



Local Latinos mark the magi visit

While the holiday season is over for some, many in the Hispanic population have been preparing for Three Kings Day, celebrated today.

Three Kings Day, also known as The Epiphany or Dia de los Reyes in Spanish, is a Christian celebration that commemorates the Biblical story of three kings who followed the star of Bethlehem to bring gifts to the Christ child. According to the account, the kings, named Melchior, Caspar and Balthazar, presented Baby Jesus with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

"We didn't have Santa Claus, snow or chimneys (in Puerto Rico)," said Evelyn Gavillan, a Belleville resident for 13 years. "Instead we had the three kings on camels."

Gavillan remembers when she was young, children would put hay and water underneath their beds for the camels at night on Jan. 5. And the next morning they would find gifts underneath their beds.

"We had cows and horses on the farm. I always wanted to see the camels, but I never did," laughs Gavillan.

There were no Christmas trees in her native land either, so instead parents would decorate the garden outside their house.

Today, Gavillan's 21-year-old a spirit of multiculturalism. American-born son celebrates the more contemporary version of Three Kings in that there is a Christmas tree and Santa Claus. Her family now celebrates both holidays, getting gifts on both occasions.

The Belleville Public Library and Information Center will be holding its own Three Kings Day party on Sat., Jan. 8 at 11:30 a.m.

"Traditionally, in Hispanic communities, gifts are not given at Christmas time, they're given on the Epiphany, which is 12 days after Christmas," said Children's Librarian Rebecca Howley, who is organizing the free event.

The library event is being held in

"The idea is to expose people of all backgrounds to this holiday," said Howley. "It's a way of having a more secular Christmas celebration for everyone."

The day will involve a retelling of the Three Kings story, craft projects where kids will make crowns for the kings, after which, robes and beards will be given out to make the kids look older and wiser. As the Hispanic tradition usually calls for big parades, about 30 "wise kings" will march through the library, as their parents throw candy at them, said Howley.

This is the second time that the library is hosting this family-oriented event. Head of the board of directors Richard Yannuzi suggested the event to be inclusive of the large Hispanic population in Belleville. There are about 8,500 Hispanics and Latinos in the township, according to the 2000 U.S. Census Bureau.

Thieves steal Dumpster from open DPW yard

A Department of Public Works Dumpster went missing last month and has not been recovered.

Police predict the 25-foot long and four and a half-foot high container was taken by someone between Sunday, Dec. 5 at 11:30 a.m., when it was last seen at the yard on Cortlandt Street, and Monday, Dec. 6 at 7:30 a.m., when it was reported stolen.

An employee noticed that it was removed from the lot, police said. When the DPW director Jim thing.

Messina left the premises on Sun-day, he said the gate to the lot was closed. But when police arrived on the scene, the gate was open, with no evidence of forced entry, meaning the gate was left open or someone opened it with a key, said Capt. Frank Manno, who's working on the investigation.

Since the Dumpster weighed about 1000 lbs., Manno assumes that someone rolled it onto a truck and drove it out. He said police canvassed the area and spoke to some workers and neighbors, but so far no one heard or saw any-

"It's unusual," said Manno. "We've had some things reported stolen (from DPW) in the past, but nothing as far as a 25-foot container."

Messina said it is not a DPW practice to lend out its equipment to anyone, so he thinks that the Dumpster was stolen and will not be recovered, since all containers look alike, he said.

"We've had other things disappear from the yard," said Messina. "Some equipment has been stolen, it's been recovered; certain things were never done according to the way they were supposed to be."

Removal of the Dumpster is was an inside job, but Tucci said considered theft of township property. The extent of the penalty depends on what the item was worth. The Dumpster was valued between \$2500 to \$3000, which makes it a third degree theft, said police, who are continuing to investigate the matter.

The stolen Dumpster was relatively new. The township will check how many spares it has in its possession before replacing it with a new Dumpster for the yard, said Township Manager Mauro Tucci.

Neither police nor the township are commenting whether the theft the thieves knew what they were doing

"Whoever stole the box was aware of the layout of the DPW yard and obviously to steal something of that size you need special equipment, you need a roll-off truck, a truck with rails on it that can lift that box and carry it," said Tucci.

How to shed those unwanted holiday presents

The silver iPod Mini - 1,000song capacity, eight hours of portable music on one charge was what Ajoy Chandra wanted, more or less, for Christmas.

OK, less.

OK, it was completely not ... the ... right ... thing. His girlfriend had goofed.

So the next day, Chandra became a de-gifter: one who tries to shed unwanted presents for cash. (In this case, \$249 plus tax exactly what Chandra's girlfriend had paid.)

'You'll save me the trip to the Apple store if you come pick it up from me," reads his Craigslist.com advertisement, which is aimed at potential buyers living near him in Jersey City and Hoboken. "You will save yourself a trip to the city."

Haters of department-store return lines, losers of cash register receipts, hunters of bargains: Rejoice, all. The second hand market for unloved-but-new-in-thebox merchandise starts roaring right about now.

Proponents say de-gifting is easier on the conscience than re-gifting, the sneaky handing-over of ho-ho-ho-hum presents. Some degifters reason that their offering could brighten someone else's holiday, particularly when they're looking to ditch merchandise that's either sold out or scarce.

"The only place you can get one

is the Apple store," Chandra said of his iPod. "At Amazon there's a wait.

In Upper Montclair, an eBay listing service called eBidz took in about 35 new electronic gadgets by the Tuesday after Christmas. Among them were a Panasonic digital camera and a Sony DVD player given to - and not particularly wanted by - Brett Kohn of Nutley.

"I don't have to stand in any return lines," Kohn said. "I pretty much drop it off and hope everything goes well.'

Ebidz starts all its eBay sales at \$9.99. and bids routinely run much higher. Kohn figured that even after eBidz takes its commission, he'll still have the equivalent of found money in his pocket to buy what he really wants - DVDs or video games, maybe, or something for a son who is due in February.

EBay, the biggest auction site on the Internet, is taking a special interest in de-gifting. In a survey released in December, it found 20 percent of Americans have listed unwanted gifts online. Auction-Drop, a California company that lists clients' merchandise on eBay, savs January is its busiest month.

'A lot of it is de-gifting," said Randy Adams, co-founder of AuctionDrop. "Some of it is actually selling old, 'extra' things - 'I got a new digital camera so I'm getting rid of the old one.' The third thing is they're out of cash and they need it.'

He added: "It's a win-win situa- she thinking?" tion. They get a check. People get a reduced rate on eBay. The buyer's happy, the seller's happy, we're happy because we make a commission."

In January, AuctionDrop will roll out an ad campaign based on de-gifting. A punk rocker, eyeing a schmaltzy Lladro figurine, is pictured above the words: "Santa get it wrong?"

Chandra, the iPod recipient, said that if he gets no bites on Craigslist.com, he'll schlep to the Apple store, subject himself to the return hassle, throw down some more money, and pick up what he really wanted: a 20-gig iPod, the one with the 5,000-song capacity. It will be as much a gift for himself as for his girlfriend, he said.

"I've been talking about getting one for years," he said. "I bore my girlfriend to tears when I talk about

And yes, she was very understanding about the whole thing and no, she has no intention of degifting the 15-inch strand of pearls he gave her. Even though she thinks they're appropriate to wear only in the daytime.

For the first half of January, consignment and resale shops expect a non-stop parade of clothing.

"You want them out of your house because you're not going to wear them," said JoAnn Lewis, owner of Hidden Closet in Ramsey. "I hear a lot of 'My mother-inlaw bought this for me. What was

Not that the merchandise is necessarily ugly or tasteless. Often, it's high-quality stuff that simply holds no appeal. In a way, unwanted gifts still are gifts - just not for the intended recipient.

In Riverdale, Chris Wheeler, an employee of the Growing Kids resale shop, said she was sorting a load of toys and clothing dropped off by a suburban mom two days after the holiday.

Three Kings Day

In these days when people are fussing and fighting over what's appropriate for display in the public sector, it's good to see the Belleville Public Library marking Three Kings Day

What this indicates is that the library's directors are aware of the multicultural uniqueness of Belleville and are looking to reflect it back to the town's people. That's why libraries exist; they make knowledge available to the general public.

Almost a quarter of Belleville's population is now Hispanic, and Three Kings Day is a part of the traditions for many of those families. Many of us who celebrate Christmas may assume that everyone around the world marks the day with Santa Claus and Christmas trees, just like most Americans. We don't think for a minute that cultural and environmental circumstance may have forged new customs in other parts of the globe.

But many kids around Puerto Rico, the Caribbean and Latin America receive their presents under their bed, not under a tree. They also receive them from three wise men, not an obese, Caucasian saint. But these are the cultural exchanges that make the world an exciting place.

to our blue and red states, it's good to occasionally meditate on the positive things that make us each similar, but also unique.

The Belleville Public Library has been very good about extolling these cultural elements. It holds its menorah lighting when it lights its Christmas tree, which is a very positive ecumenical statement. We encourage the staff to keep up the good work, and we wait to see what other ethnic flavors they'll put on the plate next.

Dumpster stolen from DPW

Something stinks about the dumpster reported stolen from the Department of Public Works, and it's not the trash. The whole premise is illogical.

Sometime during December, someone waltzed onto the department's yard on Cortlandt Street, and without forced entry or witnesses, made off with a 25-foot, 1000 pound trash receptacle.

The excuse given was that the gate was left unlocked. So we're supposed to accept that of all the thousands of dollars of equipment in the DPW yard, someone chose to

In these days where cultures clash from Iraq, all the way make off with a dumpster? The very idea seems ridiculous and highly dubious. Who would risk prosecution on a cumbersome trash bin? It's not something that can be easily sold; it can only be used to collect trash.

Dumpsters that large are handy at construction sites, so let's hope that police are inquiring with area contractors.

Also, we're supposed to accept that a passerby was suddenly afforded a crime of opportunity, and they just happened to have a flatbed truck and winch available that could make off with an entire dumpster?

Who would have that kind of vehicle on hand other than the DPW, auto body shops, trash companies or, again, large contractors?

The elements of this case don't appear to add up to a crime of opportunity, rather something that involved forethought and planning with the proper equipment. It also demonstrates that the offender was either so eager for a trash receptacle, that he or she was willing to risk prosecution - which seems strange - or that person felt a right to it, which would make sense, since the gate open for them to come right in.

Pray and don't lose heart

that prayer does anything.

Some people say, "I prayed for something in the past and I didn't get it." We have all had that happen. Despite a genuine and deeply felt belief that God would grant what seemed like a reasonable request, it never happened.

I remember when I was little I used to pray for snow every night. It never snowed, and I began to wonder if God really did hear and answer prayers. Of course many of us have learned that like a loving parent, God does not grant requests that would harm us or someone else. If God granted all our requests God would be stuck doing some very ungodly things. God only gives the best to us. Yet we have all had experiences that made us question the power of prayer.

Some people have more theologically-based reasons for believing that prayer doesn't do anything. I mean after all, who are we to tell God what to do anyway? God is the Almighty, and we are just pesky little humans. And what are my

Most people really don't believe at prayer does anything. requests in the face of the huge uni-versal problems that God faces?

There are a lot of reasons to believe that prayer is ineffective, but there is one very good reason to believe that it is effective. That one reason is that Jesus taught his disciples to pray always and not to lose heart. The Son of God, Jesus Christ, believed in prayer. He taught his disciples to pray always. Not just to pray when it seemed right, but always. Not just when the chips were down of nothing else worked, but always. Not just when the problem was big enough or important enough to warrant divine assistance, but in every situation. And Jesus told them not to lose heart. That means that the answer may be delayed enough that some would lose heart. But Iesus said, "Don't give up."

God hears our prayers, but the truth is that sometimes it seems to take a long time for God to say something back. In those times praying is an act of faith. It is a visible action that demonstrates faith. Praying puts into action the belief that there is a God. It demonstrates the faith that God is good and just. Praying is an act of faith that says, "God hears and responds to my needs." Prayer also proclaims, "God is my hope and my source of salvation.

I don't know what you have been praying for. It might have been something big or something small. It might have been world peace or peace in your family. It might have been food for the hungry or the health to eat what you have. It might have been for whole nations to find Christ or for one person to be saved. Whatever it is, keep praying. God hears and God answers. "Pray always and do not lose heart."(Luke 18:1) "Listen to what the unjust judge says. And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? I tell you he will quickly grant justice!"(Luke 18:6-8)

Men and women differ when it comes to shopping

Did you know that over 90 percent of home furnishings purchas-es are made by women? That's just one of the findings from a survey done recently by flooring manufacturer Mannington Mills. The company, first in its industry to do such extensive research on consumer shopping habits, set out to find ways for flooring salespeople to better relate to their customers. It found some answers, plus a whole lot more.

For example, men and women approach shopping from two completely different viewpoints. Women, for the most part, enjoy shopping and see it as a social and emotional experience. Men, on the other time, aren't as likely to want so much time to browse, but the male shopper wants a salesperson to be available when he's ready to buy.

Women today are the "chief purchasing officers" of their households. In other words, whether or not they earn the money, they usually are in control of it. So it is to the salesperson's advantage to take her seriously and include her in all aspects of the purchasing process, from browsing to the financial transaction.

It's wise to relate to the female consumer for many reasons. She is a more loyal consumer and will go out of her way to do business with a store she feels comfortable with. She is also much more likely than her male counterpart to tell others of her shopping experience, whether it be positive or negative.

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

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

Lucius Millinder registered 21 points to lead the Belleville boys' basketball team to its first win of the season, 48-41 over Pope John XXIII in the first round of the Passaic Valley Holiday Tournament last week.

Belleville dropped the championship game to Passaic Valley, 57-53 as Millinder, its leading scorer, was sidelined with food poison-

ing. The Bucs took a 1-4 mark into

a game against Ridgewood last Tuesday. Belleville visits Passaic this afternoon at 5:30 p.m and plays host to Indian Hills this Saturday at 2 p.m. Next Tuesday, Belleville hosts Paramus Catholic at 7 p.m.

"Overall, I was pretty happy with the way we played at the Passaic Valley Tournament," Belleville coach Duane Eason said. "We're a pretty young team and the kids continue to get better with each game. Not having Lucius in the final was tough, but our kids came through with a good effort."

In the victory over Pope John, Millinder scored 15 of his gamehigh 21 points in the second half. Sophomore forward Rahmid Thompson scored 12 points, including two 3-point baskets and freshman point guard Kaseem Harris had seven points and five assists.

"I knew Kaseem had a lot of talent," Eason said. "But he's exceeded what I expected him to do so far. He handles the ball very well and is starting to get his

offensive game going." Harris and Thompson led Belleville against Passaic Valley, with each man scoring 15 points. Harris also had six assists and four steals while Thompson collected 11 rebounds.

Eason also praised the efforts of freshmen Herminio Rodriguez and Marlou Zanoria.

"Rodriguez is a 6'3" forward who has really played well," Eason said. "Zanoria handles the ball as well as Kaseem and has settled in well at the two-guard. I've said since the beginning of the season that the first 10 games are a feeling out process. After that, we should have a good idea of where our team is headed, and the younger kids, who are playing J.V. and varsity, will have a chance to show if they're ready for varsity competition on a regular basis."

Conte will provide a big boost to Belleville's coaching staff

Belleville wrestling coach Joe Nisivoccia is pretty excited about the latest addition to his coaching staff, and rightfully so.

Anthony Conte, a 1998 graduate of Belleville and a former state champion, joins the staff along with returning coach Anthony Frantantoni.

Conte, who ranks first on Belleville's all-time win list, placed in the state tournament in each of his four high school seasons. As a freshman 103 pounder in 1995, he advanced to the state tournament. The following season, Conte won the 103-pound state championship, the last Belleville wrestler, to date, to capture a state title. He was a state runner up at 112 pounds in '97 and was fifth in the state at 119 pounds in 1998. Following high school, Conte went on to an out-



standing collegiate wrestling career.

Winning a state wrestling championship is a difficult accomplishment. To have two former state champions on the same coaching staff is certainly impressive. Nisivoccia, Belleville's head coach for 20 years and a coach here for 26 seasons, won a state title as a senior at Edison in 1972

"Obviously, I'm thrilled to have Anthony on the staff," Nisivoccia said. "His knowledge of the sport is invaluable and the kids will cer-

tainly relate to what he's saying." Conte replaces Pete Isip, who was Nisivoccia's top assistant the past 10 years. Isip will be a volunteer assistant this year as he pursues some business interests and couldn't put in the necessary hours needed as an assistant coach.

During his high school career, Conte's speed on the mat was incredible. He was quick and graceful, but it was his toughness that could never be overlooked.

That was never more apparent than a memorable match in 1998. Conte was matched against Kearny's talented sophomore Dave Cordoba in the Region 4 championship at 119 pounds. Cordoba, who like Conte would go on to be a four-time state medalist and a state champion (in 1999) was undefeated heading

into that match and had aura of confidence that clearly annoyed Conte, who was also undefeated.

Cordoba took an early lead and by the beginning of the third period, was ahead 3-1. However, Conte was setting the tone of the match with an aggressive approach that was wearing Cordoba down. The large crowd at Passaic Valley was nearing a frenzied pace by the third period, and when Conte landed a hard takedown and put Cordoba on his back, the end was near. A few seconds later, the referee signaled

a pin and Conte calmly walked off the mat a Region 4 champ for the third time in his illustrious career. That match was so intense that

the next matchup, between Belleville's Larry Martin and Nutley's Dante Cifelli in the 125-

pound final, seemed to be anticlimactic for the first period. But when Martin went on to win on criteria in an intense double-overtime match, the story of the 1998 Region 4 championships was the 1-2 punch of Conte and Martin.

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

someone moves, be sure such changes are reflected in it. After signing the new document, destroy the old one.

You may have all your wishes in writing, but someone must know where to find them when the time arrives. Store a will in a safe and accessible place such as a safe deposit box. Tell a friend or relative where the will is located. Your attorney should also have a copy of your will as well as a note, detailing its whereabouts.

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


