1 Thess 5:11 And so encourage one another and help one another, just as you are already doing.

Robert Schuller tells a story about a banker who always tossed a coin into the cup of a legless beggar who sat on the street outside the bank. But, unlike most people, the banker would always insist on getting one of the pencils the man had beside him. "You are a merchant," the banker would say, "and I always expect to receive good value from merchants I do business with."

One day the legless man was not on the sidewalk. Time passed and the banker forgot about him, until he walked into a public building and there in the concession stands sat the former beggar. He was obviously the owner of his own small business now. "I have always hoped you might come by someday," the man said. "You are largely responsible for me being here. You kept telling me that I was a 'merchant'. I started thinking of myself that way, instead of a beggar receiving gifts. I started selling pencils – lots of them. You gave me selfrespect...caused me to look at myself differently."

Hebrews 10:24 And let us think of ways to encourage one another to outbursts of love and good deeds.

People seldom think of encouragement as a gift because it

seems so ordinary. But it isn't. Encouragement is actually quite rare, because it is seldom given. Encouragement is so valuable because it is so meaningful to the recipient. Encouragement makes the perfect gift because: It is free. It requires no shopping. It doesn't have to be gift-wrapped. It can be custom-designed. It doesn't need batteries. It will last a lifetime.

A little word can make a big difference, and the results can be life changing.

Dr. Henry Goddard developed an "ergograph" which measures energy levels and he has studied the effects of criticism and encouragement. Students ran on a treadmill.

As they became tired their energy level would gradually drop. However, if researchers said to the student, "You're doing great! Keep up the good work! I'm proud of you!" Suddenly, the student's energy would shoot up. On the other hand, if they criticized saying, "You're lazy. Quit dragging your feet! What's wrong with you?", the energy level would drop dramatically.

Oh there is one more thing about encouragement. No one ever gets too much of it. So don't be stingy. Give it often! Become a life giver, not a life drainer.

## Spilsbury elected to Iona College Hall of Fame

The nice thing about writing for this newspaper since 1975 is I've seen a lot of good athletes wear the Blue and Gold of Belleville High School, along with those Bellevillebred athletes who competed for private schools.

I received a letter from Geoffrey Spilsbury the other day, informing me his son, Jeff, will be inducted into the Iona College Hall of Fame on June 6.

And when I heard the name Jeff Spilsbury, the memories came back quickly. From 1985-1988, Spilsbury played football and baseball for Belleville. He was the starting quarterback in 1986 and '87 and was a durable, tough player who threw a good ball and wouldn't hesitate to run with it, too. He was barely 5'9" tall but more than stood out on the gridiron.

I'll never forget a game early in the 1986 season. The Bucs had started the season 0-2, having lost to Paramus and Ridgewood, and were hosting Montclair on a Friday night. The Star-Ledger, in its weekly predictions, picked Montclair to win. 27-0.

As the Bucs came out for warmups, you could hear players like Nutley, 27-16.

was, baseball was his number one sport. He had a stellar career for the Bucs, leading the 1987 team to the NNJIL championship and earning All-County honors two straight years.

After being graduated from Belleville, Spilsbury went on to Iona and put up some great numbers. Jeff hit .362 for his career at Iona with 201 hits, 149 runs scored, 37 doubles, seven triples, 15 homers and 111 RBI. He also stole 29 bases and walked 106 times. In his junior year, 1991, Spilsbury hit .422 in the leadoff role, the 17th highest average among NCAA, Division I players that year. The following season, hitting third in the lineup, he batted .377 and drove in 46 runs as Iona won the MAAC title and was runner-up to Delaware in the ECAC

Spilsbury also played in a collegiate game at Yankee Stadium and hit a homer.

The Iona Hall of Fame has inducted some legendary sports figures, including the late Jim Valvano, whose coaching career took off at Iona, basketball greats Jeff





## Belleville in vicinity of lethal terror target

Local residents are in harms way, according to officials.

With a chlorine factory just across the Passaic River in Kearny, Nutley and Belleville are vulnerable to a terrorist attack or a disastrous accident, according to Nutley Deputy Fire Chief Frederick Scalera, who also oversees the county HAZMAT and local Office of Emergency Management.

If gas was released from the factory it could prove deadly. Chlorine gas was used as an early though very effective chemical weapon in World War I. According to the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, it is corrosive to the skin and respiratory tract, and would cause death in a high enough concentration.

a fire at the chlorine factory that affected Nutley and Belleville," said Jersey chemical facilities from ter-Scalera. "On the Essex County side, we had to tell people playing in parks to go home and stay inside."

Nutley was one of the responders to the fire.

More recently there was a threat to the plant reported to first responders.

Scalera said he couldn't give the 'what's and where's" about what happened for security reasons.

"As a result of that, protective measures were put in place," he said. The initial threat has since proved to be not credible.

The situation is just a glimpse of the risk residents of northern New Jersey wake up to every day.

Sen. Jon S. Corzine, joined by New York Sen. Charles Schumer, has written a letter to the secretary "Going back 10 years, there was of Homeland Security calling for

rorist attack.

The two Democrats' letter comes in the wake of a published articl e in the New York Times May 9 that detailed security vulnerabilities at a number of sites between Newark Liberty International Airport and Port Elizabeth, which extends two miles to the east. The beefed up security would be funded federally and not set as a financial burden on the sites in question.

A congressional study in 2000 by a former Coast Guard commander deemed it the nation's most enticing environment for terrorists, providing a convenient way to cripple the economy by disrupting major portions of the country's rail lines, oil refineries, pipelines, air traffic, communications networks and highway system.

According to the article, the chlorine plant in Kearny threatens 12 million people who live within a 14-mile radius and is the most dangerous of all the potential targets.

On a recent Friday afternoon, the Times reported that it remained loosely guarded and car carrying a reporter and pho-tographer drove back and forth for five minutes, snapping photos with a camera the size of a large sidearm, then drove off without being approached.

Because Kearny is in Hudson County, officials there are responsible for protecting the plants, Scalera said.

The New York Times article quoted a Kearny police officer who said that he's supposed to pass by the plant five times every shift, but the department is not equipped to protect the place.

"There is County Working Group, or CWG money that each county gets," Scalera said. "We are using it for plant safety, safety at railroad sites, industrial sites, and hopefully Hudson County is doing the same. We don't have a lot of control over it."

The two senators' letter urges Secretary Michael Chertoff to support legislation to "grant the Department of Homeland Security authority to issue regulations and enforce standards for security at chemical facilities. He said there is \$1.5 million that goes toward ensuring safety in Essex County. Some areas of focus include the terminal at Port Newark, rail security, and the interconnection of water pipelines.

Locally, the 1690 AM radio system now in place in Nutley, where residents can turn for information about emergent situations, will soon be expanded using 2005 federal money. Other towns in Essex County will soon have message boards in the center of town telling people where to tune in on their radio in emergency situations.

"If we can't tell residents what's going on in an emergency, it's a whole different (worse) situation," Scalera said.

A mass decontamination truck will be stationed in Nutley to serve the county HAZMAT unit, Scalera said. A county boat for Belleville to use in evacuations along the Passaic River is also coming.

Plans are coming to fruition locally, even if efforts regularly hit a snag on the national level.

Previous attempts to pass legislation mandating tougher security have been blocked by politicians outside the most dangerous places, like New Jersey and New York, according to Corzine and Schumer. The senators are calling for a review of how the department distributes homeland security federal funds.

The New York Times article stated that after distributing tens of billions of dollars to state and local governments, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security this year cut New Jersey's financing to about \$60 million from \$99 million. Many security experts have complained that the formula, which provides Montana with three times as much money per person as it does New Jersey, is guided more by politics than by the likelihood of an attack.

Security at the Newark Airport, while more rigorous and time-consuming for passengers, has been marred by embarrassing breakdowns, as screeners have repeatedly failed to prevent government officials from sneaking weapons and fake bombs onto planes. The time and expense of screening shipping containers has slowed attempts to tighten security at Port Newark and Port Elizabeth, where customs officials say their radiation screening devices are ineffective and need replacement.

In a separate statement, Corzine said he is seeking support on the issues from all sides.

"I am working closely with Senators Susan Collins and Joseph Lieberman, the chairman and ranking member of the Senate's Committee on Homeland Security and Government Affairs, to craft a bipartisan bill |that enacts higher standards but does not undermine the industry's economic viability," he said.





Between January and March of this year, six of them took and passed it. School #5 actually had one teacher aide who did not have to take the exam as she met the exempt criteria of having had completed at least two years of post secondary schooling.

Instrumental in assisting other paraprofessionals throughout our district with gathering information Services Director Patricia Farina, Pat Vogel, president of the Belleville Aides & Drivers Association, and long-time active parent Lisa Kistner, a current BHS paraprofessional herself, who also serves as vice president of the Belleville Aides & Drivers Association as well as president of our Middle School and Consolidated Home & School Associations. In fact, another group of about 15 to 20 of our paraprofessionals, including Mrs. Kistner, just successfully completed the exam in April. The final group, about another 15 to 20, is scheduled to take the exam on Saturday, June 11.

Once again, they have pursued this on their own time, and, at their own expense. Special thanks to Mrs. Farina, Mr. Villano, Mrs. Nash, Mrs. Vogel, and Mrs. Kistner. As Mr. Villano likes to say, principals ride shotgun while the teachers and staff drive the schools. The distinct truth of Dennis Vil-

It's a lesson worth learning firsthand.

School Boards Association, the School Ethics Act defines proper conduct for school officials and creates mechanisms to monitor their conduct. The act sets forth standards for the following: conflicts of interest; code of ethics for school board members; disclosure of employment and financial interests; financial disclosure state-ments and new school board member training requirements.

The School Ethics Act also created the School Ethics Commission, which reviews, investigates and renders decisions on complaints against school officials alleging violations of the School Ethics Act. If the commission finds a violation, it is authorized to recommend to the commissioner of education that the school official receive a reprimand, censure, suspension or removal from office.

Former Belleville School Board President Alfonse DeMeo violated a state School Ethics Commission statute when he endorsed a candidate for the township council, according to official court documents.

The violation occurred in the months before the November 2003 elections, when DeMeo endorsed At-Large Council Candidate Kevin Kennedy through a mailing where the envelopes and letterhead bore his official title as president of the Belleville Board of Education.

DeMeo was found guilty by the

commission of violating one of two

points of the School Ethics Act. School Board Attorney Frank Pomaco gave his yearly update on the school ethics law at the May 23 school board meeting.

He said school board members must hold the respect of the public and avoid prohibited acts that mainly include a board member, friend or family member profiting from a business working with the board of education, or receive privileges through association. Board members cannot have direct or indirect involvement in any activity that impairs their judgement or prejudices their conduct on the board, Pomaco said.

The commission also issues advisory opinions to school officials seeking guidance on their conduct. The office oversees the process for the filing of financial and personal disclosure statements by all school officials. In addition, it enforces the statutory requirement that all new school board members attend new board member orientation within the first year of their first term on the board.

Antoinette "Toni" Marone, the newest school board member, is looking forward to school ethics training.

"I think it is a great idea," she said. "I'd like to know a little more. I have a copy of the ethics law, but maybe they can inject a little bit more. It's important. I don't want to get in trouble."

Though her last comment was said with a laugh, the School Ethics Act is deadly serious.

It declares that school officials must avoid conduct which is in violation of their public trust or which creates a justifiable impression that the public trust is being violated.

New board members like Marone must attend an all day conference on ethics, while each school board member must sign an ethics pledge each year.





### RECIPE

Sweet 'n Sour Chicken 3 whole chicken breasts, deboned and skinned

BATTER: 1 cup flour 2 eggs

2 tbsp. vegetable oil 1 tbsp. baking powder 1/2 tsp. salt 3/4 cup water 3 tbsp. cornstarch 2 sugar

#### SAUCE:

- 1 (16 oz.) can tomato sauce
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 3 tbsp. vinegar 2 tbsp. soy sauce
- 2 cups water
- 3 tbsp. cornstarch
- 1 onion, cut in eighths
- 1 large green pepper, diced
- 1 cup pineapple chunks, drained 2 carrots, sliced on diagonal
- 2 ribs celery, sliced

Cut chicken into 1-inch cubes.

Batter - in a large bowl, whisk together flour, eggs, oil, baking powder, salt, sugar, water and cornstarch until smooth. Add chicken pieces and toss until well coated. Set aside.

Sauce - in a large saucepan, mix together tomato sauce, sugar, vinegar and soy sauce. Bring to a boil, then add mixture of 1 cup water with 3 tablespoons cornstarch. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick. Add onion, green pepper, pineapple chunks, carrot rings and celery. Simmer for 30 minutes.

Just before serving, heat 3 inches vegetable oil in a large skillet or deep fryer to 360 degrees. Drop pieces of batter-coated chicken into hot oil and fry until golden brown, turning halfway through cooking. Remove from oil. Drain on paper towels and keep warm until all meat has been cooked. Place chicken on large platter and pour sauce over. St. Paul's Cookbook

## Cook it, serve it, eat it

Food, says Webster's Collegiate Dictionary, is "material consisting essentially of protein, carbohydrate and fat used in the body of an organism to sustain growth, repair and vital processes and to furnish energy." It also defines food for

thought, food chain, food court, foodie (a person having an avid interest in the latest food fads), food poisoning, food processor, food pyramid, food stamp and others.

But it's so much more. It's one of the finest excuses to get people together. If you feed them, they will come (a takeoff on "If you build it they will come") but we're not talking baseball here.

There's a whole cable network devoted to food. One I watch is "30 Minute Meals" although I get thoroughly annoyed when the hostess dumps either hot sauce or red pepper flakes into virtually every dish. I don't know what she'd do if they banned garlic, one of her other favorites, or took the zest out of zesting. We have friends in England

who, for years, came over to the states to see, among other things, the Christmas show at Radio City Music Hall. And they (and whomever else they had persuaded to come with them) always came for Sunday dinner in Nutley.

I learned early on that the guest list could expand at a moment's notice (and usually did) so I always tried to plan an expandable meal. Oven Beef Stew was one of my favorite recipes. Guests usually liked it, my children thought it was close to the pits. And not one to do things in halves, I started out with a big roasting pan and six



pounds of meat, several carrots and onions and ribs of celery. And whatever other vegetables struck my fancy that day, always adding a box of frozen peas at the end. Topped this merry mixture with a large can of V8 juice mixed with a scant half cup of Minute Tapioca, gave it all a merry stir, covered the pan with aluminum foil and shoved it in the oven, at 350 degrees for about three hours or at 225 degrees overnight if I was heading to bed. The longer it cooked, the better it was. Add a dish of rice, salad, bread and dessert and you were home free.

And if I had fed them the stew the year before (they had long memories), I unearthed my other favorite - chicken.

Same roasting pan, chicken cutlets topped by Swiss cheese and Stove Top stuffing (prepared) and doused in a mixture of melted butter and white wine. In the oven until the chicken was cooked through and offered with cranberry sauce, a vegetable, salad, bread and dessert.

Third time around, I resorted to baked ham and frozen macaroni and cheese.

We've been serving the same dinner (Texas Roast) at church for years now, sticking to the old adage "If it ain't broke, don't fix it," or put another way, "If you sell out every year, don't mess with the menu." We don't.



# Give a priceless gift

1 Thess 5:11 And so encourage one another and help one another er, just as you are already doing.

Robert Schuller tells a story about a banker who always tossed a coin into the cup of a legless beggar who sat on the street outside the bank. But, unlike most people, the banker would always insist on getting one of the pencils the man had beside him. "You are a merchant," the banker would say, "and I always expect to receive good value from merchants I do business with."

One day the legless man was not on the sidewalk. Time passed and the banker forgot about him, until he walked into a public building and there in the concession stands sat the former beggar. He was obviously the owner of his own small business now. "I have always hoped you might come by someday," the man said. "You are largely responsible for me being here. You kept telling me that I was a 'merchant'. I started thinking of myself that way, instead of a beggar receiving gifts. I started selling pencils – lots of them. You gave me selfrespect...caused me to look at myself differently."

Hebrews 10:24 And let us think of ways to encourage one another to outbursts of love and good deeds.

People seldom think of encouragement as a gift because it

seems so ordinary. But it isn't. Encouragement is actually quite rare, because it is seldom given. Encouragement is so valuable because it is so meaningful to the recipient. Encouragement makes the perfect gift because: It is free. It requires no shopping. It doesn't have to be gift-wrapped. It can be custom-designed. It doesn't need batteries. It will last a lifetime.

A little word can make a big difference, and the results can be life changing.

Dr. Henry Goddard developed an "ergograph" which measures energy levels and he has studied the effects of criticism and encouragement. Students ran on a treadmill.

As they became tired their energy level would gradually drop. However, if researchers said to the student, "You're doing great! Keep up the good work! I'm proud of you!" Suddenly, the student's energy would shoot up. On the other hand, if they criticized saying, "You're lazy. Quit dragging your feet! What's wrong with you?", the energy level would drop dramatically.

Oh there is one more thing about encouragement. No one ever gets too much of it. So don't be stingy. Give it often! Become a life giver, not a life drainer.


