## ELECTIONS Belleville's Caputo wins primary Tuesday

It took more than three hours to declare a winner, but it appears that two challengers in Tuesday's Democratic primary have bested the incumbents, who have represented the area for years. Elections are in November.

According to Essex County Freeholder Vice President and Belleville resident Ralph Caputo, who was interviewed late Tuesday, he and running mate Cleopatra Tucker have defeated incumbents Craig Stanley and Oedline Truitt in the June primary. Caputo and Tucker will each be on the Democratic ballot for state Assembly in the 28th District, pending the

release of official results.

"I am elated. Been out for 35 years but now I am back," stated Caputo late Tuesday night. "I am very grateful to the people who supported me and got me where I am today. I'm also very happy for Ms. Tucker, I believe we can do a lot of great things for this district."

Although Caputo is ecstatic over the results, he admits that his new job will not be easy. "We have a lot of work to do. We need to fix our schools, clean up the streets, get a better handle on the crime and serve our residents. It is a daunting task but it is one that I am eager to engage," stated Caputo. "I am happy for the people of Belleville and Bloomfield. They deserve a representative and I am honored to give

that to them. This win gives geo- 'I look forward to graphical balance to a situation that desperately needed it."

Caputo played up his Belleville ties during his campaign, noting that there has not been a district representative from the township in several years.

Caputo received 6,045 votes, a total of 25.89 percent of the vote with his running mate Tucker getting 5,885 votes, approximately 25 percent of the vote. Incumbent Craig Stanley received 5,775 votes with running mate Oadline Truitt receiving 5,431 votes. One polling station was still left unaccounted for at around 11:30 Tuesday night. "I look forward to working with

Despite the change in the state assembly, the state Senate picture remained the same with incum-generating D. Bilal Beasley with 6,045 votes to 5,885 votes. Rice could not be reached for comment.

Rice ran unsuccessfully against 8 Corey Booker for the mayoralty of Newark last year following the withdrawal of incumbent Sharpe James, who stepped aside after running the state's largest city for 20 years.

## Newark reservoir land to be set aside for running track

The Belleville High School track team has used the school parking lot, town streets and fields as its practice ground for over 20 years. Soon, they will finally be getting a track they can call their own.

On June 1, Newark Mayor Corv A. Booker, along with Belleville Mayor Raymond Kimble and Councilwoman Marie Strumolo Burke, held a press conference at 336 Joralemon Street to announce the construction of a running track. "For years, the Belleville track team has had no where to run or practice in this town. It has been a vision of ours to give our children a place to go for such occasions and that vision is now coming true," said Kimble. "Our children and residents will now have a place they can go to run,

exercise and call their own."

The track will be placed on the Newark reservoir property along Joralemon Street and will serve as a practice field for the Belleville track team as well as a place to hold weekend meets. "The area is just wasted space right now and does not appear aesthetically pleasing in the neighborhood. It is a disgrace and dishonor to the children and residents of this town to go over 20 years without giving them a home track and place to exercise," said Burke. "I remember a few years back when a Belleville student, Crystal Brulato, was at a senior citizen beefsteak dinner and she asked me if there was anything I could do to bring a track to Belleville. Ever since her encouraging words were spoken to me, I have tried tirelessly to get a track up in this town and now it looks like that dream is coming true."

The property has been eyed for development for the past 20 years but complications with the piping that lies below the ground has halted several projects in the past. "This is something that has been going on for years and years. The piping underneath the ground has made it almost impossible to develop any kind of housing or business property and the ground is owned by Newark so both governing bodies need to be on board with the plan," said Belleville Township Manager Victor Canning. "I estimate that the project will cost roughly \$1.5 million but as always, I will explore every avenue possible for funding aid. I expect that Belleville will be able to receive help from several different places with this project. Everyone is working together, which makes things a lot easier?

Booker announced to the crowd that his support and the support of the city of Newark were with Belleville and that he planned to see this project to the end. "This is a wonderful thing for all parties involved. I am grateful for the leadership of this town and the work they have done. This project is a symbol of what is happening in

Essex County. We all need to work together and unify as a cohesive unit, not towns standing alone," said Booker. "It is important that we make this place a better place for the generations to come after us and projects such as this one will do just that."

The track will be a 300-meter track, as opposed to the traditional 400-meter tracks. "The track will measure 300-meters around because of the piping stations. We had a Newark engineer come in and take a look at the property and he informed us that 300 meters was the largest possible track for this area," said Canning. "This will not hurt our ability to hold practices and meetings at the track."

No timetable has been set for when construction will begin but the town council has indicated they would like to see progress on this project as soon as possible.

## Jumping (and running, and shot-putting) for joy

It's a stretch to say the timing could not have been better - track and field afficionados, after all, have been waiting 20 years - but last Friday's announcement that Belleville will finally have a place to hold track meets and practices seemed to come just as the situation had become intolerable. A few weeks ago Belleville High School track parents pleaded with the Belleville Board of Education to find their kids a place to run, something they have not had in two decades. With no suitable facility on school grounds, this ball was in the township's court.

Where it stayed for many years despite repeated attempts by the township to get its hands on unused land belonging to the City of Newark. The

negotiations were complicated by some technical issues related to the property, located on Joralemon past and present, who labored patiently to get this Street and part of the city's reservoir system. But the main roadblock to getting a deal done was former Newark Mayor Sharpe James, who during his lengthy reign in politics never seemed to show an interest in any deal unless it somehow benefited him directly. The new tide that brought in Mayor Corey Booker last year, however, has helped not just New Jersey's largest city – which may finally be enjoying its long-awaited renaissance - but the people of Belleville too. Booker should be commended for putting games aside and doing something nice for a neighbor simply because it is the right thing to do.

And hats off as well to the Belleville officials, deal done. Athletics is a vital component of the academic experience for lots of young people; it's a disgrace that track team members are forced to practice in parking lots or at neighboring facilities when space allows. Belleville's kids deserve better than that.

While last Friday's news provided an occasion to pop a small Champagne cork, there's still much to be done - like actually getting a facility built and finding the money to pay for it. Thanks to the Booker administration, the ball is in Belleville's court. Now it's up to local officials to run with it.

## Carmer residents still need relief from flooding

Work continues on bringing relief to Carmer Avenue residents, after a meeting initiated by Fourth Ward Councilman John Notari helped formulate the latest plan.

Notari said at a recent council meeting that about 18 people came to a meeting at a Carmer Avenue resident's home to discuss the ongoing flooding problems.

"Township Engineer Tom Herits said they are going to use a camera to look at the pipeline" causing the flooding problems, and will look to find a solution.

Long-suffering residents of Carmer Avenue continue to ask town officials to finally provide relief from flooding and poor road conditions on the damaged street.

The road has been totally, fully re-paved, while problems with storm drains and sewers have been remedied to prevent future flooding problems.

There were problems during the process for sure, with a resident

ing back to find their driveway torn up without any notification.

The final paving was done after the manholes had been left raised for two weeks while the first coating of paving material was allowed to settle.

Notari said previously he inherited Carmer Avenue's woes then and problems lingered since long before that. That is not the high quality of life he said he wants for his residents.

Also to be remedied were problems with catch basins and the installation of new airtight manholes, Notari said. The problems include debris getting stuck in the catch basins and water leaking through the old manholes, he said. During the reconstruction of the road, Notari made sure residents were allowed to park cars temporarily by the Pathmark on Washington Avenue.

Anyone riding down the road could have seen how bad it was, Herits said. He said the township would have to take funds from the roadway bond ordinance in order to finish the road.

Neglia replaced the water line, surface to curbs, and put in a brand new gas main line as part of the original repairs, he said.

As for the flooding, part of the problem is that the Bremond Avenue sewer line, located above Carmer Avenue, feeds into that road's pipes, Herits said.

The street has been designed so  $\pm$ water can't get into sanitary sewers and back up, but many residents have bathrooms in the basement? that still get the back flow, Herits said.

One improvement that will help is new, watertight manholes, he said, although this won't fix problems with the storm drains.



## School officials fighting town's mandated cuts

The school board's appeal to the county Superintendent of Schools over the Township Council's cutting of \$849,000 from its defeated \$54 million 2007-2008 budget will be fought on three separate levels, according to officials. The budget question, plus six added special questions, were all defeated by voters in April. Under state law, defeated school budgets go to municipal governing bodies for review.

School Administrator Edward Appleton said the district would appeal in some cases where the cuts will affect the stability of the budget. Other parts of the appeal focus on the reductions damaging the district's ability to provide a thorough and efficient education as required under the state's constitution. Still a third front to be argued is that some of the cuts can't be identified, and were misread by the council. "It may be something we already accounted for," Appleton said.

The council restored four of the six defeated ballot questions but made \$849,000 in cuts from the school budget.

Appleton said the request for restoration of funds begins with a letter to the county superintendent.

"We have to talk to him (the superintendent) to see how he wants to handle things," he said. "He may get directly involved in mediating it, or he may forward it to the state to review the rationales and make its own decision."

A copy of the letter has to be sent to the township council, which then has 10 days reply as to why the cuts should be sustained, Appleton said. As for the amount well below the \$8,105 to \$8,959

said he was not sure. "The timeline changes from year

to year, from quickly or dragged out," Appleton said.

In the meantime, the district remains "in limbo," he said.

"It makes a mess of the day-today operations," Appleton said. "I hope to hell it gets done. The worse case scenario is that we are forced to accommodate all of the cuts, and tell people, and programs, that they are going to be eliminated. Or we can make an adjustment somewhere else. There may be other options. For instance, there might be a late retirement that can help us accommodate the cuts, or we can blow what little surplus we have left. There is no one answer." He said it is always better for the

district if the appeal gets done ear-

"What if you wait, and the commissioner says you can do this?" Appleton said. "You have to make modifications midyear. We're just going to do what we can here, and hope it settles early rather than late?

New Jersey School Boards Association spokesman Michael Yaple explained the appeal process in detail. He said in recent years, there have been few appeals statewide, with just two each in 2006 and 2004 and three in 2005. Before then there were considerably more, Yaple said.

"Part of the reason for the fewer appeals is that the state Department of Education tried to get involved early, and guide municipalities so it doesn't get to that point," he said. "Appeals can only be done on certain grounds. A lot depends on cost per pupil?

Yaple explained in more detail what it means for cuts to a budget to undermine a district's ability to provide basic education or undermine budget stability.

He said that under the state's Thorough and Efficient Education standards, a district must be able to provide nine core curriculum standards.

For example, if a council cuts \$1 million from a school budget and says there will be no more art in fifth and sixth grades, that would mean a district could not provide basic education, which also includes areas like math, social studies and world languages, Yaple said

As for undermining the stability of a school budget, he used an example of Absecon in Atlantic County, where the governing body cut all but 42 cents of the district's case of emergency, and restored surplus equal to three percent of the total budget in the name of financial stability, Yaple said.

After the May 21 deadline passed for the council to pass its cuts to the defeated school budget, the district had 10 working days to file an appeal, with notice to the county superintendent, who actually rep[resents an arm of the state Department of Education. The notice can include the reasons for the appeal. The municipal governing body then has 10 working days to reply, but Yaple confirmed that there is no deadline for the state to make a decision.

The council agreed to restore monies for questions 3, 4, 5, and 7, totaling \$197,668. The decisions will restore \$25,668 to maintain the present level of student clubs, \$60,000 to pay for a third elementary instrument music teacher, \$55,000 to maintain a middle school resource officer and \$57,000

The council also terminated two positions that are currently vacant, m which would eliminate \$100,000 from the budget.

The Board of Education then restored Lisa Novak to the position of elementary school music teacher at a salary of \$42,780 and Iris Rodriguez as assistant domicile investigator at a salary of \$48,672.

The council also passed a resolution "certifying to the county board of taxation the amount of \$31,691,984 to be raised by real property taxation for school purposes in the calendar year of 2007-2008" which will have an estimated impact of \$124 per household.





## Group of women combines prayer and good works St. Mary's parishioners have crafted thousands of rosaries

What started over 6 years ago as an idea has turned into tradition for a very special group of women right here in this community.

Every Tuesday afternoon you will find a group of women from the St. Mary's Church who call themselves "The Rosary Makers" collaborating along Myrtle Ave in Nutley, quietly chatting and string-ing their beads together. "When we started we really did not have much of an idea of what we were planning on doing. It was just something we enjoyed doing and it seemed to help others out," said Alice Harrison, a member of The Rosary Makers. "We come togeth-er and get a chance to chat and do something we all enjoy doing." The group, which consists of

about 14 women who reside in Belleville and Nutley, gather at Harrison's house and string together rosaries of different colors, patterns, shapes and sizes that they later send out to those who requested them. "We belong to the Rosary Makers in Kentucky, an organization that sends out a flier bimonthly that gives us the names and locations of people who want rosaries," said Harrison. "We send ours all over. They go to nursing homes, hospitals, churches and anywhere else that you can think of. We all greatly enjoy helping others out any way we can and this gives us that chance. The letters of appreciation we receive back really show how much our recipients appreciate our work."

In the Catholic tradition, rosary beads are used during the prayer of the Rosary, which consists of several recitations of the Hail Mary and the Lord's Prayer. The beads, strung along a cord, rope or chain, are used to count off the prayers. Prayer beads in general are common in other religious traditions too.

The group has made more than 12,000 rosaries since its inception in September of 2000 and is beginning a drive to collect toiletries for soldiers currently serving in Iraq. "We have sent rosaries overseas before and next week we will be posting a message at our next Sunday mass that we are collecting toiletries for our soldiers in Iraq.

We want to answer the call of need wherever it is," said Anita Iaco, the group's vice president.

The women have kept a moderately low profile in the past and while some may not know of their deeds, those who do have shown their full support. "What these women do is fantastic. It shows that there is still good spirit in people and in the church despite all that goes on in this world today. I have been with the church for many years and these women are a special group of people," said While the project has gone on Annette Faulton, Belleville resident longer than many had expected, and long time church member.

When asked why they have continued to do this, Iaco replied simply and happily. "We are all Christians and we share a spirituoffer strength in prayer and I helping them," said Iaco.







A lifetime of memories

He has transcended time and has influenced the lives of a generation, and then some.

And now, the man everyone at Belleville High School simply calls "Z", has decided it's time to retire.

After 41 years, George Zanfini, one of the most popular teachers in the history of Belleville High, not to mention a Hall of Fame baseball coach at the school, will begin a new phase of his life, starting this summer.

"It's been a wonderful 41 years," Zanfini said. "I wouldn't trade the memories for anything. I've enjoyed myself immensely?

Before we continue, remember this. At Belleville High, a teacher has reached a level of distinction when he, or she, is simply called by an initial. For many years, the legendary gym teacher, Ed Berlinski, was called "B". Belleville High School's former great softball coach, Carl Corino, is called "C" by his students. Former Belleville cross country and track coach, John Tosato, pretty much owns the letter "T" at the high school. Tony DeAquino was called "D" by his gym students for many years before retiring. The late Sam Giuffrida was "G" to all his students during his days at Belleville High and on the waters of the Passaic River as the school's crew coach.

In Belleville, the letter Z is reserved for one man. And it's safe to say that the letter will hold that distinction long after the next generation of students has been graduated.

A graduate of Belleville High School, Zanfini first came on the scene in 1966 as a 23-year-old history teacher at Belleville Junior High School. Back then, the Junior High ranged from grades 7 through 9 before students would move on to the Senior High School for grades 10-12.

"My first memory of George was back in 1967," recalled Phil Cuzzi, today a Major League umpire and one of Zanfini's closest friends. "I was a seventh grader at the Junior High. I believe he was a first, or second year teacher at the time."

Cuzzi never had Zanfini for a teacher, but knew right away this was a man students would gravitate to.

"The kids then, and now, were something special," Zanfini said. "The years go by so quickly, and it's is and is still all about." hard to remember a specific school year, because they all seem to annoyed at us, knowing we blend together. Zanfini got a good laugh about



those pennants when reminded during our conversation last week.

"That's right!", Zanfini said. "I had bought those pennants from a promotion, and had them hung up in my classroom above the black board. I would make all the kids recite the various school's nicknames. I can't believe he remembered that."

Zanfini is a humble man. Perhaps too humble at times. I've always told him I don't think he understands the influence he's had on so many students.

My first memories of him go back to the fall of 1971. It was the first day of school at Belleville Junior High and I was starting the eighth grade. Having been through a year of Junior High, I felt a little better about the transition from grammar school to the Junior High. Now, as an eighth grader, I was more confident in my abilities and hoping for a good school year.

My first class, period one, that year? It was History. The teacher? Zanfini.

"All right, everyone settle down," he would say as he walked into the classroom at 7:55 a.m. And we all pretty much did what he told us to do. Zanfini had our respect from day one that year. A lot of us already knew Z as the freshman baseball coach and assistant freshman football coach, and within that first day, I knew he was a marvelous teacher.

We started that school year learning about the Civil War, then eventually World Wars I and II. I became a history buff and fan of FDR because of George's class. I remember listening to Roosevelt's speeches and watching the movies in Zanfini's classes about the particular times in our history. Thirtysix years later, George and I still reminisce about President Andrew Johnson, how he was impeached and later, by one vote, saved from expulsion by the U.S. Senate.

"One vote," Zanfini would say in that trademark voice. "The system worked. That's what a democracy

Occasionally, Zanfini would get should, and he let us know it. One day, he came into class, looked at us with a certain level of disgust and said, "you people have the world at your feet and you don't even know it."

that, who really cares." And they were right.

Alan Frank, who, like Cuzzi, first met Zanfini has a seventh grader in '67, recalls a different side of Zanfini.

"When George was named freshman baseball coach, we were his first team as freshmen," Frank recalled. "We won 20 some odd games that year. But what we learned about George was that he was a caring man, a good guy who we all respected. I had him two years in a row for class, too, and he was a tremendous teacher. We couldn't wait for his class every day."

Twenty-six years after graduating Belleville, Frank was named the varsity baseball coach at his alma mater. Frank's first call was to Zanfini.

"I told him I needed him to help me," Frank said. "I told him 'George, I know you said you don't want to coach any more, but if I want to get the things done that will make this program good again, I need you? I told him to take as much time as he needed to make a decision, and within a few days, he called and said 'okay, I'll do it for one year."

The 1999 Bucs had a good season, and Zanfini enjoyed it so much that he came back for another year in 2000.

'He did so much to help me those two years," Frank said. "There's no way I could have gotten things done without him. I remember coaches from other teams would see George and say 'George, you're back? Who's your assistant,' meaning me. I never felt like George was my assistant. He and I worked coached together. He's a class act in every way?

In the fall of 1974, Zanfini was named the varsity baseball coach, prompting a move to the high school, where he would continue to teach History. From 1975 through 1982, and again in 1987, he had some marvelous years coaching the Bellboys, and later, the Buccaneers. The 1976 team won 20 straight games and held the state's number one ranking for six weeks. That team finished 24-4, with two excruciating 3-2 defeats to Livingston, the first coming in the Greater Newark Tournament semifinals, the other in the North Jersey, Section 2, Group 4 final. The team did win the Big 10 championship.

"If there was one negative about my coaching, it was Livingston," Zanfini said. "We never could beat them?

In 1981, the Bucs captured the program's first, and thus far, only, GNT crown, beating Glen Ridge in the title game, 10-4, behind the pitching of Anthony Coco and the thunderous bat of Frank Fazzini, who had a junior year for the ages.

"Frankie was unreal that season," Zanfini said. "But we knew early on that he was going to be always treated us like we were all special. Carl Corino (Belleville's

You're lucky to have someone like freshman baseball coach in the late a sense of pride and honor to be 1970s) and I would talk every day about our teams and we were debating on whether to bring Frankie to the varsity as a freshman, which was unheard of back then. We decided it was better to let him stay with the freshman, and I think it worked out well. He came up as a sophomore in 1980 and was an immediate starter."

Corino, known to many in Belleville as the legendary softball coach with over 500 victories, loves Zanfini.

"A great guy, great friend for many years," Corino said. "He's Belleville all the way. Great teacher and coach for Belleville baseball, in the best sports era the school ever had, in my honest opinion. There are so many great memories, great rivalries and great games. George was the big reason, in fact the reason I got started coaching and teaching in Belleville. He's a great friend. Belleville High will never be the same without him."

An avid college basketball fan, Zanfini has long loved the University of Kentucky Wildcats. When asked how he became a Kentucky fan, Zanfini thought for a moment, then said, "Cotton Nash. When I was a kid, I'd play basketball at School #10, and this guy Cotton Nash would play ball with us. One day I found out that Cotton had gotten a scholarship to play college basketball at Kentucky, and I started watching him play there. That's how I became a Kentucky fan."

Nash, whose real first name is Charlie, was born in Jersey City. After an All American career at Kentucky, he played a year for the Los Angeles Lakers and San Francisco Warriors before a season with the ABA's Kentucky Colonels.

Zanfini derives a great deal of pleasure in seeing former players doing well. "I look at a guy like Phil Agosta, who played for me (in 1977 and 1978) and he's grown into a good family man, someone who wants to give back to his community. That means a lot."

"I had the honor and privilege of playing for Coach Zanfini in 1977 and 1978," Agosta said. "In '77, we started out the season as one of the top ranked teams in the state, but Coach Z had to leave the team during the season due to a major illness, and the team never recovered from losing him as our coach and our leader. I felt sorry team, that are still my friends to closest friends." this day, like Anthony Gamarro, Rocco Balsamo and Scott Osche, High graduate and today a coach knowing that they would never have the chance to play for Coach Z again.

"My senior year in 1978, Coach Z came back to coach the team and we had a great year, finishing 18-4. We were the last Big 10 baseball champs ever as the league disbanded the following year. I was never the big wheel on either one of these teams but Coach Zanfini equal and always tried to maintain

playing baseball for Belleville High School. That is why I think he was so successful as a coach because he had the respect of his players. We loved playing for him, and it showed in his great success."

Zanfini has, in essence, taught for two generations.

"I look back at the early days, and people like (Herman) "Jitty" Wische, Harry Farina, Carl Corino, Joe D'Ambola and John Senesky, and remember with great fondness working with those guys," Zanfini said. "But now, I can say I'm friends with a lot of teachers who are half my age. I've really come to respect Wayne Demakoff as a (Belleville High) teacher and football coach (at Wayne Hills). Teachers today like Chuck Martin are also good friends. It's a fraternity, in so many ways."

Zanfini recalls Wische coming to the Junior High one day to talk to him.

"I figured Jitty was there to yell at me, because he was always on us young teachers back then," Zanfini said with a laugh. "But instead, he asked me if I wanted to be the clock operator at varsity basketball games. He said it was easy, and that he could use my help."

Zanfini has been operating the clock at Belleville sporting events for 37 years now.

"I've seen some pretty good games while doing the clock," Zanfini said. "I think back to those days when Abdel Anderson was playing basketball at Belleville. The gym was packed every game. There was so much school spirit then."

Zanfini's generosity is often unnoticed. In 1982, Cuzzi, wanted to attend umpire school, but didn't have enough money.

"He called me and said he needed to borrow \$500 to go to umpire school," Zanfini said. "All I said was do you need the money in a check, or cash? He was really determined to make a go of it, and I wanted to help him."

It might have been the best \$500 ever spent. In 1999, Cuzzi was named a Major League umpire. He has worked the National League Divisional series twice, and in 2005, the National League Championship series.

"Few people know that it was George who loaned me the money to go to umpire school," Cuzzi said. for some of the seniors on that "To this day, he remains one of my

Rocco Constantino, a Belleville at Bloomfield College, recalls Zanfini's knack for trivia.

"The thing I remember most about him was that he was always ready with some kind of sports trivia or sports story for us any time we saw him," Constantino said. "My friends and I always sat together in lunch and we'd call him over and ask for some baseball trivia questions. He would give us

a question or two to figure out and it would keep us thinking the rest of the day. He was one of those people that even if you didn't have him as a teacher, he was such a visible part of the BHS landscape that he had a great impact on everybody around him. I also remember that (being such a big Rick Pitino and Kentucky basketball fan) he would sing "My Old Kentucky Home" any time you'd ask him to, whether he was on hall duty or in the classroom."

Constantino's brother, Danny, also praised Zanfini.

"As a player, I did not have an opportunity to know Mr. Zanfini, the coach," Danny Constantino said. However, I consider myself lucky to know Mr. Zanfini, the teacher and friend. After high school, whenever I saw Z, he was always interested to know how I was doing and how the rest of my family was doing, as well. When I was coaching American Legion baseball, Mr. Zanfini was coaching the high school team with Alan Frank. I learned a lot from him, many things that I used in coaching, and more importantly, in life, and I'd like to thank him for that."

Don Roll, a 1978 graduate of Belleville High, is today the Athletic Director at Paramus High School. His admiration for Zanfini is unquestioned.

"I was fortunate to work with George for 13 years," Roll said. "He's a true professional. George was my seventh and eighth grade history teacher at the middle school. You wanted to be in George's class because he made each section very interesting. If I didn't go into Physical Education, History probably would have been my major. I also coached freshman baseball for George when he came back as head coach (in 1987). George had so much knowledge about baseball you just tried to absorb everything that he said. He had a great year with that team winning the NNJIL. During my (boys basketball) coaching days at Belleville, George did the clock and was always positive in what he said about my teams."

Zanfini's first foray into coaching was an assistant freshman football coach to John Senesky in the fall of 1968

"I drove George nuts that first year," Senesky said recently. "I would keep practicing and prac-ticing, and George would say, 'John, they're going to fade out. I think it's enough for one day.' And he was right. I really learned a lot from him as a young coach. I guess we both did pretty good job in those days. That first freshman team was undefeated. George and I really worked well together. I'm so happy for him that he's retiring in good health. He deserves all the accolades?

Last week, Zanfini attended the Clifton-Bloomfield softball game at Bloomfield for the North Jersey, Section 1, Group 4 championship. His main reason for being there was that Clifton's starting pitcher, Deanna Giordano, is the daughter of a former player for Zanfini, Bobby Giordano, who starred on that '76 team.

"When I heard his daughter

was playing for Clifton, I had to go," Zanfini said. "I had a chance to see Bobby after the game, and it was really nice. Bobby's wife (the former Maria Nardone, also a Belleville graduate) looked great, too. That's what it's all about, seeing kids you coached and taught doing well today. It could be 41 years ago, or a kid who graduated last year. It's still the same."

Zanfini often said he'd know when it was time to retire.

"Someone once told me that I would just know when it's time, and this year, I realized it was time to move on," Zanfini said. "For 33 years, I worked in room 114 at the high school. There are so many memories there, and I'll never forget all the great kids and teachers who have been a part of my life as a teacher. As a coach, there were so many good players, I couldn't name them all, but they know how I feel about them. Kids like Danny Borgo, Fazzini, Michael Nicosia, Bobby Brave, Coco, Chipper Biafore, Dean Campana and so many others."

Next Wednesday, Žanfini will be honored at his retirement dinner at the Chandelier.

"I think it's a combination of dinner and a roast," Zanfini said. "I don't know what to expect, but I'm sure, with the characters that will be there, it will be something else?

There should lots of laughs and I'm sure a few tears shed, for the man known to most simply as Z.

"I think when you talk about George, the word respect comes up right away," Alan Frank said. "We were brought up by our parents to respect teachers, and it was easy to respect Z. He was a big brother to a lot of us from the class of '73.

As for me, I just want to say, thank you, George, for all the good times. And I know there will be plenty of good times ahead. You might be retiring from teaching, but you're a Belleville staple, a man with character (in addition to being a character), honesty and integrity, and someone who has taught me so much about life and sports.

There have been times when I wrote a column that George didn't like. "You're better than that," George would say to me in my younger days of writing if he didn't like a particular way I expressed something. But on the flip side, he would be the first to say he liked a story, or column that I wrote, as well.

So, here's my toast to Z. The Man. The Legend. Good luck in the next phase of your life.





## Carrots, sticks to be used in spurring more recycling

The printing of a new recycling calendar for all residents again sparked talk of improving the amount of recycling being done in the township. One resident took the township to task for not doing a good job of recycling its own cardboard at a recent council meeting.

Township Manager Victor Can-ning said of recycling, "There are still glitches. The biggest obstacle is citizens not recycling. We're hoping that the newsletter helps."

Stricter enforcement of the recycling ordinance also may be neces-

and residents will be summonsed under the ordinance," Canning said. "We have fallen off the wagon. People need to know they will pay far more in fines than the energy needed to recycle."

Starting in July, the township plans to strictly enforce recycling laws

"This is an educational tool, for residents to know that if they take time out to recycle, it will save tax dollars," he said in a separate interview on June 1.

He said residents need to made aware that recycling will help them financially.

"Recycling benefits taxpayers," Canning said. "It takes things out of the garbage stream, so we pay less in tipping fees."

He said the less the township pays in tonnage, the better, with tipping fees currently at about \$78 per ton.

"With cardboard, we actually get money back," Canning said. "Start multiplying all that by the 15,000 or so residential, commercial and retail addresses in town, and it can be significant."

At the earlier council meeting, he paraphrased President John F. Kennedy, saying that residents are always asking what the govern-ment can do for them, when they should ask what they can do for their government.

Former commissioner Vincent Frantantoni said recycling was more effective during his time in office.

"You're trying to lead by example, but you pile cardboard out by the garbage, every garbage day," Frantantoni said. "How do you expect residents to comply when you do this?"

He passed around a photo showing cardboard put out with regular trash.

Canning said the employee responsible for that cardboard was reprimanded, and that residents shouldn't lose sight of the benefits of recycling.

Ward Councilman Second Steven Rovell, who has been calling for better recycling for months, again started the dialogue at the recent council meeting.

Council members have renewed their call for residents, especially those in apartments, to become involved in the township's recycling program, while Canning has repeatedly said the recycling program needs to be brought back up to what it can be.

sary, he said. "We will have spot inspections, new employee has been put in charge of the recycling program.

He said the whole program has weakened, and he is trying to reinvigorate the program.

First Ward Councilwoman Marie Strumolo Burke has continued to question why the many apartments in town are not being compelled to recycle.

Burke said that the town is losing a lot of money available to the township for recycling paper, glass and plastic.

Canning said that with the apartments, each was supposed to get a Dumpster, and pay a small fee for the costs.

The more that residents recycle, officials say, the more that the township will save in garbage hauling costs and the more money Belleville will receive from recycling tonnage.

Rovell and Burke both implored residents to take recycling seriously at a previous meeting.

Rovell said previously that when it comes to recycling tonnage, by not recycling, the township pays more in hauling costs and he wanted to heighten residents' awareness.

He said apartment building complexes like Valley Crest need to join private residences in recycling.

Burke said previously that she brought up the need for more recycling with the previous administration, which included former township manager Mauro Tucci, and continues to push for it now.

She said there are a lot of apartments in her ward, including those on Newark Avenue and Cuozzo Street, and more needs to be done, like sending a newsletter to every resident.



In Belleville, newspapers are collected one week and glass bottles and aluminum cans are collected the next week.

According to the 2005 Recy-Tonnage Report for cling Belleville, the Mandatory Source Separation Act has established a

recycling fund from which tonnage grants may be made to municipalities to encourage local source separation and recycling programs.

The "intent and the spirit" of the act is the use the tonnage grants to develop new municipal recycling programs and continue to expand existing programs, the report states.

The state Department of Envi-

ronmental Protection has executed recycling regulations for towns to implement for mandatory source separation and recycling and imposes certain requirements as a condition for applying for tonnage grants. The conditions include making and keeping accurate, verifiable records of materials collected and claimed by the municipality, according to the report.



## Pentecost and the Gift of the Holy Spirit

Pentecost celebrates the outpouring of the Holy Spirit calling for God's shalom. The Feast of Pentecost, or the Greek term for the Jewish Feast of Weeks, is observed fifty days (seven weeks after Passover). It is also called "The Feast of Harvest" (Exodus 23:16) for presenting the sheaf of the first fruit during the Passover celebration. It marked the beginning of the offering of the first fruit. This was an introduction to the harvest and gave freedom to put in the sickle, so that the finishing of the harvest could be celebrated at this great feast.

(Passover, Pentecost, Tabernacle) that was to be kept with a sacred assembly on which day Israel was to meet God and one another at Jerusalem. This annual feast was instituted in remembrance of the giving of the law on Mount Sinai in the fiftieth day after the Israelites came out of Egypt. At this feast the Jews offered leavened loaves. At the Feast of Passover they ate unleavened bread as an acknowledgment of God's goodness to them and with sheep of the first fruit, they offered only one lamb for

offered for the burnt offering, giving glory to God, the Lord of the harvest.

In the New Testament, Pentecost is one of the three major Christian celebrations (Christmas, Easter, Pentecost). The Scripture tells us that Paul preached the first Pentecost sermon and three thousand people were converted to the faith. The climax and perfecting of the Feast of Pentecost was the pouring out of the Holy Spirit on the apostle (Acts 2:1-13), in which the law of faith was given and the

the gift of the Holy Spirit to the church occurred on this day, Christians recognize the meaning of Pentecost in terms of this event.

The Holy Spirit birthed the fellowship of Jesus' followers (the Church) on that first Pentecost; therefore, the Church is not the building, it is the bringing together of people to share Jesus' love. 

## Winners of national poetry contest named in DC Naja Selby, a junior at Newark every state and the District of Theatre Alliance, Discover Jersey

Arts High, was among the 12 finalists selected in the 2nd Annual national Poetry Out Loud competition held last month in Washing-Sponsored by the ton, DC. National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) and the Poetry Foundation, the Poetry Out Loud National Recitation Contest involved more than 1,000 high schools and more than 100,000 high school students across the country in this year's competition. Fifty-one state champions participated in the Poetry Out Loud national finals to compete for the national title and more than \$60,000 in scholarships and prizes.

As a national finalist, Selby received a \$1,000 scholarship prize and two roundtrip airline tickets courtesy of Southwest Airlines. The finalists' schools received \$500 each for the purchase of poetry books. The national champion, Amanda Fernandez, from the Duke Ellington School of the Arts in the District of Columbia received a \$20,000 scholarship prize. The second-place winner, Branden Emanual Wellington of Broad Ripple High School in Indianapolis, Indiana, received a \$10,000 scholarship prize, and Alanna Rivera, of Washington-Lee High School in Arlington, Virginia, the third place winner won a \$5,000 scholarship. The other finalists include Elizabeth Ann McCormick of West Virginia, Robi Mahan of Illinois, Dean Muir of Kentucky, Shuqiao Song of Nebraska, Joshua Kelly of Montana, Fantasia Lonjose of New Mexico, Janessa Nickell of South Dakota, and Amanda E. Fujiki of Utah.

During the two-day event held on April 30th and May 1st, 51 Poetry Out Loud champions from

Columbia, competed in three semifinal rounds based on geographic region. Selby and eleven other state champions advanced to finals. Judges evaluated student performances on criteria including physical presence, articulation, evidence of understanding, level of difficulty, and accuracy. Students performed poems from the *Poetry* Out Loud print and online anthologies (http://www.poetryoutloud.org/). During the national competition, Selby recited "Chicago" by Carl Sandberg and "Ma Rainey" by Sterling A. Brown.

Poetry Out Loud seeks to foster the next generation of literary readers by building on the resurgence of poetry as an oral art form, as seen in the slam poetry movement and the popularity of rap music among youth. Through Poetry Out Loud, students can master public speaking skills, build self-confidence, and learn about their literary heritage. Now in its second year of national competition, Poetry Out Loud has inspired thousands of high school students to discover classic and contemporary poetry.

The National Endowment of the Arts (NEA) and the Poetry Foundation launched the Poetry Out Loud nationwide in 2006. This year is the first year that the New Jersey's Poetry Out Loud program was launched statewide. Cosponsored by the New Jersey State Council on the Arts and Playwrights Theatre of NJ, this year over 3,000 students in 34 New Jersey high schools competed, 10 of them 3-day poetry and 3-day performing arts residencies incorporated to achieve an even deeper experience in the art of writing and presenting poetry. Other program partners included the New Jersey

Arts and NJN. Three regional competitions were held that sent two champions each to the state  $\exists$ finals on March 22, 2007 at NJN Studios in Trenton. There Naja Selby was selected as New Jersey's State Champion winning a stipend for herself and her school and an all expense paid trip to the National Finals.

The National Finals are the culmination of efforts by many partners. The NEA and the Poetry Foundation have contributed support for administration of the program, educational materials, and prizes for both the state and National Finals. Each State Arts Agency implemented the program in high schools in each state, often in collaboration with local arts organizations. The Poetry Out Loud National Finals was administered by the Mid Atlantic Arts Foundation. Additional support for the 2007 National Finals has been provided by Southwest Airlines.
