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

All applicants for passports must Applicant must have 3 forms of appear in person. To obtain a passport you must have an original or identifying witness. Parents applycertified copy of Birth Certificate with raised seal and date of filing from City or State of birth or Original Naturalization Certificate or a previous U.S. Passport. Children 15 years or younger renewing a US Passport must submit both the passport and Original or Certified Birth Certificate showing the full names of both parents.

Applicants who are 16-18 years old can appear with only one parent unless they have a valid permanent driver's license. Children 15 and under must have both parents present to execute a passport application. If only one parent is available, proof must be submitted that the applying parent has sole authority or consent to obtain the passport.

ID such as a Driver's License, Government Employee ID card, or previous US Passport not more than 15 years of from date of issuance. All applicants must have a social security number. If none of the listed required identification is available, an identifying witness, who has known he/she for at least two years, must accompany the applicant. 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Belleville joining a global recycling effort

Belleville is teaming up with Planet Aid to endorse recycling around the township and to help donate materials to areas around the world in need.

The recent partnership will bring textile recycling to Belleville, a problem that plagues many parts of the country and results in usable products going to waste. According to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), only 20 percent of textile waste is recycled, leaving 80 percent to go to landfills or incinerators, which contribute to global warming and pollution. On average, one person can contribute as much as 65 pounds of textile waste per year, giving Belleville an average of 2 million pounds of textile waste on an average year.

To combat this problem, Planet Aid has created a pick-up system for textile recycling. Residents need

only call the Planet Aid office in asters. Our team members travel which will increase through our places around the country? Clifton and organize their textiles for easy pick-up. "We have been doing this for 11 years and believe me, it works," said Planet Aid manager Phillip Perry. "The process is usually slow to start, but once we get the public's attention and word starts to spread it can get overwhelming and we can become inundated with calls. We will start with a call service but I think that after a couple weeks or a month or so we will transition over to a curbside pickup system where we will designate one or two days a month to pickup reusable textiles."

The textiles that are picked up are then sold all around the world and the proceeds are sent to charitable foundations that serve to help victims across seas that are suffering from hunger, natural disasters, disease and wars. "We send funds to Africa to help with AIDS research, we help relocate families that have been hit by natural dis-

across the world to promote education and healthier lifestyles. I myself am going to Africa to teach education strategies," said Perry.

The recycling done not only helps Planet Aid fund charitable foundations, it also helps them heal the planet. In 2006 alone, Planet Aid recovered 72 million pounds of clothes and emissions from textile factories were reduced to the equivalent of keeping over 16,000 cars off the roads for a year. Planet Aid was also directly responsible for the creation of 19,000 jobs and saved American taxpayers \$2.4 million in solid waste disposal fees. "It is a win-win situation for everyone involved on a global level and a local level. Locally, we will help the township become more proactive with recycling and can generate funds for the township because towns receive payments for their recycled tonnage at the end of the year, on like it has in so many other

program. Globally, Belleville will be helping our mission to clean the planet and reuse materials that would normally go to waste," said

The textiles that Planet Aid accepts include clothes, shoes, linens, towels, curtains, purses, soft and hardcover books, small toys and laptops. "I think this is a great initiative by the town. People these days are so wasteful it is embarrassing. If they don't like something anymore they just throw it away, not thinking that someone else could very easily use that. We have people on the streets without food or shelter and I see people literally throwing out jackets, sweaters and anything else you can think of," said Eugene Torres, a Clifton resident. "Belleville coming onboard with this initiative is a great thing. Once people see how helpful this is I think it will catch

Currently, Planet Aid is sta-tioned in 19 different states and is in several towns around New Jer-sey. Their partnership with Belleville began last week and residents can now call the Clifton office at 973-779-1088 to schedule a pick-up.



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



at Resorts Theater egendary singer, songwriter and producer Neil Sedaka plays a single concert at Resorts Superstar Theater on Saturday night. The

Despite the tumult in American pop music throughout the "British Invasion" of the '60s, Sedaka actually thrived. His songwriting talents contributed significantly to the careers of many legendary singers and bands. Tom Jones, The Monkees and The Fifth Dimension are just some of those who recorded Sedaka's songs. Today his extensive catalog remains enduringly fresh, with songs that have marked the lives of two generations. In addition to his continuing tour schedule, Sedaka is currently working on a new Broadway musical. Showtime at Resorts is 8 p.m. Saturday, and tickets are \$55.



Fire officials from the Essex nearly 8,000 home fires involve heater. County area suggest taking a good look around your home. There's a strong chance flammable materials are lurking in many areas.

It's important to store and use them properly to avoid the risk of

Fire officials urge caution when using and storing gasoline, a flammable liquid that gives off vapors easily ignited with a spark or small flame. Gasoline should only be used as a motor fuel, never as a degreaser or cleaning solvent. Using gasoline for any purpose other than as a motor fuel is

Essex County fire officials point out that commonly used liquids such as lacquer thinners, denatured alcohol and other solvents which are often stored in basement workshops, can be easily ignited by just too dangerous, say fire offi- a nearby furnace or hot water materials.

These liquids should be stored in their original containers, tightly capped and used far away from sparks or open flames. Other liquids, including paint thinners, mineral spirits and kerosene should be treated with the same respect.

Do not store rags used with oils or paint thinners. Hang them outside to dry, then dispose of them properly. Officials say you should become familiar with the hazardous materials around your home to protect you and your family. Call your local fire department if you have questions about any



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Despite obstacles, work continues on Disabled American Vets building

The Disabled American Veterans group of Belleville and Nutley refuses to accept defeat in its attempt to build a new headquar-

This week, construction continues on the new structure, even as the group readies itself for a court date to recover lost funds and/or property from a man who veterans allege may have stolen as much as \$300,000 from the group.

Former Commander Nunzie Cupo pleaded guilty in Superior Court last Aug. 3 to third degree theft, which means he stole up to \$75,000 from the DAV. He was given four years' probation and must make financial restitution to the DAV under the sentence from Superior Court Judge John Kennedy handed down last Nov. 15. As part of Cupo's plea agreement, he has agreed to pay back another \$85,000.

Ioseph Fornarotto, a Belleville

its civil suit against Cupo, where it will seek to repossess any properties Cupo owns. For now, Cupo is paying back \$500 a month, he said, but the veterans are looking to increase the amount to \$1,000 per month.

Fornarotto said of the situation, "The building is 50 percent complete on the outside. We will continue to build. We will go to court April 7 to recover monies owed to us. We didn't give up."

For newly disabled veterans as well as older vets seeking to become part of the group, Fornarotto reminded all that the 570-member group meets monthly. Each month they gather at 11 a.m. on the first Monday of each month at the Senior Citizens Building at the corner of Franklin Avenue and Mill Street in Belleville.



Fornarotto and his fellow officers are looking to prove that Cupo stole additional monies, and intend to argue in civil court to the judge that they cannot afford for his payment to be stretched out over a long period of many months.

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



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

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BOE candidates debate the issues last week

Speaking before a sparse crowd that virtually disappeared before the evening ended, the four candidates vying for two, three-year Board of Education trustee seats answered a wide variety of questions at the Consolidated Home and School Association's annual candidates night held March 26. Some questions focused on one candidates' ethnicity and others broached controversial topics like the sale of the former School #1, adding all-day kindergarten and the possibility of requiring school uniforms.

Challengers Bill Freda, Barbara Lozaw, Joseph Longo and Ralpn Vellon fielded the myriad of guestions to an audience that topped out in the neighborhood of 30 to 40 audience members and dwindled to less than 15 by the time the candidates gave their closing state-

School board attorney Frank Pomaco advised the district against taping the forum for broadcast on the local cable access channel, according to officials.

Candidate Ralph Vellon, who is of Hispanic heritage, was questioned about his desire to help citizens of all ethnic backgrounds, and about mailing out campaign fliers in Spanish.

varied ethnicity was about assisting with specific problems, not about their ethnic backgrounds.

For example, a Filipino mom might be dealing with a language barrier, but it might just as easily be a single mother dealing with how to care for a young child in half-day kindergarten, where they cannot afford day care for the other half of the day.

"We all had parents who had to deal with obstacles," Vellon said. "I've attained a certain level of success, but there are members of our town who are still fighting for their place, and with the language barrier they often feel left out."

Later on, the question of Spanish language mailings broached to Vellon.

He said that such mailings were just "another form of communication" meant to reach all voters in

When the questions were not focused on ethnicity, many of the expected questions on controversial topics were answered by all four candidates.

On School #1, a disused school building now up for sale, Longo said that selling off real property is very difficult since Belleville is very landlocked, and his initial reaction was to hold on to it for town purposes

"But I don't even know if the zones allow for another school," Longo said. "We're in fairly dire things like fix roofs, but its like selling of your house to pay off your credit cards, you end up with no house and no money."

He said since the school sale may go through, he would like to see the \$2.4 million go toward refurbishing the oldest school in town, Silver Lake's School 4.

Freda said he has gone back and forth on the issue "six times," but the reality is that the school would

have to be torn down and rebuilt, which would be cost prohibitive.

'We're faced with a situation where the rest of the infrastructure is very old, averaging about 80 years, so we need to apply the money from the sale to fixing and maintaining the existing infrastructure," Freda said.

Lozaw said the school has been vacant a very long time, and that the money from the sale should be used for the other schools, especially School #4, which is in dire need of repair.

"Land is hard to find, but the monies needed to repair the school would exceed what we could afford. It is an eyesore that should be condemned. This was a responsible decision. The money should be used directly for repairs to other schools," Lozaw said.

Vellon said he was not sure he Vellon said helping residents of fundamentally agreed with the decision to sell the school, since land is very valuable, should not be given up and \$2.4 million is solely a one time cash influx.

> We have to look at what this gives us, how much we gain," Vellon said. "I think they mean well, but the amount of value is not adequate. The land belongs to the town, the residents, and the children - perhaps even our grandchildren and great-grandchildren."

> On all day kindergarten, Freda said if the state officially mandated the program, they would be forced to pay for it, but starting it now puts the district "between a rock and a hard place."

> 'It would be nice, but our budget is literally teetering – we're selling School #1 for cash," Freda said. "We can't keep dipping into the well. This year's budget is flat, but next year we could really be faced with a dilemma if the funding is

> Lozaw said she believed Belleville should have all day kindergarten, since many surrounding districts already have it.

> "It's not day care," Lozaw said. "It's an important process in a child's development. Children have to learn things like discovery before they start actually learning. It would be best if the state mandated it the program. We have to figure out how to get them to pay for it."

Vellon said a lot of districts have financial straits, and we need to do all-day kindergarten, many parents are "crying" for it, that not having it impacts single parents, and as a district the board should be focusing on the needs of children and parents.

"The state has asked us to do this," Vellon said, and he believes there will be no problem with funding after next year, since the district stands to gain from com-

mitment of Gov. Jon Corzine, who sees the program as important.

"This is the future," Vellon said. "This is what we're here for. We may have to tighten our belts, but next year we must continue to nurture our children. It's time to move on."

Longo said the reasoning behind adding all-day kinder-garten is that the state is moving toward mandating pre-kindergarten programs. He joked that Corzine will have "a toll booth at Greylock Parkway and Washington Avenue if he has his way."

"I don't think this is a responsible move, to start this not knowing what the future will be," Longo said. "We're talking about cutting co-curricular clubs, sports. We'll put it in, get everybody used to it, and then hope it does not have to be cut. I hate to be so blunt, but I think it would be tough if we have to cut the budget next year?

On school uniforms, Lozaw said she thought they were a good idea, but would be harder to implement in high school.

"It takes away the peer pressure about how to dress," Lozaw said. "And nowadays it is a safety issue. People say it's not a problem in my backyard, but it would help to be able to identify a student trying to enter our schools who is not from here?

Vellon said the need for uniforms was a big concern at School #5 where one of his children now attends school and another will soon.

"I think it will improve safety

and have an economic impact, and will reduce the financial burden on families," Vellon said. "The parents pushed for it."

Longo said that conceptually he thinks it is a good idea, because it will take away the competitiveness regarding clothing.

"I hope it is enforced," Longo said. "I don't know if it can be."

Freda said most adults have to dress appropriately at work, and he would entertain the possibility of a pilot program at the elementary school level.

"At the high school, kids are so competitive," Freda said. "I think we could minimize the high school as a sore spot if we introduce it at the elementary schools. It would not be cut in stone, but let's try it."

On other topics, all four candidates agreed that keeping special education students in district saves money, but Lozaw said each child must be judged on a case-by-case basis and Vellon said the programs fall short in many areas.

As for teachers contributing to paying for insurance premiums, all said they would like to see such contributions but that the matter is part of collective bargaining among the board and the teachers and must be addressed in the next contract.

Lozaw and Freda said teachers should pay a portion, while Vellon said the matter must be reviewed and evaluated and Longo said Belleville must remain competitive with other districts to attract the best teachers.

The election takes place April 15, when voters will also be called upon to approve the \$55 million school budget that contains no tax increase.
