a solution to the sewer tax. At a September meeting of the town council, it was reported that many bills, many substantial, had gone unpaid for many months. One bill included back payments for sewer services to Clara Maass Hospital in excess of a quarter million dollars.

"Just the other day, I tried to help someone who had their water turned off after only two months," said Vinnie Frantantoni.

"How is it possible that the bills at Clara Maass could get so high that, before you bring it to the attention of the board, it dollars?"

School violence stats drop in **Belleville**

By Richard Dickon State school violence and vandalism numbers dropped

as much as 60 percent in some areas for Belleville public schools, with an overall drop of 72 incidents from the previous year.

The reduction was attributed to steps taken to increase security. Superintendent of Schools Dr. Joseph Ciccone said 25 separate items were initiated to lessen acts of violence.

There were 40 incidents, which can include anything from simple assault, to vandalism, to substance abuse, Ciccone said. Last year there were 103 incidents.

The report came during School Violence Awareness Week, Oct. 20-24.

Ciccone credited high school Police Officer Paul Auriemma, and before him Det. Sgt. Gerard Corbo for helping to stem violence.

"It's not just the uniform they relate to students," Ciccone said. "They stop acts before they happen."

Despite the drop in violence, the district is installing high tech, digital security cameras in the high school to give the district a presence 24 hours a day and to deter illegal acts.

"We're doing better, but there's always room for improvement," Ciccone said.

High School Principal Joseph Petrillo said the improvement comes from the schools' consistency in dealing with and rectifying possible problems.

He said locked doors and bathrooms help, as does keeping students accountable for getting to class on time. The high school administers the student discipline code, and teaches a "walk away" policy for potential altercations, Petrillo said.

"We are staying proactive," he said.

Among the other 25 items the district has done is the back parking lot at the high school, which now has a gate that prevents cars from driving through during lunch hours, Ciccone said.

There is increased lighting around all of the schools, deterring trouble, he said.

Character education has been instituted at the middle school through a grant, teaching students to be better behaved, Ciccone

Peers Educating Peers (PEP) is taught at the high school and middle school by Patricia Guardino, substance abuse coordinator. They, in turn, present programs to the elementary schools on non-violence and avoiding substance abuse, Ciccone said.

Teachers and parents take part in cooperative discipline workshops, which are also paid for by a grant.

Most of the trees and bushes near the front of schools have been removed or will be removed by the end of the school year, giving officials a clean line of sight for checking for intruders, Ciccone said.

Drop-off zones have been established for all elementary schools, so students can get to and from school more safely, he said.

There are various, ongoing assemblies on non-violence and substance abuse, Ciccone said.

There was a parent/student workshop on Oct. 21 featuring Dr. Phil Linfante, Ph.D.

"We have been very diligent reporting to the police, and that will continue," Cic-

Violence is up nationwide, making the Belleville numbers that much more impressive, Ciccone said.

"Students are comfortable enough to let us know about something before it happens," he said. "Trust is the best deterrent."

"I can't say we're directly responsible for the drop," he said. "We're not looking to take credit here. We're trying to do a better job. I (See Violence on Page A11)

Ciccone said he hadn't even looked at other schools in Belleville's district factor grouping. "I'm just worried where we stand," he said.

He said the excellent working relationship with the Belleville Police Department was important in the success. Police Lt. Mark Minichini and the juvenile bureau "are a determining factor in lowering the numbers," Ciccone said.

School Board President Alfonse DeMeo has chaired the board's security committee for half a decade.

"I want to thank my fellow board members for approving initiatives over the past five years," DeMeo said at the Oct. 20 school board meeting. "We have tried to make the schools as safe as possible. The numbers are down dramatically."

Perrone challenge goes unheeded

As reported in Belleville Times last week, resident Michael Perrone has criticized council candidate Kevin Kennedy. Perrone offered to donate \$10,000 to charity if Kennedy and his political allies, Republican Township Chairman Richard Yanuzzi and former-Mayor Angie Paserchia could substantiate allegations made in campaign literature.

The claims, sent in a letter to the three, include that "(council candidate Mario) Drozdz is for the sewer fee,' that Mayor Jerry Digori and At-Large Councilman Lou Pallante "ran on a platform to eliminate the sewer fee," and that the defeated Valley Redevelopment Plan "would have generated at least \$7 million in new ratables each and every year."

Kennedy said, "If anything is untrue, let him sue me for libel and slander. He can give the \$10,000 to a lawyer in Newark and sue me. They (Yanuzzi and Paserchia) are my friends. I don't always agree with them, but they're my friends. So let him challenge my fliers."

Yanuzzi called Perrone "a coward and a bully. He should take out his petitions and run. He throws hand grenades and hopes the newspapers will pick them up. He has absolutely no standing in the community, and yet he is not held accountable.

Paserchia would say only, "I'm a little bit frightened of him. There's something not right there."



THEM BONES

Each year, approximately one percent of children ages 4 to 17 are given a course of oral steroids, more than half to treat asthma. While most are given the inhaled versions of the drugs, which are safer than the oral doses, children taking oral doses of these powerful anti-inflammatory drugs are susceptible to potentially bone-damaging side effects. The condition known as osteoporosis is commonly associated with post-menopausal women, but the bone-thinning disease can also affect children who take oral doses o corticosteroids. Fortunately, the bone-weakening effects of these drugs can be counteracted by a group of medicines called bisphosphonates, however, it is also important to consume dairy products and engage in weight-bearing exercise that builds

bone density. If your child needs to take steroids for asthma treatment talk to your doctor about medications, diet, and exercise to offset the bone-weakening side effects.
