



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Board approves teen center at library

of Belleville Times

The transformation of the Belleville Public Library meeting room can officially begin now that the project has received unanimous approval.

The Belleville Library Board voted unanimously at their March 14th meeting to approve changing the current meeting room into a teen center. "It is a real breath of fresh air when the town mayor, town council and library board can work as a cohesive unit on a project. We are starting to get some really positive initiatives off the ground with our newly found cooperation," said board trustee Richard Yanuzzi.

The new room, which was originally designated to house 22 new computers, will hold 14 computers as well as tables, desks, a vending machine and an overhead projector. "We want it to be a place where the kids can go and do their own thing. They are never disruptive upstairs, it is just that sometimes the mix of kids and adults does not always mesh well," said Belleville Library Director Joan Taub. "This room will give them somewhere to go to do their homework, research for school, play games and just hang out with each other."

Officials involved with the project decided to bump the total number of computers down to 14 for board and business meetings.

from 22 because of space issues in the room. "We just want it all to fit comfortably and we felt that 14 would accommodate that better. We are in the process of ordering the equipment now and should have the room prepared sometime over the next few weeks," said Taub. "These kind of rooms are being done in a lot of libraries around this area. It is a great way to allow kids to continue to use the library without disturbing anyone

The library will be holding fundraisers and sponsorship programs to raise some of the money needed for the new materials in the teen center. Each computer will come to the library for under \$800 and according to Yanuzzi and Taub, the library will be getting its new furniture through Ikea at discount prices. "We are going to be able to get the equipment needed for the room at a minimal price," said Yanuzzi in a prior interview. "We are also holding a Taste of Belleville fundraiser to generate money and are also sponsoring a program that will allow local businesses to adopt a computer for our

Taub stated that the library is hoping to have the room operational by national library week on April 15th, but is unsure if that is a realistic goal or not. When complete, the room will act as the teen center and the conference room

To avoid legal trouble, 'Prayer Day' nixed

A local church Tuesday night was denied access to the front of Town Hall for a "National Day of Prayer" after the Township Attorney warned the council that allowing the day could bring a lawsuit.

Township Attorney Thomas Murphy said the prayer day would violate the separation of church and state. The Christian Apostolic Church, 77 Wallace St., asked for permission for the day May 3 and the council voted 4-3 to deny the access. Mayor Raymond Kimble and council members Marie Strumolo Burke, John Notari and Michael Nicosia voted against allowing the prayer day.

Murphy told the council at Tuesday's public council meeting, "For the respect of members of other churches, those who are not Christians and those with no belief at all, the council should not allow this. We are a multi-denominational town. I urge the council not to allow this well-intentioned day. This is secular government, and we should not use the grounds for this

Councilman Kevin Kennedy pointed out that the Pledge of Allegiance contains the line, "one nation, under God," and Murphy agreed that this is a controversial issue.

Congressman admits to 'tragic mistake' on Iraq

Almost four and a half years ago on October 11, 2002, I stood on the floor of the House of Representatives along with 295 of my colleagues to vote in support of the resolution authorizing President Bush to attack Iraq. I have since regretted that vote deeply. I admitted to the residents of my district over a year and a half ago that I made a mistake, taking total responsibility for my vote. I did so because the premise on which we authorized the War in Iraq was false, the military plan for victory has been weak and more than five years after September 11th this war has made our nation less safe, not more so.

On February 16, 2007 I stood with a significant majority of my Congressional colleagues to vote in favor of a very different resolution, one that takes a significant step

mistake we made in October when it was still possible to restore regime. Equally troubling is that ple who are demanding a strategic 2002. House Concurrent Resolution 63 states the continued support of Congress for American troops fighting in Iraq while adamantly disapproving of the President's ill-conceived plan to deploy more than 20,000 additional combat troops into harm's way. The troop escalation advocated by President Bush will only widen our involvement in this conflict and put more brave American troops in the middle of a vicious civil war. Voting in favor of the President's escalation plan would have been another historic error, one not in the interest of our War on Terror.

I stress the historic nature of this issue because I am a firm believer that history is telling of the future, especially in the prickly area of foreign affairs. The history of this war shows that President Bush can't form the right policy for victory. It is clear that he should have sent

order in Baghdad instead of now in 2007 when violence reigns daily. History also shows that Iraq has been wracked by sectarian and ethnic division long before it was even a state, a fact that was conveniently ignored by President Bush and his supporters on their march to Baghdad. Our armed forces have been misused, over-stretched and ill-equipped from the beginning and our military readiness to fight the ongoing War on Terror is now in serious doubt because of this war.

Indeed, the War on Terror, with its main staging area in Afghanistan is suffering due to the singular focus the Administration has had on Iraq. The facts are startling, for every \$5 we spend in Iraq we only spend \$1 in Afghanistan and because of our abdication of responsibility in Afghanistan we now see a truly towards remedying the historic additional troops to Iraq in 2003 dangerous revival of the Taliban

we now spend twice as much on Iraq as we allocate for homeland security, diplomacy and internaassistance tional combined. Afghanistan is the first and true front in the War on Terror and President Bush makes a strategic mistake by shifting focus away from it

In history I see lessons as far back as 280 BC when King Pvrrhus of Greece defeated the Romans during the Pyrrhic War. His army suffered irreplaceable casualties in battle and when he was congratulated on his victory he replied: "Another such victory over the Romans and we are undone." We've heard the words 'success' and 'victory' so many times from President Bush and his allies that their message is now seen as pyrrhic - empty - fleeting. The President needs to move away from chasing pyrrhic victories and start listening to the American peopast.

Arrested police officer is back on the job

Belleville Police Officer Wanda Scheumeister was reinstated March 19 after being arrested in June 2006 on a shoplifting charge.

June 2006 on a shoplifting charge. Belleville Police Chief Joseph Rotonda said Scheumeister had been reassigned to the patrol division, after being a detective. "That would be a reduction in pay," he said

Scheumeister had been the DARE officer and gang resistance education officer for the township before the shoplifting charge was made

The eight-year veteran of the department was charged with shoplifting mosquito repellant and lawn edgings from the K-Mart on Main Street last June. An official who wished not be identified said

the matter had been the subject of a plea bargain, with Scheumeister pleading guilty to a lesser charge.

Township Attorney Thomas Murphy would say only, "The matter has been resolved and she is back to work."

Scheumeister said, "I cannot make any comment," and referred questions to her lawyer, Annette Verdasco.

Verdasco would say only that "the matter was resolved amicably among both parties."

Mary Ann Jemison of the state Department of Personnel said Monday, "As of today, the Department of Personnel has no record of any disciplinary action taken for Ms. Wanda Scheumeister, Belleville Police Department. The DOP has not been notified of any suspension or reinstatement for her as of today."

In addition to the regular \$54 smillion budget, a total of six addi-Rtional budget questions will be on of the April 17 school budget ballot. The regular budget, passed along with the questions Monday night, ≥ raises taxes \$124 for a home ≥ assessed at the township average, according to School Administrator ≒Edward Appleton.

The overall budget increase is "slightly above 2 percent, significantly below inflation," Appleton placed on the ballot include:

said at Monday's budget presentation and public hearing. He cited the second elementary school increases in pupil transportation, health benefits and salaries as among the costs contained in the major portion of the budget over which the Board of Education has no control.

Cuts include the high school athletic budget being reduced by \$40,000, although no programs will be cut. Less money is budgeted for school field trips and extracurricular and co-curricular clubs, but officials said which trips and which clubs will be affected is yet to be determined.

The additional questions to be

- Raising \$65 to fund keeping counselor. There are currently two, and one is funded. This question would fund the second.
- Raising \$25,668 to maintain the present level of clubs, from the high school and middle school to the elementary schools.
- Raising \$60,000 to fund an instrumental music teacher position for the elementary schools that currently exists.
- Raising \$55,000 to continue the services of the middle school resource officer, which is a police officer that is in attendance at the
 - Raising \$60,000 to continue

■ Raising \$57,000 to keep the second of two Central Registration domicile investigators now employed that seek to detect and remove students illegally attending Belleville schools.

Appleton said the district was "very fortunate" to receive \$500,000 in additional state aid, even though it does not keep pace with inflation, but "the board was forced to make very significant decisions on staffing and pro-

There is a reduction of four staff members as part of the cuts of more than \$1.1 million needed to bring the budget down to the state-mandated four percent cap.

School Board Vice President Vincent Strumolo, Jr. said the reductions to the athletics budget would not result in "any programs

Appleton said the athletic director would "find a way to make the reductions, by hook or by crook."

School board member William Villano said the board was able to restore eight items from a list of items to be cut, but that six others were permanently cut.

Appleton said, "The program reductions, simply put, are there

because we were put in a position where we had to fund things that are absolutely mandated. This hurts, and it's something we don't want to do, but we have no choice?

Board member Dawson Bloom, who chaired the budget committee, said the reductions were reached by using the cumulative rankings of what board members said they wanted to keep, so no one board member was able to use undue influence on the decisions.

For the questions, Appleton said if voters reject a question, that item cannot be restored for that year unless the township council restores it after a possible budget defeat.


Resident Vincent Frantantoni criticized the board for spending 9.1 percent of the budget on \$5 million for administration, and for giving Superintendent of Schools Dr. Edward Kliszus a five-year contract with five-percent annual

With \$8.1 million going to employee benefits, Frantantoni said, "That's \$13.1 million going not for pencils, books or rulers. The teachers have to start paying part of the rate. For 30 years, school boards have chosen to give teachers raises that are double or triple the rate of inflation."

The town commission decided to link with other municipalities, Sappealing the change in the assessment equalization table of the g County Board of Taxation, permitting a \$2,500 item to cover the town's share of the appeal fund. Thirteen municipalities in Essex ₹County have raised a "war fund" of \$\$25,000 altogether. In the equalization table published by the County Tax Board, Belleville's true value of assessable property was set at \$109,478,620. The same property is carried on the tax rolls at \$44,807,900. The increase is 144 percent.

The Town Commission this week informally opposed the zoning board's granting a variance for a milk bar at 538 Joralemon Street. Joseph Ebert of Harvard Place, represented other residents in the area and said that "the milk bar would devalue property and result in a traffic hazard for the children." Early dismissal prompts questions

Belleville's Superintendent of Schools wants parents to know that early dismissals of students are a necessary reality in the wake of 9/11.

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

Sweet 'N Sour Chicken

3 whole chicken breasts, deboned and skinned

BATTER: 1 cup flour

2 eggs

2 tbsp. vegetable oil

1tbsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

3/4 cup water 3 tbsp. cornstarch

2 tbsp. sugar

1 (16 oz.) can tomato sauce

1 cup granulated sugar

3 tbsp. vinegar

2 tbsp. soy sauce

2 cups water

3 tbsp. cornstarch

1 onion, cut in eighths

1 large green pepper, diced

1 cup pineapple chunks,

drained

2 carrots, sliced on diagonal

2 ribs celery, sliced

Cut chicken into 1-inch cubes. BATTER: In a large bowl, whisk together flour, eggs, oil, baking powder, salt, sugar, water and cornstarch until smooth. Add chicken pieces and toss until well coated. Set aside.

SAUCE; In a large saucepan mix together tomato sauce, sugar, vinegar and soy sauce. Bring to a boil. Then add mixture of 1 cup water with 3 tablespoons cornstarch. Cook, stirring constantly, until thick. Add onion, green pepper, pineapple chunks, carrot rings and celery. Simmer for 30 minutes.

Just before serving, heat three inches vegetable oil in a large skillet or deep fryer to 360 degrees. Drop pieces of batter-coated chicken into hot oil and fry until golden brown, turning halfway through cooking. Remove from oil, drain on paper towels and keep warm until all chicken has been cooked. Place chicken on large platter and pour sauce over.

Colon, Soprano heading to top of list; Cuzzi embarks on eighth season

For nearly 10 years, Anthony Conte has held the title as Belleville's winningest wrestler, compiling 124 victories along with numerous championships, including the 1996 state title at 103 pounds.

Conte, the only wrestler in Belleville history to win four state medals and now a valued assistant coach to Joe Nisivoccia at Belleville, will most likely see two of his top wrestlers eclipse his record next winter. Filiberto Colon, a two-time state medalist, along with three District 14 and Essex County championships, will enter the 2007-2008 campaign with 112 victories. A junior, he is already fourth on Belleville's all time list, trailing teammate Robert Cozzarelli (116), Mark D'Elia (117 from 2000 to 2004) and Conte, who won 124 from 1994 through

Not far behind Colon is another Belleville junior, James Soprano, who concluded the past campaign with 99 career wins. Soprano won his first Region 4 championship this season and, along with Colon, should set a new standard for career wins by the end of next wrestling season.

Belleville's wrestling lore has been well documented. The program's first state champion was Chris Musmanno, back in 1980. Eight years later, Armondo Nardone won a state title at Belleville, followed by his younger brother, Emilio "Junior" Nardone, who won a pair of titles in 1991 and '92. Three years after Junior's title run, John Perna won a state title in an improbable way. Perna trailed in

his state title bout, 11-0 in the third period, but came back with a stunning pin in the closing seconds in what may have been the most dramatic result in state history.

Conte won his title as a sophomore a year after Perna's heroics, then advanced to the state final the following year. Six years passed before another Belleville wrestler made it to the state finals, when Nick Mattia earned a berth in the 103-pound opposite a freshman from Delbarton named Mike Grey. Mattia dropped a hard fought 5-1 decision to Grey in that 2003 final. Grey went on to become the first, and thus far only, wrestler to win four state wrestling titles.

Reaching the century mark for victories on the wrestling mat isn't easy. In addition to Conte, D'Elia, Cozzarelli and Colon, others who have won 100, or more, in a Belleville singlet, include Mattia (110), Emilio Nardone (101), Armondo Nardone (101), Frank Zarro (100) and Joe Cerreto (100).

I was in Tampa, Fla., last week, and had a chance to see Belleville native Phil Cuzzi, who is beginning his eighth full season as a Major League umpire. Cuzzi was working a game in Dunedin, Florida, between the Blue Jays and Tigers and seems content as a new campaign nears.

"I'm looking forward to the season," Cuzzi said. "It's good to be here and getting ready. My wife [Gilda] and I are enjoying the spring."

Cuzzi will once again work with crew chief Jerry Crawford, who will begin his 30th Major League season. It's the sixth straight year that Cuzzi will work on Crawford's crew. Brian O'Nora, who has worked with Crawford in 2003, 2004 and last year and is beginning his tenth year, is also back on the crew along with veteran umpire Bill Hohn, who starts his 18th Major League campaign.

Cuzzi will open the regular season next Monday in Anaheim when the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim take on the Texas Rangers. Next weekend, he's in San Diego for the Padres' home opener against the Colorado Rockies.

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
Council members pitch in during church repair

One of the oldest churches in the country sits comfortably along Main Street right here in Belleville.

The Belleville Dutch Reformed Church, over 300 years old, is among the oldest churches found in the continental United States and will be receiving some much needed repairs in the coming weeks. "That church is a large part of the history of our town. It would be a shame to see it rot away to nothing so some of us have decided to take it upon ourselves to make the necessary repairs," said Belleville Township Councilmen Michael Nicosia. "It is my intention, along with John Gorman, to make repairs to the church steeple."

Nicosia will make the charitable donation of labor through his personal business to perform the repairs at no cost to the town. Councilman George Ritacco plans to donate some of the materials used but was unable to be reached

for comment. "This is a one-day deal, we want to get in there and secure the area around the steeple where the bell is. We plan to replace the 2x4 that creates the

wall and put new boarding on it to close off the steeple area. Some of it has rotted out so we will replace the wood with weather proof lumber to avoid future problems," said Nicosia. "We want to secure the housing around the bell and tie up any loose ends up there."

The church was founded by Dutch settlers in this area in 1697 and was originally known as the Old Dutch Church of Second River. Town records indicate that the Belleville Reformed Church's original building was replaced in 1725. That building operated for almost 80 years before a tornado destroyed it in 1804, resulting in another building erected in 1807.

Growing membership at the church over the next 40 years led to further construction in 1853, when the current building was dedicated with the fellowship hall being added in 1895. The current 8-rank pipe organ was purchased in 1915 and despite replacements of the console, the original pipes remain. "There is more history in that church than most towns have collectively. It is not just a part of our history, it is a part of American history and I think it is a great thing that some of our council members are taking the initiative to preserve it," said Belleville resident Michael Fershmen.

Nicosia indicated that there were other repairs he would like to see done in the future but is focusing on the steeple for now. "Perhaps in time we can organize a larger effort to remedy some of the other immediate problems like the water coming into the basement or the holes in the roof," said Nicosia. "For now though, the repairs on the steeple is all we intend to do."

Today, the church is shared with the First Hispanic Reformed Church and services are held each Memorial Day, a tradition that began in 1890. "That church defines a certain part of Belleville and it is upon us as residents to preserve it," said Nicosia.



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

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

The parade would proceed down Harrison Street to Franklin Avenue and end in front of the Franklin Middle School in Nutley.

Kelly has said previously that it would be foolish to have separate parades and called the situation 'petty nonsense."

The latest moves were made to end the controversy between groups in Nutley and Belleville as to whether the Columbus Day Parade should continue to be a joint project of the two neighboring towns. Nutley's Assemblyman

An aide for Scalera said previously that the assemblyman acted as an arbitrator and "came up with a couple of excellent proposals."



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Issue of school staff escorts in ambulance raised

Questions of school liability versus student safety were raised by school officials after a parent complained about her daughter's treatment during a medical emergency.

At the March 19 Board of Education meeting, parent Lisa Kistner complained to school board members that a high school nurse did not accompany her 16-year-old daughter in the ambulance to the hospital after her daughter complained of chest pains and had a blood pressure spike.

Superintendent of Schools Dr. Edward Kliszus said it was safer for her daughter to be escorted by Emergency Medical Service (EMS) technicians and that there were issues of liability involved with nurses being involved in the

transport, rather than trained technicians.

Kistner quoted from first aid and emergency procedures put out by the schools that stated that a school nurse should be notified, that immediate care should be taken and 911 called if necessary.

"If a parent or guardian is not available, a nurse or administrator should accompany them," she said of the procedures.

School board member William Villano said he did not know for sure, but was almost certain that no one other than an EMT is allowed to ride in the back of an

School board member John McManus said a nurse can only be involved if there is a need for an EPI-pen involving an allergic reaction to something like peanuts.

McManus said the nurse prop-

erly traveled behind the ambulance in a car, and would have stayed until Kistner arrived at the hospital. Kistner arrived before the nurse, she said.

"I'm almost positive that it is not legal, and the EMTs won't do it," McManus said.

Villano said, "The majority of the time you're not allowed. I've smooth-talked my way."

Board member Dawson Bloom addressed Kistner's concerns that no one was around to approve lifesaving procedures should they there with her." have been needed.

He said a Mobile Intensive Care Unit (MICU) would have met her daughter halfway if needed.

"You can't have someone in the ambulance," Bloom said. "I don't think that any specific rules or policies were violated. I would not want to have an administrator be liable if something happens. The EMTs are trained."

Villano said the board would find out if nurses can or can't ride

School Board President Arlene Schor said Kliszus would check with School Board Attorney Frank Pomaco to see what the law is.

"I would respond similarly if it were my child," Schor told Kistner.

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A NEW WARNING FOR **PREGNANT WOMEN**

The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) has recently warned pregnant women to avoid the anti-depressant medication paroxetine hydrochloride (Paxil). The warning also includes women who are planning to become pregnant. The ACOG goes on to say that pregnant women (and those planning on becoming pregnant) should consider treatment with other anti-depressants on a case-by-case basis. These guidelines come one year after the FDA issued a warning about possible birth defects linked with Paxil when the drug is taken during the first trimester of pregnancy. There have also been reports that selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs), the category of antidepressants that include Paxil as well as Celexa, Prozac, and Zoloft, may cause newborns to have withdrawal symptoms.



12-12 rent leveling board

12-12.1 Determination. The governing body of the Township of Belleville in April of 1974 and April 27, 1976 and October 24, 1978 found and affirmed that a housing crisis existed and that the demand for increases in rent were exorbitant, speculative and unfair, and the governing body of the township found and declared that under the police powers granted to the mayor and board of commissioners of the township under N.J.S.A. 40.48-2, in order to protect and promulgate the health and welfare of the citizens of the township, a rent leveling board was declared to be necessary within the township, and the governing body thereafter adopted an ordinance referred to in the title hereof for the purpose of regulating rents.

12-12.2 Conditions Continue to Exist. The governing body of the township now finds and declares that the condition with respect to multiple dwelling housing space in the township, continues to exist in the township and that legislative action in the exercise of the municipal police power continues to be essential to protect the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the township.

12-12.3 Definitions. As used in this section:

12-12.3 Definitions. As used in this section:

All newly constructed dwelling units shall be exempt from this Chapter for 36 months commencing at time of first occupancy of each unit, and thereafter such unit(s) shall be subject to the provisions of this Chapter.

All "substantially rehabilitated" dwelling units shall be exempt from this chapter for 12 months commencing the date of occupancy after rehabilitation. Qualification for this exemption only applies in instances wherein there are four or less rental units on the same property and where the bona fide cost of improvements to same are at least 75% of the assessed property value on said property.

a. "Housing space" shall mean and include that portion of a dwelling rented, offered or available for rent for residential living purposes to one individual or family unit together with all privileges, services, furnishings, furniture, equipment, facilities and improvements connectived with the use and occupancy of such portion of the property.

b. "Multiple dwelling" shall mean and include any building or structure containing housing space, rented, offered or available for rent. Exempt from this section are one, two, and three-family dwellings, and four-family dwellings where one unit is owner occupied, or occupied by a member of the owner's immediate family (parent, spouse, child).

c. "Available for rent" shall mean fit for habitation as defined by the statutes, codes and ordinances in full force and effect in the State of New Jersey, County of Essex and Township of Belleville and occupied and offered for rent.

d. "Notice" shall mean an owner, lessor, sub-lessor or any other person entitled under the terms of a housing agreement to the use or occupancy of housing space or

rent.

12-12.5 Voided Rent Increases.

Any rental increase at the time other than the expiration of a lease or termination of a periodic lease shall be void and must be returned to the tenant or tenants. For purposes of determining whether a rental increase is in excess of that authorized by the provisions of this section, the rent leveling board shall determine and establish the rent for the housing space as of July 1, 2005 which shall be considered the base rent. As to all applications, petitions or complaints pending before the rent leveling board as of the time of the first reading of this ordinance, prior law shall apply in that the base rent for the housing space shall be determined as of January 1, 2000.

In the event the rent leveling board shall determine that a tenant is entitled to a rental rebate resulting from an overcharge in rental for housing space, such rebate shall be made only for the two year period preceding the date on which the tenant's complaint was filed or the land-lord's hardship petition was filed. The board may also cause a complaint to be issued in the Belleville Municipal Court for violation of this section where a landlord has charged rent for a period in excess of two years which rent is in excess of that which is or was permitted by this section.

In the event a tenant shall file a complaint charging a landlord with rental overcharge more than 60 days after such tenant has vacated a unit of housing space located in a multiple dwelling, then such tenant shall not be entitled to any rebate as provided in this section.

12-12.6 Vacancy in Housing Space. A vacancy in housing space shall not relieve the land-lord from the controls of this section as to such housing space.

12-12.7 Landlord Foregoes Maximum Allowable Rent. Where a landlord, because of unusural circumstances, is agreeable to forego the maximum allowable rent, he shall apply to the rent leveling board setting forth the reason therefore in order to protect the base rent so that the higher rent is not waived as the base of a future rent.

12-12.8 Agreement Between Landlord and Tenant Requires Approval. Where a tenant requests a personalized service for furnishing furniture, equipment, facilities, alterations or improvements in the subject housing space, which is unique, and the tenant has negotiated at arms length with the landlord a mutually satisfactory agreement with the landlord as to a price and terms of payment, such agreement shall not be deemed as part of rent and shall require prior approval of the rent leveling board.

12-12.9 Amount of increase; Time. The rental for housing space shall not be increased more than five percent (5%) in any consecutive 12 month period irrespective of the number of different tenants occupying said housing space during said 12 months.

12-12.10 Notification and Calculation of increase. Any landlord seeking an increase in rent shall give notice to the tenant by certifled mall, return receipt and contemporaneous first class mall of the calculations involved in computing the increase, and shall in the case of the proposed increase.

12-12-11 Creation of Board; Members; Powers. There is hereby created a Rent Leveling Board within the Township of Belleville, which shall consist of seven (7) members and three atternate members. The Rent Leveling Board shall reorganize once per year during the month of July.

The members and alternate members of the board shall be appointed by the governing body of the township and shall serve without compensation. The alternate members shall consist of a landlord, a tenant, and a single-family homeowner. The etrem of office shall be for two (2) years and shall continue until an appointment is made to fill any unexpired terms. The rent leveling board is hereby granted, and shall have and exercise, in addition to other powers herein granted, all powers necessary and appropriate to carry out and execute the purposes of this section, including but not limited to the following:

No earlier than August 1st of each year and not later than October 1st of each year, every owner or managing agent of multiple dwellings shall file an annual statement on a form approved by the rent leveling board setting forth the rent for each unit of housing space as of the date of the statement and shall further set forth any amendments or corrections to the registration statement already on file for such multiple dwelling as otherwise required in this section. The annual statement herein required shall set forth the date and amount of any proposed or anticipated rental increase in the succeeding 18 month period. The annual statement shall include a certified statement setting forth all services included in the rent charged and further statement of any surcharges imposed and the service provided for such surcharge. A copy of the annual statement filed with the Township Clerk shall be provided to each tenant. The annual statement shall be accompanied by a ten (\$10.00) dollar per unit filing fee.

12-12.13 Hardship Rent Increase. In the event a landlord cannot realize a just and reasonable return on his property after taking into account income and expenses, the board may grant the landlord a hardship rent increase for good cause shown. Prior any such appeal to the rent leveling board, a landlord must serve notice on all affected tenants at least ten days prior to the hearing date and the landlord must post in the lobby of each building or if no lobby is present, in a conspicuous place in and about the premises, a notice of said appeal, setting forth the basis for said appeal. Said notice must be posted for at least ten days prior to the publishing date of the appeal. The affected tenants shall have the right to challenge the basis of the facts for the hardship increase on the hearing date thereof. A just and reasonable return shall take into consideration, among other factors, the value of the property, the reasonable expenses of operation, the income, and the rate of return. The rate of return should be generally commensurate with returns on investments in other enterprises having comparable risks.

In computing rental increase or rental rebate as provided under this section, the amount so computed shall be limited to allowance of one hardship rent increase within any 12-month period.

A landlord shall be limited to allowance of one hardship rent increase within any 12-month period.

The board may review any hardship rent increase in excess of 15 percent after 12 months from date of the granting of such increase.

Fair market value shall mean assessed value, as that value is set forth on the official tax records of the Township of Belleville. In the event a petition or complaint has been filed with the county board of taxation or a court of appropriate jurisdiction challenging the assessed value for such property, fair market value shall mean the value alleged by the landlord in his petition or complaint filed with the county board of taxation or a court of appropriate jurisdiction or the value alleged by the landlord in any experts report or pleading which he shall file with the county board of taxation or a court of appropriate jurisdiction. All such pleadings, reports, petitions and other documents deemed necessary by the rent leveling board to establish the petitioner's alleged fair market value must be filed by the landlord with his petition for a hardship rental increase pursuant to this section. In the event a judgment is rendered by the county board of taxation or a court of appropriate jurisdiction during the 12 month period within which a hardship increase has been granted based upon the fair market value as alleged by the landlord in his pleadings or petition before the county board of taxation or court of appropriate jurisdiction, and in the event such judgment is final in all regards and has not been nor can be appealed by the landlord, and the judgment rendered varies from the value relied upon by the rent leveling board for purposes of determining the hardship rent petition filed by the landlord, the landlord may petition the rent leveling board to recalculate his hardship petition based upon the value established by such final judgment of the county board of taxation or a court of appropriate jurisdiction.

In any event, no increase authorized by this section shall exceed 15 percent of the tenant's rent.

Depreciation Schedule for such capital improvement.

12-12.16 Present Landlord Not Responsible for Violations of Predecessor; Exception Where title to a multiple dwelling has been conveyed to a landlord by a predecessor landlord who has violated the provisions of this or any previous rent leveling ordinance, the present landlord may not be held liable for excessive rent charged by the predecessor landlord except for the following:

he said. Sposato said the committee will still invite anyone from Belleville to be a part of the parade, and they have a good relationship with Belleville Mayor Raymond Kimble. He said he was very disappointed, that he had hoped the sides could get the problems resolved.

Former Belleville Mayor Mario Drozdz said the committee felt the new proposals were not much different than the one made by Cocchiola, which called for a steering committee to guide two separate parade committees.

He said the new committee is saying they are two separate committees, but they have always been one, and anybody who wants to participate is allowed, but they would prefer to remain as one unit.

He said that the Belleville committee, with many Nutley members, would have no problem with the new Nutley committee coming back to their committee.

As for the lawyer, Drozdz said. the committee feels that no relief is in sight, and it is "a slap in the face to everyone on the committee."

He reiterated that this is not a Belleville versus Nutley fight, is instead infighting among Nutley people, and they have to follow the rules.

Previously, a member of the Belleville committee said the committee had voted unanimously to reject the Nutley mayor's proposal.

A group in Nutley, consisting of many of the leaders and organizers of the parade in recent years, wants Nutley to stage its own parade.

Scalera met with Kelly to discuss a resolution to the problem.

Scalera is vacationing and could not be reached for comment.

Cocchiola said the Nutley commissioners had agreed with her plan. All five commissioners had said previously they would support having control of the parade in

A tenant who petitions the board for an adjustment of rent or files a complaint with the board alleging landlord's violation of any of the terms of this section must serve notice of the petition or complaint upon the landlord within ten days of the filing of such petition or com-

12-12.19 Filling of Application or Petition. Any application or petition made to the rent leveling board by a landlord or tenant must be filed with the secretary of the board at least 30 days prior to the next regularly scheduled meeting date in order to be heard at that meeting. 12-12.20 Notice to Landlord of Petition. Upon proper notice by tenant upon landlord that tenant is petitioning or otherwise moving before the board against the landlord for a reduction in rent for violation of the terms of this section, the landlord shall appear at the scheduled hearing date with all pertinent information and records which the board will need to determine this matter. Failure of the landlord to appear upon proper notice and without just cause as determined by the board may result in the tenant's petition being heard and decided outside the presence of the landlord.

12-12.21 Rents After Effective Date of Original Ordinance. No landlord shall, after the effective date of the original ordinance, adopted April 9, 1974, charge any rents in excess of what he was receiving from the effective date of the original ordinance except for increases authorized by this or any prior or subsequent ordinance.

12-12.22 First Rental Not Restricted. The owner of the housing space or dwelling being rented for the first time shall not be restricted in the initial rent he charges. Any subsequent rental increase, however, shall be subject to the provisions of this section.

12-12.23 Appeals. A landlord or a tenant aggrieved by any action, regulation or determination of the board may appeal in a court of appropriate jurisdiction within 45 days after the entry of a decision.

12-12.24 Violations. A violation of any provision of this section including but not limited to the filling wift the rent leveling board or township clerk of any misstatement of fact or the failure to appear, upon notice, at a rent leveling board hearing, shall be punishable by a fine of not more than seven-hundred fifty (\$750.00) dollars or by imprisonment for a period not more than 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment as to each leasehold. Each rent leveling hearing in which the noticed party fails to appear shall be prosecuted in the municipal court of the township upon a complaint and summons signed by either party, his agent or attorney, or by the chairman of the rent leveling board or its agent.

12-12.25 Correction of Errors or Omissions. Clerical mistakes in judgments, orders or other parts of record and errors therein arising from oversight and omission may at any time be corrected by the board on its own initiative or on the motion of any party, and on such notice and terms as the board directs notwithstanding the pendancy of any appeal.

12-12.26 Filling Fee for Hardship Increase. All applications for a hardship increase pursuant to the terms of subsection 12-12.13, and for a major capital improvement increase pursuant to the terms of subsection 12-12.14, shall be accompanied by a filling fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) per application plus five dollars (\$5.00) per unit in the subject multiple dwelling. These fees are cumulative to those set forth in Section 12-12.17.

12-12.27 Fee for Transcript. In the event an appeal is taken from a determination of the rent leveling board clerk, a reasonable fee shall be paid for the service of preparing a transcript of the hearing.

12-12-28 Landlord to Provide Copy of Rent Leveling Ordinance to Tenant. A landlord at his or her expense shall provide a copy of the rent leveling ordinance to every tenant upon the tenant's initial occupancy of housing space in a multiple dwelling.

12-12-29 Purpose. This section, being necessary for the welfare of the Township of Belleville and its inhabitants, shall be liberally construed to effectuate the purpose thereof.

12-12-30 Severability. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence or any other part of this ordinance is adjudged unconstitutional or invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance.

12-12.31 Repeal of Inconsistent Ordinances. All ordinances or parts of ordinances which are inconsistent with provisions of this ordinance shall be and are hereby to the extent of

12-12.32 Effective Date. This Section is to take effect immediately upon final passage and publication as required by law and shall remain in force and effect for a period not to exceed five (5) years at which time this Section shall be reviewed and considered by the Governing Body, and if not extended shall terminate five (5) years from the date of adoption. The Rent Leveling Board shall have the power to review this Section annually and shall make suggestions to the Governing Body concerning amendments to the Rent Leveling Ordinance.

12-12.33 Section 12-12A et seq. is not affected in any way by this Ordinance. Said ordinance 12-12A et seq. remains in full force and effect.

12-12.34 The Township Clerk is hereby directed to give notice at least ten (10) days prior to hearing on the adoption of this ordinance to the Essex County Planning Board and to all persons entitled thereto pursuant to N.J.S.A. 40:55D-15 and N.J.S.A. 40:55D-63 (if required). Upon adoption of this ordinance after public hearing thereon, the Township Clerk is further directed to publish notice of the passage thereof and to file a copy of the ordinance as finally adopted with the Essex County Planning Board as required by N.J.S.A. 40:55D-16. The Clerk shall also forthwith transmit a copy of this ordinance after final passage to the Township Tax Assessor as required by N.J.S.A. 40:49-2.1.

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
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
