BOE still working on nepotism policy

A school board committee attempted to alter its version of the new state requirements to prevent nepotism from occurring in School Board Member hiring of personnel in the Belleville Public School System, bringing questions from a local former political leader. The school board member who chairs the committee announced the newly formed policy needs at the Aug. 25 meeting, but after the audience member complained the board president said two members of the committee are being replaced. The policy will not be approved until new members are chosen and review the plan.

Committee members Eric Jr. are to be removed from the committee chaired by board member Arlene Schor, Yanuzzi said he was told by school board president Joseph Longo.

Steps have been taken to change the perception that fami-ly members of Board of Education personnel have been given preferential treatment.

School board member Arlene Schor chairs the school board's policy committee, and she said the board needed to table the new nepotism policy at the Aug. 11 public Board of Education meet-

"We did not definitively" implement the state's policy, she said. "We made it more limiting than what the state would have us impose. We want to more clearly reflect the state statute."

She summarized the proposed changes that were tabled on Aug. 11 at the earlier July 21 public board meeting.

Schor said the board had to institute a new policy on nepotism, effective as of July 1. The board received information from the state, and some of the language is not exactly the same as the state statute.

The tabled policy defined a relative as anyone in the immediate The changes have to be family, including in-laws, all the way down to nieces and nephews, grandparents and children of board members and school Schor Administrators include academic department directors all the way down to school principals.

The other important area cov-Schwartz and Vincent Strumolo, ered by the mandate has to do with school district officials being prohibited from being involved in the development of personnel contracts. All personnel of relatives are excluded from such activities, Schor said.

For example, personnel of relatives cannot be part of a collective bargaining unit working a new contract for school personnel, while the structure of a contract is being formulated. However, once a contract is ready to be voted upon by a board member, that board member can cast a vote even it involves a relative, Schor

The new policy applies to any board member or administrator who has a relative in another district, but again they may fully participate in a vote after negotiations are completed, she said.



Residents displaced by house fire over the weekend; no one hurt

A residential home was rendered uninhabitable after a later he said. afternoon fire over the long holiday weekend, but there were no injuries to occupants or firefighters in the blaze.

The residential house fire was called in to fire headquarters at 5:45 p.m. on Sunday, Aug. 31, according to Firefighter Scott Wentworth, spokesman for the fire department.

The fire rose to two alarms, with the 12 firefighters on duty assisted by firefighters from neighboring Nutley and Bloomfield departments.

There were no injuries reported to either civilians or fire personnel, Wentworth reported

The fire was at 119 White Oak worth said.

While the cause is officially so far undetermined, fire officials believe the cause was accidental,

Firefighters brought the blaze under control in approximately a half hour, at 6:15 p.m. The entire scene was not cleared, however, until 1 a.m.

The home is now considered uninhabitable to residents, who have been temporarily relocated until more permanent accommodations can be arranged, Wentworth said.

The fire started in the back of the house and then spread before firefighters could battle the fire under control, he said.



With league alignments, 'good' may be good enough

It's a dilemma as old as New Jersey high school sports. Teams from smaller high schools are thrust into competition with parochial powerhouses who have their pick of talented boys and girls from a huge geographic area many, many times the size of the smaller school's district. Blowouts - and hard feelings by the losing schools - ensue.

Coaches at Belleville and a lot of other smaller high schools have a legitimate gripe. Parochial schools can effectively recruit, creaming off the best athletes from a number of towns. Doing something about it, however, has proved to be a tough nut to crack.

That's why state high school athletic officials had their work cut out for them when they

decided to re-jigger the leagues to make them more fair, a realignment that was announced last month. Most coaches and athletic directors say it's an improvement, but still far from ideal. Yet ideal may be an unrealistic standard. Instead, it may just be enough to make sure that league play is as fair as possible to as many schools as possible.

Consider the complexity of the task. For one thing, the schools each field lots of teams in a bunch of sports, which means that many schools may be dominant in one sport but not so much another. Bloomfield Tech, for instance, is tops in basketball and Seton Hall Prep is a baseball monster - but neither is a traditional powerhouse in football. In crafting a "fair"

league, which sports do you consider?

Likewise, simply creating an all-parochial league doesn't much work either, since this would be unfair to the parochials (which wouldn't have many teams to play, probably not enough to round out a decent season).

Bearing all this in mind, league officials decided to focus on ensuring parity in school size, keeping conferences geographically compact and "spreading out" the parochial schools, so no one public school has a schedule overloaded with Don Boscos and Bergen Catholics. These are good, reasonable criteria, and adhering to them offers the best chance for creating the greatest fairness for the greatest number of teams.

Roche HQ move now on hold as deal falls through

The rumored move by Hoffman La-Roche to California has been delayed after Genentech Inc. recently rejected the opening bid by Roche.

The rejection came nearly a month after Roche offered to pay \$43.7 billion to buyout Genentech and move its headquarters from Nutley to California. The buyout valued the remaining 44 percent of shares that Roche does not own at \$88 a share, a value that some thought was too low. Many Wall Street analysts believe that the actual value of Genentech stock is roughly \$100 per share.

This rejection was expected by many in the business world and was thought to just be the beginning of the negotiating process. Genentech may need to tread care-

under an agreement with the two companies, a majority of non-Roche shareholders must approve any sale or merger of Genentech with Roche. If shareholders reject the bid, Roche can then hire investment banks to set the price for Genentech's remaining shares, according to an article in The New York Times.

Genentech indicated in the article that they are not necessarily bound by that agreement and that they are working diligently to ensure as few layoffs as possible for their 10,700 plus employees. Genentech representatives have also stated that they want to be sure that Roche will maintain a "hands-off" philosophy with the company and allow them to conthey currently are.

Student performance is the second category and is measured by taking the sum of the standardized rank scores for average combined SAT score, students showing advanced proficiency on HSPA and students scoring a 3 or higher on AP tests as a percentage of total juniors and seniors.

multiplied by the percentage of graduates going on to post-secondary education. Those attending four-year colleges were given a weight of 1.5 while those attending two-year college were give a weight of one. Students going to other colleges or post-secondary schools were given a weight of .67.

The final score for each category was then added together, giving each school a grand total number that was used to rank them in order by the folks at the Monmouth University Polling Institute.





Debbie does Resorts

all next week

his weekend will see the return of beloved superstar Debbie Reynolds, who opens Sunday at Resorts for five shows through next Friday night. A consistent audience pleaser, Ms. Reynolds epitomizes the rare handful of well-rounded, multi-talented performers who are able to deliver a one-man (or, in this case, one-woman) variety show!

It all started when, recently arrived from her native Texas, 16-yearold Mary Frances Reynolds won the title of Miss Burbank. "The beauty contest carried a prize of a blouse and a scarf," Debbie recalls. "We were very poor, and that prize was very appealing." The newly-won title brought her to the attention of MGM moguls who promptly cast her into small movie roles which propitiously catapulted her into national attention. Of course, the unsinkable Debbie Reynolds worked like a trouper, and earned the respect of terpsichorean co-stars Gene Kelly and Donald O'Connor as well as the hearts of all America.

Her career progressed with a series of hit recordings and blockbuster films like Tammy and The Unsinkable Molly Brown, with a foray to Broadway with the revival of Irene, the story of the legendary dancer Irene Castle. Belleville's Senesky begins second season at Castle Park

He's beginning his 41st year of coaching and teaching, and while the scenery has changed somewhat, the passion for developing young men into athletes and, more importantly, productive members of society, has never left John Senesky's heart.

Senesky, who devoted over 30 years of his life to Belleville High football, either as a player or coach, not to mention 34 consecutive years as a teacher at Belleville, is beginning his second season as the head football coach at Castle Park High School, located in Chula Vista, a suburb of San Diego, California. Senesky and his wife, Carmela, moved to San Diego in 2002, ostensibly after John "retired" as a teacher at Belleville





Tips For Finding Work Overseas

With technological advancecloser together, it's no surprise many of the world's workers are interested in working abroad. An increasingly global market has thusly created an increasingly global workforce.

However, much like a recent college graduate may find it difficult to get his or her foot in the door in a chosen field, a worker looking to land a first job overseas may also face some challenges. While the notion of an international job hunt can seem daunting, it doesn't have to be if the right approach is taken.

- Align yourself with an American company. A big roadblock many job seekers face when searching for work abroad is securing a visa. Foreign countries typically discourage their companies from hiring overseas workers. However, larger American companies with operations all over the world are more adept at securing visas for their workers, and are more likely to be successful in securing such visas than an individual attempting to alone. If possible, find domestic work with a company in your home country and then apply for an international transfer after you've worked with the company. Workers willing to travel internationally, while growing, are still somewhat of a rare commodity, so that flexibility will likely be attractive to prospective employers.
- Be willing to teach. Teaching visas are often far easier to come by than standard work visas. Even if you don't have a strong teaching background, countries all over the world grant visas to people who agree to teach English overseas. Such opportunities can also provide you with a chance to network, as you're likely to meet professionals with business contacts of their own who might be able to help you find work.

■ Study abroad if possible. has proposed legislation that summary of voter registration eliwould require all New Jersey schools to provide voter registration materials to graduating high school students.

Caputo, D-Essex, a former educator, said the law would increase the likelihood that voter registration materials are received by young people and promote voting among them.

"With so many key issues facing us today, whether it be global conflicts, environmental worries, economic fears or health care concerns, it's more important than ever that young people have their voices heard," Caputo said. "This bill will help ensure that happens?

Under the bill (A-2752), each public school board - and officials in private schools - would provide

Assemblyman Ralph R. Caputo a voter registration form and a gibility requirements to each graduating high school pupil.

The material would be nonpartisan and conform to state election laws.

"There's no better time to emphasize the role of being a citizen and the importance of voting than when a teen-ager is entering the world after receiving their high school diploma," Čaputo

The law would apply to the first school year following its passage.

"The easier it is for people to understand how to register to vote, the better we'll be as a society," Caputo said. "This is a simple and comprehensive way to promote voter registration and we should take advantage of it."

Tips for our readers on how to submit photos to the Belleville Times

Organizations often hold a meeting, ceremony or fete and seek a mention of it in the newspaper. The event often can be summed up in a photograph, which, if done right, can be more attention-grabbing than a press release.

The standard "passing-a-check" or "line-'em-up-and-shoot-'em" photographs usually go unnoticed by readers. Recognizing this fact, Belleville Times is reluctant to publish photographs of static lines of people staring at the camera. Candid photos of people having a good time or actually doing something will draw readers' interest.

Changing the angle from which you are shooting can make significant difference in the aesthetics of a photo. Try shooting from a higher or lower angle. Photos of a few people, rather than a large group, are more noticeable, as readers respond to faces and the newspaper can identify them in a caption.

Editors choose photos that are of the best quality. Please make sure your group's best photographer is behind the lens and captures an imaginative image.

Please also include the photographer's name with the photo submission, and identify everyone in the photo, with their first and last names.

And, obviously, the photograph must be relevant to Belleville.
