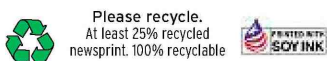

Deadline for School 1 project extended

The potential developer of a possible townhouse or other residential project on the existing site of the former School #1 elementary school in Belleville has been given yet another extension to decide whether or not to move forward with the project.

School Board Administrator Edward Appleton said Daniel Alvarez, the developer who paid just over \$2.4 million to acquire the property, can take until the end of June to decide if he wants to go through with the purchase.

Alvarez did not return calls for comment.

Appleton said the latest delay nixes plans about where to move school buses and other school and town items from the closed school to other locations before the start of school in September.

"We have to make plans based upon a whole new schedule for a closing on the property," Appleton said. "We need a new plan for the buses and all that is in storage."

He said all the district can do

now is take a wait and see approach.

"We'll have to see what happens at the end of June, and see if there is going to be a closing," Appleton said. "Frankly, I don't know what we're going to do. Certainly, for the purposes of the closing and us vacating the school, this changes the timeline."

There has been nothing new stemming from a township resident's formal complaint with the state Attorney General's Office regarding the proposed sale of the school, many months after the complaint was filed.

The suit claims that one board member had the appearance of a conflict of interest that should have prevented him from voting to approve the sale.

Alvarez said previously that a land survey done had been done, and everything in the process was going as planned. He said his company was trying to work out the details, if possible, and he said previously that he thinks it's still "a good deal."

He said previously that there are a total of four options regard-

ing what to place at the property that takes up the full block at the corners of Cortlandt and Rutgers streets, near the entrance to Belleville. Alvarez, however, said previously that he didn't want to discuss specifics until he was sure what was going to happen.

Alvarez has expressed anger that questions are still lingering about the sale many months after accusations were made, despite no specific, legal action being taken by anyone.

Resident Vincent Frantantoni said previously that on Feb. 8 he went to the Attorney General's Office in Trenton asking for an investigation into the proposed sale of School 1 by the Board of Education for \$2,401,000, alleging a conflict. In the bid specifications for School 1, it states specifically that "no board member should take part in a vote" if there is "either a direct or indirect conflict of interest."

One board member's cousin is in business with Alvarez, but not involved in the School 1 purchase, Alvarez said.

Alvarez has said repeatedly that

he has no connection to anyone on the board, and no actions have been taken involving the allegations.

Along with an alleged conflict, Frantantoni also questioned the amount Alvarez bid for the school, which was just a fraction higher than the next highest bid. Frantantoni has copies of the three bids submitted for the purchase of the school, and Alvarez' winning bid was just \$1,000 more than the second highest bid, much less than one percent of the cost of the total bid. Alvarez has said repeatedly that the miniscule difference between the two bids resulted from Alvarez's practice of adding a small amount onto what he believes may be a good price for the property to ensure his is the winning bid.

The potential conflict of interest alleged by Frantantoni is not his only complaint about the sale. Frantantoni, who has said the board should hold onto valuable property and rehab School 1, also said he believes there may be a deed restriction on the property that prevents its sale.

arms in the air. After police said they attempted several times to get the suspect to stop, he was arrested. Bail was set at \$500.

■ Police arrested and charged James Locacio, 20, Jorge Alfonso, 20, Joseph Bua, 18, Jonathan Lodi, 19, and Richard Barbier, 20, all of Nutley, with underage drinking behind the parking lot of the Pathmark, 726 Washington Ave. According to police, they were drawn to the area behind the parking lot by a burning smell coming from the bushes, and then observed a haze emanating from the bushes. Police then observed six youths hiding in the bushes, and a small bonfire burning. Further investigation revealed that Fonder and another juvenile were also involved. Fonder's bail was \$5,000 and the other three were turned over to juvenile court.

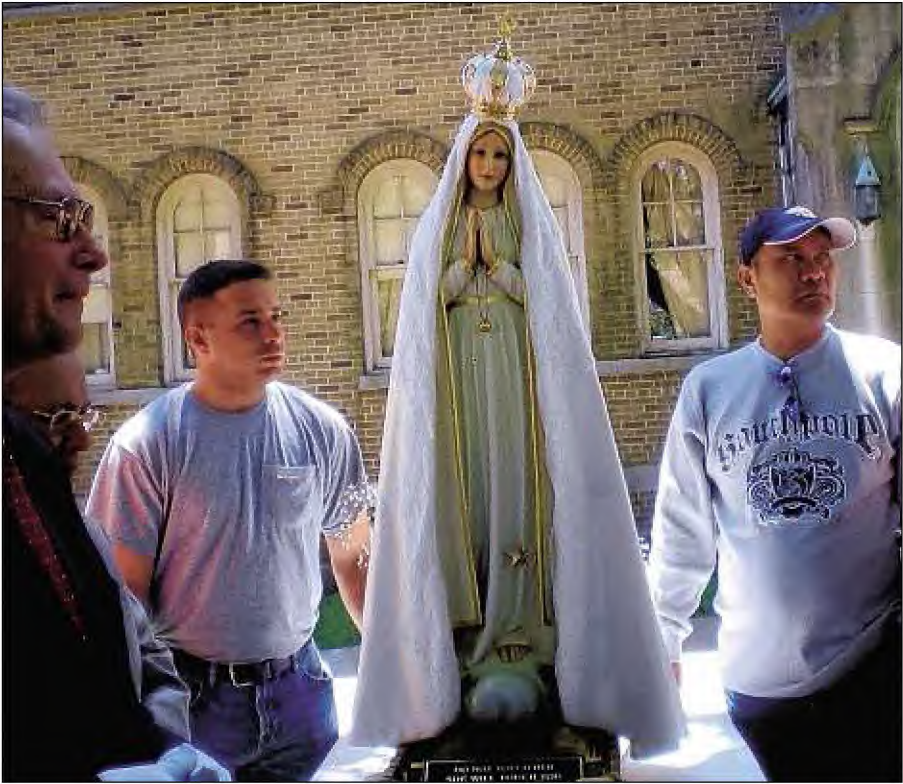

What utilities should be doing to cope

A rolling blackout that occurred over the weekend throughout parts of Essex County just missed Belleville, stopping just next door at Nutley, where people were without electricity for almost half a day over the weekend. If history is any guide, however, there's a very good chance Belleville will not remain unscathed the next time the region's electrical substations start fuming from overuse. While Public Service Enterprise Group – PSEG – did an admirable job getting the power going again, the area's primary utility can do even more to ensure that soaring temperatures cause as little disruption to their customers as possible.

Utility companies generally have a pretty good idea when energy usage is going to spike – when the mer-

cury climbs to near-unbearable levels as happened earlier this week. Many people naturally enough opt to stay indoors when the temperature broaches triple digits and the humidity is smothering. That fact alone sets off a cascade of increased electrical use: people run their air conditioning full blast, do household chores like the laundry that gulp electricity, keep the lights on and watch TV. When tens of thousands of people do this, the needle tips towards the red and sooner or later the lights go out.

To prevent this from happening, PSEG should send out advisories ahead of predicted heat waves (and the meteorologists are pretty adept at predicting when these occur). It could ask customers during heat waves to

take some minimally invasive steps that nonetheless save precious kilowatts when tens of thousands adhere to them. Like raising the thermostat a few degrees; a two-degree difference would hardly be felt but would save a lot of energy. Or keeping lights, computers and other unnecessary appliances off. Or "pooling," gathering at one person's house where the air conditioning is on and keeping the AC off at the non-pooled homes.

But the important thing is for PSEG to use the news media to get the word out before the mercury makes its dizzying ascent, not after the lights have already gone out. An ounce – or in this case, a few watts – of prevention can be worth a pound of cure.

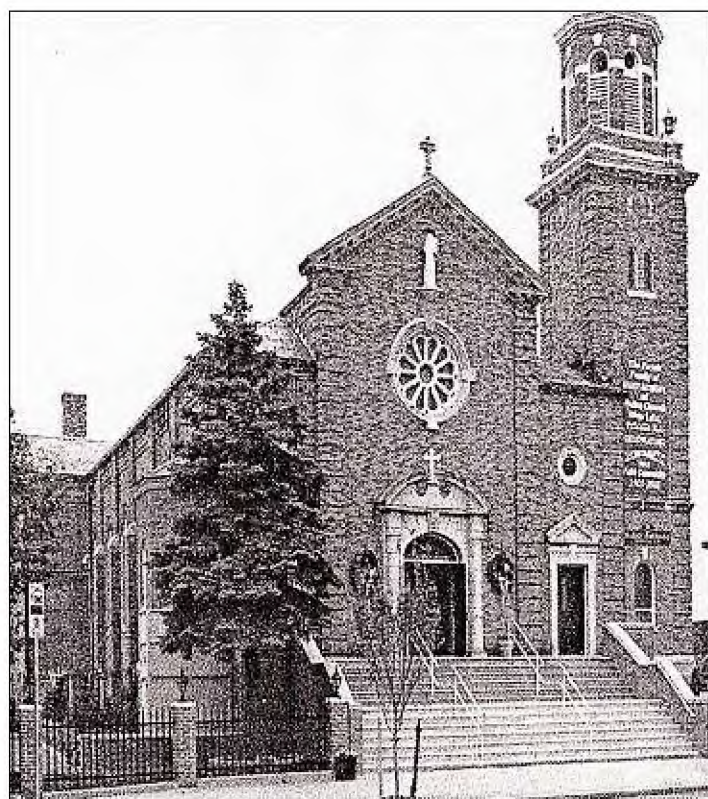

Board opts for 'uniform' solution to school dress

School uniforms are coming this fall for all elementary public school students in Belleville, and the uniforms were unveiled at Monday's Board of Education meeting.

Dennis Villano, assistant superintendent of schools, said the uniforms will be required for all students, kindergarten through grade six.

He said the plan is to offer parents an opportunity to go to two or three different locations throughout the township to purchase the proper clothing, to accommodate people in all sections of town.

The district distributed a survey to parents regarding school uniforms, and officials said more than eight out of 10 parents favored the change.

Villano said a package of five, three-button collared shirts and three chino-style pants could be purchased for \$100 and would make for 10 different outfits, a huge cost savings for parents during tough economic times.

"It eliminates the competition of who buys what, and considering what the costs of clothes are today, it can really help," Villano said.

Ralph Vellon, who ran for the school board in April and lost, said the parents in grades seven through 12 did not get their wish for uniforms.

Villano said Tuesday that uniforms are being "phased in," with K-6 next year, and then when sixth graders move to seventh grade, uniforms will follow.

"It's probably going to take a three-year period, but no one has been ignored or rejected," he said.

After a concerned parent brought up the subject in October, school board members and the administration came up with the survey.

One survey per parent was sent home, and they were numbered but anonymous. One side of the survey card was in English and the other side in Spanish.

The survey asked parents whether they favor uniforms, how many children they have, and in what grades their children currently are.

Specifically, the survey said the school uniform will consist of collared, three-button tops and chino bottoms, with several deviations allowed from the basics.

The total uniform must be visible at all times, and no coats, hats, headgear (other than approved head gear for religious reasons) or other outerwear, including hooded sweatshirts, may be worn indoors.

Villano said reiterated Monday that uniforms would level things for all socioeconomic groups, that clothes are very costly, and that as long as the uniforms are clean, there's no discussion in the morning about what students are going to wear.

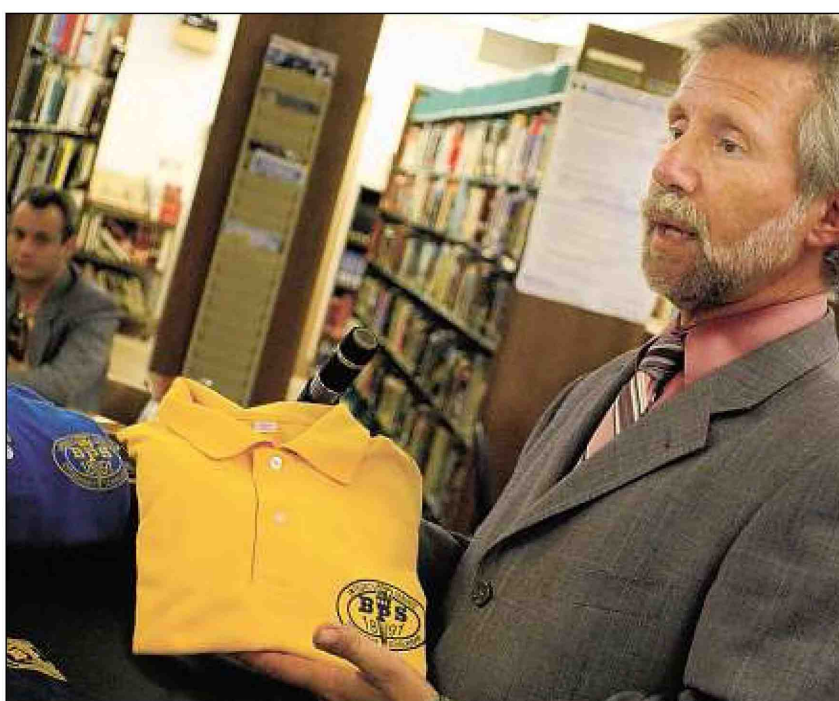
He said uniforms make things easier for the parents, and easier and safer for the schools.

Villano said the schools would no longer have to deal with the issue of skirts being too short, shirts plunging too low, and baggy pants possibly hiding illegal items.

School 3 parent Rachel Martinez questioned the school board in October about the possibility of requiring all students to wear uniforms, and said there was strong sentiment in favor of the change among School 3 parents.

Martinez said that students could hide all kinds of dangerous items in a typical school outfit, such as baggy jeans and a white T-shirt.

She said that with the advent of school uniforms, should there be an altercation at a school, any

youth from outside the district involved could be easily identified by their attire.

This would make it easier for school resource officers or local police to deal with such situations, Martinez said.

A second positive effect of changing to school uniforms would be to take away the prominence of socio-economic status in how children interact, she said.

Martinez said children would focus on learning, not trying to impress each other with what they wear.

School Board President William Villano said previously that there was a directive about uniforms sent out previously by the school board a few years ago, and the response was negative.

He thanked the school board committee Monday for its work, and the administration for coming up with a survey that found 86 percent of parents favored uniforms.

School board member Carmen Bucco said the committee "worked diligently" and the uniforms will "provide a safe and secure environment" for students that will help attract potential home buyers to the school district.

Bad blood following GOP shakeup

Belleville's version of the Hatfields versus the McCoy's has ended another chapter of ugly, accusatory campaigning for control of the local Republican Party, with the winning and losing sides coming nowhere near conciliatory tones following the June 3 primary. In fact, the winning side is contesting one of the district leaders' absentee ballots in Superior Court (see related story).

Township Republicans have a new chairwoman, former mayor Angie Paserchia, after the existing leadership group was beaten in the district leader elections on primary night, June 3. Paserchia beat Michael Perrone by a two to one margin in the reorganization meeting held Monday night.

With the-ex-chairwoman and the former chairman trading barbs throughout the primary season, the two spoke about the change, as did the likely new GOP chairwoman, former mayor Angie Paserchia.

Former Republican chairman Richard Yanuzzi said of the win, which included more than 35 seats out of 52, "the Republican voters of

Belleville rose up last Tuesday (June 3) and decided that the leadership had to be replaced, and with Angie Paserchia, it will be replaced. It was overwhelmingly approved by voters in great numbers. It is a tremendous victory, something that many people worked very hard at, to make our case. Now it is time to build the party, which was put into a coma by Toni Marone. It was on life support, and now it is time for [former] Mayor Paserchia to build it up, and bring it back."

Marone, who chaired the GOP for several years, spoke mostly graciously in defeat, but did not rule out a comeback by her version of the township GOP, which is still backed by the county Republican Party.

"You know how many years he (Yanuzzi) has been after me," Marone said. "It's their loss, not mine. I've done a lot of good in this town. So be it. I don't feel bad for myself, but for the people of this town. There are a lot of great people. I love it here. Now I will just work for the Republican candidates, and I will work with the county, and we will come up on top again."

Paserchia talked about including all Republicans in the local party, but still took a swipe at her predecessor. She and Yanuzzi together have been bitter rivals of Marone's faction for a long time.

"I want to make the party inclusive," Paserchia said. "I want all of the district voters who supported me to play a part, but I want all of the Republicans to help bring back a strong party here. I feel we can do it. We have good people here. Marone ran the party into the ground. Still, any Republican that wants to be part of this is welcome to sit in at all of our meetings."

As for the ugly accusations that flew from some quarters during the campaign, Paserchia said, "It rolls off my back like water off a duck's back."

Many district leaders who held their positions for a long time under Marone were ousted, and Marone only kept her slot by a relatively slim margin.

Yanuzzi has had many ups and downs as a GOP leader in Belleville, backing many winning candidates and then being ousted as chairman, and has said repeatedly during this campaign that the party will now be in Paserchia's hands.

Lawsuit filed to dislodge GOP party leaders

In an example of just how deep resentments run among Belleville's Republican factions, the former GOP chairman is suing to overturn two district leaders' victories in Superior Court.

The district leader, Alois Schmitt, said Tuesday he knows nothing of the attempt and voted in Monday night's Belleville GOP reorganization meeting at the Bella Casa restaurant.

Former GOP leader Richard Yanuzzi filed

suit to contest Schmitt's and his wife's absentee ballots, which allowed him to claim victory in the June 3 district leader election.

He said Superior Court Judge Thomas McCormick required the presence of Schmitt, his wife Joan and ousted GOP chairwoman Antoinette "Toni" Marone at Monday's hearing.

Schmitt said Tuesday he had "no idea" what Yanuzzi was up to, and said, "We were declared the winners and we went to the first meeting."

He claimed the court papers he received were not authentic legal papers because they have Yanuzzi's name and address at

the top.

"We will wait to see what happens," Schmitt said.

Yanuzzi said he hired private investigator Stephen Bojekian of Franklin Lakes to investigate "ballot verifications" involving Schmitt.

In his report, Bojekian claims Frances Iracane, one absentee ballot voter, told him, "that she received it (her absentee ballot)

from Mr. Al Schmitt," said "she was assisted (in completing the application) by Mr. Schmitt. She went on to say she was "again assisted by Mr. Schmitt in filling it out...she

sealed the ballot envelope and handed it over to Mr. Schmitt as she assumed it would be cast."

Yanuzzi said Schmitt violated the law governing absentee ballots by helping her fill it out and not saying he did, and by not signing the envelope himself.

Yanuzzi said there will be a hearing on June 24 where Iracane and Kenneth Mahon will be asked to testify that Schmitt brought them the absentee ballots.

Yanuzzi said Schmitt trailed in the district leader election 14 to 8, but then produced 13 absentee ballots, more than any other candidate.

First the flower car, then the hearse, followed by an endless caravan of cars with funeral flags waving in the gentle breeze from the side windows. At approximately twelve noon on Friday, May 30th the funeral procession of my cousin Virginia "Ginny" DiCarlo crawled past Nutley Park ShopRite as all employees, managers, owners Tom and David Infusino and loyal customers lined the sidewalks in front of the store. Some blew kisses, others had their heads

bowing in prayer while still others extended their arms towards the limousine carrying their co-worker friend as if trying to reach out and touch Ginny one last time.

Soon after graduating Belleville high school, Virginia Giangrosso married Michael C. DiCarlo from Newark. Eventually they were able to take out a down payment on a home of their own on Center Street in Belleville. "This is it," Ginny said with a big smile. "This is where you'll find me until they take me out in a box."

Well that's not exactly how the story went. There was a life in between. A life that affected many, many other lives in a positive way. Every life affects others.

You'd be hard pressed to find one person who ever met Ginny who didn't like her, a lot.

In 1969, with the four little ones finally in school, she was hired as a part time cashier for Nutley Shop Rite. She worked her way up to full time book-keeper, a position she held for the next 30 years, but not without interruption.

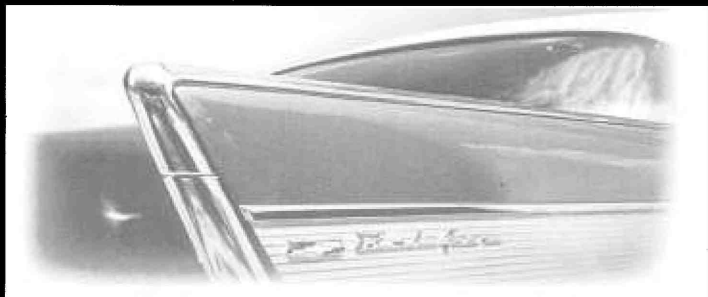

Public schools were shortened to half days Monday and Tuesday, and students were kept until 12:30 p.m. on Tuesday despite the high school losing power.

"Overall, we had some brief outages, but nothing major," Rotonda said Tuesday afternoon. Other surrounding Essex County towns were not so lucky.

With temperatures rising into the mid 90's over the weekend, Nutley power grids were pushed to the limit by full blasting air condi-

Last Saturday around 3 p.m. one of the primary PSE&G circuits used to power the township failed and when it flopped to its backup, the demand was too high and the backup system failed as well. "We lost power on the west side of Nutley and in areas of Bloomfield and Clifton. All those areas are powered by the same station so when it goes down there is a very large area impacted," said Nutley Fire Inspector David Wilson. "We brought in a number of crews to repair the station and they worked feverishly to get it back up and running but many people were without power for an extended amount of time."

Emergency management teams assisted in the repair and incorporated a system of rolling blackouts where the available but limited power was being transferred from block to block, giving certain houses a small period of time with power. "They got it so that they could put up the power for a couple

Around 2 a.m. on Sunday morning the power was restored, roughly 11 hours after the power outage.

"It was great work by those involved, the intricacies of those grids are well beyond my compre-

Wilson suggested that people should set their thermostats a couple degrees higher than normal, limit TV watching, shut down their computers or delay doing laundry for another time. "Any kind of power you can cut back on is a giant help. If people would set their thermostats to 74 instead of 72 they would hardly feel the difference but cooling a house an extra two degrees requires a lot of power," said Wilson. "Cutting back on things that might seem insignificant really add up if every house does it"

Another suggestion was the idea of "house pooling" when it gets extremely hot. "Relatives all can meet at one house and stay cool there, preserving energy. It is this

This heat also resulted in Nutley schools closing for a half day Monday and Tuesday.

"The heat is just too much so they made the decision to close the schools. We were able to use our communication alert system and notify all the parents of the plan on Saturday night. It worked very well," said Wilson.

Nutley was not the only town impacted by this torrid heat wave. A substation in West Orange went down and has left the Oranges and surrounding areas without power. "When a substation goes down it can really impact a gigantic area. This is one of the most densely populated areas in the country and the demand for power simply gets too high and these stations just can't handle it" said Wilson.

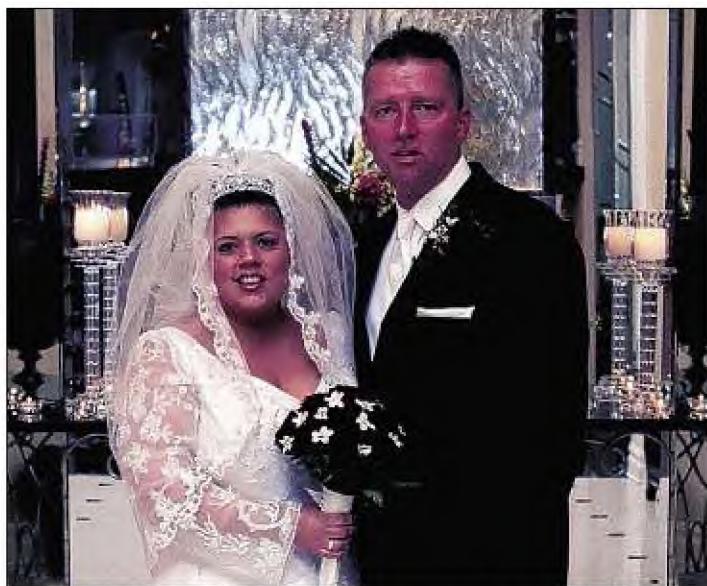

Drowning incidents involve any source of standing water

According to the State of Home Safety in America report, drowning is the fifth leading cause of unintentional injury and related death. Drowning incidents may involve any source of standing water, including swimming pools, spas, buckets, bathtubs and toilets.

"Drowning is a sudden and silent danger," says Meri-K Appy, president of the Home Safety Council. "Since drowning victims do not make any noise once in distress, constant supervision around any body of water is critical and the best method of prevention." The Home Safety Council urges families to take the following basic safety precautions around water outdoors and in-home.

Many drowning incidents involve swimming pools and spas. Adopt the following guidelines from the Home Safety Council to help keep your pool area safe:

- Always practice constant adult supervision around any body of water. Older children should not be left in charge of younger children in the pool area.
- Install four-sided fencing that isolates the pool from the

home. Four-sided pool fencing is proven to be an effective drowning prevention intervention. While many communities have codes or regulations that require some form of pool fencing, there is not a consistent national standard.

- Pool fencing should be at least five feet high and have self-locking and self-closing gates.

- Position gate latches out of the reach of young children.

- Never prop the gate open or disable the latch.

- Clear debris, clutter and pool toys from the pool deck and adjoining pathways to prevent falls.

- Keep a cordless, water-resistant telephone in the pool area and post emergency numbers near the pool area.

- Enroll non-swimmers in swimming lessons taught by a qualified instructor. Pediatricians recommend that children ages five and older learn how to swim.

- Never swim alone. Even adults should always swim with a buddy.

- Learn and practice the basic lifesaving techniques, including First Aid and CPR.

"I've really enjoyed high school," Cozzarelli said last weekend. "There are a lot of nice memories. But I'm also looking forward to college. I'm going to major in veterinarian science and I hope to be a vet in a zoo one day."

She has always had a love of pets and works during the summers at the Turtle Back Zoo in West Orange.

"My father (Bob, Sr.) helped me get that job last year, and I'll be starting my second summer there in a few weeks," Cozzarelli said. "They have some nice animals there, like a pair of cougars, peacocks and a river otter. I really like working with the animals."

At home, Cozzarelli has five cats, all with a different background.

"They're a big part of my life," Cozzarelli said of her bond with Penny, Frances, Santa Claws, Timmy and Nea. "It's going to be strange when I go away to school, but my parents love them, too, and I'll be home when I can to check on them."

An excellent student, Cozzarelli stayed busy with athletics during her four years at Belleville. She ran cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. This past spring, she had the opportunity to compete at the highest level when the girls 4 x 100 relay team ran at the Penn Relays in Philadelphia.

"That was incredible," Cozzarelli said of running with teammates Sherece Shabazz, Victoria Barrett and Vanessa Ackon, all underclassmen, at the relays. "Competing at the Penn Relays, in front of big crowds and against the best runners in the country was something I'll never forget. I have to credit our coach Kwesi (Sarabo) for putting that together for us. He was the one who felt we should run there and I'm very appreciative for that opportunity."

She admits that indoor track was her favorite venue.

"Our 4 x 200 relay team set a new school record during the

indoor season," Cozzarelli said. "That's something I'm really proud of, to be a part of that team. We also set outdoor records in the 4 x 100 and 4 x 200."

Cozzarelli, Shabazz, Barrett and Ackon took third place medals at the Essex County relays when they broke the school record on Feb. 10.

In addition to her demanding academic schedule and her work with the track team, Cozzarelli also served as the wrestling team's scorekeeper for four years. Her older brother, Bobby, was a star wrestler for the Bucs during three of those years.

"It was tough watching Bobby wrestle, because I was always hoping he wouldn't get hurt," Cozzarelli said. "I remember when he had to win three matches on one day to qualify for the states (in 2006). He ended up doing it, and I was sitting in the stands with my parents and it was a very emotional moment for all of us when he qualified for the states for the first time."

Bobby Cozzarelli would go on to win the Region 4 championship in 2007 and earn his second straight appearance in the NJSIAA tournament, something Becky was very proud to discuss.

"Bobby was 39-0 in his senior year after winning the regions," she said with a smile. "He broke his heel at the states, but still went out there and competed. He worked so hard."

Her brother, the fourth winningest wrestler in Belleville history, just completed his freshman year at Quinnipiac University in Connecticut, where he is studying to be a physical therapist. He's in a vigorous six-year program that will ultimately gain him a Ph.D. in his field and did very well in his freshman year.

The fact that Becky and Bobby will be attending college not far from each other in Connecticut is a source of comfort for their parents, Bob, Sr. and Susan. The family is very close knit and shares in all its successes.

"The schools are about an hour apart," Bob Cozzarelli said. "They'll be able to come home during holidays and summers and they'll be there for each other. My wife and I are very proud of what they've accomplished and of what they plan to do in college. They're great kids."

She will enjoy the last two weeks of high school, then spend her summer working with her first love, those animals. Then, it's off to college, where her love for animals will continue with a career path toward taking care of them on a professional level.

"I'm very excited about the future," Cozzarelli said. "My family has been so supportive and now I get a chance to pursue my dream."

Treatment for bunions varies by severity

A bunion is an enlargement of the bone and tissue around the joint of the big toe. As the deformity gets worse, the big toe starts to move toward the second toe, resulting in misalignment of the joint. Bunion pain can be mild, moderate or severe. Fire official offers tips for college-bound

You're a freshman in a dorm room far from home, and you're not sure if your dwelling meets even the minimum of safety requirements, so what do you do? In a neighboring community, Nutley Fire Lt. David Wilson told Nutley High School seniors just what they might need to do in those types of situations if they find themselves at college next fall, all during a special presentation given

twice on May 30. Fire officials said the recent rash of college dorm fire fatalities and injuries has focused the need for improvements to the state Uniform Fire Code, including sprinkler legislation and funding, construction changes, stepped-up inspection programs and fire drills. Those improvements need to be supplemented with fire safety educational programs like the one just given. That, however, only covers students attending school in their home state.

The Nutley Fire Department's Public Educational Unit's program featured the federal Fire Administration's "Get Out and Stay Alive" directive, and also featured Frederick Scalera, Nutley's volunteer fire chief. Wilson said the Seton Hall dorm tragedy, where several students died, helped make the case for the program, which is now in its eighth year. The program includes what he called "a hard-hitting video" that shows real life stories of students

killed, and their families' anguish, and is followed with prevention and safety tips. "Dorm living can be very dangerous," Wilson said. "New Jersey is one of just two states that have sprinkler and other safety precautions in place, but otherwise dorms and apartments are largely unregulated throughout most of the country." Housing off campus might include attic or basement apartments with no safe exits and no smoke detectors or sprinklers, he said.

"Students need to know if their place is safe, and how to make it safer, by avoiding things like using candles or burning incense and using unsafe extension chords," Wilson said. If there is a situation where a student needs to get rid of someone who is a safety problem, the lecture explains how to remove the person using the proper authorities. Any student wishing to obtain information can google USFA College Campus Fire Safety: Get Out and Stay Alive.

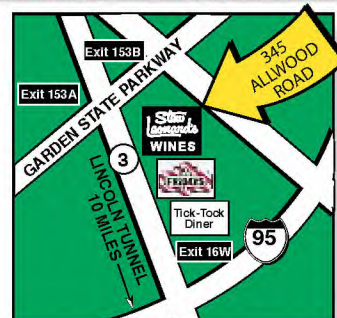

Nighttime stroll underlines cancer survivors' tenacity

"We're fighting back!"

That was the clear message on a Friday night recently when the second annual Nutley "Walk for Life" began for hundreds of participants and supporters, many of whom walked all night long to raise money to help cure cancer.

There were many parts of Nutley and the area heard this night, from the featured speaker, a 24-year-old woman battling a rare liver cancer, to a large turnout of local students and teachers, to Girl Scouts. Then there was the local

Irish American Association, the Thriving Survivors breast cancer survivors and so many others, all of whom showed a true camaraderie apparent and flowing through the crowd at DeMuro Field.

The event drew participants and supporters from throughout the area, including a cancer survivor from Bloomfield and her supporter from Belleville.

Commissioner Mauro Tucci led off the proceedings with a stirring call to action, while Mayor Joanne Cocchiola both ran and walked for the cause. Commissioner Alphonse Petracco lent his support, while Nutley Assemblyman

Frederick Scalera bragged about his son being more involved than he was at a similar age.

Mindy Markel, who is dealing with a rare liver cancer, represented the American Cancer Society's "Heroes of Hope." She focused on how she at first did not feel like one of the 50 cancer survivors who walked the first lap of the relay, because she feels no health restrictions.

"Now I realize being a survivor is about so much more, including my family and friends," she said. "I have to be trucking along. I am a survivor, but we're all surviving something, and we all have to celebrate, remember - and fight."

The 50 survivors then took a lap, as the Melissa Etheridge song, "I Run For Life" blared over the pub-

lic address system, her anthem about her and everyone's travails in dealing with cancer, including the

He counts on us, as we count on Him

You are probably familiar with the phrase concerning God's amazing grace and the hymn by the same name of "Amazing Grace." We count on God's love and forgiveness in our lives and are grateful, but do we ever entertain the idea that God is also counting on us to spread this good news to all people?

Matthew 28:19-20 tells about Jesus' words to his disciples, "Go therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son, and the Holy Spirit. Teach them to observe all

things that I have commanded you, and I am with you always."

Who do you and I teach about God? Our children, friends, relatives? Who taught us? Our Sunday School teachers, our neighbors, singing hymns all day long, our parents or grandparents? I need to face some facts. The youth of today have few examples in their families or with their friends of people being faithful to worship, Bible Study or prayer.

We may wonder why our young people are pulling away from the values our God has advocated. The

reason is clear. The people they love have no time to worship either. So Sunday has become a day like all the rest, no rest for the weary. Faithfulness is a foreign word to many.

I'd like to share paragraph from "A Life in Our Times," an autobiography by John Kenneth Galbraith. He was the ambassador to India for President Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson. Galbraith tells a story about his faithful housekeeper. After a long day Galbraith arrived at home exhausted. In order to get a nap, he asked his

housekeeper to hold all calls. While he was asleep, President Johnson called to speak to him. The housekeeper informed the President that she had been instructed to hold all calls. The President insisted that she wake her employer, but the housekeeper held her ground. "I don't work for you," she said. "I work for Mr. Galbraith." When Galbraith later returned the phone call, the President could barely control his delight. "I wish that woman worked at the White House," he said with a chuckle.

It reminds me of Joshua 24:15, "Choose this day whom you will serve ... but as for me and my house, we will serve the lord." Remember also Luke 2:49. Jesus, 12 years of age, said to his parents who could not find him, "Did you not know that I must be in my father's house?"

What about us and our loved ones? Where may they be found? Where are we?

on, one day at a time, with this dreaded disease. Eventually we can all speak of this as a disease of the past. You all have given the time and dedication with big hearts. Together, I know we're going to find a cure."

Shivang Bhatt, a National Honor Society student, preferred to talk about the efforts of his fellow students, but his teachers were more willing to credit him with helping organize about 45 students, teachers and staff from Nut-

ley High School into six separate walking teams.

His Spanish teacher, Peg Rucinski, said Bhatt "is just amazing in his energy and dedication. He's so excited. This is something that makes a difference."

Maria Irene, an NHS substitute teacher, said she wasn't aware of the event, but became "interested and inspired" thanks to Bhatt, and was fittingly part of a team named after inspiration.

Bloomfield's Merle Fox, a grateful cancer survivor, was found sitting alone at first, but was later joined by a number of supporters, including Belleville's Rosemary

Machado.

Fox said she was trying to have a previous surgery reversed when doctors found abnormal cervical cells from a "bad PAP (smear)."

So, in July 2003, after all the testing was complete, she needed surgery, but said with a grateful smile, "Nothing since."

Like so many, her story is not

just about herself, but sadly includes her entire family, including her brother, who is right now

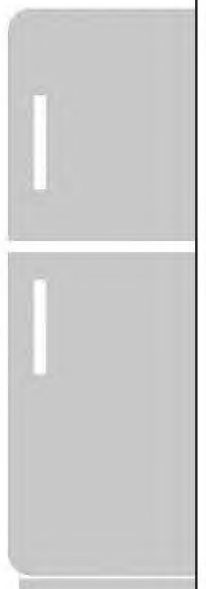
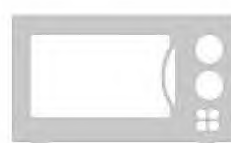

dealing with chemotherapy for esophageal cancer.

"I'm doing this for him, also," Fox said.

She may have been the only survivor there with souvenir T-shirts from relays for two states.

"I went to my first one two summers ago, when my mom had

bone cancer, and it was in Tennessee," Fox said. "Mom's okay today, but nobody's immune. It doesn't care about race, size or wealth."

Her supporter, Belleville's Rosemary Machado, said Fox's support comes from "friends and a lot of family, more than you can count. It's all about helping out."

No one at the event was more grateful or full of emotion for those suffering than NHS teacher Mary

Perrotta.

She said a huge help in her fight against breast cancer, which was diagnosed in 2006, was the students and staff at NHS.

"They rose to the occasion, with cards, hugs and kisses," Perrotta said. "The students know that good health is what makes our world."

She said one of the true perks of teaching has become clear to her. "It's the way the kids rally

around you," Perrotta said.

Richard Kogel, a fellow NHS teacher and walker, was diagnosed with prostate cancer in 2002, but is doing well.

"I'm fine," he said. "I go to a once a year program, and I keep right on going."

The pride that each and every team felt was inspiring evidence. As previously reported, the Sarno family and the daughters of the late Bonnie Weiss, who fought

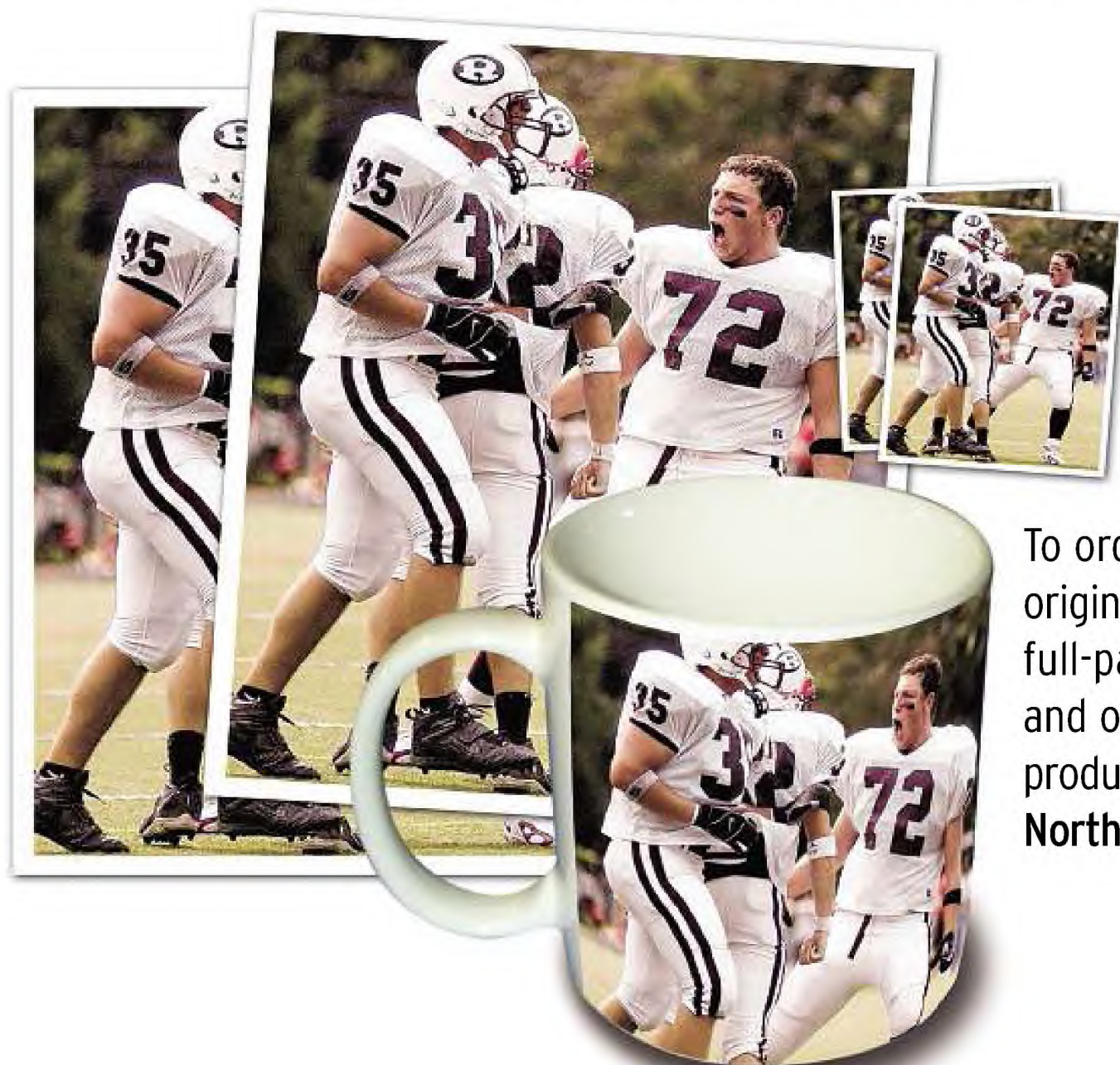
breast cancer, were front and center. Their good humor and obvious support of each other informed the fact that for the friends and families of those lost, sharing the loss leads to incalculable consolation.

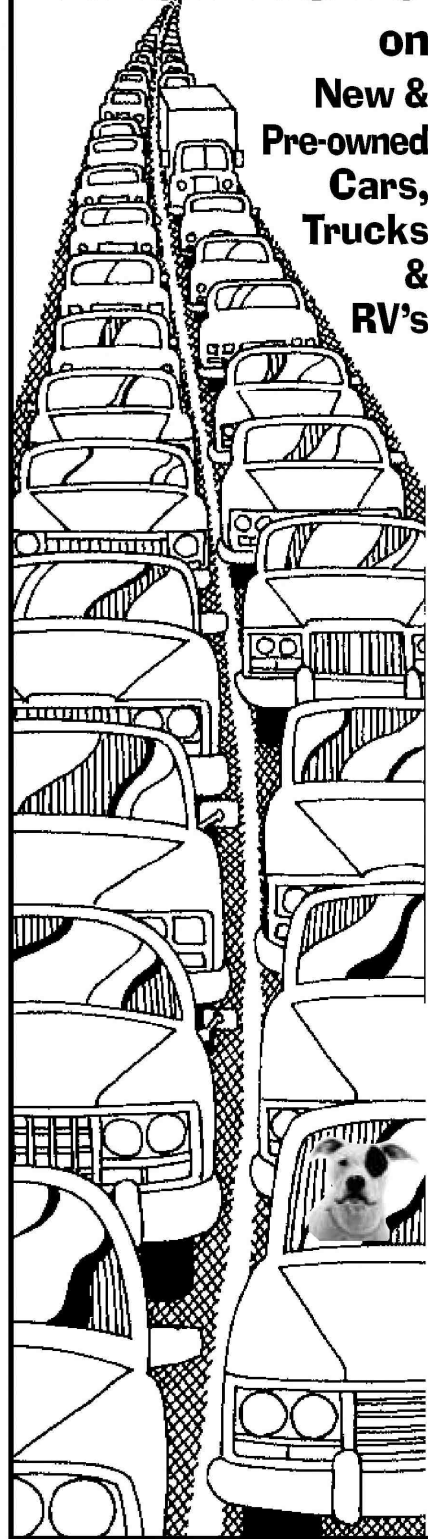
