■ Burglary and auto theft was reported March 2 at 6:30 a.m. A Belmont Avenue resident's 1995 Toyota Corolla had a broken driver's side window. His car stereo and CDs were removed, causing extensive damage to his dashboard.

■ An officer was flagged down by a cab driver March 2 at 2 a.m. complaining that a patron ran out of the cab without paying for his fare from Montclair. The suspect was described as a 5'10 white male running on Joralemon Street. He was spotted by police officers, at which time he dropped a glass pipe, used to smoke a controlled dangerous substance. Police also found on him a large bag which

appeared to contain marijuana. A restitution of \$6 was made to the cab driver. Mark Masters, 30, of Belleville was charged with possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia. He also had a \$100 warrant out of Newark. He was held on \$1000 bail.

■ Police observed a vehicle being driven in an erratic manner on Washington Avenue March 3 at 11 a.m. Police followed the vehicle and pulled it over on the corner of Washington Avenue and Rossmore Place. When the car was stopped and the female driver was asked to step outside, the officer observed a large bulge in her sock. When she was questioned

about it, she presented 10 blue wax folds with the word "extra" stamped on them. Inside of them was found a white powdery substance believed to be heroin. Mary Fox, 54, of Rutherford, was charged with possession of a controlled dangerous substance (CDS) and was released on her own recognizance.

■ Plainclothes detectives patrolling the area spotted a red Cadillac parked in an unusual spot March 4 at 5:30 p.m. at the corner of Main and Mill streets. A detective observed the driver in the process of using CDS. Upon police approaching the vehicle, the man threw a white item out the window. Detectives observed an empty wax fold, believed to contain a CDS. When interrogated, the person appeared to be

under the influence of narcotics. Detectives placed Raymond Swinesburg, 50, of Belleville under arrest. His court date is pending.

■ Police received a phone tip that someone was overdosing from affects of drugs at the Washington Motel March 4 at 7 p.m. Upon knocking on the door and then entering, police observed a man lying in bed with a syringe still stuck in his arm. He was unresponsive. In his possession were found five syringes containing a clear liquid, four vials with blue caps on them with a white powdery substance inside that appeared to be cocaine. Angel Suri Valdes, 51, of Kearny was charged with being under the influence of heroin, possession of CDS and drug paraphernalia. March 9 is his criminal court date.

Liquor store owner arrested

Police arrested a liquor store owner after watching an out-of-town minor walk into his establishment and walk out with alcohol on Tuesday, March 1.

Police were monitoring Family Liquors at 542 Washington Ave. after a number of tips that kids were getting their liquor from that store.

Owner Suraj Dixit, 65, of Staten Island was taken into custody and released on his own recognizance. He is due to appear in court. If found guilty the owner will have to answer to Alcoholic Beverage Control. The 19-year-old male teen was not charged although his alcohol purchase was confiscated. Police will continue to monitor the premises, said Capt. Mark Minichini.

Neighboring teens from Nutley also reported to getting their liquor from the same liquor store, said Lt. Steven Rogers.

96-unit condominium

The Zoning Board hearing to build a 96-unit condominium on the south end of Washington Avenue was postponed until March 24 at 7 p.m. inside the council chambers at Town Hall.

Developer Remo Di Popolo of Group D Capital Partners is looking to construct an eight-story high complex at 85-89 Washington Ave. He currently owns a used car lot in the same spot. He is also looking to include three parking levels with one below grade, six levels of residential units above with commercial tenant space on the ground level.

Elected officials tackle Friendly House

In an effort to tackle facility improvements in the township, a couple of local officials are starting with a facility that is in most need: The Friendly House on Frederick Street.

Once a popular playground and recreational facility in the community, today the 75-year-old building is a semi-abandoned brick structure with no heat, paint peeling off the walls, crumbling floors and dead pigeons decomposing in the attic. Also since the water is shut off, a foul smell permeates the building from unflushed toilets. The edifice looks many years forgotten by the inhabitants of the

community.

For this reason, Councilwoman Marie Strumolo Burke and District V Freeholder Ralph Caputo, the same team who spearheaded the Branch Brook investigation, invited Senator Ronald Rice to tour the chilly edifice in hope of spurring some legislative funding for improvements.

Although the conditions of the building are not exactly up to par, about 80 youngsters still use the basketball gymnasium, considered the better part of the building, for practice before the games. While Strumolo Burke said she doesn't want to take away the recreational facility from the kids completely, Caputo contends that for safety reasons the place needs to be shut

down.

The township already received a Community Development Block Grant for \$50,000 last year to repair the Friendly House roof, for which the township is currently seeking bids. Now officials are focusing on repairing the rest.

Strumolo Burke said that the township had plans to demolish the building, but Rice contested that the building is solid.

"This is not a building you want to knock down, it has a lot of character to it," he said.

The Friendly House also supports a large in-ground pool inside the building that has not been used for years but Rice said that the pool could bring families together the way it used to years ago.

The senator said that at the county level, he will meet with Acting Gov. Richard Codey about getting a NJ Livable Communities Grant for the building, which he thinks will be met with reasonable success.

"There's never enough recreation in the community," said Rice. "I don't see taxpayers arguing about kids."

In the meantime, the senator advised that local officials do a complete assessment of the building, calculate how much money the needed improvements will cost and then submit the list to the county.

Aside from legislative funding, Rice also advised that local officials apply for a one-time grant, such as

one from United Way to offset the costs for repairs.

While the senator is working on the grant, locally, due to the unsanitary and unsafe conditions of the building Strumolo Burke plans to talk to the township manager about shutting the building down until necessary improvements are made.

"For many years we've been looking at something that is just deteriorating more and more," she said. "And what are we doing here. We have a substandard (facility) for those poor children, and this could be for the whole town."

Local youths set to gather at Clara Maass for 'Safe Sitter'

Local youths will gather during their upcoming school break at the West Hudson Division of Clara Maass Center, an affiliate of the Saint Barnabas Health Care System, for the two-day workshop, "Safe Sitter."

Constitutional convention unconventional idea

After 20-plus years of inaction to stem ever-increasing local, county and state taxes, New Jersey state legislators are considering a constitutional convention.

Convention members will examine our state's reliance on property taxes to fund the vast preponderance of local and county governments' budgets, and attempt to sleuth out other sources of funding presumably found on planet Earth.

However, the Legislature has barred convention members from examining where our collective taxes are spent. The Legislature is preventing the convention from proposing methods to reduce governmental costs.

Because of this restriction, the constitutional convention will be fundamentally limited in its analysis of how to diminish governmental reliance on property taxes.

Without an ability to examine where our taxes go, the convention is inherently incapable of addressing the worsening crisis in public expenses.

Some state legislators oppose creating a constitutional convention, arguing that state

legislators, not a temporary body of convention members, should make far-reaching decisions.

But during their tenures, these same members of the state Senate and Assembly have consistently failed to address the escalating costs of government and the onerous taxation afflicting property owners throughout New Jersey — certainly here in Essex County.

Republican and Democrat state legislators unite in a bipartisan depletion of the state treasury.

Legislators approved astoundingly munificent benefits for many public employees that taxpayers will never receive in their private-sector jobs. Yet private-sector taxpayers are responsible for paying the cost of these public-sector benefits and pensions.

Last year, instead of confronting an out-of-control state budget, the Legislature dramatically increased the NJ Saver rebate to homeowners. Now, attempting to address a \$4 billion deficit in a \$27.4 billion budget, Acting Gov. Richard Codey intends to eliminate the NJ Saver rebate, along with fund-

ing cuts that will affect public schools.

There are solutions.

New Jersey's 567 municipalities can be reduced in number. As people move into our state, or relocate from one town to the next, often because of the disparity in property taxes, the support for home rule will diminish. Newer residents in tiny municipalities such as Glen Ridge and Metuchen will realize they can markedly reduce their taxes, or diminish tax hikes, by merging into neighboring towns. Combining towns and/or school districts will generate immense savings.

It's long past time for the state Legislature to abolish county governments in New Jersey. There is nothing — nothing — that a county government does that cannot be done by the state government, local governments or consortiums of towns. An entire tier of public-sector bureaucracy can be eliminated, with most county employees and functions assigned to the state. Civil Service requisites and statewide ethical standards would replace the rampant corruption, nepotism and patronage that have afflicted

all county governments in New Jersey.

The abuse of taxpayer-funded pensions for public employees, such as the dramatic increases in salaries awarded to politically connected employees during their final year of employment to enlarge their pensions, and taxpayer-funded health coverage of healthy dependents into their adulthood, must end.

The perk that persists in many municipalities — permitting many public employees to annually accrue unused sick or compensatory time and then retire with a huge wad of cash derived from these unused sick days — must end. There is no private business in the United States that pays its employees for years of unused sick, compensatory or vacation time. It must cease for public employees.

Alternatives? When sufficient numbers of New Jersey taxpayers are stretched beyond their financial limits, then citizens will support privatizing components of government.

Basketball courts needed

TO THE EDITOR:

There is only one full outside basketball court in all of Belleville. Thanks to previous administration, the three full courts at the "Rec. Building" were turned into a parking lot to cater to the parents of toddler who use the toddler equipment. The only other courts in all of Belleville for over 2000 children from eight up to young adults are two at Fairway and Cortlandt Street. There are many toddler playgrounds throughout Belleville, including one behind the Friendly House, which is always locked according to town officials by a neighbor. The two above mentioned basketball courts are half courts, purposely created so our teenagers have no place to play full court, except at Cortlandt.

Now a councilman wants to close the Cortlandt Street court and turn it over to toddlers. He says it is not maintained and that litter is apparent. In addition, the hoops get broken. We all know that teenagers wherever they are, whether on the street or in their bedrooms have a tendency to not be neat. Hoops are probably broken due to dunking the ball. The answer seems to be to provide more expensive hoops and to have Public Works clean up the area regularly. In addition, the

police might make it a stop when patrolling the town. Neighbors can call up the police when there is a need.

Toddlers cannot walk to the swings and thus it would seem that their parents could drive them to equipment already in place. Teenagers on the other hand can walk to the courts and their parents are not often available to drive them to three courts in Belleville and then pick them up.

Perhaps, our teenagers would be less likely to drink alcohol, smoke cigarettes and marijuana, and engage in other negative behavior, if Belleville offered an outlet for them.

Belleville did not want visitors from Newark playing on their courts and so removed the many hoops throughout the town. This reader then had to drive his kids to Nutley. Now, Nutley has torn up its courts. No longer can one bring his children to the courts on Park Avenue by the 7-11 and on Bloomfield Avenue in Nutley.

About four years ago, the council appropriated \$250,000 for the rehabilitation of the toddler equipment, which had become very dangerous and missing; no money was spent for our teenagers. Now Councilman Ritacco is going to spend more money for the toddlers and ignore the needs of our teenagers. It appears that he has a toddler and has a vested interest. Mr. Tucci, who is still the recreation com-

missioner in Nutley and also our town manager apparently is in agreement with Mr. Ritacco. A headline in a local newspaper reads: "Councilman wants to breathe life into parks." This reader sees a lot of life on the three basketball courts. It seems our town leaders want our teenagers to play in the streets. People who are looking to move to town should ask the realtors, why all the hoops on the street? When this reader moved to Belleville 30 years ago, there were courts in most of the schoolyards and there were several rec sites with hoops. The leaders of our town probably utilized them. It seems that now they are in power, they wish to deny this activity to our teenagers. We are told that many of our children are obese and need to exercise more. The question in Belleville is where? The track has been removed. The schools are not open at night for our children, except one is being opened again for toddlers according to the rec director. We have only one gym for 1500 students at the high school.

When this reader was on the recreation committee, which was disbanded by a previous administration, it showed the board of education and the town council a poll from the middle school and high school indicating that our children wanted more facilities for them to enjoy physical activity. Perhaps, our basketball team could do better if they had an out-

door court to practice on when the schools are closed.

It is hoped that a majority of the council, if not all of the council and mayor, will make a concerted effort to provide facilities for all of our children, not just super athletes on the teams and the toddlers.

Belleville's police cars to get makeover

The Belleville Police Department's eight new police cars are now receiving a facelift. The changes are designed to make the cars more visible and add to the safety of police officers and residents, according to officials.

The department's new 2005 Ford Crown Victoria patrol cars will be ready for action in the coming weeks. These new cars will be equipped with new, state-of-the-art devices to assist officers in per-

forming their duties, according to Police Lt. Gerald Campanella.

New Light Emitting Diode (LED) lights are being set on top of the car. The LED lights pull very little current from the car's battery, but shine very brightly. That increases the visibility for the officers as well as residents, making things safer for everyone.

The cars' decals will also be getting a makeover. The department will continue to have the traditional black and white color scheme, which has been used for more than 10 years by the department. How-

ever, the decals will be changed a bit.

"The front and back will be black, while the doors and roof will be white," Campanella said. "The striping will be all gold, which is highly reflective, and more reflective at night. It's better than the black and white striping we had. It gives the police a new look and better safety at night on the highway, with more of a contrast."

Campanella is overseeing the purchase and specific changes to the cars. To save money and maximize usage, the cars are reusing

items, including radios and prisoner partitions.

The partitions must be retrofitted, Campanella said, and there are kits available that do just that.

"The cars slightly change their interiors from year to year," he said. "By reusing we get all of the life out of items."

The existing fleet was purchased in 1993 and 1996. Cars purchased in 1999 and 2002 will be used as backups, while the 1993 and 1996 cars will be retired.

"We got seven from last year's budget, and an eighth was partly

paid for by an insurance claim on one of our patrol cars that was in an accident," he said. "We paid the remainder of the cost out of our own funds."

The first of the new cars was scheduled to be on the streets as soon as the end of February. When ready, all eight of the new cars will be put on 24-hour patrol, Campanella said.

"We have to get the new ones on the road," Campanella said. "The old ones are literally falling apart. That's what happens when you use them around the clock."

Belleville youth receives Dana Christmas heroism award

Acting Governor Richard J. Codey has announced that a Belleville youth is one of five recipients selected for the 2004 Dana Christmas Scholarship for Heroism award.

The award, administered by the higher Education Student Assistance Authority (HESAA), is a scholarship named after the Seton Hall student who, at great risk to her own safety, saved many students by alerting them to evacuate during a devastating dormitory fire. Christmas was herself the first recipient of the scholarship. Each year, the scholarship honors young people who display the heroism, selflessness and bravery exhibited by Dana Christmas.

The recipients of 2004 included Angelo J. Domenick, 12, of Belleville, who rescued his young cousin from drowning under ice last winter in the frigid waters of a lagoon near a relative's house.

Last February, Domenick was preparing to leave a relative's house when he noticed his young cousin, age four, playing near a lagoon. His cousin fell into the lagoon and became stuck under the ice. Without concern for his own safety, Domenick sprang into action. He jumped into frigid water, picked his

cousin up over his head and carried him out. Angelo suffered from pneumonia for two weeks following the incident due to the cold temperature and freezing water. Domenick's bravery was reported in local and international publications.

HESAA Executive Director Michael Angulo praised all applicants for their outstanding acts of bravery. He acknowledged the

statewide support for this program, thanking the many communities around the state for nominating so many deserving students. "The Selection Committee faced the very difficult task of having to choose finalists from a pool of many deserving and courageous applicants," Angulo said. With regard to 2004 recipients, Angulo noted, "Their acts of courage demonstrate that they are truly

heroes and leaders. They accomplished feats that others beyond their age would not have even considered. Their stories are touching and capture the spirit of the Dana Christmas Scholarship.

The statewide Dana Christmas Scholarship for Heroism honors up to five young New Jerseyans each year and provides a one-time award of up to \$10,000. To be eligible for a scholarship, recipients must be a New Jersey resident

(both at the time of the act of heroism and upon application). They must be age 21 years or younger at the time of the heroic act, a U.S. citizen or eligible non-citizen, and registered with the Selective Service (if required). Final selections are made by the executive committee of the HESAA board based on the nominations received from community and school officials and individuals from across the state.

Codey visits town for Read Across America

The Therapeutic School and Preschool of Northwest Essex Community Healthcare Network in Belleville celebrated the birthday of Dr. Seuss as part of The National Education Association Read Across America Day with its traditional "Green Eggs and Ham" breakfast. The faculty was thrilled that Acting Gov. Richard Codey was one of the readers.

The Governor selected "Oh, the Places You'll Go!" as the book he read to 15 children ages nine to 12. The Governor spoke to the children about making the right choices.

Theodor Giesel, a.k.a. Dr. Seuss, would say, "Children want the same things we want; to laugh, to be challenged to be entertained and delighted."

Gov. Codey inspired all the children with his warmth and sense of humor, according to Principal Dr.

Elizabeth Callahan.

"It was absolutely exciting," she said. "He was very warm and congenial."

The Governor spent about 35 minutes at the school, during which he visited some classrooms and read to two classes of children, Callahan said.

Callahan resides in Glen Ridge, and the school also has students from Bloomfield and Nutley.

The Therapeutic School and Preschool is a private non-profit school accredited by the New Jersey State Department of Education. The school accepts children ages three to 14 who are classified autistic, preschool disabled, multiply disabled, and behaviorally disabled.

A variety of techniques including Applied Behavioral Analysis for the autistic population and intensive play therapy for children with behavioral disorders provide

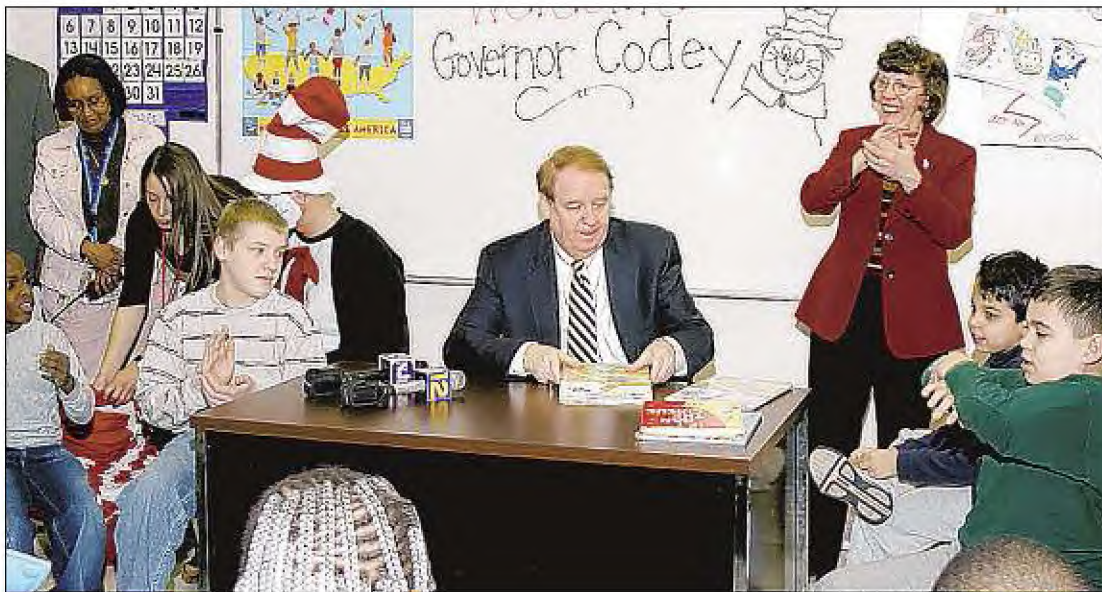

and to match graduation standards with the expectations of employers and colleges was met with skepticism by Belleville school officials, who questioned where the funding would come from and resented the interference of government in school matters.

According to a report on CNN.com, a coalition of states, including New Jersey, want to require tougher high school courses and diploma requirements. The announcement came from a summit of the nation's governors, gathered in Washington, D.C. for a summit on improving high schools, with many wanting to see quick progress.

Some school officials have hailed the intervention as necessary to raise standards, but local officials disagreed.

Belleville Superintendent of

Schools Dr. Edward Kliszus said the talk is in its early stages.

"I think that's great, but I hope they're going to fund it," he said. "That's always the key. It's going to cost more."

Kliszus said this is part of the federal No Child Left Behind (NCLB) act, and would require two more years of testing for high school students.

"We would have to buy materials and change curriculum," he said. "You can't just throw tests at children. You need summer classes and smaller class sizes."

Kliszus said the new plan would change curriculum to drive more students into college preparation courses, but there is also talk of vocational education, now called technical arts, getting a boost.

"I wonder if the pendulum is now going to swing more toward

vocational education," he said.

School Board President John McManus said, "Once again, on a personal note, not speaking for the board, my feeling is that the more government gets into education, the worse it's going to get."

He said the problem is treating all the students the same, when each is an individual.

"They keep trying to treat students like plain vanilla, where they're all going to achieve 1,600 on their SATs," McManus said. "Students are individuals. You can't just lump them all together. They're trying to put a plain vanilla slice on every child. You have to treat each individual with what they need to succeed when they leave school."

He said school officials should be making these decisions.

"The further these decisions are

made from the schools, the worse off we are," McManus said. "We need to look at how to make them more successful instead of putting on individual constraints."

Principal Joseph Petrillo decried the potential increase in red tape for the schools.

"All this bureaucracy is supposed to enhance education," he said. "I'm all for standards being raised, but we've been doing it for a lot less money than anyone else in Essex County."

He was talking about improvements in standardized test scores while Belleville spends the least per pupil in Essex County.

"(Acting Gov. Richard) Codey is talking about cutting funding, and putting more of a burden on taxpayers," Petrillo said. "No Child Left Behind is wonderful, but there is no funding."

Big changes for park thanks to grant

Big changes are on tap for Belleville Park on Belleville Avenue, with a possible \$2 million to be spent on upgrading buildings, jogging and walking trails, fencing, fountains, and the ball fields, along with building a new playground.

Freeholder Ralph Caputo said the township received a \$500,000 state grant last year, with matching funds that brought the total to \$1 million for park upgrades. The town received the same half million grant and is seeking matching funds for 2005.

Under the new Open Space Trust Fund system, a group of county conservancies get \$500,000 each in grants from the state, and then an entity is found that matches those grants. Caputo said it is different every year, one year being the Open Space Trust Fund, another year a bond issue.

Acting Gov. Richard Codey signed legislation last month dedicating more than \$18.7 millions in loans and grants for open space and park projects in Essex County, including the \$500,000 for Belleville Park.

The Essex County Parks Foundation, in conjunction with the County of Essex, proposes improvements to the existing facilities at recreational areas like Belleville Park, a 32-acre swath. Proposed improvements include the re-grading and re-paving of the jogging trail and walkways, and removal and replacement of outdated playground equipment to ensure compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act, according to Caputo.

The money will also fund the installation of new drinking fountains, and the renovation of the playground shelter, Caputo said. Fencing and the drainage infrastructure will be rehabilitated while the softball and soccer fields will be rehabilitated and irrigated, he said. Landscaping will be done as required.

The ball fields have taken a lot of abuse, Caputo said, and may get artificial turf, which is easier to care for than natural turf.

Little Leaguers use the fields, as do softball players.

"This is very significant," Caputo said. "We've not had money spent here for many years."

Caputo said the freeholders

have worked hard to get the money for the project.

"We really kick-started the project," he said. "It's subject to change, but a lot of money is being spent there."

He said he would also like to reconfigure the parking lot, since it currently doesn't have enough spaces.

But if the money doesn't go that far, so some things may have to wait.

"What we have now is a rollover grant, to take care of items we could never get to with the initial grant," he said. "The first proposal was so thick, we never got to them. The playground itself might

take the whole million."

He said the playground would be very similar to the one in Yantacaw Park on Centre Street in Nutley. That is a state of the art playground with rubber flooring and hard plastic slides and swings.

"We had some problems with the playground," Caputo said. "We had to move the site because some underground pipes were in the way."

Caputo said construction would likely begin at the end of April on the playground and an outside bathroom.

The senior citizen building at the site will have some work done to the inside to bring it up to date

with ADA and other safety codes, he said.

Seniors meet at the small clubhouse for various functions every week.

Caputo said the work is being done with attempts to improve the Branch Brook Gardens apartments across the street.

The apartments have had all kinds of problems with property maintenance, and some say drugs are sold across the street at the park.

The apartments may be up for sale.

"It has to all come together," he said.

Flat state aid has school officials seeing red

School officials decried the freeze on state aid for 2005-2006, which means Belleville will get

exactly the same \$18,752,521 as they got for 2004-2005.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Edward Kliszus said the freeze was pretty much expected and that word has been out on the street for

some time.

"As far as the impact, I don't know yet," he said. "(School Board Administrator) Mr. (Edward) Appleton is downloading information now."

Kliszus said aid stayed the same, but costs have gone up, like heating bills.

He said aid has been pretty flat for at least three years at many districts.

The freeze on state aid makes the situation worse with the new state law 1701, which will restrict the board of education as it puts together the 2005-2006 school budget, Kliszus said.

The law caps spending at 2.5

percent and makes it difficult for school boards to put aside money in surplus for use on capital improvement projects. Among other things, 1701 puts caps on surplus and affects line item transfers.

"With the avenue of relief we normally have, 1701 will make things more restrictive," he said. "We can go above the cap or reduce programs."

Planning for the new school budget has been going on for some time, but until the state aid figures are plugged into the software, Kliszus said, they don't know for sure what the effects will be.

How much of a tax increase there may be is really up to the

school board, he said.

"If it turns out they need to raise taxes, they can try cost cutting of non-mandated programs that don't affect thorough and efficient (education)," Kliszus said. "For instance, you can't eliminate the third grade. That's thorough and efficient. But you can cut clubs, sports, even kindergarten. Class size is not mandated, so you could increase that. It depends on what tax increase the school board thinks the public is willing to accept."

School Board President John McManus said the school budget committee was meeting later in the week on March 7.

"I haven't even spoken to Eddie Appleton yet," he said. "The problem is that if it's the same number, we're not talking any increase, but we're looking at going up say, three percent. There are pay raises, and costs incurred. If state aid stays the same, it's actually a reduction for Belleville."

Appleton was did not return phone calls.

The school board has to approve and send a preliminary budget to the county Superintendent of Schools by the second week of March for approval. The officials school budget vote will take place April 19.

Last year's aid included \$12,751,9458 in Core Curriculum Aid, \$611,166 in transportation aid, \$3,087,540 in special education aid.

Three singers chorus time unforgettable

For three young singers, participating in this year's prestigious North Jersey Region I Chorus was something they'll never forget.

"I tried out last year and didn't make it," said Gonzalo Valencia, one of three Belleville High School choral members who made the chorus. "It's an honor. It was one of the most memorable experiences of my life - an amazing experience."

"She has been studying dance since the age of six and has put her talents to good use by appearing in all the musicals at Belleville High School," Finetti said. "Stina is also a member of the National Honor Society and president of the Tri-M Music Honors Society."

Calungsod said she would like to attend Rutgers University to pursue a bachelor's degree in fine arts in dance and a master's in physical therapy.

Valencia has been an active member of the high school chorus since his freshman year and has been in the honors choir for the past three years. He is a member of the National Honor Society, has appeared in the high school talent shows and musicals, and will be a lead in this year's production of "Once Upon a Mattress."

Valencia's favorite subjects include music, math, science and English; his hobbies are playing various instruments, reading, and playing ping-pong.

"I owe everything I have accomplished in high school to Dr. Finetti," said Valencia. "When I first got to the high school, I knew nothing of music. Kang, who also enjoys playing guitar and singing in a rock band with Valencia and other friends, hopes to attend Seton Hall University where he would like to pursue degrees in law and religion. Like Calungsod and Valencia, Kang said he wants to keep music as an important part of his life.

When Finetti informed Kang

that he successfully passed the audition and was selected to perform with the North Jersey Region Chorus, he said he was overwhelmed with happiness and yet, apprehension.

"Practicing and performing with these great musicians was everything I thought it would be and more," Kang said. "The pieces were epic to say the least and the conductor was brilliant. All in all, this was an amazing experience for me which I will never forget."

When asked what their favorite choral work was on the program, the three unanimously chose the opening selection, "Lamentations of Jeremiah" by G. Randall Stroope. They agreed that the

music and the text had tremendous emotional impact on them and the audience.

Not only was participating in the chorus a musically rewarding experience for them but an enjoyable social one as well, they said. They had the opportunity to make new friends from various parts of northern New Jersey all sharing

musical talent and the love of music, they said.

All the students are grateful to Finetti for having confidence in their ability to try out for such a prestigious choral group, preparing them for their audition, and for giving them the opportunity to experience such a wonderful musical event.

Three singers chorus time unforgettable

For three young singers, participating in this year's prestigious North Jersey Region I Chorus was something they'll never forget.

"I tried out last year and didn't make it," said Gonzalo Valencia, one of three Belleville High School choral members who made the chorus. "It's an honor. It was one of the most memorable experiences of my life - an amazing experience."

Calungsod said she is very active in the high school music department performing groups. She is a member of the chorus and honors chorus, plays flute in the wind ensemble and marching band and is this year's drum major.

"She has been studying dance since the age of six and has put her talents to good use by appearing in all the musicals at Belleville High School," Finetti said. "Stina is also a member of the National Honor Society and president of the Tri-M Music Honors Society."

Calungsod said she would like to attend Rutgers University to pursue a bachelor's degree in fine arts in dance and a master's in physical therapy.

Valencia has been an active member of the high school chorus since his freshman year and has been in the honors choir for the past three years. He is a member of the National Honor Society, has appeared in the high school talent shows and musicals, and will be a lead in this year's production of "Once Upon a Mattress."

Valencia's favorite subjects include music, math, science and English; his hobbies are playing various instruments, reading, and playing ping-pong.

"I owe everything I have accomplished in high school to Dr. Finetti," said Valencia. "When I first got to the high school, I knew nothing of music. I might have had the talent, but I had no idea what to do with it. Dr. Finetti has single-handedly shown me how to be a good musician and even how to be a good human being."

Valencia said he hopes to pursue

a career in physics or mathematics past the graduate level. He also said he wants to keep music as an integral part of his life.

Eleventh grader Kang is an outstanding member of the honors choir, Finetti said. He is also a member of the SGO and computer club, and has been on the varsity tennis team since his freshman year. Kang, who also enjoys playing guitar and singing in a rock band with Valencia and other friends, hopes to attend Seton Hall University where he would like to pursue degrees in law and religion. Like Calungsod and Valencia, Kang said he wants to keep music as an important part of his life.

When Finetti informed Kang

that he successfully passed the audition and was selected to perform with the North Jersey Region Chorus, he said he was overwhelmed with happiness and yet, apprehension.

"Practicing and performing with these great musicians was everything I thought it would be and more," Kang said. "The pieces were epic to say the least and the conductor was brilliant. All in all, this was an amazing experience for me which I will never forget."

When asked what their favorite choral work was on the program, the three unanimously chose the opening selection, "Lamentations of Jeremiah" by G. Randall Stroope. They agreed that the

music and the text had tremendous emotional impact on them and the audience.

Not only was participating in the chorus a musically rewarding experience for them but an enjoyable social one as well, they said. They had the opportunity to make new friends from various parts of northern New Jersey all sharing

musical talent and the love of music, they said.

All the students are grateful to Finetti for having confidence in their ability to try out for such a prestigious choral group, preparing them for their audition, and for giving them the opportunity to experience such a wonderful musical event.

Breaking the barriers of discrimination

It was noonday at Sychar. The disciples went on into the village, we are told, to buy food. Someone has suggested that they were seeking out the stores that gave the clergy discount. Jesus stopped at the well on the outskirts for a brief respite from the sun's blistering rays. When a woman of the village walked up Jesus addressed her: "Woman, give me a drink."

She was taken back that Jesus spoke to her for two reasons. First, men did not publicly speak to women. Two, she was a Samaritan and Jews had no dealings with Samaritans. They considered them unclean, ritually speaking, and probably in terms of personal hygiene as well.

Thus, Jesus had crossed both a gender and a racial line by speaking to this person. She replied: How is it that you, a Jew, ask a drink of water from me, a woman of Samaria? Jesus ignores her question, ignores the racial issue, and gets to the heart of the matter. He said, "If you had know who was asking you for water you would have asked him and he would have given you living water. Jesus is, of course, speaking theologically, which is the only significant way to speak, but the woman cannot get beyond the literal. "Oh, go on," she snips. "This is a deep well and you haven't even got a bucket."

The woman appears to be poking fun at Jesus: You have nothing to draw with and this well is deep. Just how did you suppose to draw this living water of yours? Our

father Jacob drank from this well. Do you think that you are better than he is?

You can't miss the irony in her sarcasm. Here she is speaking to the Master of Life about depth, when her own life was so miserably shallow.

In a sudden change of direction, Jesus startles the woman and asks her to go get her husband. With this one question he has exposed her dark side. We all have a dark side. Of course, we already have a hint of that because she has come to the well by herself at noon.

Now the woman is in quite a predicament, Jesus has talked her into a corner. She can walk away with her earthly water or she can stay and receive lasting water. What steps must be taken for her to find the latter: First, she is honest and admits the truth about her life. Second, she is open and accepts the truth about Jesus' life. Third, she is enthusiastic and tells others about the truth she has found.

In his book, "Living Faith," former President Jimmy Carter talks about the barriers that divide people and give them a false sense of identity. Having grown up in the South during the time of racial segregation, he had many African-American friends. When his parents were away, he would stay with his black neighbors, Jack and Rachel Clark. He played with black friends, went fishing with them, plowed with mules side by side, and played on the same baseball team. But when he carried

water to people working the field, it was unthinkable that black workers and white workers would drink from the same dipper.

That is what Jesus did with the woman at the well. He accepted her. He accepted her though she was a Samaritan and an enemy to his people. He spoke to her of God through she was a woman and not thought worthy of such conversation.

He offered her his blessing – even though she debated with him and questioned his statements. He regards her as a dear sister – and gives her the same title of endearment he gave Mary when he calls her woman and asks her to believe his words concerning how the time is coming when true worshippers will worship Father in Spirit and in Truth.

And that is why she sang his praises in her village. Because of his acceptance – because of his love.

It was because in knowing her – in knowing her nationality; her gender; her religious attitudes, and the mixed history of her marriages, Jesus nonetheless treats her as if she was an equal, as if she was a person worthy of respect. Worthy of affection. Worthy of love.

And that is where it is at the well. And we sing his praises in our lives.

Clara Maass introduces innovative treatment for non-Hodgkins lymphoma

In January, Clara Maass Medical Center, an affiliate of the Saint Barnabas Health Care System became the first hospital in northern New Jersey to offer an innovative radioimmunotherapy treatment known as "Bexxar" to patients with non-Hodgkins lymphoma.

The treatment, which received United States Food and Drug Administration approval in 2003, combines the use of monoclonal antibodies and radiation to specifically target and destroy cancer cells. Bexxar has been used successfully for the treatment of patients with follicular non-Hodgkin's lymphoma – a form of cancer that affects the blood, bone marrow and lymphatic tissues – whose disease has relapsed after chemotherapy.

"Bexxar is very effective in treating a specific type of lymphoma," stated Kenneth Blank, M.D., medical director of the Radiation Oncology Department at Clara Maass Medical Center. "It has proven to be far more effective than the second and third line of traditional chemotherapy agents and offers new hope for patients with aggressive disease."

"Delivering this sophisticated treatment requires a multidisciplinary approach that combines the expertise of several specialties,

including radiation oncology, medical oncology and nuclear medicine," noted Dr. Blank.

Unlike external source radiation treatment, Bexxar employs a radioactive component bound to man-made antibody that is injected into the patient's bloodstream. The antibody seeks out the targeted cells and delivers the tumor-killing power of radiation. It is a single, short course of treatment delivered during outpatient visits over a one to two week period. Physicians and patients know

within a month if the treatment has been successful.

According to the National Cancer Institute (NCI), more than 54,000 new cases of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma will be diagnosed next year. Of those cases, 25 to 40 percent will have the follicular type that may be responsive to Bexxar.

Irish Soda Bread

4 cups all-purpose flour
1/3 cup sugar
1 tsp. baking soda
4 tps. baking powder
2 cups buttermilk
1 cup raisins
Cinnamon
2 tbsp. margarine

In a large bowl, sift or carefully mix together dry ingredients (flour, sugar, baking soda and baking powder). Add buttermilk - dough will be very stiff and hard to mix. (If you prefer, you can add a tiny bit more regular milk to make dough easier to mix.)

Add raisins and mix well.

Divide dough into two standard loaf pans; spread dough as evenly as possible. Sprinkle the tops of both loaves with a little cinnamon.

Bake for 30-40 minutes at 350 degrees until a knife inserted comes out clean. When the loaves have baked for approximately 15 minutes, spread margarine on top of each loaf and bake until done. Cool on baker's racks. Serve warm or cool.

Lemon Sponge

1/2 stick unsalted butter, softened
3/4 cup sugar
3 eggs, separated
1/3 cup lemon juice
1/3 cup flour
1 tbsp. grated lemon rind
1/4 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cups milk
Pinch cream of tartar
Sifted powdered sugar (optional)

Using an electric mixer, cream butter together with sugar in a large bowl. Beat in the egg yolks, one at a time. Mix in the lemon juice, flour, lemon rind, and salt. Combine mixture well.

Add milk in a stream, beating and combine well. Beat the egg whites with a pinch of cream of tartar until they hold stiff peaks.

Stir one fourth of the whites into the lemon mixture. Fold in remainder of whites gently and transfer the mixture to a buttered 1 1/2 quart souffle dish. Set the dish in a deep pan, adding enough boiling water to pan to reach halfway up the sides of the souffle dish. Bake dessert in a preheated 350 degree oven for 50 minutes, or until it is puffed and the top golden.

Sift powdered sugar over top and serve dessert warm or chilled (The sponge will separate, a custard sauce on the bottom.) Spoon the top onto dessert plates, and spoon sauce over each serving.

Putting Essex County First

Task force recommends school upgrades

The Belleville Community Facilities Task Force (CFT) unveiled 12 separate recommendations for upgrading public schools on March 7, plans that could cost between \$50 million and \$70 million, according to School Board Administrator Edward Appleton.

The plans, some version of which will end up in a referendum probably in December, include replacing the more than 100-year-old School 4.

The school board will examine the recommendations, come up with its own, and the two sides will come to a consensus, according to school board member Dawson Bloom, who chaired the task force committee.

The recommendations were ranked in order of importance, according to CFT members.

The CFT was made up of parents and concerned citizens, and broken up into four subcommittees.

■ The first recommendation

report states, "Renovations should not be made to School 4, and a new school should be built. Even if renovated, the life span and practical usefulness of the building are hard to determine. Return on the investment in renovations would very likely be poor, and the cost of renovation would exceed the cost of new construction, with uncertain benefits.

Rebuilding School 4 is estimated to cost between \$20 million and \$25 million.

The report calls a new school "an investment in our children, our town, and our future" that "would have long term benefits, would improve the education of the children and would have a positive impact on property value and Belleville's future growth."

■ The second recommendation is to install mechanical ventilation in Schools 3, 5, 7, 8, 9 and 10, the middle school and high school. Board member William Villano said mechanical ventilation means the movement of air, not necessarily air conditioning.

■ The third recommendation is

to construct additional classrooms in Schools 5, 7 and 10 and the high school.

■ The fourth recommendation is to install heat, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) in multi-purpose rooms at Schools 3, 5, 7, 8, and 9.

■ The sixth recommendation is to expand the high school cafeteria, in order to reduce overcrowding during lunch periods that are already reduced by half. It would also alleviate the poorly ventilated kitchen and poor storage and expand the faculty lunch room.

■ Recommendation seven is the build an additional gymnasium with locker rooms at the high school to alleviate extreme overcrowding that requires multiple classes to use the gym simultaneously and early start times for students to meet physical education requirements, as well as the lack of storage for after school sports.

A point of contention remains whether to allow flea markets on the new gym or old gym floors.

■ Recommendation eight is to add bathrooms in School 5 and the

high school.

■ The ninth recommendation is to upgrade the existing high school gymnasium, specifically the floor, ceilings, locker rooms, teachers' offices and bleachers.

■ Recommendation 10 is to repair and improve the playground at School 3, the current condition of which is a safety issue.

■ Recommendation 11 is to upgrade the fire detection system in all schools except School 10, which already has an upgraded system.

■ Recommendation 12 is for site improvements to the high school, including items such as expanding the parking lot, widening the driveway, resolution of the sewage problem and repaving.

Jeanne Lombardi, one of the subcommittee leaders, said people are wary of the tax expense, "It will help property values, and the children deserve it."

Subcommittee leader Joyce Donnelly said examining School 4 was "quite an experience. Our children deserve the best. We can do it now or later. It will cost more later."

Lisa Kistner, a subcommittee leader, said, "I'm a taxpayer myself, but this will help students achieve, and Belleville will put children first as we always like to do here."

Quad town wrestlers at the Region 4 championships came through with some outstanding performances. Overall, six wrestlers from Bloomfield, Belleville, Nutley and Glen Ridge punched their ticket to Atlantic City for this weekend's state championships at Boardwalk Hall. Here's a look at all 14 weight classes and how the local wrestlers fared.

103-Colon (28-2) advanced to the finals before losing to top seeded Bobby Dabal of North Bergen, 10-2. Bloomfield's John DelVecchio lost a heartbreaking 3-2 decision to Joey Rusin of Cliffside Park on rideout in the pre quarterfinals. Nutley's Anthony Cifelli finished fourth. He lost in the semifinals to Dabal, then gained a victory in the wrestlebacks before placing fourth overall.

112-Soprano (26-4) lost to the

eventual champion, Mike Bastante of Passaic Valley in the semifinals. He wrestled back for third, defeating Herbert Martinez of North Bergen and Danny Bonastia of Cliffside Park. Nutley's Matt McQuillen took second. He defeated Livingston's Mike Spiesbach 5-0 in the semifinals before losing to Bastante in the finals.

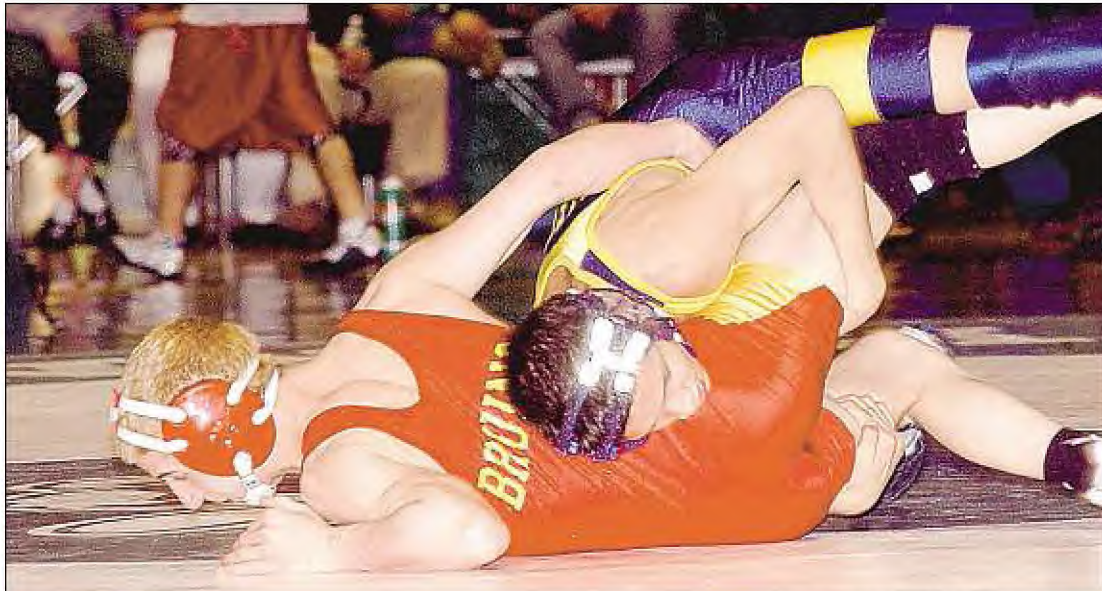
119-Paul Gerbino of Glen Ridge advanced to the final before losing to Sean O'Grady of St. Peter's Prep. Nutley's Kyle D'Amato was defeated in the pre quarterfinals.

125-Bloomfield's James Chauncy did a good job, taking fifth. 130-Angel Cuevas of Belleville lost in the prequarterfinals.

135-Robert Cozzarelli of Belleville advanced to the semifinals before losing to the eventual champion, David Greenwald of St. Mary's (Ruth.). Cozzarelli eventually took fifth. Bloomfield's Dan Arias finished fourth.

140-Belleville's Carlos Atuncar lost in the semifinals, but came back to win in the first round of wrestlebacks before dropping a decision to Livingston's Sean Robertson. Nutley's John Dinan advanced to the semifinals and eventually took fifth.

145-Glen Ridge's Sean O'Keefe finished fourth. A Region 4 champion last year, O'Keefe had a good run this season, advancing to the semifinals, then winning in the wrestleback semifinals before los-

DeFrance a junior who had a good year, was eventually eliminated in the wrestleback round.

Larry Murphy of Glen Ridge was 20-9 this year. He lost in the prequarterfinals.

171-HyeChung Gehring (17-4) of Nutley advanced to the final before losing to 4-time champion Frank Dugan of Passaic Valley.

189-Bloomfield's Said Gaida (21-10) took fourth, losing a close match for third place to Bryan Fill of Hasbrouck Heights-Wood Ridge. Nutley's Louis Ritacco (21-4) lost in the prequarterfinals. 215-Nutley's Anthony Maurillo pulled

off one of the biggest upsets in the region, defeating previously undefeated Craig Sutura of Passaic Valley 2-1 in double overtime of the semifinals. Maurillo (20-6) lost a hard fought 4-1 battle to Marquies Johnson of Hudson Catholic in the final. Belleville's Joe-Mac Dizon lost in the prequarterfinals.

275-Bloomfield's Andrew Ackerman won the championship, defeating Terry Stanford of Ridgefield Park on injury default, in the final.

DiLeo, Colon, Soprano advance down to Atlantic City

Four wrestlers with Belleville roots earned an invitation to the NJSIAA wrestling championships this weekend at Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City.

Seton Hall Prep's Angelo DiLeo won his first Region 3 championship at 171 pounds. Belleville High's Filiberto Colon and James Soprano finished second and third respectively at Region 4 and Joe Troise, who grew up in Belleville and now attends Hanover Park, earned a bronze medal at Region 3

and will make his third straight appearance at the state championships.

The final weekend of the high school wrestling season commences tomorrow night at 6 p.m. at Boardwalk Hall with prequarterfinals, quarterfinals and wrestlebacks. The tournament continues on Saturday with the semifinals and more wrestlebacks. On Sunday, the tournament concludes with consolation finals and at 2 p.m., the championship bouts begin to determine the 14 state champs for 2005.

DiLeo, who has enjoyed a phe-

nomenal career at Seton Hall, including four straight county championships, dominated the 171 pound class at Region 3 in Union. He pinned Andrew Barnish of Boonton in 1:44 to wrap up the title. DiLeo should get a high seed for the state tournament and will wrestle his first match in the second session of action, starting at 8 p.m. tomorrow.

Colon (28-2), a freshman 103 pounder, had an outstanding run at Region 4. He advanced to the final before losing a 10-2 decision to a rugged competitor in North Bergen freshman Bobby Dabal.

"He had trouble establishing position against Dabal," Belleville coach Joe Nisivoccia said. "He had a tremendous tournament and I think he'll enjoy his first experience in Atlantic City."

Soprano (26-4), also a freshman, was the top seeded wrestler at 112 pounds. He lost to the eventual champion, Passaic Valley's Mike Bastante in the semifinals, but came back to win two matches and gain third place.

"Again, a very good performance," Nisivoccia said. "For two guys to get there as freshmen is outstanding."

Troise transferred to Hanover Park as a freshman, but he grew up in the Belleville wrestling program and his father, Joe, Sr., was a stand-out athlete at Belleville in the 1970s and was later Belleville's head football coach.

Troise, a 3-time district champion, was defeated in the 152-pound semifinals but came back to take third at Region 3. Considered one of the better wrestlers in North Jersey for his weight class, don't be surprised to see Troise finish in the top eight in the state at 152 pounds.

Barnes, Lopez, Hernandez named to All-NNJIL squad

This is the type of year the Belleville girls' basketball team enjoyed in 2004-2005. Even after its season is completed, the team gained an additional win.

Belleville ended its season with a 9-15 record, which was already a monumental improvement for a program which won two games since the 2001-2002 season prior to this year. Then, last week, the team was awarded a tenth win after Immaculate Heart Academy was forced to forfeit all but two of

its wins this year because it used an ineligible player. Belleville's official record for this year now stands at 10-14 and first year head coach Dilma Hernandez was certainly pleased with the team's resurgence.

"I'm pleased with the progress, but this is just the first step," Hernandez, a former Belleville player, said. "We made the county tournament and won a first round game (against Glen Ridge). The next step is to advance further and, of course, to qualify for the state tournament."

leading the team in scoring (13 ppg) and rebounds (10 per contest). Barnes scored 300 points this year. Christina Lopez, a junior point guard, was named to the conference's second team after averaging 10 points a game, nine rebounds, five assists and three steals. Jackie Hernandez, the coach's sister, earned Honorable Mention from the conference. She averaged seven rebounds a game and scored the key points in a late season victory over Arts.

"Being Jackie's coach took time to develop," Dilma Hernandez admitted. "But as the season pro-

gressed, our relationship on that level got better. It was tough for both of us, but in the end, I think our relationships is better because of it."

Senior forward Yanira Almagro turned in a solid effort on the boards and in the key leadership role.

"Yanira provided our team with leadership and was a big part of our success," Hernandez said. "She gave her best in every practice and game. You can't ask for more than that."

Freshman guard Samantha Baker averaged seven points a

game and was the team's third leading scorer.

"She'll be a big part of future teams here," Hernandez said. "She's continuing to learn the game and I couldn't be happier with her progress."

Sophomore guard Akilah Robinson and freshman Marissa Brown were also key players off the bench.

The junior varsity team, led by Joelle DellaVolpe and freshman squad, under the direction of Jeff McMurray, also showed marked improvement. We'll have more on those teams in a future issue.

In final game, Millinder gets 1,000 points

Lucius Millinder certainly had a flare for the dramatic.

Playing in his final varsity game last Tuesday at Montclair, Belleville's senior guard needed 33 points to reach the 1,000 point mark for his career. At halftime, he had scored 10.

"He had to really open up his game in the second half," Belleville coach Duane Eason said. "And he found a way to do it. I give him a lot of credit, it's quite an accomplishment."

Millinder starting hitting his shots with consistency in the second half and also excelled at the

foul line, where he normally struggles. However, with just 1:30 left in the game, Millinder was still 11 points shy.

"The game was wide open by then, so Lucius got plenty of looks in the final 1:30," Eason said.

Millinder converted a series of jump shots, free throws and layups to close to within one point of the milestone. Then, with 25 seconds left, he took a pass from freshman guard Kaseem Harris, hit a layup and was fouled. Millinder converted the free throw to give him 1,002 points for his career.

Millinder became the seventh player in the history of the Belleville boys basketball program,

and the first in 12 years, to reach 1,000. Abdel Anderson was the first to do it in 1975. Wayne Bubet (1981), Ted Sochaski (1987), Leon Puentes (1988), Marquis Talmadge (1991) and Dennis DeWork (1993) were the others to eclipse 1,000. Sochaski is Belleville's all time leading scorer, with Anderson second.

Belleville lost the game, 64-57, but Eason was proud of his team's effort, and, of course, Millinder's accomplishment.

"The kids played hard and the younger guys were really happy for Lucius," Eason said. "Lucius had a big challenge all season, because he's the one scoring threat we had,

and he's playing with a lot of young kids. If guys like (freshmen) Kaseem Harris and Marlou Zanoia didn't step up and become solid varsity players, there's no way Lucius could have scored 1,000. And Danny Baker and Joshua Droz were also vital to our success. They all deserve credit."

NOTES: A key to reaching 1,000 was Millinder's effort from the free throw line, where he was 13 for 15.

Eason remembers well the last two Belleville players to hit 1,000. Talmadge and DeWork both reached the plateau against Hackensack when Eason was a player there.

"I remember them both doing it against us," Eason said. "It was nice to be on the other side this time."

The Belleville girls basketball program has three players in the 1,000 point club. Jennifer Apicella, of course, is the school's all time leading scorer, for boys and girls, with 3,105 points. She hit 1,000 as a sophomore in 1982. Simone Edwards (1988) and Laurie Dondarski (1989) also reached the mark. Edwards is second all time in the girls' category and Dondarski ranks third.
