

#### Belleville taking part in speeding crackdown this month

the Belleville Police Department will be cracking down on speeding motorists this summer, as part of the "Obey the Signs or Pay the Fines," initiative.

The program begins July 1, in advance of the July 4th holiday, and runs through July 31, in more than 180 northern New Jersey municipalities.

Police agencies in Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Morris, Passaic, Sussex, and Warren counties will participate in the campaign, which resulted in more than 10,800 speeding citations during the 2007 crackdown.

"Excessive speed, particularly on local roads, is one of the leading contributors to traffic crashes," said

Law enforcement officers from Pam Fischer, Director of the New Jersey Division of Highway Traffic Safety. "Last year, 22,839 crashes were speed-related, and 166 of those crashes resulted in fatalities."

Speeding reduces a driver's ability to steer safely around curves or objects in the roadway. It also extends the distance necessary to stop a vehicle, and it increases the distance a vehicle travels while the driver notices and reacts to a dangerous situation.

"If you're speeding in New Jersey, you will be stopped and you will be fined," Fischer added. "Police will not give warnings. They will be writing tickets."

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
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

Two weeks ago our area was hit with one of the worst storms we have seen in a very long time. First the anticipation of waiting until the storm was over to see what damage, if any, it had brought with it. Then after going outside and looking around we found we were very fortunate that no trees had fallen on our property and caused the devastation that they did in some areas. Next we were waiting along with everyone else to see when would we get our power back on.

Wednesday morning the police were driving around trying to assess all the damage and notifying everyone when we would possibly get our power back. One detective told us it could be four days! He said, "Now would be a good time to go on

vacation". With no plans of vacation we figured we needed to do

something quick.

We called our family in Saddle Brook that wasn't affected by the storm. Russell Kelley, from Russell J. Kelley Builders, immediately came over with no hesitation and took four boxes of food from our house to his to keep refrigerated so we didn't lose all our food. Then he called back and

said he would see if he could get a couple of generators so we would have some power at our house in Nutley and one for our gas station in Belleville so we would be able to operate the business. He showed up with one of his workers, Danny, bringing us two generators lent by Lou, from A-1 Heating and Cooling in Saddle Brook. We hooked the one up at the house no problem, that gave us two outlets to hook power up to. The other one we took to the gas station and called Harold Goglia, Jr. from Linwood Electric in Nutley to come and hook it up. It was only 3000 watts and Harold said, "I have an 8000 watt generator I'll loan you that you could run the whole station on." So that's exactly what he did. He hooked up his generator directly to the electrical panel and we were in business again! It was very much needed because we supply gas to the Clara Maass Medical Center for their transport vans. And in a crisis like this they really needed their vans in ser-

So, through the help of family and friends and our good customers we were able to run our business. We were one of the only gas stations open Wednesday pumping gas and we would just like to thank everyone who played a part in making that hap-

It's nice to know in a time of

need that we can all depend on each other. Thursday we had power back from the town in Belleville and Friday we had our power back in Nutley. A sincere thank you also to all the DPW workers in our town, to the Police Departments who did a fantastic job at protecting our properties and keeping us safe and to PSE&G for getting our power back. We take some of our luxuries like "electricity" for granted but it takes a storm like that to really make us appreciate what we have.

Thank you from Pasquale & Gale Palumbo and we hope you all weathered the storm through family and friends and the hard and dedicated workers we have in our towns. Once again it proves; "Belleville and Nutley are great places to live"!

## Library board wins in lawsuit with township

of Belleville Times

After more than 18 months of court appearances, hearings and trial work the court case between the Belleville Township Council and former Belleville Public Library Board members has been resolved.

On the afternoon of June 27th the Honorable Judgé Walter Koprowski ruled in favor of the ousted library board members and determined that the ordinance adopted by the Belleville mayor and council that was amended in June 2007 was vague and ambiguous. "This was a complete and total win for my clients and was a vindication of everything my clients said. When I first went into court I asked for a stay on what the town had done and it took me over a year and a half to get the vindication but we got it," said attorney Michael Cerone, who represented the ousted board members. "My board and will remain there for the

duration of their terms.

Koprowski also ruled that Janice McManus, who had submitted a letter of resignation from the library board following the appointment of the new members, could retain her position on the board. Koprowski stated that McManus' letter of resignation only gave her right up to serve on the newly created board, not the original one.

This case began back in November of 2006 when Mayor Ray Kimble and the township council passed an ordinance that allowed Kimble to appoint new members to the board to replace the existing ones because the existing members had not taken an oath of office. "Any person who is elected to any municipality in the county or state must take and subscribe to an oath as stated in Chapter 41-1," stated Township Attorney Thomas Murphy at that meeting.

The Township Clerk stated that there was no such record of any current member taking or subscribing to any form of an oath and Murphy instructed Kimble that he could appoint whomever he saw fit to fill the position, as the library board seats were then deemed vacant.

Belleville Township Manager ศัVictor Canning stated that a ≧change in the municipal aid could throw off the already delayed budget again. "We have been told by our State Senator and Ralph ☐ Caputo that it is possible our aid numbers have changed. I wanted to see if I could get an exact number before this week started but I couldn't," said Canning. "Hopefully at the July 15th scheduled meeting we can introduce the budget accurately. The state aid numbers may change but there is still a chance they may not."

"I don't know, I know very little about numbers but I do know that we have been promised lower taxes or no increases yet they continue to happen. If it is impossible than it is impossible but don't tell me it can be done if it can't," said Belleville resident Paul Killian, a senior citizen who admitted he has not





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

## Nick Grande retires after 39 years

Nick Grande didn't want last Friday to be anything more than just the final day of another school year at Belleville High School. But Grande knew it would be different, because last Friday marked his final day as an educator after 39 years, all of which were spent at the high school.

"I tried to keep it low keyed," Grande said last weekend. "But it was tough. When it was time to leave last Friday, the nostalgia really built when I was loading the car up. I had these magnets in my office, and I spelled out the word "bye" with them and left it there. That was my way of saying good bye. It's been a great run.

Grande grew up in Belleville and was graduated from Belleville High in 1965. He played football for Ed Berlinski and Tom Testa and baseball for Charley Travers and later. Nick Petti.

"My class was the first to graduate at the new high school," Grande said, referring to the building on Passaic Avenue which first opened in the fall of 1964. "I guess

I never went too far away."
Grande had been offered an appointment to attend West Point, but he turned it down and eventually attended Glassboro State College, today known as Rowan University.

"I had gone to Glassboro, but they didn't have the major in secondary education I was hoping for, so after a year, I transferred to Montclair State," Grande recalled.

While in college, Grande received a call from Sy Grossman, the Belleville Junior High principal, who had an interesting propo- him an assistant coaching position

I was originally supposed to be a wood shop and print shop teacher, but that later changed to auto shop and print shop."

with the football team, beginning ily man. He and his wife Claire were married in August, 1969 and a year later, their son, Paul Jerome, known to most as P.J., was born. In the 1980s, Grande became an assistant baseball coach to Ralph LaConte and George Zanfini. În 1988, he was promoted to head baseball coach at Belleville. One of the seniors on that team was P.J.

"I loved coaching my son," Grande said. "But it was tough, because I was probably harder on him than anyone else on the team. (The late) Sam Giuffrida once told me that the toughest thing I'll ever

do is coach my own son, and he was right. But that first year as head coach was really something. We won the NNJIL, Essex-Passaic division and had some tremendous players. I can remember a kid like Ernie Brodie pitching his heart out that year in a GNT game against Verona and talented players like Jeff Spilsbury and Jay Marchese."

Grande remained head coach through the 1993 season, and recalls with pride the play of such athletes as Steve Tice, Brian Dena, Joe DePeri, Frank Orrei, Steve Iannuzzi, Charlie Giachetti and his God son, Chris Cantarella.

"Not many people knew then that Chris was my God son," Grande said. "Chris got hurt in his senior year (1989) while playing basketball. I always remind him of

Cantarella, the current softball coach at Belleville High, also remembers his early days working with Grande.

"Claire Grande and my mother were good friends who were nurses," Cantarella said. "Eventually the families became close, and that's why Nick is my Godfather. I enjoyed playing for him. We're still close today."

Grande's teaching years at Belleville developed some strong friendships.

"There were teachers I had as a student who welcomed me as a teacher," Grande said. "People like John Klotz, Ann Schneider and Bob McDonough come to mind. As a kid, I was a basketball manager to Al LoBalbo. As a teacher, I had some great relationships with educators like Mike Lally, Sam Giuffrida, Joe Ciccone, Mike

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
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
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

## Pomp, circumstance and school policy last week



Editors choose photos that are of the best quality. Please make sure your group's best photographer is behind the lens and captures an imaginative image.

Please also include the photographer's name with the photo submission, and identify everyone in the photo, with their first and last names.

And, obviously, the photograph must be relevant to Belleville.
