Sharp critique of BPD facilities, procedures

TO THE EDITOR:

The Belleville Police Department was kind enough to show this reader how they would operate in case a terrorist cell was found in Belleville. It appears it would ignore the rights we take for granted, such as the right to see a search warrant and observe a search in one's home. When arrests take place, the citizen would not be able to contact a lawyer nor make the cherished phone call. There would be no questioning of suspected lawbreaker. Arrests would be based on the word of others, some of whom might be lawbreakers themselves. Suspects would not be able to put on clothes nor

This reader learned that police facilities are woefully inadequate. The holding cell was difficult to

shut completely. The metal detector gave a positive response when the suspect was only dressed in swim trunks. The fingerprinting machine was difficult to operate and required several efforts to get good prints. The computer camera did not work. The camera used instead showed a completely black picture. The signature pad did not work, as the battery had not been replaced. The police often used garbage bag ties instead of handcuffs, which one suspect was able to get out of. Other suspects asked for ties to be loosened, as they were too tight. The officers could not do this. Suspects were not allowed to use

a bathroom.

It would seem the town council needs to adequately fund the police facility so that officers' time is not wasted booking suspects, lessening over time and not punishing suspects who may have done nothing wrong.

It might be mentioned that this reader, when passing through the metal detector in front of the town court with keys, coins, etc. in his pocket, observed that the machine did not react; he was told the machine often does not work. This could be a danger to the court and council. Our police

Boards mulls truck buy, notification system

Villano said the system can utilize either "a text, phone or voice format. We hope to have it in place by September.

The notification plans are not tied to the current updating of the district's phone services.

No timetable on introducing uniforms, super says

So exactly what is the future of school uniforms in Belleville Public Schools?

In a phone interview the day before the new school uniforms for elementary students were unveiled in May, Assistant Superintendent of Schools Dennis Villano said in an exclusive interview that it was possible that the uniforms could be phased in in as soon as three years. That would occur with the uniforms following students into the middle school and eventually into the high school.

At the most recent school board Superintendent of Schools Dr. Edward Kliszus completely backed off discussions of a timetable, saying that the district times.

He told a resident questioning the ultimate resolution of the uniform issue, "I can't be responsible for what is said in the papers."

At the same meeting, Lisa Kistner, Consolidated Home and School Association president, said there was a concern that some children wear "hand-me-down" clothes, and their parents may not be able to afford to purchase new

Kliszus said the district is "waiting for feedback" regarding children eligible for free or reduced school lunches, to help determine who might need help. "It's in the works," he said.

Villano said the uniforms will be required for all students,

He said the plan is to offer parents an opportunity to go to two or three different locations throughout the township to purchase the proper clothing, to accommodate people in all sections of town.

The district distributed a survey to parents regarding school uniforms, and officials said more than eight out of 10 parents favored the

Villano said a package of five, three-button collared shirts and three chino-style pants could be purchased for \$100 and would make for 10 different outfits, a huge cost savings for parents during tough economic times.

After a concerned parent brought up the subject in October, school board members and the administration came up with the survey

One survey per parent was sent home, and they were numbered but anonymous. One side of the survey card was in English and the other side in Spanish.

The survey asked parents whether they favor uniforms, how many children they have, and in what grades their children current-

Specifically, the survey said the school uniform will consist of collared, three-button tops and chino bottoms, with several deviations allowed from the basics.

Borgata shows them how it's done if you can afford it



With the opening of the Borgata nearly five years ago, Atlantic City took on a brand new dimension. The first Las Vegas-calibre property brought a level of luxe and service that attracted a new breed of visitors to the resort. From day one, it was obvious that the exciting new property was creating a demand beyond Borgata's 2000 guest rooms and suites. As many AC casinos comped most of their guest accommodations on a regular basis, Borgata had tapped into a market where visitors were happy to pay for the world-class amenities, achieving a 90+ occupancy.

Within months, plans were underway for the construction of The Water Club, a non-casino boutique hotel adjacent to Borgata. Bob Boughner, the Boyd Gaming genius behind creation and launch of Borgata, muses that other casino execs would ask visitors what they wanted. Instead, Boughner sought out those who were NOT visiting AC to find out what it was that would attract them. He delivered, and they came! The Water Club opened this week, an exquisite \$400 million non-casino tower featuring 800 guestrooms and suites; a two-story 'spa in the sky;' elaborately state-of-the-art equipped meeting space; and every amenity a brilliant imagination and \$400 million could buy.

Everything about The Water Club expresses hushed elegance, from the arrival in a private garage where valets take your car to the escalator to the grand lobby where waterfalls grace the marble walls. The granite reception desk is banked with massive bundles of fresh lilies. Fresh flowers are everywhere, even to individual stems of baby orchids on the poolside chaises. Throughout the property, there are 40 different woods and over 60 different marbles incorporated into the décor. There are no actual restaurants within The Water Club, but resident celebrity chef Geoffrey Zakarian, creator/owner of two luxe Manhattan restaurants, oversees an elaborate room service operation as well as food service at the pools and spa.

Immersion, the two-story spa occupying the 32nd and 33rd floors, is entered through an Asian river rock archway with more cascading water. There' an 80 foot infinity-edge lap pool, where floor-toceiling windows offering views of the AC skyline give visitors the feeling of being suspended in space. Private individual and couples facilities offer an amazing menu of spa treatments from skinc massages and "body experiences" like the Moor Mud Body Float, to wraps, scrubs and reflexology. Unlike Borgata's Spa Tocare, Immersion is open only to registered guests at The Water Club, and the pool and workout facilities are made available to those guests who purchase Spa services. A number of the guest suites are also equipped with their own dedicated spa rooms ready for treatments in the privacy of the guests' own suites. (If you have to ask about prices, you can't afford it!) Guest room rates range from \$700+ to \$5,000 per night for a one-bedroom "Social Suite."

Harrah's has recently opened a newly-completed guestroom tower, and later this year we look forward to the opening of the luxe new 800-room Chairman Tower at Trump Taj Mahal. The mavens are betting that there's a huge market out there among the very rich who will be happy to indulge in the pleasures of AC's new offerings.



Mind safety practices on bikes, AAA advises

gas prices are leading to an AAA New Jersey Automobile Club reminds both motorcyclists and motorists to follow basic safety rules when sharing the road.

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), 4,100 motorcyclists died and another estimated 70,000 were injured nationwide in traffic crashes in 2004. About 2,500 motorcycle crashes occur in New Jersey each year resulting in more than 50 fatalities and over 2,000 injuries, according to the Federal Highway Authority.

"Motorcyclists need to understand that motorists can't always see them; and motorists need to constantly be on the lookout for motorcyclists," said Hank Frank, Jr., the Club's external operations manager and a motorcycle-training instructor. "Since motorcycles are smaller than cars, it's hard for motorists to judge a motorcycle's speed or distance. It's important to always leave enough maneuvering space between and around vehicles?

AAA offers these tips for motorcyclists:

■ Obey the laws and traffic signals. Don't ride after consuming alcohol, don't exceed the speed limit and communicate your intentions by using turn signals, hand signals and brake lights.

■ Be visible to others. Wear reflective and/or bright colored clothing and use reflective materials on your bike and helmet, especially when riding at night or in bad weather. Always use your headlights - both day and night and be sure to flash your brake

Belleville taking part in speeding crackdown this month

Law enforcement officers from the Belleville Police Department will be cracking down on speeding motorists this summer, as part of the "Obey the Signs or Pay the Fines," initiative.

The program began July 1, in advance of the July 4th holiday, and runs through July 31, in more than 180 northern New Jersey municipalities.

Police agencies in Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Morris, Passaic, Sussex, and Warren counties will

participate in the campaign, which resulted in more than 10,800 speeding citations during the 2007 crackdown.

"Excessive speed, particularly on local roads, is one of the leading contributors to traffic crashes," said Pam Fischer, Director of the New Jersey Division of Highway Traffic Safety. "Last year, 22,839 crashes were speed-related, and 166 of those crashes resulted in fatalities."

Speeding reduces a driver's ability to steer safely around curves or 3405.
