The hunt is on for new superintendent Search committee may opt for interim schools head

School board members said the search for a new superintendent of schools will proceed as quickly as possible, while one former school board president said the current superintendent's departure came unexpectedly and evoked some negative emotions.

Current Superintendent of Schools Dr. Edward Kliszus announced at the July 21 Board of Education meeting that he is leaving the district effective Oct. 1 to take a similar position in Hackensack. His contract will run from October through the next four years in Hackensack.

The school board's leaders immediately formed an ad-hoc committee to begin the search for a new district leader. School Board President Joseph Longo, board vice president Bill Freda and former board president and current trustee Arlene Schor make up the

three-member committee.

Longo said the committee is soliciting input from the New Jersey School Boards Association "about the best way to do the search," and that the process will "take a fairly long period."

He said the district will be advertising for the position, and accept applications and resumes.

"We will then weed the applicants down to a small number, and eventually the committee will make a recommendation," Longo said. "We might have to hire an interim superintendent, the way they did when (former superintendent) Dr. (Joseph) Ciccone left."

He said there is no hard and fast answer to filling the position, and that while the board would like to do so as fast as possible, "We want to make a good choice, and we can't let time force us into a decision."

Freda said the committee "needs to begin the process ASAP." He said that is necessary

because of the length of the process.

"It will take us a number of months to get one," Freda said. "That's why we immediately swung into an ad-hoc committee."

He said the committee will have to figure out what is needed in Kliszus' replacement.

"We will sit down and define exactly what we're looking for," Freda said. "That way, when we reach out for someone, we'll know

what the search criteria is."

The conversation then turned to the departing superintendent's decision.

"I couldn't speculate on his motivation," Freda said. "I do know that it's around the four-year mark that seems to be about right (for a superintendent to leave)."

Board member William Villano is a two time board president and the longest-tenured board member in his second decade, and he offered this statement about Kliszus' departure.

"To say I was surprised would be an accurate statement," Villano said. "I guess you could say I was saddened. He did some major things during his time."

Villano said he wanted to be clear that he will not be part of the search process, and may not be able to vote on the final candidate.

Dennis Villano, his brother, is the current assistant superintendent of schools and may emerge as a candidate.

New law puts more responsibility on bar owners

The safety of a drunken patron may now fall in the hands of the bar they were last seen in according to a recent court ruling.

The decision was made in a New Jersey state appellate court where it was decided by a panel of judges that a tavern may be liable for negligence if it makes no effort to keep a visibly drunken patron safe, even if his or her drinking was done elsewhere.

The ruling came during the case of *Bauer v. Nesbitt*, which dealt with a drunk driving accident that occurred back in September of 2003.

Frederick Nesbitt, 19 at the time, was out with James Hamby, 21, at the C View Inn in Cape May, New Jersey where allegedly Nesbitt was only served soda because he was underage. The bar was unaware that Nesbitt had been drinking beforehand and that he was also allegedly having alcohol poured into his drink by Hamby. Nesbitt became "visibly drunk" before leaving with Hamby. Nesbitt would then travel down the Garden State Parkway North with a blood alcohol level of .199, twice that of the legal limit, and would crash into a guard rail. Hamby was pronounced dead on the scene and Nesbitt would be charged with vehicular homicide. Hamby's estate would later sue Nesbitt and the tavern the two were last seen at.

Although employees of the inn say they never served Nesbitt alcohol or noticed he was drunk, there was testimony given that the two met three friends at the inn. All but Nesbitt proceeded to drink successive mugs of beer over the next two-hour period at a table described as only a few feet from the bar and in plain view of the bartender.

There was no evidence that Nesbitt drank beer or was served alcohol but he admitted that Hamby spiked two of his cokes with rum. Allegedly Hamby was so drunk that he exposed his penis on the table.

The judges reversed a trial court's dismissal of the case on summary judgement. The case was

dismissed by Superior Court Judge Joseph Visalli on the basis that the inn did not serve Nesbitt any alcohol.

The Appellate Division did not see things the same way and New Jersey Appellate Division Judge Edith Payne wrote, "The inn had a duty to protect him [Hamby] from foreseeable injury as the result of an automobile accident by insuring he did not drive or ride passenger with a patron who was similarly impaired."

Judge Payne went on to say, "If, as the evidence we have recounted permits a jury to conclude, Nesbitt was visibly intoxicated while at the C View Inn, then a duty of reasonable care for his safety arose, regardless of whether Nesbitt's intoxication resulted from the service of alcohol by the inn or from other cases."

"That included a duty to protect Nesbitt from the foreseeable risk of injury to himself and others from an automobile accident by insuring that Nesbitt did not drive while in an intoxicated state."

Payne also noted that there was no indication that the inn tried to cut off the flow of alcohol or call a cab for any member of the group when they left, despite waitress testimony that the inn had done so for other customers on prior occasions.

The unanimous decision by the judges now means that New Jersey bars can be sued for the actions of drunk drivers who leave those establishments, even if the drivers consumed no alcohol while at the bars. Local bar owners and employees were not thrilled with this news. "This is complete garbage. It is one thing if we spoon feed the guy Captain Morgan and then hand him his keys and send him ripping down Route 3 but if someone stumbles in to our bar and we kick him out we are responsible for that? How can we control what someone does before they get here and why should we have to assume responsibility both morally and financially for them?" stated a local bartender at Shannon Rose, a bar at the Clifton Commons. "Look, I don't want anyone to get hurt obviously but this is ridiculous. We have to call

someone a cab because they had too much to drink two towns over and stumbled into our place last? Since when is it not your own responsibility? How many more exceptions are they going to make to bail people out who make dumb choices?"

An employee at "MacMurphys," a bar and restaurant in Ridgewood had a similar reaction to the ruling. "We were told about this but I couldn't even believe it. I mean is this for real? How could they rule this," questioned Mark Burman, 32. "I have been in this business for

a couple years now and we do our best to make sure no one wasted gets behind the wheel but when its Saturday night and you got over a hundred people running around you can't play babysitter for everyone. The best I can do is not serve someone who looks like they had too much and call them a cab. How can we be expected to monitor someone who has not even taken a sip of alcohol in our place? It's absurd."

Some bars have begun training programs to teach their employees how to intervene with patrons that

have had too much to drink. The Verona-Cedar Grove Times reported that the Il Tulipano Restaurant in Cedar Grove has their employees undergo Training for Intervention Procedures to help them cope with aggressive patrons looking to booze and drive. "We tell them that their safety is more important than their money. That seems to make a big impression on them," said restaurant owner Gregorio Polimenia, Jr. in an interview with the Times. "You have to be prepared to take a little abuse. In the end, it is about protecting these people."

Schools need new textbooks, board says

The need for newer textbooks was brought to the attention of the school board and administration at the most recent public board of education meeting July 21, with one board member taking the outgoing superintendent of schools to task for not correcting the problem sooner.

Board member Arlene Schor chairs the school board's curriculum committee, and said the copyright dates for some new textbooks being ordered for the 2008-2009 school year cause her concern.

"We have textbook purchases that we have to vote on annually," Schor said. "We need to bring to the board's and (Superintendent of Schools) Dr. (Edward) Kliszus' attention that there is a problem."

She said certain textbooks copy-

rights are "way over 10 years" old. "They need to be addressed," Schor said sternly. "Some foreign language books may have a little bit more life in them, but 1987 is a bit of a stretch. That was the date on one language class. Another had 1989."

She said one of the jobs of each academic department is to keep up

with its obligations for updating technology and procedures.

"Using books that are over 10 years old is a problem," Schor said. "They need to use a little newer books."

She suggested that supervisors review each class by text, and come with a budget for updated textbooks.

At this point, School Board President Joseph Longo said he was told the previous weekend that in a music history and theory class, there are no textbooks.

"One teacher is buying their own materials," Longo said.

Schor responded, "I don't want to zero in on any one department. There is more than one department that doesn't have anything listed."

Kliszus said that as part of the new state review process, there is a plan of action to monitor curriculum guides and textbooks, and fix any problems so that the books are aligned with New Jersey standards, not just a new copyright date.

"It's part of an action plan already in place," Kliszus said. "We're right there. It's going to be addressed."

Schor responded sternly that the problems should have already been addressed.

Super search may lead to super costs

The Board of Education committee charged with finding a new superintendent of schools has its work cut out for it. The replacement for Edward Kliszus, who departs for the Hackensack Public Schools this year, will come from a relatively small pool of highly qualified candidates who, generally, are able to command high salaries and lavish benefits packages.

Superintendents in New Jersey and across the country are among the most generously compensated public servants. In Belleville and elsewhere, they earn far more than chiefs of police, town managers, engineers or other professionals.

The reasons for this stem from the fact that, first, running a school district effectively is an absolutely vital task. It can also be a fiendishly difficult one too. Everything happening in society

at large is happening in the schools too, so supers must tackle a stunning array of issues, from drug abuse to family breakdown to the influx of immigrants to a host of civil rights issues. Superintendents, even in pleasant, sleepy suburban districts, have a tough job.

But the salary and benefits scale is also relatively high because supers spring from a unionized workforce that has successfully won good wages and benefits itself. Teachers generally get more money with more education, so they have an incentive to rack up master's degrees and postgraduate credits.

Here in Belleville, the challenge has to be to contain expenses. There is no getting around the fact that a super will be paid something well north of \$150,000 a year, but other efforts can

be made to reign in costs. For example, in some communities boards of education have signed contracts that entitle supers to collect big paydays in the form of accrued sick time and other perks when they retire or leave the district. These one-off payouts have been considerable – sometimes in the region of half a million dollars or more.

So the board and its lawyer must be careful when crafting a superintendent contract. They might also consider very well qualified candidates who do not possess a doctorate, as most, but not all, superintendents hold. Doing this might provide Belleville with a qualified professional at the helm while keeping the cost of hiring him or her to a minimum.

Belleville schools addressing a 'relative' problem

Some residents have complained long and loudly about nepotism running rampant in the Belleville Public School System over the years. Steps have been taken to change the perception that family members of Board of Education personnel have been given preferential treatment, and now the state has mandated an even more stringent policy to prevent the practice.

School board member Arlene Schor chairs the school board's policy committee, and she summa-

rized the state's changes at the July 21 public board meeting.

"We have to institute a new policy on nepotism, effective as of July 1," Schor said. "We have received information from the state, and some of the language is exactly the same as the state statute."

The policy defines a relative as anyone in the immediate family, including in-laws, all the way down to nieces and nephews, grandparents and children of board members and school administrators, Schor said. Administrators include academic department directors all the way down to school principals.

A key component of the mandated changes is that those already employed may continue, she said.

The other important area covered by the mandate has to do with school district officials being prohibited from being involved in the development of personnel contracts. All personnel of relatives are excluded from such activities, Schor said.

For example, personnel of relatives cannot be part of a collective bargaining unit working a new contract for school personnel, while the structure of a contract is being formulated. However, once a contract is ready to be voted upon

by a board member, that board member can cast a vote even it involves a relative, Schor said.

The new policy applies to any board member or administrator who has a relative in another district, but again they may fully participate in a vote after negotiations

are completed, she said.

The new policy was on the agenda of the July 21 public meeting for a first reading.

After a second reading in August, the policy will become official, but will be retroactive to July 1.

Belleville taking part in speeding crackdown this month

Law enforcement officers from the Belleville Police Department will be cracking down on speeding motorists this summer, as part of the "Obey the Signs or Pay the Fines," initiative. The program began July 1, in advance of the July 4th holiday, and runs through July 31, in more than 180 northern New Jersey municipalities.

Police agencies in Bergen, Essex, Hudson, Morris, Passaic, Sussex, and Warren counties will participate in the campaign, which resulted in more than 10,800

speeding citations during the 2007 crackdown.

"Excessive speed, particularly on local roads, is one of the leading contributors to traffic crashes," said Pam Fischer, Director of the New Jersey Division of Highway Traffic Safety. "Last year, 22,839 crashes were speed-related, and 166 of those crashes resulted in fatalities."

Speeding reduces a driver's ability to steer safely around curves or objects in the roadway. It also extends the distance necessary to stop a vehicle, and it increases the

distance a vehicle travels while the driver notices and reacts to a dangerous situation.

"If you're speeding in New Jersey, you will be stopped and you will be fined," Fischer added. "Police will not give warnings. They will be writing tickets."

County College offering dietary management certification

Essex County College will launch a Dietary Management certificate program this fall in conjunction with the University of Medicine and Dentistry of New Jersey.

Students will be able to complete the 33 credit certificate program in about a year and secure work in various health care facilities, said ECC Allied Health Chairperson Martin Asobayire. These facilities include hospitals, rehabilitation centers and senior citizen residences. He said he expects students who enroll in the certificate program to have some knowledge in both science and general nutrition.

Existing courses in biology, math, English and psychology totaling 18 credits will be offered at Essex, with the dietary courses and

clinical work taken at UMDNJ.

To sell or not to sell: That's now the School 1 question

With the proposed sale of the former School #1 officially dead, school board members are planning the next move for the property, with one member against trying to sell the school and another questioning if the housing market weighs against a proposed sale. The possibility of state money to complete overdue school improvement and construction projects is also a possibility, since many projects were to be funded with the \$2.4 garnered from the school's sale.

The due diligence period for the proposed sale passed at the end of

June, and the developer had the option to increase his contribution to equal 10 percent of the full price of purchase to continue the process. Since he has not, the deal is for all intents and purposes over. The potential developer of a possible townhouse or other residential project on the existing site of the former School #1 had been given yet another extension to decide whether or not to move forward with the project. The \$2.4 million price to acquire the property may have been too steep in the terrible real estate market, some have speculated.

School Board President Joseph Longo said Monday there "are

varying options about what to do. We'll take it back to the buildings and grounds committee to discuss what the options are and make a recommendation. There is no telling at this point."

He said he has "mixed feelings" about keeping the property versus selling it, and that the different arguments "are all legitimate."

"Maybe we should make use of it since it is our property, and the state of the real estate market may be a consideration," Longo said. "Everything will be dictated for our plans by costs, and weighing all our options."

In the meantime, the money that was supposed to fund badly

needed school improvements is not coming, and Longo said that also must be addressed.

"There are some ideas out there based on what are the greatest needs, and that also needs to go back to buildings and grounds," he said. "We have to figure out how to complete the projects that we really need to get done. We'll see if we can figure out some way to find out what, if anything could be done. It's unfortunate, we're back at square one."

School Board Vice President Bill Freda said he is against selling the property. "I think we need to explore what to do next, but it is not a good idea to sell the property," he said. "I am not in favor of selling it again, especially in light of

the housing market."

Freda said that there is now supposedly "a wealth of dollars" set aside by the state to fund school construction projects.

"We need to see what we can get from the state," he said. "If the state has money set aside, clearly we want to get it. The Holy Grail would be to get a new (School #4) built out of it. The average age of our schools is 80 years. We're in need of a facelift."

School board member William Villano, the most senior member of the board in his second decade, said anything can happen now. "Clearly, it's wide open right now," he said. "It needs to go back to buildings and grounds, with a recommendation for the full board to discuss."

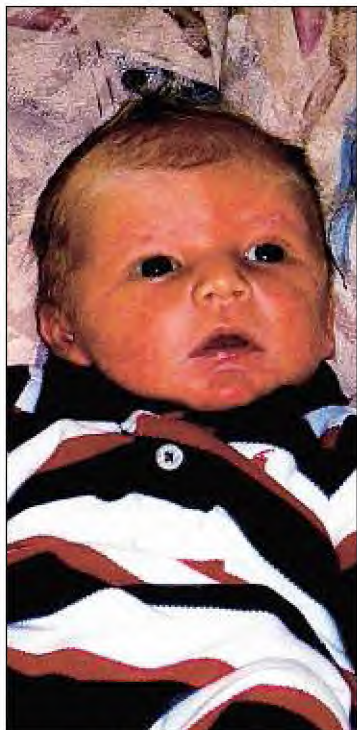

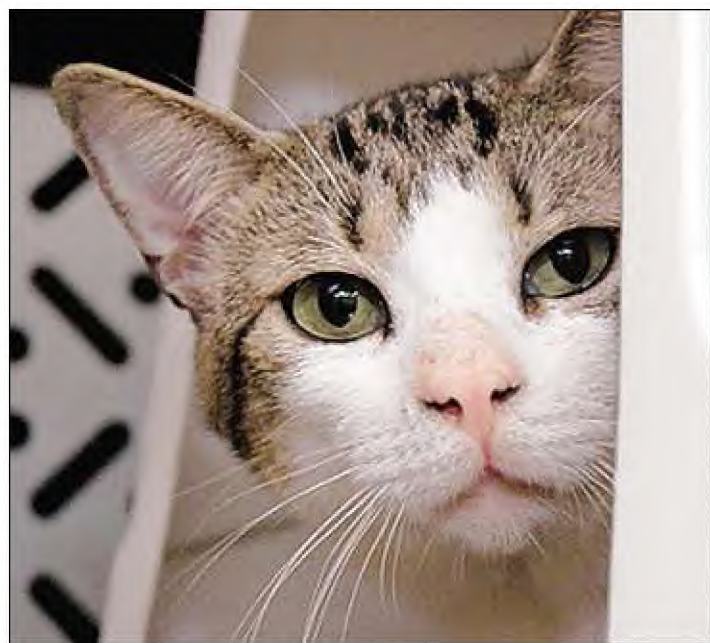

25 years later, Belleville softball team is fondly remembered

It's hard to believe that a quarter century has passed, but time has indeed been good to the 1983 Belleville High softball team.

For the next few weeks, we'll look back at that team, which finished 23-4 and won a second straight Essex County Tournament championship.

In a way, the '83 team was somewhat overlooked, mainly because of its predecessor. The 1982 Bucs were a phenomenal team which put Belleville softball on the map in a big way. The '82 team was 24-2-2 and won the school's first county softball title. It had a marvelous senior class, led by Rosie Leonidis, Mona Stampe and Nancy Coffey. That team was expected to be good and it lived up to the hype.

Carl Corino, who took over as head coach prior to the 1980 campaign, remembers that era well.

"I've always said that when it came to Belleville sports, those times were incredible," Corino said recently. "Not just for softball, but just about every sport at Belleville. There were some great teams back then."

Corino had succeeded his wife, Eve, as Belleville's softball coach prior to the '80 season and led that

team to a 20-8 record and a spot in the county final, where it lost to Cedar Grove, 4-0. The following year, Belleville struggled somewhat, even though it did finish 18-8.

The '81 season ended with an unlikely loss to Shabazz in the state tournament, a defeat which left the players feeling somewhat numb.

That loss was the catalyst for 1982, and Belleville would dominate, losing just once in its first 27 games before a stunning 6-4 setback to Livingston in the NJSIAA, North Jersey, Section 2, Group 4 semifinal at Belleville. It was stunning because Belleville had a 4-0

lead in the game and appeared on the way to an easy win. Three days later, the teams met again, this time for the county title, and Belleville won, 8-0, to conclude an incredible year.

"There was a lot of pressure attached to that '82 county final," Corino said. "Back then, we didn't play in a conference, so if we lost that county final, especially after the state game with Livingston, the season wouldn't have been remembered the way it is today. We really needed to win a county championship that year."

Heading into 1983, Belleville was confident, even though it had lost some talented seniors. Returning would be the junior battery of pitcher Dina DeAquino and catcher Tracy Buono, senior shortstop Kim Indiero and sophomore centerfielder Donna Brooks. Freshman Desiree Johansen would also make an immediate impact at third base, as did senior Lois DeLuccio, who replaced Stampe at first base.

Over the next two weeks, we'll look back at that '83 season, with some comments from the players who helped make that team very special.

The victory moved Belleville into last Sunday's second round, where it ran into a buzzsaw from Bergenfield and lost, 14-0.

"They were a very good team," Sorce said of Bergenfield. "They had some older kids with more playing experience. It was a tough game, but that's the kind of competition we can learn from."

Last Monday, the season ended with a loss to Livingston in the double-elimination tournament. Shawn Gonzalez had three hits to lead Belleville while Chris Judge, Gabe Rivera and Joe O'Donnell had two hits each.

Kris Bosea hit a two-run single to draw Belleville within 5-3 in the third inning.

Belleville got as close as 5-4 before Livingston pulled away with two runs in the seventh and eighth innings.

"We got a win in the state tournament and opened some eyes from other teams," Sorce said. "All in all, it was an excellent summer."

Memories of Shea Stadium

Last week, I looked back at some of the best games I ever saw at Yankee Stadium. This week, here's a look at the best I ever witnessed at Shea Stadium. If you have some memories of games you attended at either venue, please write me at mike051893@aol.com. I'd love to hear about them.

As a diehard St. Louis Cardinals fan for 40 years, you can probably guess that there will be a few games with St. Louis on this list. My list starts with a tie for tenth place, and then works its way down to number one.

#10 - Sept. 12, 1987. A day after Terry Pendleton's homer leads St. Louis to a big win over the Mets, the Cards rout Dwight Gooden and the Mets, 8-1. St. Louis goes on to win the N.L. East and later, the National League pennant.

#10 - Nov. 23, 1980. Lots of Jets games on my top 10, too. I affectionately call it the Jackie and Ronnie Wis game. If Jackie is reading this, she knows why. (Jackie had to be the only Oilers fan sitting in our section that day). Anyway, it was a crazy game, with the Jets leading the Houston Oilers, 21-0, in the fourth quarter before Kenny Stabler rallies Houston back. Thirty five points are scored in the fourth quarter alone, and the game goes

driven there. This time, I took the DeCamp bus to Port Authority and then the #7 train to Shea. For a 14-year-old kid, that was something special. Anyway, the Cubs beat the Mets that afternoon, 5-1, as Burt Hooton pitched a complete game, scattering four hits.

#7 - Oct. 2, 1977. This was my first game at Shea as a Jets season ticket holder. My father and I had finally gotten season tickets after waiting for years. Anyway, I remember getting to our seats, for the first time, and seeing how close we were to the field. We were right behind the visitor's bench, on the field level, and we had those seats for seven seasons before the Jets moved to Giants Stadium for the '84 campaign. Anyway, the Jets upset the New England Patriots on this day, 30-27, as Greg Buttle intercepted a Steve Grogan pass late in the game to set up a Pat Leahy field goal.

#6 - June 24, 1972. The St. Louis Cardinals blank the Mets, 11-0, as Reggie Cleveland spins a six-hitter and the Cardinals bang out 17 hits, 10 of which come against starting pitcher Tom Seaver. Luis Melendez hit a grand-slam homer for St. Louis in that game off Seaver, as well. I think I was the only one left in my section by the seventh inning

of this game.

#5 - Aug. 4, 1973. The Cardinals edge the Mets, 4-3, but lose Bob Gibson for six weeks to a knee injury. Gibson, my favorite player of all time, was on first base after getting a hit, but was doubled off and twisted his knee. The Cards were in first place at the time, but the Mets go on to win the division in the famous 'Ya Gotta Believe' season, made popular by Tug McGraw.

#4 - June 23, 1968. It was the first professional sporting event I ever attended, on a Sunday afternoon at Shea Stadium. Helmet Day, to top it off. The Mets edge the Dodgers, 5-4, as Nolan Ryan beats Bill Singer. You never forget your first game.

#3 - Nov. 27, 1977. My buddy Tommy Agosta might remember this game. Tommy and I both loved those Steelers teams of the 70s and I was a huge Jack Lambert fan. Lambert wasn't supposed to play that day because of a knee injury, but when the Steelers fell behind in the second quarter, Lambert, to my delight, went in and played a great game. Steelers won, 23-20. But for Tom and I, there was nothing like seeing the Steelers play in person that day.

#2 - Oct. 27, 1968. A few days

before, my father told me he had gotten tickets for the upcoming Jets game. As a 10-year-old, who loved Joe Namath, this was the ultimate. (I had never been to a professional football game before). 1968 was the first year I became an avid sports fan and to go to a Jets game was incredible. The Jets didn't disappoint, winning 48-14 as Matt Snell and Billy Joe scored twice and Namath played a good game. That was such a tremendous experience, watching the Jets play in person. I can even remember the scores of the out-of-town games on the Shea scoreboard that day. Of course, the '68 Jets went on to its best season, ever, winning Super Bowl III.

#1 - Sept. 1, 1968. It was the first time I ever saw my Cardinals play in person. What other game could be number one for me? The Cards won, 3-2, in 11 innings. Dick Hughes was the starting pitcher for the Cards while Dick Selma started for the Mets. Lou Brock scored the game-winning run for St. Louis. The '68 Cards went on to the World Series, where they lost to Detroit in seven games. (I was devastated.) It took 38 years to avenge that series, but St. Louis beat Detroit in five games two years ago to win the Series.

County announces passport, other outreach services

Essex County Clerk Christopher J. Durkin announces the August 2008 Outreach Program will be at the Belleville Public Library, 221 Washington Ave. on August 14 from 11:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

People will be able to obtain passports, notary oaths, Veterans licenses or file for physicians' licenses; no senior cards will be issued. Photos can now be taken on site for \$10.

All applicants must come in person, please allow 4-6 weeks for passport processing prior to date of departure. Please allow 2-3 weeks for expedited passports.

Applicants who are 16-18 years old can appear with only one parent unless they have a valid permanent driver's license. Children 15 and under must have both par-

ents present to execute a passport application. If only one parent is available, proof must be submitted that the applying parent has sole authority or consent to obtain the passport.

Requirements to obtain a passport are an original or certified copy of birth certificate with raised seal and date of filing from city or state of birth or original naturalization certificate or a previous US passport.

Children 15 years or younger renewing a US passport must submit both the passport and original or certified birth certificate showing the full names of both parents. All applicants must have a social security number.

ID such as a driver's license, government employee ID card, or

previous US passport not more than 15 years old from date of issuance.

If none of the above-required identification is available, an identifying witness, who has known him/her for at least two years, must

accompany the applicant. Said witness must be a US citizen or resident alien and be able to establish their own identity by one of the above means. Applicant must have three forms of identification in addition to an identifying witness. Parents applying for minor children must be able to identify themselves using the above requirements.

Two identical photographs (2"x2") with light background and non-glossy finish (full faced only). School photos are unacceptable.

All fees must be paid by separate checks. Passport fees are \$75 for adults and \$60 for children 15 years and younger.

Expedited service fees are \$149.85 for adults and \$135.85 for children.

Checks or US Postal Money Order are to be made payable to US Department of State. There is a \$25 processing fee and \$41 processing fee for expedited services payable by cash, certified check or US Postal Money Order made payable to the Essex County Clerk.

Notary Public Oath Administered fee is \$15 payable by cash, certified check or US Postal Money Order made payable to the Essex County Clerk.

Those applying for Veterans License must have the DD214 form in addition to proof of residency and signature.

There is a \$25 fee for applicants filing for a physicians license payable by cash, certified check or US Postal Money Order made payable to the Essex County Clerk.

The American Red Cross will offer a class for volunteer Braille transcribers beginning Tuesday, September 9, 2008 at 1:00pm at the Northern New Jersey Chapter headquarters located at 209 Fairfield Road in Fairfield, home to the world's largest remaining volunteer Braille production center.

The course, which lasts approximately twenty weeks, includes a two-hour class and about 12 hours of homework weekly.

There is no charge for the training, and all materials and equipment will be supplied by the Red Cross.

After completing the course, participants prepare a trial manuscript for submission to the Red Cross for certification.

Upon certification, the transcriber will be ready to prepare Braille textbooks for blind children in New Jersey schools and throughout the country and the world. These books allow blind children to be mainstreamed instead of having specialized schooling.

And, transcribers can make a difference in the lives of blind children on their own schedule and from the comfort of their own homes, without the hassle of travel and high gas prices.

20 Tips for our readers on how to submit photos to the *Belleville Times*

Candid photos of people having a good time or actually doing something will draw readers' interest.

Changing the angle from which you are shooting can make significant difference in the aesthetics of a photo. Try shooting from a higher or lower angle. Photos of a few people, rather than a large group, are more noticeable, as readers respond to faces and the newspaper can identify them in a caption.

Editors choose photos that are of the best quality. Please make sure your group's best photographer is behind the lens and captures an imaginative image.

Please also include the photographer's name with the photo submission, and identify everyone in the photo, with their first and last names.

And, obviously, the photograph must be relevant to Belleville.

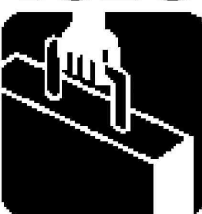
