

Sparks fly over wider use of senior building

Council members and residents went back and forth at the last Township Council meeting discussing possible scenarios for the usage of the Senior Center on Franklin Avenue.

The dialogue started when councilman Michael Nicosia, who has Belleville resident spoke out repregone on the record before concerning this topic, stated that he had met with a group of seniors and requested they come in front of the council to discuss their concerns. "I have asked the seniors to form a committee themselves and bring their issues to us. There are policies in place concerning the usage of that building that are out of our control," said Nicosia.

Many senior citizens were present at the meeting and once the floor was opened to the public several of them spoke. "The picking on the seniors that is going on has made me sick. I have seen this place on New Years and I can tell you it is full of people that would otherwise be home alone with nothing to do. This building gives them a place to go, be with friends, dance and bring the new year in with the company of others," said one Belleville senior. "It is a senior citizen building, leave it to them. Just leave the senior citizens alone. There is nothing for them in this town, why can't we just leave them alone? I plead with you, just leave the senior citizens alone?

Nicosia responded by again saying that he was not picking on the seniors but was actually looking for a way to help them. "Nothing would make me happier than if our seniors could use that building option."

Not letting us use this building is hurting our children and I must say I am very disappointed with my elected officials over this."

The audience cheered back and forth in support of each argument Councilman John Notari as responded by saying he was still in favor of keeping the building exclusive to seniors. "This has been a senior building for as long as I can remember and now all the sudden everyone wants to use it. Once we open it up at night by law we will have to open it up to all outside visitors in the county and that is something I don't want to happen," said Notari. "I know outside committees have been using other buildings for years and the high school cafeteria has become an







Belleville resident set to challenge Caputo

Incumbent Ralph Caputo will be facing a familiar opponent in the upcoming freeholder election when he squares off against Republican Andrew Bloschak.

Bloschak ran against Caputo 18 months ago when he tried to unseat Caputo as the county Assemblyman. Now he is running against him again, this time to obtain the seat as the Essex County 5th District Freeholder. "When I ran then I spent very little money on my campaign and I was still able to get 4,000-plus votes. This time around I have pumped a lot of my own time and money into this thing and am already seeing the results," said Bloschak. "Everything I do is out of my own pockets and my own timetable. I don't deal with donations or anything like that, I am my own person. When you start accepting donations people want something back when you get elected and that is not what I am about. I am about being my own person and doing what I think is right. No one will control or dictate my actions."

One of the main reasons Bloschak decided to run is the status of the American economy, which he acknowledged has a serious problem that may not end in the foreseeable future. "Essex County communities experienced a property tax increase of 17 percent. This is totally unacceptable, people in this area cannot afford tax raises like this and something needs to be done," said Bloschak. "Right now this county is controlled by a body entirely comprised of Democrats and they have become complacent and feel like they can do whatever they desire. I welcome the opportunity to be the lone Republican and offer a different view. I would not stand for what is going on now."

Bloschak believes that by being a Republican in a predominantly Democratic board, he could monitor any corruption or foul play going on. "This state has been plagued by corruption for years and it has to come to an end. I would love to blow the whistle on any of these guys if I saw something that wasn't right," said Bloschak. "Right now there have been 112 public officials in New Jersey that have been indicted, convicted and imprisoned for political corruption with some of them being Democrats from right here in Essex County. This nonsense has to end."

A longtime Belleville resident, Bloschak believes he can bring the view of the people into office because he is a middle class resident, like the majority of Essex County. "I worked for General Motors for 23 years, have been an electrician for 30 years and have four kids, all of whom have spent time in the Belleville school system. My wife works as a part time teacher, two of my kids are in college and two are in grammar school. I know what these rising taxes feel like and I want them to stop as much as anyone else and I will fight for the people of this county and I will be responsible and conservative with tax money," said Bloschak. "Mr. Caputo is out of touch with the working class, he does not know what it is like to be

in this situation. He has complete- When you start ly lost touch with reality."

Bloschak went on to say that he accepting donations disagreed with Caputo holding two offices. "There are close to ten individuals who were grandfathered in when the law was made against this and Caputo was one of them. I was appalled by this. I took a look at his financial disclosure that he is required to give and I found out he is collecting Social Security, salaries from both offices and a teacher pension. He is getting person and doing money from all different corners that is coming to him from the taxpayers," said Bloschak. "He has no idea what it is like out there and it is time to get someone new in there who knows what is going on and


First Ward Councilwoman Marie Strumolo Burke was asked to read the council proclamation at School #4 in Silver Lake.



Board takes on school violence

BY RICHARD DICKON of Belleville Times

With incidents of violence having more than doubled in the past year in district schools, Belleville's new interim Superintendent of Schools Melindo Persi outlined a series of initiatives to lower such acts in the future.

At Monday night's school board meeting, Persi reacted to a report that showed 56 incidents of violence for the 2007-2008 school year, up substantially from a num-ber in the "high 20s" for the previous year, Persi said. There were also seven incidents involving weapons and three substance abuse incidents, the report states.

The breakdown of violent incidents shows 26 fights, 11 simple assaults, 11 instances of bullying, intimidation, harassment and threats and one criminal threat. With weapons, there were six instances of possession of other weapons and one incident of assault with other weapons.

The vandalism includes nine incidents of damage to property, one bomb threat, two burglary and theft cases and two instances of arson. Under substance abuse, there was one possession of marijuana, and two suspected use confirmed/possession of marijuana cases.

Persi began his comments by saying that while districts must

School district to receive \$1 million in special ed funds

The district's special education \equiv department is in line for more \$1 뵤million in federal grant money, while at the same time has com-



Belleville football coach Chris Strumolo didn't have to look too deep into his team's performance last Saturday against Paterson Kennedy to get to the root of the Bucs' 46-21 loss in Paterson.

D'Alessandro inducted into National Hall of Fame

It was June 1976 and the athletic program at Belleville High School was about to undergo some major changes. The long-time Ath-letic Director, Herman "Jitty" Wische, was going to retire and Jim Silvestri, the very popular wrestling coach at Belleville, was set to succeed him.

Silvestri had been a math teacher for a number of years and was well known to the students as an easygoing, very likable man. His legacy had already been cemented a few months earlier when he guided the varsity wrestling team to a 13-1 record, including a win for the ages over Pascack Hills, 29-25, in the final match of the '75-76 season. If you were in the gym that Gene D'Alessandro will be the new afternoon of Feb. 14, 1976, you'll coach," Silvestri said to me that remember it as an all time classic in which the Bellboys ended Pascack Hills' five-year mark of undefeated seasons in dual matches.

The Pascack Hills match was a fitting crescendo for Silvestri's coaching career. A year earlier, he had led Belleville to a 13-2 mark, including a 25-24 win over its most intense rival back then, Essex Catholic, and was later named the District 14 and Region 4 coach of the year.

may result and lead to ulceration and possibly even amputation. Neuropathy can also cause deformities such as bunions, hammer toes, and charcot feet.

It is very important for diabetics to take the necessary precautions to prevent all foot related injuries. Due to the consequences of neuropathy, daily observation of the feet is critical. When a diabetic patient takes the necessary preventative footcare measures, it greatly reduces the risks of serious foot conditions.

Inspect your feet daily for blisters, cuts, and scratches. The use of a mirror can aid in seeing the bottom of your feet. Always check between your toes. Wash you feet daily. Dry carefully, especially between your toes. Avoid extreme temperatures. Test water with your hands or elbow before bathing. If your feet feel cold at night, wear socks. Inspect the insides of your shoes daily for foreign objects, nail points, torn linings, and rough areas.
