

State approval next step to WalMart coming

The owners of the former Walter Kidde property on Main Street said approval from the state Department of Environmental Protection is expected minute," allowing plans for a Wal-Mart store to jump start.

In a related matter, a Kearny deal across the river for a WalMart has been in the works for a long time and has no effect on the Belleville project, according to Harold Finkelstein of Route 21 Associates, LLP, which owns the 23.5 acres of land on Main Street.

'WalMart needs a date where they can start to build." Finkelstein said. "They're so slow at (Walter)

Kidde with the clean-up, that I won't live long enough to see it."

For that reason, once the DEP approves the clean-up, the Finkelsteins will remove the earth that needs remediation, paying their own way. "It will take six weeks to two months," Finkelstein said.

The can't promise WalMart a date until they get the DEP approval, he said.

In an effort to keep WalMart under contract to purchase the former Walter Kidde property Main, the owners are planning a more extensive clean-up of the property, which will cost \$1.5 million to \$2 million, according to Finkelstein.

The former Walter Kidde company, now known as Millennium, has spent between \$5 million and

\$6 million on a clean-up of contaminated soil and place monitoring and treatment wells for groundwater coming in offsite, according to Barry Osmond, lawyer for Route 21 Associates.

It is fairly regular for clauses to be included in contracts like the one between WalMart and Route 21 that would allow the buyer to back out if the seller does not complete due diligence, such as environmental clean-up.

The Millennium clean-up "may or may not be enough for Wal-Mart," said John Glock, who is handling the environmental aspect of the deal between Route 21 Associates and WalMart.

Scores of students protest teacher decision

As many as 50 to 60 students and parents came out to the Sept. 29 school board meeting to protest the hiring of a new mass communications teacher, replacing a popular temporarily assigned teacher.

Sharon Senatore, saying she was speaking for Belleville High School students, said she was upset that Ryan Sheridan was removed from his position.

"The board never explained why this was done," she said. Senatore also said she was upset that the decision was made in private session on Sept. 13 and voted on in public on Sept. 29.

She complained about not being able to get an agenda for the meeting. McManus explained that the board didn't anticipate the larger crowd and printed the normal number of agendas.

McManus said Senatore "incited" the students. He said Sheridan is still a substitute in the system.

"I wish him every success," McManus said. "He's a good person. We selected the best candi-

Hiring Simonetti comes after a recommendation by the Superintendent of Schools, in this case Acting Superintendent of Schools Joseph Kraemer, who would not discuss his decision, because it involves personnel.

"The board made this decision fairly and accurately, by a unanimous vote," McManus said.

Before that vote, board member Dawson Bloom tried to have the hiring tabled, but was voted down.

Others pointed out that Sheridan's father, Dennis Sheridan, is a Republican District Leader who won over candidates supported by Republican Chairman and school board member Antoinette "Toni" Marone.

Marone said, "I didn't even realize that. I thought the fella who ran was younger. I didn't even know him. We (the school board) just go by qualifications."

Senatore said there might still be time to overturn the hiring.

"Mr. McManus, I still think there might be time for you and your board to undo the injustice you and your board have done to our town, our school, our teachers, our parents, and most importantly, our children," she said. "... Students and parents, once again our board has failed us and we cannot allow them to do this time and time again and get away with it."

Senatore said she would do all possible to get Sheridan his job

McManus said the hiring has been made and there is no going

"This is just normal hiring practice," he said. "There is no intent. The kids had an impassioned plea but didn't have all the facts."



Cozzarelli arraignment on tax, fraud Oct. 5

Former township attorney Frank J. Cozzarelli who disappeared a few weeks ago after being indicted on federal charges for tax evasion and fraud is listed to appear in U.S. District Court in Newark on Tuesday, Oct. 5.

"His attorney gave us assurance that he will be appearing in court for his arraignment," said Mike Drewniak, a spokesman for the U.S. Attorney's Office.

The Belleville attorney will be appearing in front of Judge Dickinson Debevoise, said Drewniak, the same judge who issued a warrant for his arrest the day after his disappearance on Sept 21.

Cozzarelli, 51, was not arrested at the time of his indictment two weeks earlier, per his attorney's request, because he was not seen as a threat. But after disappearing without a trace thereafter, a fugitive warrant was signed against him. After a broad search by authorities, family and friends, Cozzarelli returned to his North Caldwell residence.

While attorney Franklin Sachs said his client was despondent and failed some suicidal attempts, some family friends said he just went away to clear his head and plan the next step of action in his

Shortly after his return home a couple of weeks ago, Cozzarelli was admitted to a psychiatric unit at a hospital in Teaneck, but would be released for the court appearance.

"Because of the nature of his emails (sent to family while he was missing), it was better to have him evaluated," said Michael Melham, former Belleville Councilman and family friend.

Drewniak said at the arraignment it would be known whether Cozzarelli would be set free before the trial date or be incarcerated. But Sachs said Cozzarelli will post the necessary bail and be released on his own recognizance.

The charges against Cozzarelli stated that he "intentionally" failed to report around \$1.6 million total in income from 1996 and 1997 from a \$7 million deal involving Russian investors in the country, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office.

But Sachs said his client will plead not guilty, because he has not committed a federal tax crime. Sachs told the press that Cozzarelli did not report the income in question, because the money was frozen in a lawsuit with the Russian investors.

Cozzarelli served as the Belleville municipal attorney from 1987 to 1990. He still has a law practice on Joralemon Street in the township, which he shares with his father along with other attorneys on counsel. Melham said Cozzarelli's law license is not in jeopardy because of the charge, and after a conviction it would be up to the New Jersey Bar Association to decide what happens next. In the meantime, while Cozzarelli is busy preparing for his defense, other attorneys will pick up the work load at his law firm,

said Melham. The former councilman said he will be in court and later at Cozzarelli's home on Tuesday for moral support to the family.

"They're in good spirits and everyone wants to get Frank the proper legal help he can get," he

Cozzarelli resigned his longtime post as attorney, at no cost, to the Belleville Public Library and Information Center. He will be replaced by Township Prosecutor Emil Nardachone, according to Richard Yanuzzi, president of the library Board of Trustees.


"He was competent and brilliant," Yanuzzi said. "He did an outstanding job. He has our full approval. We never would have appointed someone else had he not taken this action. He allowed us to achieve great things."

His short resignation letter said that for the time being he was removing himself from public service because he doesn't have the time to commit, Yanuzzi said.

Fire safety week now observed

The Belleville Fire Department is joining the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and other safety advocates this fall to remind children and adults about fire safety during Fire Prevention Week, now through Oct. 9.

This year's theme, "It's Fire Prevention Week: Test Your Smoke Alarms," highlights the importance of all families installing and maintaining smoke alarms in the home.

Smoke alarms are the most effective early warning devices available for the home. Since they were introduced to consumers in the 1970s, they have helped to reduce the home fire death rate by one half. Even though they are now widely popular, roughly 70 percent of home fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

Fires can spread through a home rapidly and, in some cases, individuals may have as little as two minutes to escape to safety once the alarm sounds. The Belleville Fire Department encourages residents to keep smoke alarms working and to leave immediately when a smoke alarm

Here are some key smoke alarm installation and maintenance tips:

- Install at least one smoke alarm on every level of the home and outside each separate sleeping area.
- Mount smoke alarms on ceilings or high walls.
- Test smoke alarms once a month, following the manufacturer's instructions.
- Replace batteries once a year or as soon as the device "chirps," indicating that the battery is low.
- Replace all smoke alarms after 10 years, even those that are hard-wired or smoke alarms with "long-life" (10-year) batteries. Smoke alarms with "long-life (10-year) batteries also need to be replaced when the alarm "chirps" or fails to respond to periodic testing. The batteries in these units cannot be replaced.

NCLB scores improve, schools sanctioned

The good news is that overall test scores have improved for the high school, middle school and School #4 from the year before.

The bad news is that for the second consecutive year, the schools are among the quarter of New Jersey's public schools that failed in meeting all of the requirements of the federal No Child Left Behind act last year. The state also improved overall over the year before — but local officials are still critical of the Bush Administration's landmark law.

The law mandates that schools show "adequate yearly progress" in overall student test scores and participation, within every category broken down by race, socioeconomic status and special education, according to Acting Superintendent of Schools Joseph Kraemer

"The intent of the law is good," Kraemer said. "The mechanics still have a lot of kinks to be worked out."

For the second straight year, the high school, middle school and School #4 did not make adequate yearly progress in at least one area under NCLB. The law requires that schoolwide average test scores and participation meet achievement criteria in 40 categories, including the testing of students with disabilities and limited-Eng-

lish-speaking students.

The only testing area that was failed by the overall student population was math at School #4, which failed for the fourth consecutive year, despite showing improvement in the NJASK4 testing. The scores improved five percent, to 41.5 percent passing. The adequate yearly progress (AYP) percentage is 53 percent.

In the high school, students with disabilities did not reach the AYP in language arts or math. African Americans likewise did not pass either side of the test, Kraemer said.

In the middle school, students with disabilities did not pass either part of the test.

At School #4, the federal government is paying \$1,000 per student for supplemental educational services at outside learning centers.

Unfortunately, Kraemer said the money is not designated based on performance, but is instead given to students who are deemed economically disadvantaged.

"They're saying poor students need services," he said. "It's not just poor students that need help. Performance is the second criteria, so we're handcuffed. The gliches in the law were supposed to be cleared up. This is a form of discrimination."

There were summer and after school programs at School #4, and math summer school in the middle chool.

"We want to keep students on schedule for a college track," he said

At the high school 74.4 percent of students passed language arts, making adequate yearly progress for the third consecutive year. In math, the percentage was 57.7 percent, while AYP was 53.2.

At the middle school, language arts was down slightly to 64.1 percent, but still better than the 58 percent AYP. In math, the school was up 10 percent to 47.2 percent, while the AYP was 39 percent.

At School #4, language arts passed with 65 percent, after pass-

ing last year. Math did not pass, as reported earlier.

A list of 621 schools failed to meet precise test score and participation levels for 2003-04 required under President Bush's law, while last year, the number was almost 1,000, according to Kraemer.

Almost 300 other schools met the requirements in 2004 but because of previous scores, they remain on the failed list until they hit the marks for two straight years, according to state Department of Education information.

It won't get any easier for schools to meet these mandates, Kraemer said, since the state's required performance levels rise this year. Sixty-two percent of fourth-graders will be required to pass in math and 75 percent in language arts this year, he said. That is rising from last year's 53 percent and 68 percent, respectively.

NCLB was passed in 2002, and will eventually require 100 percent proficiency in both reading and math by 2013.

All schools that fail to meet standards face stronger sanctions the longer they fail to reach the mark. Sanctions can include the option for students to transfer or receive free outside tutoring, as at School #4.

Red Cross recommends having disaster kit

Disasters happen anytime and anywhere. And when disaster strikes, there may not be much time to respond. The American Red Cross advocates family emergency preparedness by offering tips that will help to prepare and respond if a disaster were to happen.

One way to prepare is by assembling a Disaster Supplies Kit because once disaster hits, there won't be time to shop or search for supplies. But if supplies are gathered in advance, a family can endure an evacuation or home confinement.

"To prepare for a disaster, stock water, food and first aid supplies" advises Director of Emergency Operations John Kocotos at the Montclair-Glen Ridge-Nutley Red Cross. "Keep the items that would most likely be needed during an evacuation in an easy-to-carry container, such as a large, covered trash container, a camping backpack or duffel bag.

"Store your kit in a convenient place known to all family members and keep a smaller version of the kit in the trunk of the car," Kocotos "Change your stored water and rotate stored foods every six your physician or pharmacist about storing prescription medica-

The American Red Cross also advises to discuss the types of disasters that could occur at a family meeting, explain how to prepare and respond to them and discuss what to do if advised to evacuate.

"Plan how your family will stay in contact if separated by disaster," he added. "Pick two meeting places such as a location a safe distance from your home in case of fire and a place outside your neighborhood in case you can't return

months, replace batteries, and ask home. Also, choose an out-of-state and 3 inch roller bandages; scisfriend as a check-in contact for everyone to call."

In preparing for disaster, post emergency telephone numbers by every phone, be sure smoke detectors are working and show responsible family members how and when to shut off water, gas and electricity at main switches.

"Meet with neighbors and plan how the neighborhood could work together after a disaster," Kocotos added. "Know your neighbors' skills (medical and technical), consider how you would help those with special needs, such as elderly or disabled persons, and make plans for child care in case parents can't get home."

After a disaster, local officials and relief workers will be on the scene, but they may not be able to reach everyone immediately. There may be help in hours, or it may take days. It is important to have a family plan and a disaster supply kit prepared before disaster strikes.

The following is a Disaster Supplies Checklist provided by the American Red Cross:

Water - Store one gallon of water per person, per day in plastic containers such as soft drink bottles. Avoid using containers that will decompose or break, such as paper milk cartons or glass bottles.

Food -Store at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food. If you must heat food, pack a can of sterno. Include a selection of the following foods in your supplies: ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits, vegetables and juices; high energy foods/vitamins; food for infants and pets.

First Aid Kit - Assemble a first aid kit for your home and one for each car. It should include: sterile adhesive bandages in assorted sizes; safety pins; cleansing agent/soap and antiseptic; 2 pairs of latex gloves; sunscreen; 2 and 4 inch sterile gauze pads (4-6 of each); 3 triangular bandages; nonprescription drugs; 3 rolls each of 2
