Cops nab suspects in teen shooting

Four people were arrested in Bloomfield by Belleville Police Monday night after allegedly shooting a 17-year-old teenager and pistol-whipping a 20-year-old man during a robbery on Salter Place, police said.

The teenager was listed in stable condition at University Hospital in Newark after undergoing surgery for a gunshot wound to a "lower extremity," said Capt. Chris Goul, spokesman for Bloomfield Police Department. The other victim was treated for minor injuries and

Police did not release the victim's names, both of whom are Bloomfield residents, and the hospital would not make public any details involving the condition of the patients, citing privacy issues.

female and three male suspects after spotting the black Nissan, reportedly involved, near Belleville and Union avenues in Belleville, Goul said.

Jessenia Carrasquillo, 20, Alex Diaz, 20, and Octavio Gomez, 19, all from Elizabeth, and Frank Blake, 21, of Hillside, were each remanded to Essex County Jail on \$100,000 cash-only bail set by Judge John Paparazzo.

Bloomfield police have charged the four with robbery, aggravated assault, weapon possession, conspiracy and possession of hollowpoint bullets, Goul said.

As it was only a shooting and not a murder, the case will stay within Bloomfield police jurisdic-

tion and not with the county, said County Prosecutor Spokesman Paul Loriquet.

Goul said there was an on-going altercation between the four suspects and the two victims, and the buildup finally led to the shooting. What the relationship is between the two groups was not released.

"There was some familiarity between the two groups, which then escalated to the robbery and then escalated to the shooting," he

The incident began Monday around 8:30 p.m. when Bloomfield police were alerted to a possible report of a youth shot and another male hit on the head at 5 Salter Place, near the corner of Franklin Street, near the Bloomfield-Belleville border, Goul said.

Police responded and found the two robbery victims.

A description of the suspects Belleville Police arrested one was broadcast over the county radio police band for assistance, and the suspects were picked up minutes later by Belleville police near Belleville and Union avenues, Goul said. Police found the cell phones and wallets within the vehicle but not the alleged weapon, he said.

The suspects later admitted to throwing the weapon out of the moving car, he said.

"We received several confessions from the group and located the weapon," he said.

Police located the gun, a .38 caliber handgun, with one spent round and two live rounds of ammunition still inside the

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Marching band finishes first

Another very successful campaign by Belleville Marching Band concluded earlier this month with a state championship.

On Sunday, Nov. 9, the band completed in the USSBA Northern States Championships at J. Birney Crum Stadium in Allentown, PA. Competing in the Class 1A against bands from New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts, the BHS band won the championship with a score of 89.95, edging neighboring Nutley by five hundredths of a point, according to Band Director Pamela Brigante.

The accomplishments of the 2008-2009 season include success in seven separate competitions along with playing many important town events, Brigante said.

On Sept. 20, the band took first place and won Best Percussion at the Carteret Marching Band com-

Band director has returned to roots

The continuing, growing success of the Belleville High School Marching Band is a particularly proud accomplishment for the band director, who just a few years ago was a member of the BHS band herself.

Band Director Pamela Brigante reflected on how the band succeeded, why the band's success should continue, how she came to take the director's position after being a member and the possible difficult decision she may face down the road.

The band capped a very successful season by winning first place in the final state championship competition (see related story). Those winning ways should continue, Brigante said.

The band is comprised of 43 members in grades 8 through 12. Out of the 43 members, 15 are rookies, Brigante said. Out of those 15, 10 are in the eighth grade, signaling a bright future for the band, she said. Add to that the fact that there are 15 second-year members, and that means 31 out of 43 members will be coming back for a few years, fueling the promise of more championships.

The band will only lose three seniors to graduation this year, so it

chamber on Watchung Avenue in Belleville, he said.

Several residents on Salter Place said they heard a commotion outside accompanied by a loud noise, but did not think anything of it, according to a Belleville resident, who lives across the street but declined to give her name.

"I heard a shot, and I thought it was fireworks," she said, adding she was not a firsthand witness to the incident but later saw the police and other emergency vehi-

She said she did not know any of the occupants of the apartment, but said a large group of young adults lived in the upstairs apartment and were always coming and going.

Goul would not say who lived in the apartment or if the 17-yearold shooting victim was a student at Bloomfield High School.

Another Bloomfield resident, who declined to be named but lives directly outside from where the shooting occurred, also said he heard the skirmish and noticed someone run up his property calling for assistance.

"I heard fighting, and someone

ran up the back steps and called for help," he said.

Goul noted how quick thinking and a good partnership with neighboring police departments aided in the speedy capture of the suspects.

"This was s great example of how we have a great working relationship with Belleville police," he said. "It was a good ending to a bad situation."

But the Salter Avenue residents said the neighborhood has gone down hill recently and think it may get worse, the Belleville resident said.

"Now I don't think it is safe anymore," she said.

Move to stop rebates unpopular but right

It's hard to turn down money from the government. Once a year, like a little present, homeowners and tenants find nestled among the credit card bills and utility bills a Homestead Rebate check, just waiting to be cashed. That envelope from Trenton may seem more like a lifejacket than extra help right now, as anxieties deepen about the worsening economy.

But the Homestead Rebate may itself become a casualty of the financial crisis. As Columnist Charles Stile reported this week, Democratic leaders say the program may be canceled or cut next year as part of the state government's sweeping effort to lessen the budget shortfall. Officials say it is too early to know if the rebates will be cut. It may depend on state income tax collection in April and on a new economic stimulus plan being considered

There is no need to wait to make the decision. It may be unpopular and it may seem unfair, but cut the rebate -

Governor Corzine said on Wednesday the state's tax revenue shortfall is projected to reach somewhere around \$1.2 billion. That's triple previous forecasts, which means

the projected gap for next year could grow to \$3 billion or even \$5 billion.

Officials will look at the largest service contracts to find savings, the governor said. And, perhaps at layoffs. "We're not anticipating that, but we're not taking that off the table," he told reporters.

The Homestead Rebate appeared 32 years ago, created by former Gov. Brendan Byrne to ease the pain of the new state income tax. Well, the income tax has been around for a while, and no one enjoys paying it any more today than they did three decades ago, with or without the homeowners' rebate thrown in. And this year the rebates are expected to cost \$1.6 billion.

Put that chunk of money toward the budget shortfall. Maybe it will save jobs or important programs. Maybe it will help defray tax increases.

New Jersey residents are desperate for property tax relief. We understand that, and we sympathize. Property taxes are so high that some people are forced to move out of state just to make ends meet. Others forego medication or food to pay the tax. That is why comprehensive property tax reform must take place.

But putting together a hodgepodge of money from income taxes and other places to keep voters happy at a time when there is no money is fiscally irresponsible. The rebate checks coming from the government are only going to go back to the government in some other form, whether by higher income taxes, school taxes or sales tax-

No one ever accused Mayor Michael Bloomberg of New York of being a shrinking flower. Last week, the mayor announced the end of the city's popular \$400 homeowner tax rebate, saying it would save \$256 million. This from the guy who had just pushed through legislation that will allow him to run for a third term.
We applaud Corzine, Senate President Dick Codey and

Assembly Speaker Joe Roberts for their willingness to raise the issue. We urge them to take the unpopular step of ending the program.

If possible, Homestead Rebates should continue for the elderly and the disabled. Others, though, should understand that in desperate times, a once-a-year present is no gift at all.

In 1998, an 11-year-old boy and his companion, aged 13, killed four fellow students and a teacher at a middle school in Jonesboro, Arkansas. In 1999, two teens killed 12 students and a teacher before committing suicide at Columbine High School in Colorado. As recently as last year, a Virginia Tech student opened fire on campus and killed 31 people in what has been classified as the most lethal Active shooter incident in American his-

An Active shooter incident is described by law enforcement officials as "an armed person who has used deadly physical force on other persons and continues to do so while having unrestricted access to additional victims".

While Essex County has been spared such violence, law enforcement agencies, including the Prosecutor's Office, the Sheriff's Office

During the past decade, vio- and the Association of Chiefs of police departments. Police, have prepared protocols for dealing with such an incident. To bolster their efforts, the Sheriff's Office has provided every municipal and college police department with the tools to locate, contain and stop the shooter.

"Throughout our county, law enforcement has conducted numerous Active shooter incident drills at our middle schools, high schools and universities," said Belleville Police Chief Joseph Rotonda, president of the Association of Chiefs of Police for Essex County. "Now, thanks to our Sheriff's Office we have the equipment to protect our officers and contain active shooters."

Sheriff Armando Fontoura stated that his department's Office of Homeland Security has been successful in obtaining state funding for protective ballistic shields and tactical entry tool kits. The ballistic shields and entry tool kits have been distributed to each of Essex County's municipal and university

"Active shooter incidents are a unique problem for police," noted Fontoura. "The behavior of the shooters is very different from that typically associated with other violent criminals. While most commonly identified with schools, Active shooter incidents can occur in the workplace, at malls and other public places."

Fontoura added that active shooters generally begin to shoot at people without warning and that their motives may include rage, vengeance, mental dysfunction or acts of terrorism.

"The typical criminal has the instinct to survive," he said. "Active Shooters want to kill and they demonstrate little or no regard for their own lives. To confront and contain such criminals police need the proper tools."

Last year, the Sheriff's Office distributed Level 3A Ballistic Shields to all local law enforcement agencies, including college police departments. Last week,

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
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Kids maneuver the Meadowlands

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
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Students capture anatomy

Perry Mayers, a husband, father and fan

We lost another Belleville legend last week with the passing of Perry Mayers. A young man of 72, Perry was an example of the type of person I, and so many others in Belleville, grew up admiring.

Mr. Mayers (this is another in a select list of people who I called Mr., only because he was the type of person who gained that respect simply by saying hello) had the typical Belleville resume.

He, along with his wife Eleanor, raised three children, Diane, Perry and Scott, all of whom went through the Belleville school system. Mr. Mayers was a successful electrician who owned a business in town. He served and defended his country in the United States

In other words, he worked hard, loved his community and wanted to provide his children the opportunity to be successful.

A loving father, he stood in the background and watched with pride as his sons played football for the Buccaneers.

I first met Mr. Mayers in 1978, when his eldest son, Perry, was a senior tight end for the Belleville High football team. That was my first season of covering the varsity football team for this newspaper, and it was an especially satisfying year for the new-look Buccaneers, who had just changed its moniker after being known as the Bellboys for a generation.

The '78 Bucs opened the season with a surprising 28-14 win over Livingston and went on to a 6-3 season under second year coach,

relatively small senior class, led by captains Angelo Santinelli and Joe D'Agostino, along with hard work-

ing seniors like Perry Mayers. Watching the younger Mayers play football gave a clear indication of the work ethic instilled by his father. Senesky would often rave about Mayers' knack for making a key catch, or throwing a crushing block.

Perry Mayers, the football player, was his father's son in so many ways. He did his job on the gridiron in the same manner his dad did in life.

After many of those games in 78, I'd see Mr. Mayers waiting by the lockerroom, and we'd talk. It was the beginning of a 30-year friendship with a man who would never complain about the result of a football game, but would be filled with pride at the thought of his son making a good play.

Thirteen years later, Scott Mayers would lead the Bucs to some solid seasons. A hard nosed linebacker, Scott played with the same fervor as his older brother, and by his senior year, it was evident that Scott was one of the team's leaders

town, attending high school sporting events when he had the opportunity. Most recently, I'd see him at The Stone Horse, where he'd always greet me with that solid handshake and gleam in his eye. I'd ask him how his family was, and he'd tell me about his children and grandchildren, and do so in such a way that one could tell this was a man of extreme faith and happiness.

When I heard about his passing, ironically while at The Stone Horse the other night, it was hard to believe. It seemed like I had just seen him recently, and he looked

Mr. Mayers' long lasting legacy to his family and friends will be something that sounds easy, but takes a great deal of work. He was a man. He did his job on earth by making this town a better place. In my opinion, no kinder words could be spoken.

Mr. Mayers has gone home to a Belleville long since removed, where he'll meet up again with such classics as Dick Baker, Robert Luongo, Rich Luzzi, Ed Berlinski, Jim Fusaro, Pete Spera, Sam Giuffrida, Elias Lamberti, Anthony Satriano, Mike Limongelli, Mickey Limongelli, Phil Chatham, Bob Killeen, Doug Cantarella, Bob Leffelbine, Mike Marotti, Mike Swinarski, Joseph Cozzarelli and Emil Nardachone, who all made a significant contribution to their community by simply being good, hard working men.

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Stuffing safety

Turkey and stuffing can bring smiles to the faces of friends and family this holiday. However, if improperly prepared, they can also bring something else to the table -food borne illnesses. That is why it is important to maintain safety when preparing the Thanksgiving feast.

One of the first safety concerns should be with regard to stuffing a raw turkey and then cooking the stuffing and turkey together in the oven. Health officials advise against stuffing the turkey, primarily because salmonella and other microscopic pathogens may enter the stuffing from the raw juices of the turkey and then not be adequately eradicated during the cooking process. It is better to cook the stuffing and turkey separately. Once the turkey is nearly cooked through, the stuffing can be added to the bird's cavity and heated up so that the flavors will meld and it makes for a traditional presentation.

Turkeys come both fresh and frozen. A fresh turkey should be purchased no more than a day or two before it will be cooked. This is why many people opt for frozen turkeys, so that they can get the best deal and buy ahead.

Turkey should be cooked until the internal temperature reads a minimum of 165 F on a meat thermometer when the thickest part of the breast is checked. Baste the bird frequently to maintain moisture while cooking if you fear a dry bird. If you need to cook the turkey longer to achieve this internal temperature, consider tenting parts like the wings and breast which may burn or dry out with aluminum foil to redirect some of the oven heat.

It's easy to linger at a Thanksgiving table overflowing with food. However, it is not a good idea to package up foods that have been left out for more than two hours.

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

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
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Cops win point in false arrest case

All of the defendants in the case involving a Belleville tavern manager who claims local police falsely arrested him have been excluded from liability for punitive damages in the case, including the police chief and some high ranking Belleville police officers.

John O'Reilly is the lawyer defending Belleville Police Chief Joseph Rotonda in a case that has taken many legal twists and turns over the past several years.

O'Reilly said Monday that on Nov. 14 Superior Court Judge Donald Coleman ruled that all of the defendants are exempt from punitive damages in the case, which he said is a significant victory for the individuals and the township. He said that Coleman's ruling numbered 39 pages, and since the ruling several motions have been filed by the various lawyers for the different police officer defendants looking for summary judgements that would have the case thrown out.

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

"I do think this takes one part completely out of the case," O'Reilly said Monday. "I think it's great for us. We'll see what the judge

does with the rest of the parts. His decision was very well reasoned. It's a big weight taken off for us, since personal liability is now out of the case. Now it's about whether the actions are within the scope of the officers' employment."

The lawsuit claims that Weedo and Police Officer Joseph DeRose falsely arrested Ehler on a drunk driving charge in June 2002, at the same time Ehler was dating the estranged wife of another Belleville police officer, Phillip Canning. The defendant has claimed that the arrest was made in retaliation for him engaging in that relationship, according to records.

Weedo's report said Ehler repeatedly changed lanes, did not pull his vehicle over when police lights were turned on and had a great deal of difficulty walking when he exited the vehicle, and subsequently refused a chemical breath test.

This new ruling is just the latest twist in a case that has seen several victories for the plaintiff before this defeat. Most recently, Alexander received a ruling that he would not have a gag order placed upon him. In the meantime, a tentative trial date of Dec. 1 has been set for the case to possibly finally go to tri-

O'Reilly said the gag order ruling helps the township's case against him because it excludes either side from calling the previous judge who has removed himself from the case. This comes after defense lawyers for the police said a remark the judge made about being in danger from Belleville police makes it impossible for the judge to remain neutral in the proceedings.

On Aug. 18, Superior Court Assignment Judge Patricia Costello refused to place a gag order on Timothy Alexander, who represents the plaintiff Darien Ehler in the case, after lawyers for the township claimed he was trying to sensationalize the case, O'Reilly
