Court: Most GOP candidates can run

Belleville's Republican Party took a turn for one side, with the current chairwoman regaining six candidates for the June 3 primary but admitting she might be unseated by the challenge from a longtime former chairman. The contentious moves will likely last until Republican County Committee members are elected in the primary election.

Representatives for one slate of candidates for county committee sued the township clerk because a representative for the other faction of candidates had successfully challenged the qualifications of eight of the rival's candidates.

Now, a Superior Court judge has restored six of the eight committee nominees, and the last two will run as absentee write-in candidates, according to one of the six nominees restored.

Richard Yanuzzi, former GOP chair, challenged the petitions of the eight candidates, and Township Clerk Kelly Cavanaugh upheld all of the challenges, which would have disqualified all eight candi-

The current Republican leader, Antoinette "Toni" Marone, took part in a lawsuit against the town clerk in Superior Court in a case decided April 23. The decision allows six of the eight candidates to correct mistakes made to their petitions, so they will be allowed to appear on the June 3 primary ballot. Plaintiffs in the case said that it is routine for errors to be found in petitions, but state election law generally requires municipal clerks to allow for sufficient time to correct them, the lawsuit states.

majority of the 52 county committee slots in June will have control of the local Republican party.

Marone, the current GOP chairwoman, admitted that Yanuzzi's attempt to have former mayor Angie Paserchia elected chairman following the primary may succeed, but her group will battle until the outcome is decided.

Yanuzzi said he has been challenging petitions for many years "and I always knock off a few, because they're always sloppy. But there's election law that evolves, and it has allowed more and more to get corrected, because they have become more and more lenient. It's designed to be interpreted liberally and give them the benefit of the doubt?

Andrew Bloschak, one of the eight challenged committee nominees, said he has known Yanuzzi for 20 years, and Yanuzzi was once his son's godfather, but the two have since fallen out and Bloschak now strongly opposes Yanuzzi's influence with the local GOP.

He called the April 23 court decision "a major defeat" for Yanuzzi. Bloschak questioned the GOP qualifications of some of the committee members being run by Yanuzzi, and Yanuzzi countered that among his candidates are former councilman Michael Melham, former school board member Judy Piscatowski and senior citizen and longtime outspoken town critic Florence Pentol.

"He (Yanuzzi) is not going to take over," Bloschak said. "He's vilified in this town by the 80 to 85 percent of people who know him. He's running out of friends."

Yanuzzi continues to accuse Whichever faction wins the Marone and Bloschak of incompetence, and said that three committee slots are unfilled with candidates by the Marone faction in the First Ward, and two each in Wards Two, Three and Four.

Belleville keeps getting caught in court battles

Once again Belleville has gone to court, and the outcome was for the most part not in the township's

A slate of Republican candidates sued the township clerk recently because that slate was being excluded from the June 3 ballot. The clerk excluded the candidates for defects in their petitions. The GOP candidates sued because, under state law, they were entitled to try and correct those defects, a chance they say was denied

The township scored a partial victory when a court ruled that three candidates would be excluded, but another six candidates are to remain on the ballot. But one has to wonder if a court appearance could have been avoided alto-

gether if candidates were just given the chance, board battle share another common thread too: as was their right, to fix the problems themselves; it was entirely possible that the same outcome could have been the result.

This is hardly the first time Belleville has gone to court with an idiosyncratic case. Last year the township tried to upend municipal law in an attempt to remove several members of the library board, an attempt that was ultimately unsuccessful. The township, meanwhile, has racked up significant legal fees in other cases as well. The onus is on the township council to ensure that Belleville only goes to court when the circumstances warrant it and when all other options have been exhausted.

The GOP certification fight and the library

both times, prominent political player Richard Yanuzzi had a significant role. Yanuzzi has aided many local politicians over the years, and his critics say he has won considerable influence as a result. One has to wonder if some of these ill;-conceived legal actions are being pursued not on their merits but simply because an influential player in local politics wants it that



For the first in recent memory, the two newest school board memorare elected board president Monday For the first in recent memory, ₩ bers were elected board president and vice president at Monday gnight's board of education reorga-Rnization meeting.

Joseph Longo, who tallied the ₹ most votes in the April 15 election,

and Bill Freda, his running mate who came in second, were elected president and vice president, respectively.

Longo's election was unanimous, while Freda received four votes for vice president, edging out school board member Carmen Bucco, who garnered three votes from among the seven-member

A stunned Longo said after leading his first board meeting, "I was surprised. This is very interesting." He did not elaborate, and left the meeting for a celebration open to all residents.

Freda spoke of how it was a "privilege" to be elected, and even more so to be elected vice president. He had nominated Bucco to be vice president.

In the vice presidential election, Bucco, along with board members Arlene Schor, outgoing board president William Villano, and outgoing vice president Vincent Strumolo, Jr. all supported Freda, while Freda, Bucco and Longo supported Bucco. Bucco said he was not at all disappointed to lose the vice presidency by one vote, and he fully supported Freda.

In earlier interviews, the new president and vice president talked about what they expected certain degree of change and new

their roles to be on the board, and did not speak about expecting to be leading the governing body.

Board president-elect Joseph Longo confessed surprise when he was chosen for the post this week. It is unusual for board newcomers to take the board's top spot.

And we have a chance to upgrade all of the technology. We don't want a situation where the students have better technology at home than we have in the schools. I think if we all work together, we can get some of these things tack-

Longo has resided in Belleville for 35 years. He has a son who graduated from BHS in 2005 and is now a corporal in the U.S. Marines, and a daughter who graduated in 2007. He is employed as an account executive for Offset Impressions Inc.

Freda has lived in Belleville 22 years, has a daughter who graduated from Belleville High School in 2003 and a son who graduated in 2006. He is the vice president of Pershing Technology Group in Florham Park with an information technology background.

The two defeated Barbara Lozaw and Ralph Vellon by more than 400 votes, while the school budget passed by just 45 votes, 739 to 676, despite containing a zero property tax increase. The budget includes all day kindergarten for the first time in Belleville, paid for by part of the \$4 million increase in state aid.


Cuomo came to be known as Cowboy. I guess we will never

We can't cut our school funding and we are at the bare minimum on the municipal level. I support Essex County Executive Joseph DiVincenzo's efforts to have the state take on the cost of the Essex County Prosecutor's Office. That is a burden that should not fall on the local residents?

Russo has also stated that he will forfeit half of the earned salary he would make if elected to Freeholder. "I pledge to donate half of my salary to charity, approximately \$15,000. I am doing this because I want people to know this is not about the money for me. I am looking to serve the people, not to be recognized," said Russo. "I ran for this position back in 1978 and lost by less than 50 votes on a recount. In that year I was going to be paid \$15,000 for my services so in recognition of that I will only take on that much money this time around if elected. I am not looking to be in office forever. I want to run for one term and then see where it takes me."

Owners say salacious billboard is coming down

A racy Bloomfield billboard that has angered residents may soon be removed.

The billboard – advertising Wet, a strip club on Belleville Avenue appeared last week, and caused a furor almost instantly.

Bloomfield Mayor Ray McCarthy said his office has been inundated with phone calls and e-mails from residents expressing outrage over the billboard, which sits near Brookside Park.

Steven Janosko, whose mother owns the billboard, said Wet has leased the billboard for one year, at a cost of \$1,000 per month. Richard Dickon contributed to Janosko, an assistant prosecutor this report. for Ocean County, said he didn't

believe the picture on the billboard was much more salacious than a Victoria's Secret advertisement. He added that he understands why some would prefer a different advertisement altogether.

Jonasko, who said he thinks residents are more upset about the name of the strip club than about the picture, said he is amenable to changing the billboard if another renter foots the bill.

"If I can interest someone else in leasing it, that would be fine and dandy," he said.

Thomas Verlingo, owner of Wet, The billboard originally featured said the billboard, which was erected twice and defaced twice, will not be placed a third time.

"We filed a couple of police reports, but we're taking it down," Verlingo said. "We don't want any trouble, and clearly the people don't want it there."







Recent research suggests that some high-risk individuals may benefit from taking their blood pressure medication at bedtime instead of in the morning. This simple timing switch may normalize blood pressure patterns among patients who are at extra risk from heart and kidney diseases. This finding is based on the fact that, in normal people, blood pressure dips by 10%-20% at night, probably to provide the arteries with some rest. For people with hypertension, those whose high blood pressure does not dip at night fare worse than other people with hypertension. Moreover, because heart and kidney disease fuel one another, those with chronic kidney disease are most prone to "non-dipping." Taking medications at night transformed nearly 90% of nondippers into dippers.
