With the Belleville Township Council gearing up to review the failed board of education budget, school administrators are holding their breath that summer school isn't axed from the ledger.

The school budget was defeated on April 19, and the school board and council must now agree on what to eliminate.

"This way, if a student fails, they don't have to double on classes their senior year," Kraemer said.

Summer school for the middle school is "a little shorter," he said.

"We need to raise test scores," Kraemer said. "We have fifth, sixth, and seventh grade tests next year."

Those three grades have not had standardized tests in the past, and will now as part of NCLB.

School 4 is a NCLB school in need of improvement. The funds cannot be used for any other elementary school, despite the fact that parents from other schools call regularly, Kraemer said.

Parents from other elementary schools call and ask if their children can go to summer school, but the money isn't there, he said.

"It's for math and language arts in any grade (at School 4) for kids that get letters saying they are in need," he said. "It's not a babysitting service?

The funding is \$75,000 to \$80,000 just for the high school, less for the middle school and considerably less for School 4, Kraemer said

"With the budget going down, it's quite possible that all bets are off," he said. "The council may decide the money can be utilized in other ways. But students need remediation during after school and summer."

Kraemer said the recently defeated school budget does not contain any areas to cut, and basically maintains existing programs, with the summer school one of the few new programs.

Deputy Mayor Louis Pallante is a former school board member, and for that reason he said he knows what the board tries to do.

"If the per pupil costs are within the thorough and efficient education (requirements), if it's near or below, there's not much we can do," he said.

Kraemer said the mobility of students coming and going in school has increased a great deal, increasing the need for summer school. It would be a shame if summer school were not utilized because of costs, he said.

Recent data shows that summer school works, he said.

In a Grade Eight Proficiency Evaluation (GEPA) math summer school, 40 students attended, and at least 32 of the eighth graders went on to pass math as freshmen.

"It made a difference," Kraemer said. "Success was proven. We want to keep it moving."

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

Fiber optics bring school computers to a new level

Students and school staff will be able to increase Internet speed "a minimum of 10-fold" when a new fiber optic system is installed in all public schools over the next several months, according to school board member William Villano.

The upgrade will also allow for streaming video on all computers, said Villano, who chairs the school board's technology committee. Belleville Middle School Princi-

pal Marilyn McGrath said the new computers will be "much faster. It will enhance the students' use of the computers by cutting down the waiting time for the computer to boot up. They can get more done in the time frames they have."

She said it is like her daughter, who is a teacher, and says when she is on the Internet, every second she has to wait is like 10 minutes. "It cuts down on the frustration,

and forces you to focus," McGrath said. Right now, students have to wait, but that will change with the fiber optics, she said.

A similar upgrade has been made to the Montclair Public School System. Installation of a new high-speed fiber optic network, video-conferencing with students across the globe, and partnerships with Montclair State and other universities are just some of the ways Montclair schools are taking the lead in technology teaching and learning, according to the district's website.

Fiber optics are thin glass filaments within a jacket or bundle that optically transmit images or signals in the form of light over distances, with extremely low highbandwidth quality losses, according to the definition given by a spe-

cial Internet technology dictionary. According to the New Jersey School Boards Association, fiber optics "has been fairly successful in New Jersey as many schools were being wired over the last year" and "there is a dire need for facility improvements in New Jersey public schools (including) a distribution system using fiber optic cable."

The Belleville district passed a resolution to wire all of its schools. Six of the schools will cost \$75,908 each, including Schools 3, 4, 5, 8, 9, 10 and the middle school. School 7 will cost \$78,831 and the high school will run \$177,502.

The initiation of a fiber optic communication system was approved by the BOE unanimous-

Villano said the change will be dramatic.

"Once it is done, we'll be flying in this district, as they say in computers," he said. "This has been a year and a half's worth of work by the committee."

Villano said it's still another six to eight months until every school's building, and throughout the town, including town hall, is wired. "We will be able to share files," he said. "We will own the space on the pole. I'm happy, but I'll be even happier when we get it

McGrath said "fire walls" are in place to keep students out of questionable sites."

"Nobody can get in," she said. "There is very tight security. The computer says 'error'. Plus teachers monitor the students constantly."

As for the fire walls, McGrath said, "I don't know how or what they do, but they work."

As for the money spent, Villano said it will pay for itself over the

"This is a powerful investment," he said. "We will get paid back year after year."

The payback will be students having better computer speed, which will help them learn faster,

School Board Vice President Arlene Schor echoed Villano's optimism.

'We will use fiber optics to our advantage over a long range," she







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

MUSIC HONORS HURTS STUDENTS

A parent's open letter to the Belleville BOE

TO THE BELLEVILLE BOARD OF EDUCATION:

As elected officials and school administrators are you looking out for the kids?

Since June of 2003 I have brought the following problems to the attention of the school administrators with little results.

I was told in 1999 that the music parents requested that the music students' class rank be raised. In order to do so they wanted "honors" music and choir courses added to the curriculum. The Board of Education had Mr. Kraemer do a study of other schools with honors in their music programs. I was not aware of any schools that had honors music classes but two schools were found - West Orange and Bergenfield. From that study, Belleville now has freshman, sophomore, junior and senior honors choir, band and orchestra, over 10 honors music classes. So, since 2003, Belleville, with only four honors classes in math, only four in science, four in English, three in history, none in business, none in the related arts area, and one in art, has 10 in music! All because the music parents wanted their students' class rank raised.

only two schools that we found. It offered six AP classes.

shows us all the more that we should not have music honors classes. Bergenfield only has one honors music class, "Music Theory 4" which would indicate to me that the student needs three years of music theory required to take the class. West Orange also has no choir honors classes which makes Belleville the only school in the State of New Jersey that we can find that has honors choir. Honors choir is not just a fourth year course but is offered every year in Belleville, which means the student, could take it again and again. Does anyone see anything wrong yet? We have not raised the bar, we just raised their class rank. West Orange offers honors to outstanding juniors and seniors in instrumental. Belleville offers it all

In addition, West Orange honors classes only offer a raise of one letter grade for their honors classes but Belleville offers two letter grades (20 points) for honors classes. Belleville seems to have taken this to the extreme.

In 2003, Bergenfield offered the one honors class in music, but also offered a balance of 12 AP classes in other areas. West Orange offers the two honors classes and they Now let's look at the data of the offer 16 AP classes, Belleville only

Even if Belleville had 20 AP contact me in writing by March 4, classes it would not matter. No school in the State of New Jersey, that I could find, has this kind of music offering or thinks choir is honors worthy. Mr. Kraemer said that these classes were for the music majors. I cannot believe that Belleville has that many music majors.

Your resources should be built around your core course and then move out to your electives.

I would like to know how many students you had in honors music courses and the grade distributions of the classes over the past five years. I have heard their grading referred to as an "easy A."

You need to stop this practice. Stop calling those music classes honors and remove the extra points you gave those students for the last three years so that you do not affect the class rank of the seniors and any other students.

Class rank and grade point average is a key measuring tool that is used by higher educational institutions for students going on for further schooling, and by raising up one group, you lower the

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Famed Belleville-bred columnist dies

Longtime New York Daily News TV columnist and former-Belleville resident Kay Gardella, known for her candid reviews and her love of the golden age of entertainment, died last week at Cabrini Medical Center in Manhattan of lung cancer.

Gardella was a Saturday columnist who reviewed movies, series and specials that aired on the weekends for almost 60 years, which made her an icon in her

"Every television critic in the business today owes something to her," said Richard Huff, her editor at the New York Daily News for along in a time when television was in its infancy, and there were very few people actually writing about television the way she did?

Gardella was born in Belleville on Feb. 23, 1923. She lived on Washington Avenue with her parents Genevieve and Charles Gardella, and her brother John.

Even as a child, she knew she wanted to be a journalist. When she played with her cousin, Dorothy, she liked to play reporter and ask questions.

"That was her passion and her hobby; she did enjoy (journalism) immensely," said her niece Judy Brennan of Lake Hiawatha.

Gardella wrote columns for the paper up to the very end. Her last review appeared on March 19 regarding the USA Network film premiere "Cool Money," where she wrote, "if you've seen one hotel robbery, you've seen them all."

Gardella graduated in 1944 from Upsala College in East Orange, a private liberal arts college that was affiliated with the Lutheran Church of America before it became inactive in 1995.

working for the Daily News as a copygirl. She worked on a myriad of topics, from murders to feature stories. She later moved to covering the Gardella still undeveloped



television business, when there were only three channels. She was promoted to radio and television critic in 1975, became a TV critic in 1981 and then a columnist in 1993, at which time she left the office and started working from home. She lived across the street from the old office location on 42nd Street and Second Avenue.

"She was having trouble with the last four years. "She came her knees and she used a cane," said Brennan.

But she would still pop into the Daily News office once in a while, even when it moved to the west side of midtown.

While at the office, Gardella

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always came to work dressed up, wearing heels, makeup and nicely coiffed hair. She was a hard worker, who spent countless hours at her typewriter and went after a story until she got it.

She is remembered for her oldschool ways and reminiscing about such legends as Frank Sinatra, Fred Astaire and Lucille Ball.

Among the number of celebrities that she interviewed and became good friends with were Jackie Gleason and Dolores and

"She and Dolores kept in touch right up to when Bob died," said Brennan.

Brennan remembered being excited as a child, knowing that her aunt was interviewing Sonny and Cher or Sal Mineo who were big stars of the 1970s.

While Gardella was known for challenging editorial decisions as passionately as she would review TV shows, her editor remembered her as a dedicated professional

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who would lay out her case and fight for her work.

"She had an uncanny ability to be able to look at a television project and accept it for what it was worth," said Huff. "She didn't take a TV cable movie on a network and look at it as anything else. She didn't compare it to War and Peace. She compared for the quality of the work and the entertainment value of that project."

While a columnist for Daily News, Gardella also wrote reviews for the magazine, Entertainment.

Longtime Daily News sports cartoonist Bill Gallo, who was

Gardella's friend and colleague of 40 years called her "a peach" and a professional "of star quality" whom he will miss.

"I would always call her a 'great dame,' and she liked the label," said Gallo. "She was a throwback of all the former newspaper gals who competed with males and who mostly won."

Gardella will also be remembered as caring and helpful. Her nephew Charles Gardella of North Arlington, a sports tabulator at Daily News remembered his aunt's

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

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Branch Brook turnaround continues in park

Now that the troubled Branch Brook Gardens Apartments is under new management, county officials are moving ahead with plans to construct a new playground across the street at Belleville Park.

County Executive Joseph DiVincenzo announced the coming improvements at a press conference at the park on Thursday of last week.

The playground will be inside the park adjacent to a parking area off of Belleville Avenue. The entire area will be enclosed with fencing.

The plans call for a modern playground called "The Butterfly," which will include an area for two to five-year-olds and an area for five to 12-year-olds.

The park's name comes from a butterfly theme used throughout its design, with both the playing surface and seating area shaped in the form of the colorful insect. There will also be a garden to attract real butterflies to the area.

A 700-square-foot restroom facility will be built, and renovations will be done to the parking lot and the handicapped parking area, as well as the senior citizen building on site. Other improvements will include drainage improvements, repaving pathways, constructing new ones and installing park benches, trash receptacles, decorative lights, a drinking fountain and landscaping.

The Belleville Park playground is part of DiVincenzo's initiative to provide modern and safe playground facilities throughout the county park system. There used to be a playground in the western corner of Belleville Park between Belleville Avenue and Parkside Drive, which residents asked the county to remove in the mid-1980s. But during the county executive's tours, residents said that the demographics of the neighborhood had changed and now a playground was favored. Since the new playground will be located deeper inside the park, nearby residents

Belleville Foundation ready to benefit BHS seniors

The Belleville Foundation will have averaged \$24,000 award \$28,000 in scholarships and student loans to Belleville High School seniors who will be furthering their education. This is the largest one-year commitment to student education made by the trustees of the Foundation. Distributions over the past five years

The foundation's policy in recent years has been to award one new scholarship, based on a student's academic accomplishment plus participation in extracurricular activity. The first year award is then continued for three additional years contingent on the student's

successful academic performance. For 2005, \$2,000 has been designated for one new scholarship and \$6,000 for the past recipients. Twenty thousand dollars will be distributed in no interest student loans. A repayment schedule begins when the student's course work is complete.

Concern for the future direction of Belleville in the years following World War II led three corporate executives to establish the foundation in 1942. Fueled by their own \$15,000 in corporate gifts, Walter Kidde, president of the company that bore his name, Martin Tiernan of Wallace and Tiernan, and Harry G. Specht, president of Eastwood

Neally then enlisted the support of other local businessmen, service clubs and community leaders. To put the generosity of that \$15,000 in perspective, a new one family home could be purchased for under \$5,000 at that time.

The founders next hosted a luncheon to which they invited area physicians. Their aim was to discuss the possibility of bringing a hospital to the town. Nothing in the records indicates the outcome of that meeting. In fact, very little is recorded about activities for the next 20 years except that the foundation was making grants for education, religious and social welfare causes, and its trustees and mem-

bers probably played an active role in bringing Clara Maass Hospital to Belleville. Grants in 1963 totaled \$26,000. Of this \$15,000 was spilt equally among the high school rowing teams of Belleville, Nutley, and Kearny as matching gift toward construction of a boathouse on the Passaic River.

Grants from 1964 to 1974 totaled \$296,500 with Clara Maass Hospital receiving \$270,000 of that. Additional grant recipients were the Cerebral Palsy Center, Little Zion Church, YM-YMCA of Newark, the high school music fund, Belleville Dental Clinic and

In 1974, foundation trustees adopted new by-laws to change the focus to scholarships and student loans for Belleville High School students. The foundation, then, joined a number of civic groups in presenting scholarships and loans to deserving young people each

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


