

New system connects the police/public

The Belleville Police Department in conjunction with the Belleville Community Policing Unit is pleased to announce a new computer program identified as Trak II. This new technology bridges law enforcement with the private sector by enabling the Belleville Police Department to send an alert bulletin to all residents, and businesses within the township of Belleville within minutes of the critical incident. Trak II is also capable of sending photographs of potential suspects and/or missing juveniles. An additional aspect of Trak II is that it is also connected to the NJ State Police Amber Alert Program.

Trak II distributes bulletins simultaneously to e-mail addresses, fax machines and other Trak II systems.





Schools set for summer projects

As students packed up their pens and pencils, finished with another academic year, contractors and school maintenance workers were unloading their tools for some large summer pro-

jects. Aside from finishing an approximate \$750,000 project to replace the high school roof, workers are also relocating the school's television studio. Recently, all new state of the art equipment was purchased for the studio. The equipment is much too large for the existing space, next to the library on the school's first floor, Board of President Education John McManus said.

"They're moving it from the first floor to the second floor," he said. "They will use two small rooms that will double the size of the studio?

Hi-tech mass communications supplies are being installed in the studios after voters approved a \$47,900 funding question in 2004.

The supplies provide the latest technology to the high school television station, which board members say is woefully out of date. The items include racks, a sound mixer, audio cassette decks, editing decks, recorders and monitors, basically the standard equipment for an effective studio.

McManus said the board has to look at how to employ the technology as opposed to what the district used to do and how it's going

to change.

The new technology is so different, the use of it must therefore be different, compared to how the older, obsolete technology was used, he said.

McManus said the board needs to improve the quality of programs with new and better graphics and digital picture quality and how the new system will link up with up with the old existing systems.

The supplies were delayed because the technology kept changing and modernizing, so they kept needing to change the order, which officials say will now be the right, up-to-date technolo-

School Board Administrator Edward Appleton said the vendor is Troxell Communication of

Gibbsboro, which will be paid approximately \$51,000.

At the Belleville Middle School, every room in the entire school will be repainted before classes resume in the fall, McManus said.

Beyond that, there are many safety improvements of all different kinds to be made to each and every school, he said. The projects are small repairs. For example, sidewalks are being repaired at many schools, McManus said.

Elsewhere, nothing major is set for School 4, since officials say they are awaiting the results of an upcoming referendum that could total as much as \$70 million and would rebuild the school and include major renovations to other schools.

High school roof project finishing cheaper, but much later

The good news is that the replacement of the Belleville High School roof is costing less than anticipated. The bad news is it's a year behind schedule. Sixty to 70 percent of the high

school roof is being replaced to fix leaks that could spread water damage to the building's interior. According to Board of Education President John McManus, the roof hasn't been redone in 25 to 30 years.

"We originally thought it would cost between \$900,000 and \$1 million," said McManus. "The contractor came in at considerably less, and we were thrilled."

The costs now will be in the \$650,000 to \$750,000 range.

"We originally looked at the architect's projections, which the state (Department of Education) marks up on the district's five-year plan," he said. "They cleared the plan and final specs (specifications) came in much lower in price.

The work was funded out of the board's capital construction budget. That budget is set aside each year to fund improvements that need to be done right away.

Unfortunately, the project was to be finished in the summer of 2004, but work will instead wrap up this summer.

"They're still finishing it up," McManus said. "They're close to being finished. I didn't imagine it would take this long, but I understand they're doing a good job."

The leaks started two years ago, but officials said that it was water from a groundswell, McManus said.

Over the winter of 2004, the leaks got really bad, and officials found out it was emanating from the roof, he said.

Things were held up for a year while the architectural and engineering specifications were being finished.

Previously, there was an original roof of built-up tar with a rubber over layer, according to Edward Appleton, school business administrator.

The new roof features a membrane rubber which is more like a rubber treated roof. He likened it to a boot that doesn't allow water to penetrate.

None of the other schools have such a serious problem with a roof. School 5's roof was replaced just two years ago, and portions of School 9's roof were just repaired, McManus said. That doesn't mean major renovations are not in the future, however.

A referendum that could total as much as \$70 million is set for a vote as early as this fall, and would rebuild School 4 and include major renovations for the other schools.







Cuzzi center stage at stadium

Few rivalries in Major League Baseball match the intensity of the six games played between the Yankees and Mets, and last weekend was no exception.

Belleville native Phil Cuzzi, who is in his seventh season as a Major League umpire, worked his first Yankees-Mets series at Yankee Stadium last weekend and was the plate umpire in Friday night's game, won by Pedro Martinez and the Mets, 6-4.

Cuzzi, a 1973 graduate of Belleville High who today resides in Nutley with his wife Gilda, has had an impressive major league career after toiling for nearly 15 years as an umpire in the minor leagues. He was officially named a full time umpire in the big leagues in the summer of 1999 and has been good enough to be assigned to the playoffs the past two years. In 2003, he worked in both National League Divisional rounds, including the decisive game between Florida and San Francisco, won by Florida in four games and a day later, the deciding fifth game in the Chicago-Atlanta series, won by Chicago.

Last fall, Cuzzi worked all five games of the Atlanta-Houston divisional round, won by Houston.

This year, Cuzzi is once again a member of crew chief Jerry Crawford's crew. When Cuzzi was promoted in 1999, Crawford was his crew chief. After working with Tim McClelland's crew in 2000 and with Bruce Froemming in 2001, Cuzzi was assigned to Crawford's crew again in 2002 and the two have worked together uninterrupted since.

"I enjoy working with Jerry," Cuzzi said. "I've learned a lot from him, as I have from Tim and Bruce. Umpiring is a tight fraternity, and every crew has its own dynamics. I've been fortunate enough, every year, to be working with some good guys."

Crawford's umpiring background is extensive. He has over 20 years of major league experience and has worked three World Series, most recently in 2002. He was also assigned the 2000 Series between the Yankees and Mets.

In addition to Crawford, Cuzzi's crewmates this year include C.B. Bucknor and veteran umpire Ed Rapuano. Cuzzi and Rapuano have been friends for nearly 20 years. The two worked together on McClelland's crew late in the 2000 season and are reunited this year for an entire season. Rapuano has worked two World Series, including the legendary 2001 matchup between the Yankees and Arizona Diamondbacks, played just six weeks after Sept. 11. Rapuano was also an umpire in the 2003 World Series between the Yankees and Florida Marlins and has been assigned multiple league championship series.



Bucknor was recently selected to this year's All Star game, a big honor for any umpire and, like a playoff assignment, symbolic of outstanding work in regular season games.

As for last weekend's Subway Series at Yankee Stadium, Cuzzi took it all in stride.

"When I was a kid, obviously I loved baseball," Cuzzi said. "But now that I'm an umpire, it's my job and I really don't look much into who's playing, and where the game is. Obviously, being home for a few days is great, and I get to see my family and friends. But when it comes to the game, it's business. I was on the plate for Friday's game, and that was exciting because of the electricity the game provides, but once it starts, it's another game."

Cuzzi's schedule is indeed hectic. After last weekend's series, he boarded a flight to Tampa for a series between the Devil Rays and Toronto. After three days in Tampa, it's off to Kansas City this weekend for the Royals and Los Angeles Angels. He'll get a week off, plus a few days for the All-Star break, before hitting the road again on July 14, starting in Oakland.

"It gets hectic, but I enjoy it," Cuzzi said.

As for his successful life, he wouldn't change anything.

"We have a really good crew, no doubt about it," Cuzzi said. "I have a great job, working with some tremendous umpires who really know the game. What else can I ask for?"




Twenty years ago, the Belleville girls crew team completed a monumental run by winning its third national title in four years. Five

Sex abuse suspect takes plea bargain

A Nutley resident who was arrested for sexually abusing young boys in both Belleville and Nutley agreed to a plea bargain that prosecutors say saves those children from having to testify in open court. "The well-being of the children

Child sexual abuse charges were brought against former assistant scoutmaster Kevin Hildreth of Nutley, with many of the charges involving a Belleville church.

has already pleaded guilty to similar charges in federal court, admitting to fondling or raping the five children, all under age 13, over several years in Belleville and Nutley.

He pleaded guilty before Superior Court Judge Paul Vichness to two counts of second degree sexual assault, two counts of second degree endangering the welfare of a child and one count of first degree endangering a child. The assaults took place between 1989 and 2004.

In exchange for his guilty plea, Freier said she recommended that Hildreth be sentenced to no more than 15 years in prison for the Belleville charges, with no parole Hildreth, 35, pleaded guilty to eligibility for seven and a half assaults on five of the victims. He years. The Nutley charges and fed-

eral charges would also run concurrently.

A new law in New Jersey means Hildreth will be subject to the Sexually Violent Predator Act. which means he will be eligible for civil commitment in a state facility following his criminal incarceration, Freier said.

Freier described Hildreth as a slightly built man who wore eyeglasses and had stringy hair.

He was already in Passaic County Jail on federal child pornography charges. The state charges culminated an extensive investigation jointly conducted over the past several months by the Essex County Prosecutor's Office Child Abuse Unit, the Belleville and Nutley police departments,

and the United States Department criminal restraint, seven counts of of Homeland Security's İmmigration and Customs Enforcement Bureau.

While acting as the caretaker for three of the children in Nutley, he allegedly fondled them and videotaped one of the children in a sexually explicit act, according to Dow. He was charged in Nutley with three counts of endangering the welfare of a child and two counts of sexual assault by sexual contact.

Hildreth is charged with having committed similar acts upon three of the children in Belleville including confining one of the children in a locked room while he videotaped the sexual abuse. His charges in Belleville include kidnapping and

endangering the welfare of a child, and sexual assault by sexual c

Many of the incidents occurred while Hildreth volunteered to supervise children at Wesley Methodist Church in Belleville. He also acted as an assistant scoutmaster for Boy Scout Troop 301 at the church, a position he held until approximately five years ago.

Rev. Don Kim, pastor of Wesley Methodist Church, could not be reached for comment on June 27.

Hildreth admitted to fondling or raping at least nine children in the past 16 years, according to an affidavit filed in federal court, the Star Ledger reported.






