Almost every municipal and police official attended a fourth block meeting over poor conditions at Branch Brook Gardens Apartments, held last week at the senior citizen fieldhouse on Belleville Avenue.

And this time, the chatter centered on a realtor who's interested in acquiring Belleville's largest apartment complex from its current owner, Larry Lipschutz.

Officials have confirmed that Andrew Schwartz of Vintage Group, a realty firm in New York, property from the code enforcement department and has asked Police Chief Joseph Rotonda about safety in the surrounding area, which some feel indicate his intentions as a buyer.

"I have two children and I'm tired of being cold," said Olive Martin who moved into the complex two months ago. "The radiator is lukewarm, the parking lot is a disaster, with many potholes. I moved here for a better life, but I don't want to subject myself to this sort of living."

Lipschutz, who's been the owner of the building for the past 10 years, has been fined \$36,000 for failing to fix 3,665 violations But living conditions for some marked by state inspectors, said Jennifer Szwalek, spokesperson for the state Department of Community Affairs. His fine was cut in half and payments spread out under the condition that he fix the problems in a timely manner. He was also fined about \$13,000 by the Belleville Municipal Court.

Lipschutz had said that a complex of that size always has problems that need to be fixed and it's impossible to get to them all at inside the building there is a lack once, but he's tending to them in a

But not all tenants feel they have been subjected to poor living conditions. Bridget Butler, who's attended the past couple of meetings, has been a 10-year resident at Branch Brook.

"When I heard people com-plaining, I felt like I'm living in a different complex," said Butler, adding that she is not experiencing those conditions in her unit on Maier Street.

Lipschutz recently said that many interested buyers have been approaching him about the complex after reading about the situation at Branch Brook in the Belleville Times and other newspapers. The landlord did not deny being interested in selling the property.

We are exploring all of our options," said Lipschutz. "We are not ruling out anything?

Some residents, such as Marisol Rodriguez, said that news about a new owner coming in does not give her hope that things will get better at the complex.

Winter tough time for blood shortages

The Blood Center of New Jersey is urging people to donate blood this month to ease the winter shortages and give second chances to patients who will need life-saving blood transfusions to survive.

"Now is the most difficult time of the year to maintain an adequate inventory of all blood types," said Judy Daniels, spokeswoman for the Blood Center of New Jersey. "Fewer blood drives are scheduled, fewer people come out to blood drives, and the refrigerators empty quickly," she continued.

Blood center officials note decreases in donations in January are often associated with cold weather, cold and flu season, and college recesses. "In addition, these shortages occur nationally we have little ability to rely on other states to supplement our supply," said Daniels.

All community blood drives are listed on the blood center's Web site at www.bloodnj.org or people can call 800-BLOODNJ to ask a representative to help identify a convenient blood drive. The Blood Center of New Jersey is a community, non-profit organization supplying blood and blood components to over 35 hospitals in northern and central New Jersey.

People interested in sponsoring blood drives are also needed. Anyone belonging to an organization or business who would like to learn about running a blood drive is urged to call 800-256-6365, ext.

Donors must be at least 17 years of age. There is no upper age limit for donors. Donors should know their social security number and bring a signed or picture form of identification. For more information or to sign up for a blood drive, call the blood center at 1-800-652-5663, ext. 140.

Building inspectors to roam Washington Avenue

Business owners on Washington Avenue, Belleville's busiest business district, will be getting almost daily visits from building inspectors compelling them to maintain their storefronts and keep garbage under control.

Township Manager Mauro Tucci said inspectors will be starting from Mill Street on the Newark border, walking the length of Washington Avenue to King Street on the Nutley border.

"They will be looking for garbage that's not packaged properly, and checking overall property maintenance," he said. "We will have two folks sweeping to the Nutley line every day, weather per-

Tucci said it's part of a move to improve the business district.

We want people to see a visual

difference," he said. Councilman Third Ward George Ritacco spearheaded the move to clean up the area with initial support from First Ward Councilwoman Marie Strumolo Burke.

They said trash is piling up outside local businesses.

Officials say the trash sends the wrong message to potential shoppers - that business owners don't care how the downtown looks and whether shoppers visit their establishments or not.

While some would say the extra effort should come from the Belleville Department of Public Works, town officials said it would property maintenance codes.

Local building maintenance codes say that storefronts must be clear of loose garbage and other debris or else a business owner is subject to fines.

A system of fines is in place for violators, though officials said they would rather warn businesses and have them do a better job of property maintenance.

Officials will take tougher measures on repeat offenders, issuing

Bringing in shoppers, officials said, is the ultimate need for downtown businesses, so they should cooperate.

Frank Marmo, who runs Yerg Printing on Washington Avenue, said, "I'm happy to see inspectors

He has complained that garbage blows onto his property from other sources.

"If you have garbage blowing, you should get the people who are causing it," Marmo said. "Maybe they're putting it out too early or in improper containers."

He said if he swept his property at 11 a.m., that by 3 p.m. garbage would be back.

"We need to educate business owners," Marmo said. "You can tell when garage just got there versus when it's been there awhile."

He said he didn't think that other business owners would be driven out of town by the new tighter restrictions.

"If you're not keeping your storefront clean, something's not

right," Marmo said. "Pick a time and go out and clean. I do it every morning, come out and sweep."

He said he stores his garbage in

thick, secure, heavy plastic bags. "Thin bags can't be put out there," Marmo said. "This involves a little extra work."

Some businesses rent from a building owner, and they should insist that the building owner keep their business clean since they are spending thousands a month to rent, he said.

He said the business owners on Franklin Avenue should also get some consideration from property inspectors, to make sure the other big business area in Belleville is as clean as it should be.

Drake said his main concern with the complex is poor management, for which he didn't blame the landlord as much as the code enforcement office, whose inspector was supposed to be continually checking for viola-

"Code enforcement is key," he said. "One man didn't do it and (Lipschutz) didn't do it overnight."

Drake stressed that many new tenants don't know that Belleville is rent controlled. Under the current Consumer Price Index, which changes every month, landlords can raise the rent only a certain percentage and not more.

Criminal check required for building superintendents

The township council adopted an ordinance on first reading requiring anyone working as a building superintendent Belleville to go through a criminal history check.

First Ward Councilwoman Marie Strumolo Burke pushed the resolution after her constituents complained about the "mangy" appearance of superintendents at Branch Brook Gardens Apartments.

"(The landlord) took them from the street, gave them a sleazy apartment, so the people were afraid to let them in, they had no identification, no badge on, that's the thing," said Strumo-lo Burke explaining her reason for the ordinance.

The law states that any superintendent of an apartment building with more than 10 units needs to submit to a criminal history record check and must also be fingerprinted. The state police would do the criminal check, as it's done for schoolteachers, for which the building owner would most likely have to pay. The Belleville police would help out with the fingerprinting, said Capt. Mark Minichini.

There are 63 apartment buildings with more than 10 units in Belleville, according to the tax assessor's office.

Township Attorney Robert Gaccione can't say it's a normal practice for building superintendents to get criminal checks, but according to his research the ordi-

While officials say the ordinance is for the security and safetv of the community, others say criminal checks of building superintendents may be a violation of privacy

"I'm not sure I would be in favor of seeing that come into fruition," said Belleville resident Tom McCrohan, who's also a Nutley High School teacher. "I don't know how important it is that you do a criminal check just because a person is in charge of a housing unit. They could have done something wrong, they paid their debt to society - why should that keep them from keeping

But Branch Brook superintendent Jose Oquendo says he has nothing against being fingerprinted or his background being

"You can take my finger prints, all of the police officers know me here," he said.

He doesn't think the new law violates his privacy.

"People get fingerprinted for other jobs too, why not for this one?" he added.

The information obtained would be kept confidential within law enforcement, said Strumolo Burke.

The ordinance will be enacted 20 days after final passage, at which point all 63 building owners will be informed of the new

Tenant complaints lead to three arrests at troubled Branch Brook Gardens

In response to ongoing complaints from neighbors who say they live next to "criminals" at Branch Brook Gardens Apartments, police raided the complex and arrested three female residents on the morning of Thursday, Feb.

In a joint operation between the Belleville Police Department and the Essex County Sheriff's Office Fugitive Squad, authorities ran a list of tenants with active warrants at Branch Brook Gardens.

The offenses were minor. Nikki Coleman, 29, of Branch Brook Drive, was arrested on a \$500 shoplifting warrant out of Wayne. Carlisha Millidge of Maier Street was arrested for a traffic warrant out of Caldwell for \$300. Both women were transferred over to the relevant townships. Yanira Jimenez, 28, of Branch Brook Drive, was arrested by the sheriff's department for violating terms of her probation on a drug charge. She is being held at Essex County Jail without bail until her court date, according to the sheriff's

"We respond to complaints from community groups," said

Capt. Mark Minichini of Belleville police. "We got enough reports that say that there are active criminals there."

Residents have reported problems with violence in the past and alleged hearing gunshots around the property back in the summer, said District V Freeholder Ralph Caputo, one of the officials who initiated the Branch Brook investi-

"Obviously they're doing their job," said Caputo of the police.

Although most of the people with active warrants moved out of Branch Brook earlier, dodging the raid, according to Minichini, Belleville officials have started becoming more vigilant about living conditions at the largest apartment complex in the township. After the community and the press started paying closer attention to quality of life issues for some residents at the 404-unit apartment building, local officials followed

"It was not only just the physical improvements that needed to be made, but also we were looking into some of the quality of life issues there," said Township Manager Mauro Tucci. "We wanted to Anna Spiewak's e-mail address is make sure that it was safe, people were concerned about different

things. Together we went in there and hopefully we've taken out a few more bad guys."

The crimes that the three women were charged with are considered minor, but Branch Brook resident Terri Sutton said she's in favor of police doing background checks on residents.

"You've got to get the bad stuff out of here," she said. "Don't be running from the law; if you get a ticket, you need to pay it, because eventually it will catch up with you."

At the most recent Branch Brook block meeting, some residents also complained about kids selling drugs at the park across the street from the building. Minichini said the police are actively pursuing any narcotic activity. Residents who witness any suspicious narcotics activity are asked to call the Belleville Police Narcotic Hotline, which is anonymous and confidential 24 hours a day at (973) 450-3359. Minichini said several drug arrests were made the past couple of weeks, but did not want to go into details, since the matter is still under investigation.

a much-debated issued in Christian circles. Giving appears on the surface to be sharing possessions, wealth, income, and the like. More importantly, giving is sharing self. Giving is a most remarkable concept, originating in the heart of a giving God, a God who pours out more blessings on his people than we can ever deserve or expect. Carmer Ave. work examined; costs increase

While officials continue to investigate if anyone is to blame for delays in essential repair work to Carmer Avenue, Township Manager Mauro Tucci talked this week about the project's large cost

The final cost of upgrades and paving to the road increased more than \$125,000 - a 21.8 percent raise from the original contract. The total cost of the project is now

"(Originally) we did not include the portion after the crest of the hill that heads to the right (St. Mary's Place) and goes right to the Nutley border," he said. "That's what increased the price."

Tucci said there was paving, grading, sidewalk improvements, curbing and re-grading of driveway aprons as part of the new phase of the project.

The work was not put into the original contract because it is not

Some Carmer Avenue residents have lauded town officials for finally providing relief from flooding and poor road conditions on the damaged street.

Susan Greco of Carmer Avenue has said in a previous interview that it appears the flooding has been rectified by the paving, and a few new sewers have been added.

The road has been fully repaved, while problems with storm drains and sewers that were clogging and causing flooding have been remedied with new drains that don't clog to prevent future flooding problems.

Questions still remain about who was responsible for the delay in finishing the project, Tucci said. done at least by the spring of 2004 and was not done until the fall of

"Our engineer (Thomas Herits) is doing some digging," he said. "I don't know if there is any legitimate malfeasance or design error, but we're trying to learn for sure."

Herits is checking to see if there was a basic flaw in the plans to complete the work or if money was improperly used by the contractor or engineer.

Tucci said that in the past there have been "shortsighted" decision processes by previous officials, where in the end the township didn't get what it wanted in the name of trying to save money. For example, he mentioned Municipal Stadium, where township lawyers are investigating whether the contractor can be held accountable for what town officials feel is less than satisfactory work on the stadium.

The stadium fields have not

The work was supposed to be been renovated to the satisfaction of several council members.

"If there is culpability (on Carmer Avenue) we will pursue it," he said. "The jury is still out."

Neglia Engineering Associates of Lyndhurst is the engineer on the project, while the contractor is Tomaro Contracting Co., Inc. of Rockaway.

Some complaints came from residents who went out in the morning and came back to find their driveway torn up without any notification. The final paving on the road was done in October.

Residents have thanked Fourth Ward Councilman John Notari and Tucci for finally getting the street repaired after a year.

In a previous interview, Notari

said he had been working diligently on the problem since taking office in July 2004.

Notari said he inherited Carmer Avenue's woes then and problems had lingered since long before that.

He said two residents, Greco and Joanne Caffie, had been instrumental in bringing the problems to light and getting action.

The poor quality of the road and the flooding brought the two to Notari for help.

The two rallied their neighbors and continued to press Tucci and Notari to complete the work.

During the reconstruction of the road, Notari made sure residents were allowed to park cars temporarily by the Pathmark on Washington Avenue.





Grease a ring cake pan. Pour boiling water over raisins and boil for 10 to 15 minutes. Remove from heat, but while still hot, add shortening, sugar and baking soda. Mix well. Add cold water, flour and spices. Mix well. Fill pan with batter. Bake at 350 degrees for about 50 minutes, but test for doneness.

FEVER PITCH

Your mother may have touched the backside of her hand to your forehead to tell whether or not you had a temperature, but is this a valid way to tell whether someone has a fever? According to a 2003 study that was conducted in India, which involved approximately 200 children, 60% percent of the children whose skin felt hot to their caregiver (usually a parent) had no fever at all. Conversely, 27 percent of those who did feel normal have a fever. Members of the medical staff were better able than caregivers to spot the presence or absence of a fever. They found that the best site for checking was the abdomen, not the forehead.

Maintaining control of your finances

Maintaining control of your finances not only helps you in the short term, it's an essential step toward achieving your longer range financial goals, such as buying a new home or making home improvements.

What you may not realize is that your credit score (FICO) affects your ability to achieve these goals.

Recent research found that only 13 percent of consumers know that a FICO score above the low 700s will most often get them a lower interest rate on a loan. And only a quarter of those who responded to the survey had accessed their credit scores, a tool that provides valuable information for making financial decisions.

Fortunately, instituting only a few good practices can help you raise your credit score. Some

examples include:

■ Paying bills on time. If you have a credit score of 670, paying your bills on time for at least three months can raise your FICO score as much as 20 points.

■ Paying down balances. Paying \$750 toward a revolving credit balance of \$2,122 can raise your credit score from 670 to as high as

■ Tranferring balances. If you have an FICO score of 670 and open a new credit card with a credit limit of \$3,000 and consolidate all existing credit card balances onto that one card, your credit score can increase to between 675 and 715.



Colon, Soprano win district crowns

Cozzarelli, Cuevas, Atuncar and Dizon also invited to region wrestling bout

Belleville freshmen Filiberto Colon and James Soprano took home District 14 championships last weekend at Livingston High and gained a first round bye for the Region 4 championships, which began last Tuesday night at Passaic Valley in Little Falls.

Four other Belleville wrestlers, Angel Cuevas (130), Robert Cozzarelli (135), Carlos Atuncar (140) and Joe-Mac Dizon (215) finished in the top three of their respective weight class and were also extended invitations to the regions. Those four had to win in the preliminary round last Tuesday in order to advance to tomorrow night's quarterfinal round.

The regional championships, which are being contested at eight sites throughout the state, began last Tuesday and continue tomor-

row night. The semifinals and championship bouts will be held on Saturday. (As mentioned, Belleville is wrestling at Region 4 in Passaic Valley). Those wrestlers who finish in the top three of their respective weight class at the regions will earn a trip to Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City for the state championships, which begin March 11 and conclude on March

At the District 14 championships last weekend, Belleville finished fifth as a team, with 108 1/2 points. Livingston won its fifth straight and eighth district crown over the last nine years with 184 1/2 points. Nutley finished second with 164.5 while surging Bloomfield took third, scoring 149. Upstart Montclair was a surprise fourth, tallying 149 points in the nine team field.

"Overall, I was satisfied with our results," Belleville coach Joe Nisivoccia said. "But I wouldn't say I was happy. I thought we could have gotten a few more through, but the kids who are moving on did a good job."






