Caputo should relinquish a position

Freeholder and Assemblyman Ralph Caputo has been a stalwart public servant throughout his lengthy career, and enjoys a well-deserved reputation for being responsive to his constituents. Nevertheless, holding two elected offices simultaneously is problematic and he should give one of his posts up.

As Caputo himself admits, other officials who have held two offices at the same time have been the object of scandal - namely, former Newark Mayor Sharpe James, recently convicted on corruption charges stemming from his activities while leading the state's largest city (the charges didn't have anything to do with his sey already enjoy a huge advantage, one that

activities in state government). But as Caputo also rightly points out, he himself has never been entangled in scandal, and there's no reason to believe he would be.

But dual office holding, as James demonstrated, can lead to abuse. A freeholder-Assemblyman like Caputo enjoys power on two levels of government. At each of those levels, the rules are structured so there are checks on the office holder's power. The system in place, however, did not have dual-office holders in mind.

There's also a fairness issue at play here. Incumbents for many elected offices in New Jerfew challengers can overcome. A challenger against Caputo for either of his offices would undoubtedly have an even tougher time because his constituencies - and therefore his name recognition and influence- overlap.

Addressing the question, there is now a law against dual-office holding, but one that contains a grandfather clause from which Caputo benefits. As fine and as conscientious a lawmaker as Caputo is, he should nevertheless adhere to the spirit of that law and relinquish one of his elected posts.







Area officials defend double-office holding

Is double-dipping always a bad policy for taxpayers?

One local lawmaker is a dual office holder while another has a paid public position with the county and state legislative seat, but both say their multiple roles help them better serve their hometowns and all of their constituents.

Gov. Jon Corzine signed into law last fall a ban on state lawmakers holding other elected posts like mayor, freeholder or municipal council member. While the Nutley official does not hold dual office, he does have a high profile, wellpaying public position in addition to serving Nutley in the state assembly, which leads to questions Department in charge of Emer- county, and by extension Nutley, to

of dual pensions, or "pension gency Management and co-chair stacking" as it is called. He offered of Homeland Security. proof that he has turned down all "perks" that he can legally reject.

The Belleville official points out that his salaries as assemblyman and freeholder do not constitute a large salary and he is definitely not pension stacking.
Frederick Scalera is a Nutley

native who serves the township along with several Bergen County municipalities as state assemblyman. He also recently gave up a \$100,000-plus position as Nutley's Deputy Fire Chief, the highest paid non-volunteer position in the fire department.

He traded that job in for a \$90,000-plus job as deputy director in the Essex County Sheriff's

He said his assembly position pays about \$49,000, and as a public employee, he is not allowed by law to give up all of his pensions, but after a meeting with officials he now has no pension from the

"There is nothing in the law that allows me to waive my pension on the state level," Scalera said. He has a 401K plan as part of his county emergency management and homeland security job.

"Homeland Security become my life," Scalera said of his decision to leave one public job for another, and he added that the new position allows him to broaden the scope of preparing the entire

Zanfini recalls a decade of excellence

(First in a two-part series)

George Zanfini might have coached his last game over 20 years ago, but the memories are still quite vivid for the beloved Belleville High School teacher and

Zanfini, 64, retired as a history teacher after 41 years last spring. A Belleville native, he's still a regular at Buccaneer sporting events, working the scoreboard during the fall and winter months and being a big fan in the spring.

On May 16, the varsity baseball field at Belleville High will be officially renamed in Zanfini's honor in what should be a very emotional night. The festivities will begin with a reception in the high school library at 6 p.m., followed by a walk to the high school field where the sign will be officially unveiled, around 6:30 p.m. Belleville High

starting at 7.

"I remember when (Councilman) Mike Nicosia announced at my retirement dinner last (June) that the field would be named after me," Zanfini said last week. "I was beyond stunned. I thought maybe he would say there would be a plaque in the dugout, or something like that, but to have the field named after me, that's unbelievable. I'm overwhelmed."

It was particularly appropriate that Nicosia made the announcement, since Zanfini considers him one of the best players to ever wear a Belleville High baseball uniform.

As Zanfini prepares for his big night, he's had the chance to look back at some great years as Belleville's head coach. He held that title from 1975-1982, and again in 1987. His record during that run was an incredible 156-59. He led his teams to two Big 10 championships in 1976 and '78 and an NNJIL title in '87. In 1981, Zanfini guided Belleville to its only Greater Newark Tournament crown when the Bucs defeated Glen Ridge, 10-4, in the title game.

"Ed was an incredible athlete and later a great coach at Belleville," Zanfini said of Berlinski, who had a marvelous athletic career at North Carolina State. "When Eddie's coaching career began to wind down, he was teaching gym at the junior high and I was a teacher there. We began talking and I told him if he decided to step down. I'd like the chance to be the baseball coach. Eddie had that season." a tremendous influence in my life. I always talked to him about coaching and he was a great help."

Zanfini replaced Charlie Travers as the varsity baseball coach after the 1974 season.

"I was a history teacher at the junior high from 1966 through 1974," Zanfini recalled. "It worked out well for me because I moved up to the high school as a teacher after the (1973-74) school year and

same time."

In Zanfini's first year as head coach in 1975, the Bellboys starred the season 9-1, but struggled down the stretch and finished 14-10.

'That first year was one of transition," Zanfini said. "There were some good seniors there who had played for Charlie for three years, but I had coached them as freshmen. It's tough taking over a varsity program with seniors who have been used to a different coach. But kids like Victor Pasquariello, Vinnie DeNotaris, Joe Panalone, Steve Gerard and Louis Grasso were tremendous. That year, we lost (junior pitcher) Ricky Loma to a broken finger and that was a big hit in the middle of

There was also the epic contest on May 2, 1975, when Belleville, riding a nine-game winning streak, hosted the state's number one team, Irvington. The game went 14 innings before Belleville lost a 4-1 heartbreaker. Greg Petite pitched the first 11 innings for Belleville and was marvelous. The game clearly wore both teams out. 

Newcomer seeks Pascrell's Congressional seat

Improve air quality indoors

When the topic of improving air quality comes up, much of the discussion focuses on how to improve outdoor air quality. Solutions such as reducing harmful emissions from vehicles and properly disposing of certain household items are easy ways to improve outdoor air quality.

But what about improving air quality indoors? Ways of doing that are not discussed nearly as much, as it's common to overlook indoor air quality. ■ Clean the blinds. Blinds are common gathering places for dust, which tends to gather on the outside-facing part of the blind, making it seem as though the blinds are clean when they are not. Clean blinds weekly using the same microfiber dusters used to remove dust from the rest of the house.

■ Bathe and brush pets regularly. Pets contribute mightily to poor indoor air quality, particularly pets that stay outdoors while their owners are away. Pets' coats are often loaded with dirt and dander (skin flakes in animal fur or hair).

Particle pollution is dangerous

According to the American Lung Association (ALA), particle pollution is the most dangerous and deadly of widespread outdoor air pollutants. Formerly known as soot, particle pollution itself is not visible, though the haze it creates when the sunlight hits it is visible. Thorough school sweep meant to send message

A recent sweep of high school lockers was meant as a deterrent and as part of a lesson in drug resistance, according to school and police officials.

On April 16, a limited facility inspection of Belleville High School took place, and the initiative included the inspection of student lockers.

This inspection was not in response to any specific problem in

Edward Kliszus, Superintendent of Schools.

"This initiative was planned as part of our ongoing efforts to ensure an optimum and safe learning environment for our students," he said.

The inspection was conducted in cooperation with local and county law enforcement authorities, in accordance with school policy, and guidelines as set forth by law enforcement officials. Kliszus said.

Nothing illegal was found in the

search, but if the inspection team had found something in a student's locker that warranted parental attention, those parents were advised as soon as possible and informed of what steps were to be taken to address any concerns, Kliszus said.

Kliszus said "The goal of our parents, students, and school community is to continue maintaining a safe and secure learning environment for every student attending Belleville High School."

*Woman recalls childhood spent at TB hospital

For anyone passing the imposing-looking building at the back of 닮the great lawn near Belleville and

Franklin avenues, the structure's Shistory may be a mystery. While Some may know its recent history ∞as a geriatric hospital and later in ₹the 1990s as a cancer research cen-₹ter, it was once a respected refuge for those suffering from contagious 2 diseases.

Phyllis Smith recalled her childhood in Belleville, when her father was a doctor at what was known as "the isolation hospital" in the 1930s and 1940s, but doesn't remember things in a negative way, but rather as a fun place to be a kid.

"We had a lot of people who stayed there with tuberculosis, and they were permanent residents,"

Even though there were residents there with every type of contagious disease, from TB to polio, from measles and chicken pox to scarlet fever and diphtheria, the hospital grounds was still a place for play time.

"We played there," Smith said. "They had a tunnel to and from the hospitals, and we used to roller skate, and bike. The tunnels were all attached to the hospitals. It was a fun place, particularly the tunnels on a rainy day."

On one of the top floors of the main hospital there was a pool table on which the doctors played, so there was always time set aside for recreation, even in the midst of dealing with terrible diseases, Smith said.

In addition to the tunnels, there were tennis courts, swings and Smith recalled. "They used to all go playground equipment." Most outside of growing up around con-

poignantly, Smith would interact -

"The kids would sit by the windows, and I used to talk to them," she said.

While Smith was enjoying all the innocent freedoms of childhood, her father was doing very important work.

Her dad was Dr. Ellis Smith, and he began his career treating polio patients in Minneapolis.

"He was a specialist in polo before the Sabin and Salk vaccines," Smith said. "A lot of doctors did that back then. With all these diseases, even the measles, you went to the hospital. The back end of the property that now is condos was the original site. Then they built the new hospital. The old hospital's gone now, but time moves on."

She was born at the hospital in May 1932, so she knew nothing

Her father at a distance - with young patients. had grown up in Oklahoma and met her mother, from Nova Scotia, in the unexpected locale of Jersey City, when he was a doctor and she a nurse at Christ Hospital. He took over the Belleville hospital right before Smith's birth, and did not retire until 1960.

The family resided in the brick house on the corner of the property that has recently been renovated, much to Smith's approval.

Still, while her life began in the throes of the Great Depression, she said she had no complaints grow-

"I was a kid," Smith said. "I didn't know any better. I know I didn't have any memories of being

There were signs of the difficult times that did interrupt her idyllic childhood that she know understands.

"I remember there was a guy with a horse who would come around," Smith said. "He would visit homes, and take our picture with the horse to make money."

Then came World War II, and her father was not sent to the front lines because he was deemed too important to fighting the war at home against contagious disease. Smith has a memory of those years probably familiar to most people her age.

"We used to have times, because they were worried about bombs being dropped on us in school, where we had to go downstairs and curl up against the wall," she said.

Most children's fathers, however, were not whisked away to a secure location in Livingston when a bombing threat materialized, however, but Smith said her father was always going there to prepare

to treat potential bombing victims.

She said one of the family's prize possessions is a commendation from President Dwight D. Eisenhower from about 1957 presented to her father for his work during the Second World War.

Even with her pride over her father's efforts, Smith said that despite the attempted eradication of diseases like measles and polio, it troubles her to see the occasional outbreak in this country or abroad.

"Once in awhile you see something about measles or another disease, and then another shows," she said. "I guess it's never really gone.

Especially in a place like India."
Something Smith probably shares with many Americans is a feeling that her last name is too common, something her parents handled in a unique way.

"In my family there is an Ellis, a Leon, an Otis and a Macon," she said. "My parents said they were not going to have a kid named John Smith?

These days Smith keeps up with her elder statespersons from Belleville with reunions, and jokes about the need to combine more than one graduating year because of advancing age.

We'll have our 60th reunion in two years," she said. "We also have the class of '51, because there just aren't that many of us left, but we meet every year. Of course it is more of a luncheon, but we always have a good time."

So the next time you pass the big hospital on the hill of the great lawn, remember that many sick persons were helped there in the previous century, but for at least one child, it was a fun place to call


