

Two events at the most recent Board of Education meeting in Belleville point up the fact that the school board takes its charge very seriously, and is open to all suggestions from residents on how to improve the education of the township's public school children.

First, school board member Arlene Schor talked about the importance of properly updating existing curriculum guides for all academic subjects, and in the process took a bit of a swipe at the previous school administration. Her comments illustrate just how important her job as chair of the curriculum committee is to her, and that she will not settle for anything but the best for Belleville's youth.

Second, Joseph Longo, the brand new school board president, agreed to take a serious look at a proposal made by one of the school board candidates he bested in the April elections, rather than trying to avoid or dismiss the idea. While the previous board president

did not dismiss or avoid dealing with the proposal, no meeting has yet taken place for what certainly seems like an earnest attempt to improve relations among school board, school administration, school staff, parents and residents.

For her part, Schor called it "embarrassing" that previous updating of curriculum guides appears to possibly have been done by simply downloading data from a disc. If that is true, then those involved in updating the guides did not give the most complete effort possible.

Curriculum guides are not exciting or the type of subjects that draw positive attention to a school board member, much like talk of improving infrastructure draws a yawn from the average resident.

In both cases, however, the subjects provide the very necessary nuts and bolts of proper education, whether it be academically or with the upkeep of schools. Schor should be commended for continuing to treat curriculum as the vital cog in education it deserves, and for choosing to use her lifetime of educational experience to lead the committee.

For Longo, respectfully acknowledging the efforts of once and future school board candidate Ralph Vellon was a simple, yet important act. The parents that pushed Vellon to run had legitimate concerns about educational policy and decisions, and deserve to be involved in the process to a larger extent. Whether that comes to pass remains to be seen, but Longo has proven a man of his word first as a very involved parent and so far as board president. He must now give Vellon's proposal a fair reading, and make sure the rest of the board does the same.

The Belleville school board continues to impress, and no less is expected in the future.

Officials wanted to stress that nothing that happened a half decade ago negatively impacted the district, but the problems were noted by Schor.

At the May 12 public Board of Education meeting, Schor reported that the curriculum committee had met the previous Monday. She said she wanted to bring to the board's attention guides that were adopted in 2003, which now have been placed on the schedule for revision.

Schor said it was "embarrassing" that some of the guides for 2003 actually had a copyright for 2004.

"They must have been clairvoyant," Schor said. "There seems to be a question about the amount of authorship done then, and whether they just took something off of a disc. We need full documentation, so we make sure people who write the guides do the work. It's embarrassing, and we need to make sure it doesn't happen again."

The news was not all negative, as Schor said the committee's review led to the recommendation of Journalism 1 and 2, World Language 1,2 and 3, and Advanced Placement Government class for grade 12, among "extensive recommendations."

The curriculum committee currently includes board members Eric Schwartz and Vincent Strumolo, Jr.







lized at Northside Hospital (where he was born), he was moved to Egleston, the children's hospital affiliated with Emory University in Atlanta and underwent surgery shortly thereafter. All turned out well. His heart returned to its normal place and he did indeed have two lungs, although one was smaller than the other. They put him on a paralytic drug, hoping to

stop him, among other things, from pulling out the multitude of necessary tubes and lines which he didn't like at all. And weren't the NIC nurses surprised when they looked at him one day and found him staring, one-eyed, at them. They concluded he really wanted to wake up and the drug that was keeping him comatose was soon stopped. Then they weaned him off the morphine (for pain) with methadone.

He was able to come home after 50 days and is doing well, although he must still suffer a feeding tube (which he pulls out at least once a day), and is prone to gastric reflux. Nothing stops

him from smiling. I think we'll be dealing with a feisty little boy very shortly. Watch out, Shaw. Here comes your "brudder."



# **Baseball team** looks to future

It was a topsy-turvy season for the Belleville High baseball team. which finished 9-16 this spring after making a late bid to clinch a berth in the state tournament.

Joe Sorce's Bucs might have finished below .500, but the future of the program appears to be good.

"We've got some talented players returning next year," Sorce said. "I'm excited about the future of the program, based on what I saw this year from the varsity players, an improved J.V. and freshman team and some very good eighth graders coming up to high school this fall."

The varsity team started slowly at 1-5, but the Bucs quickly regrouped and won five of its next six to reach the .500 mark. It then lost four straight before winning two impressive games over Nutley and Paramus Catholic that improved the record to 8-10 and gave some hope for a NJSIAA bid. However, the Bucs, playing its third game in less than 72 hours, lost a tough game to Kearny in the final inning that officially eliminated it from the states and the final two weeks were tough, with five losses in the last six games.

"We didn't end the season the way we would have liked," Sorce admitted. "But the kids are resilient, and they're all getting ready now for legion ball." (See related story on legion in this week's issue).

Belleville will lose some valuable seniors, beginning with Angel Gaud, a team captain, who was selected first team, all NNJIL, as a designated hitter. Despite an injury which kept him from playing shortstop on a regular basis, Gaud was effective at the plate, hitting .467.

"Angel was an outstanding player for us," Sorce said. "We're going to miss him. He was an excellent ball player."

## Tech upgrades make assessor's office more efficient

The Belleville tax assessor's office now has new technology to go along with its new assessor.

Belleville tax assessor Kevin Esposito, who was brought in as the town tax assessor back in January, has recently finished updating the technology in the office and has brought Belleville to the top of Essex County. "We did a complete computer upgrade on our office. We have a new printer, new computers, Internet access and a host of new features available to us," said Esposito. "When I took over this job we had Windows 95 installed on the computers and no Internet access so I knew we had to make changes.'

That new technology that Esposito was referring to includes the Tablet PC that Belleville acquired, which was sold to the town by Vital. It allows Esposito to go into the field and create or update properties without a paper trail and also allows him to perform the whole process in front of the homeowner instead of having to head back to his office. "The old way the assessor would go out into the field and would record the updates the homeowner did to their homes and sketch them out. Measurements would have to be taken, calculations made and then a process called vectoring would have to be performed to load all the information," said Esposito. "With the new system, we just take the tablet PC out there, measure the property, draw the lines and hit

The Township of Belleville will be testing fire hydrants beginning in June of 2008.

Why do we test fire hydrants?

The fire hydrant testing program was designed to ensure that our hydrants are ready should our fire services need to use them. Testing ensures that hydrants are in full working order and verifies their flow capacity.

How do we test a fire hydrant? In order to determine that a

flow requirements, fire crews must open the hydrants and discharge water from the hydrant at a very high flow rate.

How does this affect the street where the testing takes place? While fire hydrant testing is a routine maintenance procedure, it may result in temporary inconve-

devoted to serving the people of these great towns. Everyone knows I am one of the most accessible people in office," said Caputo. "I'm not saying this will be easy, but I feel I have the energy to do this. I can work both positions legally and benefit my constituents greatly."

The feeling over at Russo's headquarters was much different as the battle appeared far from over. "We are not conceding defeat yet. We are going to wait for all the districts to be accounted for," said Russo, former Montclair mayor. "I have done very well in Montclair, winning by a margin as high as 3 to 1 and if districts from Montclair remain unaccounted for we believe we still have a chance."

Even if the votes do not turn in Russo's favor, he believes just bringing the race this close was a statement in itself. "Seeing that this many people supported me despite my lack of power and resources says a lot. My campaign stood against the notion of politicians holding two positions at once and I think the people backed me up. I am a winner no matter how these final votes turn out."

The Republican primary was far less exciting as Andrew Bloschk ran uncontested.


Frank Lautenberg, who will turn 85 in January, won the Democratic U.S. Senator Primary decisively over Robert Andrews, tallying over 75 percent of the votes. The race for the Republican U.S. Senator Primary was more closely contested with Dick Zimmer beating out Joseph Pennacchio by just over 1,200 votes.

Incumbents Donald Payne, Patricia Sebold and Blonnie Watson claimed three of the four available Essex County freeholder At-Large terms. Rufus Johnson, the former aide to Senator Ronald Rice, claimed the last spot and all the winning candidates collected over 25,000 votes.

Current Belleville Township Councilmen Kevin Kennedy, who also ran for one of the four At-large positions, tallied the most votes of any candidate not to win by garnering over 3,700 votes, approximately 3.1 percent of the vote.

No vote tallies had yet been officially verified Tuesday night.

## Teacher puts touch o' the green in Irish history class

**BY RICHARD DICKON** of Belleville Times

For teacher Charlie Gallagher, teaching a class in Irish literature allows him to share his love of his ancestors' culture and traditions while providing an overview of Gaelic literary history. Belleville High School is adding

both a five-credit course for seniors and a two-credit course revolving around a trip to Ireland during spring break in 2009. Gallagher is anxious to expose his students to the contributions that the Irish have made throughout world history.

"This is a labor of love," Gallagher said of his new assignment.

His own roots as an Irish American trace back to his grandfather's arrival, and after Gallagher took his first trip to the Emerald Isle to look up his old homestead, his love for his ancestry was set in "Blarney Stone."

Having taught Irish literature along with British literature after making the switch from three decades in the corporate world some eight years ago, he said he decided to ask the administration for a full, five credit course in Irish literature that now extends to the cultural history. His dedication to his people is visually evident.

"I'm serious enough that I have my family crest tattooed on my arm," Gallagher said.

Because of that interest, he knows that while the Gaelic spelling of his name, Gallobhair, can be traced all the way back to the King of Ireland, 642-654 A.D., his grandfather arrived in America in 1900 after his birth in Ireland in 1877.

"He left most of his family behind," Gallagher said of his grandfather's bold and brave move. "He was born in Belavor County, but the clan itself is from

County Meath in Donegal." With his own research so detailed, Gallagher wants his course to include the oral traditions and folklore that span from before and during the medieval period to 20th century Dublin writers like James Joyce, Oscar Wilde, William Butler Yeats, and surprisingly to some, "Dracula" author Bram Stoker.

"I also want to get into the customs that have come to the U.S. from Ireland, like all of the Halloween traditions, and the St. Patrick's Day Parade, which celebrated its 247th year," he said. "I guess it's a misnomer to call it a lit class, since it encompasses folklore and culture. We're going to incor-porate a field trip to Ellis Island, and put on an Irish festival, with folk songs and such."

An ambitious itinerary awaits any student who signs up for the tour of Ireland, which Gallagher said is about "expanding horizons. There will be pre-trip reading and post-trip writing, and a chance for photojournalism. I'm happy to see that the administration is allowing me to approach this from all angles







Since April 2007, flood insurance policies in New Jersey have increased by 4.6%, to more than 225,000 policies as of April 2008.

However, many New Jersey households remain at risk. There are more than 3 million households in New Jersev (2000 U.S. Census), but just 225,171 insurance policies in effect. Only seven percent of the state's households are covered.

#### **BE FLOODSMART -REDUCE YOUR RISK**

Learn vour flood risk. Properties that are not located within high-risk areas can also flood. Find out your flood risk right now by entering your address at Flood-Smart.gov's "One-Step Flood Risk Profile." Insurance agents can also help assess your risk.

Plan for evacuation. Plan and practice a flood evacuation route, ask someone out of state to be your "family contact" in an emergency and make sure everyone knows the contact's address and phone number.

Move important objects and papers to a safe place. Store your valuables where they can't get damaged.

Conduct a thorough home inventory. Thorough documentation of your belongings will help you file your flood insurance claim. For more information, visit www.knowyourstuff.org.

Food, bottled water, first aid sup-

plies, medicines and a batteryoperated radio should be ready to go when you are.






