Cops nab suspects in teen shooting

Four people were arrested in Bloomfield by Belleville Police Monday night after allegedly shooting a 17-year-old teenager and pistol-whipping a 20-year-old man during a robbery on Salter Place, police said.

The teenager was listed in stable condition at University Hospital in Newark after undergoing surgery for a gunshot wound to a "lower extremity," said Capt. Chris Goul, spokesman for Bloomfield Police Department. The other victim was treated for minor injuries and released.

Police did not release the victim's names, both of whom are Bloomfield residents, and the hospital would not make public any details involving the condition of the patients, citing privacy issues.

Belleville Police arrested one female and three male suspects after spotting the black Nissan, reportedly involved, near Belleville and Union avenues in Belleville, Goul said.

Jessenia Carrasquillo, 20, Alex Diaz, 20, and Octavio Gomez, 19, all from Elizabeth, and Frank Blake, 21, of Hillside, were each remanded to Essex County Jail on \$100,000 cash-only bail set by Judge John Paparazzo.

Bloomfield police have charged the four with robbery, aggravated assault, weapon possession, conspiracy and possession of hollow-point bullets, Goul said.

As it was only a shooting and not a murder, the case will stay within Bloomfield police jurisdiction and not with the county, said Essex County Prosecutor Spokesman Paul Lorient.

Goul said there was an on-going altercation between the four suspects and the two victims, and the buildup finally led to the shooting. What the relationship is between the two groups was not released.

"There was some familiarity between the two groups, which then escalated to the robbery and then escalated to the shooting," he said.

The incident began Monday around 8:30 p.m. when Bloomfield police were alerted to a possible report of a youth shot and another male hit on the head at 5 Salter Place, near the corner of Franklin Street, near the Bloomfield-Belleville border, Goul said.

Police responded and found the two robbery victims.

A description of the suspects was broadcast over the county radio police band for assistance, and the suspects were picked up minutes later by Belleville police near Belleville and Union avenues, Goul said. Police found the cell phones and wallets within the vehicle but not the alleged weapon, he said.

The suspects later admitted to throwing the weapon out of the moving car, he said.

"We received several confessions from the group and located the weapon," he said.

Police located the gun, a .38 caliber handgun, with one spent round and two live rounds of ammunition still inside the

Marching band finishes first

Another very successful campaign by Belleville Marching Band concluded earlier this month with a state championship.

On Sunday, Nov. 9, the band completed in the USSBA Northern States Championships at J. Birney Crum Stadium in Allentown, PA. Competing in the Class 1A against bands from New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts, the BHS band won the championship with a score of 89.95, edging neighboring Nutley by five hundredths of a point, according to Band Director Pamela Brigante.

The accomplishments of the 2008-2009 season include success in seven separate competitions along with playing many important town events, Brigante said.

On Sept. 20, the band took first place and won Best Percussion at the Carteret Marching Band competition.

On Sept. 27, the band took first place, Best Percussion, Best Overall Effect and Best Music at the

Edison competition.

On Oct. 5, the band won first place for all of the areas of the previous week's competition, plus Best Marching at the J.P. Stevens competition.

At Oct. 19's New Jersey Regionals, the band placed fourth, and did the same the next week, Oct. 26 at the New Jersey Championships. At that date, they won Best Color Guard for the entire state.

On Nov. 2, the band won First Place, Best Percussion, Best Color Guard and Best Visual Effect at the Bloomfield band competition.

At the end of the 2006-2007 season, nearly half of the Belleville Marching Band graduated and band director Paul Haase retired after many years of dedicated service.

Recruitment was strong, however, and a new director, Brigante a former student of Haase's, was appointed. The result has been that the Belleville High School marching band has had another two fine seasons.

In 2007-2298, under the leadership of Brigante, the band kicked

off its competitive season Sunday, Oct. 7, after performing at the Columbus Day festivities at Town Hall in Belleville. After the performance, which included the Star-Spangled Banner and the Italian national anthem, the band proceeded to J.P. Stevens High School in Edison to debut its new show, "Dancing through the Decades."

The band took first place at J.P. Stevens and won top awards for Best Color Guard and Best Effect.

Then, on Oct. 14, they swept the first-place awards for their group at a competition at Carteret High School. They went on to place fifth at the Central New Jersey Regional competition on Oct. 21 at The College of New Jersey. And on Oct. 27, Belleville competed against 19 other bands and earned 5th place at the New Jersey State Championship in Parlin.

Again last year, the band headed to the Northern States Championship in Allentown, its final competition of 2007. The band placed eighth in the competition, completing a successful fall season, according to the band parents.

Band director has returned to roots

The continuing, growing success of the Belleville High School Marching Band is a particularly proud accomplishment for the band director, who just a few years ago was a member of the BHS band herself.

Band Director Pamela Brigante reflected on how the band succeeded, why the band's success should continue, how she came to take the director's position after being a member and the possible difficult decision she may face down the road.

The band capped a very successful season by winning first place in the final state championship competition (see related story). Those winning ways should continue, Brigante said.

The band is comprised of 43 members in grades 8 through 12. Out of the 43 members, 15 are rookies, Brigante said. Out of those 15, 10 are in the eighth grade, signaling a bright future for the band, she said. Add to that the fact that there are 15 second-year members, and that means 31 out of 43 members will be coming back for a few years, fueling the promise of more championships.

The band will only lose three seniors to graduation this year, so it is looking forward to still having a

strong foundation for next season, Brigante explained.

As for why the band was successful, Brigante said the reasons were clear.

"It was definitely their drive, their desire to want to get better and make progress," she said. "They were so enthusiastic about being there and wanting to win."

Brigante said it might surprise people to know that the band started out "fairly weak" in some areas. "That's why it's so gratifying to see the progress made in a short amount of time," she said.

With success comes a likely move from Group 1 to Group 2, meaning the size of the band is expected to grow from the current top number of members for Group 1 to the 44 to 58 members allowed in the next group up.

"We should get more than enough new members to move up," Brigante said. "I would really like to be at the top of Group 2 next year. There's so much more sound at that level, so much more you can do. This year we moved a lot. Visually, we were really, really tight, even though we were not as strong musically."

Brigante's own roots with the band make the success that much sweeter.

"I went to school here, so I'm so excited to be back at my old high school," said the 2002 BHS grad-

uate.

She had originally seen herself as an elementary/middle school music teacher, but previous band director Paul Haase hired her as his assistant in 2006 and said he wanted to groom her to take over last year after he retired.

"It was very intimidating to step in and try and fill his shoes," Brigante said. "Also, I had this impression that high school kids would have a certain attitude that I didn't want to deal with. But a lot of people said they thought I'd be great. I'm really busy, but I don't know anything else now."

She said Haase told her he couldn't picture her hearing the younger kids try and play "Mary Had A Little Lamb" over and over again in elementary schools.

"At those younger ages, you can only take them so far," Brigante said. "There is no limit at the high school level. And the kids respond well to me, which makes it so much easier. There is mutual respect."

Still, there may some tough decisions down the road for the newly married band director.

"There is an inner struggle - do I want to have kids?" she asked. "I have to give this up if I do. I can't do both. This takes too much time."

For now, however, Brigante is looking forward to a larger band and larger goals for next year.

cles on scene.

She said she did not know any of the occupants of the apartment, but said a large group of young adults lived in the upstairs apartment and were always coming and going.

Goul would not say who lived in the apartment or if the 17-year-old shooting victim was a student at Bloomfield High School.

Another Bloomfield resident, who declined to be named but lives directly outside from where the shooting occurred, also said he heard the skirmish and noticed someone run up his property calling for assistance.

"I heard fighting, and someone

ran up the back steps and called for help," he said.

Goul noted how quick thinking and a good partnership with neighboring police departments aided in the speedy capture of the suspects.

"This was a great example of how we have a great working relationship with Belleville police," he said. "It was a good ending to a bad situation."

But the Salter Avenue residents said the neighborhood has gone down hill recently and think it may get worse, the Belleville resident said.

"Now I don't think it is safe anymore," she said.

New Silver Lake fire house plan heats up

A long-standing promise made to improve the safety and quality of life for Silver Lake and Soho section residents of Belleville is finally coming.

Township Manager Victor Canning said NJTransit is close to finalizing plans to place a new firehouse in Silver Lake and may also include money for a community and recreation center as part of the deal.

First Ward Councilwoman Marie Strumolo Burke credited state Assemblyman and county District Five Freeholder Ralph Caputo with helping the long-discussed project come to pass.

"Assemblyman Caputo was very instrumental in getting NJTransit to come to the table," Burke said.

Caputo said the question about the firehouse, "had been lingering for a long time. The talks sort of drifted apart. When I became assemblyman, a lot of people, most notably Marie Burke, but also the mayor and Victor Canning, said there were a lot of problems with the NJTransit light rail crossing and the firehouse."

The traffic light at Franklin Street and Belmont Avenue with the railroad crossing was causing extensive delays, particularly around rush hour and school dismissal, Caputo said.

"We had the lights and the crossing re-calibrated, so the traffic didn't go on forever," he said. "The police traffic department said the problem has been relieved somewhat. But with the traffic jams, there was no way the fire trucks could get out of the existing fire house (on Franklin Street)."

Caputo said NJTransit has finally made an offer, that includes building a new firehouse and possibly allowing the township to sell off the old one.

"NJTransit was coming to my

office every month, and I'm elated to have a tentative agreement," he said. "It's been long delayed and is much needed. It was supposed to part of the tradeoff for them coming through town with the trains. This will help us face the future and be very helpful. Things happen when you have a representative who lives in your town. I couldn't be happier."

Burke said town and NJTransit engineers are hammering out the final plans for the firehouse to be placed behind Lockland Storage where NJTransit built its railroad yard several years ago.

She said that Caputo, she and Mayor Raymond Kimble had "three or four meetings" with NJTransit.

"We said we were tired of talking about it and we needed to know if it was going to be yes or no," Burke said.

So about a month ago, they received a positive decision from NJTransit that between \$500,000 and \$600,000 would be spent on the new firehouse, and the old firehouse on Franklin Street could be sold by the town to help offset taxes, Burke said. It will take a few years to work out all of the technical aspects and have the house built, she said.

As for the community/recreation center, Burke said the township still has \$800,000 in a bond ordinance for the existing Friendly House center on Frederick Street, and she would like to see any money from NJTransit go toward helping repair that area landmark.

"I'm not going to let the Friendly House be taken away," Burke said. "It's been here for 50 or 60 years, and we need it for the kids who are too small to go to the other side of town for things like basketball or indoor soccer. It's a large property. We could use it to also house the Silver Lake library, as well as a game room and court. Soho would of course be included in all of this."

chamber on Watchung Avenue in Belleville, he said.

Several residents on Salter Place said they heard a commotion outside accompanied by a loud noise, but did not think anything of it, according to a Belleville resident, who lives across the street but declined to give her name.

"I heard a shot, and I thought it was fireworks," she said, adding she was not a firsthand witness to the incident but later saw the police and other emergency vehi-

Chief praises county's shield distribution

During the past decade, violence in America has discovered a new venue, our schools and universities.

In 1998, an 11-year-old boy and his companion, aged 13, killed four fellow students and a teacher at a middle school in Jonesboro, Arkansas. In 1999, two teens killed 12 students and a teacher before committing suicide at Columbine High School in Colorado. As recently as last year, a Virginia Tech student opened fire on campus and killed 31 people in what has been classified as the most lethal Active shooter incident in American history.

An Active shooter incident is described by law enforcement officials as "an armed person who has used deadly physical force on other persons and continues to do so while having unrestricted access to additional victims".

While Essex County has been spared such violence, law enforcement agencies, including the Prosecutor's Office, the Sheriff's Office

and the Association of Chiefs of Police, have prepared protocols for dealing with such an incident. To bolster their efforts, the Sheriff's Office has provided every municipal and college police department with the tools to locate, contain and stop the shooter.

"Throughout our county, law enforcement has conducted numerous Active shooter incident drills at our middle schools, high schools and universities," said Belleville Police Chief Joseph Rotonda, president of the Association of Chiefs of Police for Essex County. "Now, thanks to our Sheriff's Office we have the equipment to protect our officers and contain active shooters."

Sheriff Armando Fontoura stated that his department's Office of Homeland Security has been successful in obtaining state funding for protective ballistic shields and tactical entry tool kits. The ballistic shields and entry tool kits have been distributed to each of Essex County's municipal and university

police departments.

"Active shooter incidents are a unique problem for police," noted Fontoura. "The behavior of the shooters is very different from that typically associated with other violent criminals. While most commonly identified with schools, Active shooter incidents can occur in the workplace, at malls and other public places."

Fontoura added that active shooters generally begin to shoot at people without warning and that their motives may include rage, vengeance, mental dysfunction or acts of terrorism.

"The typical criminal has the instinct to survive," he said. "Active Shooters want to kill and they demonstrate little or no regard for their own lives. To confront and contain such criminals police need the proper tools."

Last year, the Sheriff's Office distributed Level 3A Ballistic Shields to all local law enforcement agencies, including college police departments. Last week,

Fontoura's office supplied each police agency with Blackhawk Entry Tool Kits. The kits which are carried in a backpack contain a sledgehammer, a Halligan multi-purpose pry bar and Blackhawk Dynamic Entry Bolt Cutters.

"Upon reviewing active shooter incidents, law enforcement has learned that the shooters, in complete disregard for their own lives, seek to kill as many responding police officers as they can," observed North Caldwell Police Chief Joseph Clark.

Fontoura pointed out that there are general guidelines for campus personnel and others who find themselves involved in active shooter incidents. "The first word of advice that I would give is to trust your instincts," said the sheriff. "If you cannot escape a particular location, remain calm. Try to warn others of the danger. Find a room or closet that can be locked or barricaded. After calling 911, put your cell phone on vibrate and turn off any radios or lights. Stay in place until police arrive."

Society honors BHS alumnus

The American Society of Mechanical Engineers recently presented Belleville native Donald M. McEligot with its 2007 Heat Transfer Memorial Award.

He was recognized "for pioneering research toward the fundamental understanding of viscous layer behavior, heated turbulent wall flows, effects of gas property variation and laminarization through key experiments, analysis and computations."

ASME established the award in 1959. In 1974, it was elevated to a society-wide award. It is ASME's highest honor for heat transfer.

McEligot graduated from Belleville High School. He received a bachelor's degree in mechanical engineering from Yale University, and after serving in the U.S. Navy, received a master's degree in nuclear engineering from the University of Washington and a doctorate degree in thermoscience from Stanford University.

Today, he is a distinguished visiting professor at the Institut für Kernenergetik und Energiesysteme of the Universität Stuttgart in Germany. He is a professor emeritus in aerospace and mechanical engineering of the University of Arizona, and a technical leader in thermal science at the Idaho National Laboratory.



Kids maneuver the Meadowlands

Mr. Gaccione's Environmental Science students at Belleville High School recently took a canoe trip through the Meadowlands and Mill Creek, a tributary of the Hackensack River.

Thanks to the enthusiasm, knowledge and leadership of Gabby Bennett Meany of the Meadowlands Environmental Commission, the trip was a great success. A day prior to the canoe trip, Meany stopped by BHS to introduce herself to the classes and brief them on what to expect.

When the students arrived, Meany and her crew had all the canoes ready to be launched. After a lesson on water safety and paddling instructions, they were off on their adventure.

For many students, this was their first attempt to paddle a canoe, and it showed. All that Meany prepared them for in the classroom came to life as they experienced the Meadowlands first hand.

Most of the students were very good at easing through the twists and turns of Mill Creek, while others just seemed to have an affinity for the Phragmites, a common reed, in which they repeatedly became trapped.

When Meany called for a "lock-up," all the canoeist came together to test water quality and discuss the following; the importance of wet-

land restoration projects, the ecological benefits of wetlands, nutrient filtration, water quality enhancements, aquatic nurseries, migratory rest areas, aesthetics and recreation.

The students stopped for lunch on an area called "the field," directly next to an ancient Atlantic White Cedar Forest, filled with herons, egrets and Ringbilled gulls. They took the trail around the Cedar Forest as Meany and Gaccione led discussed indicator species, restoration projects and invasive species.

Students capture anatomy

For the more advanced art students at Belleville High School, exploring two-dimensional media meant taking on the challenge of capturing human anatomy.

David Imhoff, supervisor of visual and performing arts at the high school, said the drawing and painting students do such a project each year, and that they began by sketching in pencil, and then trace over the works in ink.

In a statement, Marcia Miele Branca, art instructor for the class,

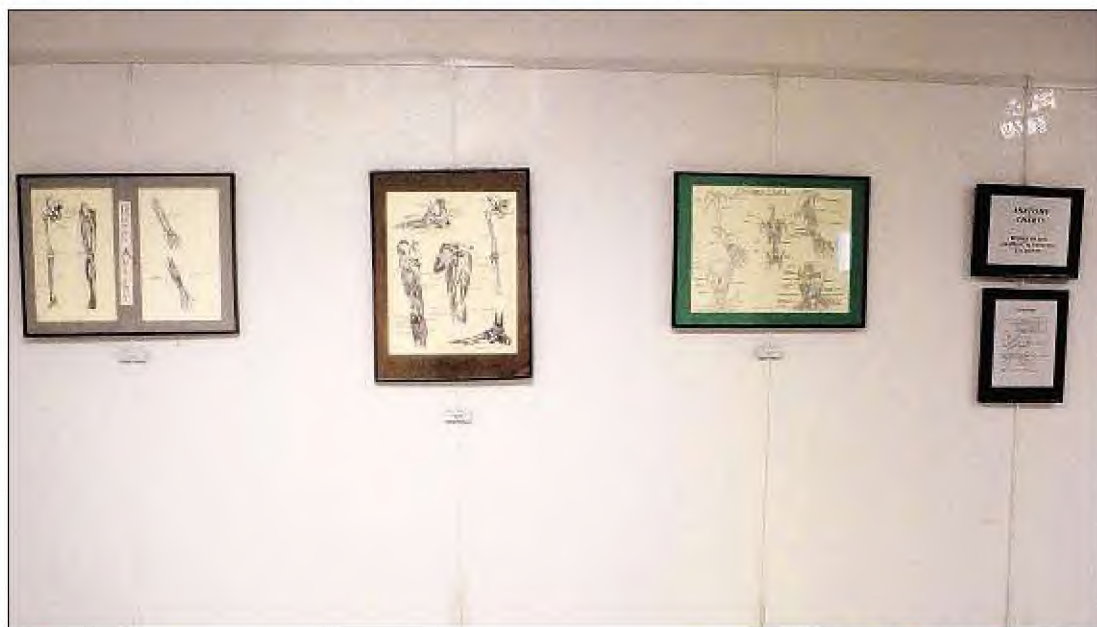
said students began the project by drawing various views from a life-size skeletal model. Using pencils that range from hard graphite for outlining to softer graphite for shading, they explored the human structure.

Emphasis was placed on proportion, line quality and shading, Branca stated. Other resources for the project were the book "Gray's Anatomy," the benchmark for medical illustration for some time, "Anatomy for the Artist," and handouts containing labeled anatomical illustrations. These resources aided in the muscular

structure of the human body in the works, she stated.

Sketches of bones and muscles were done and reviewed, and students decided what parts of the anatomical structure they wished to illustrate on their chart. The works are rendered on illustration board with various types of graphite and fine point markers, Branca stated.

She stated that the students participated in the mounting, framing and hanging of their work in the gallery. The works are now on view at the high school.

There's also a respectable selection of steaks, free-range chicken and burgers for those in of your party who may not be fish-a-philas.

Bucs fall to P.V., now prep for Nutley

The Belleville football team dropped a tough 24-14 decision to Passaic Valley of Little Falls in a NJSIAA consolation game last Friday night at a muddy Doc Ellis Field.

Chris Strumolo's team will take a 4-5 mark into its season finale at home, on Thanksgiving morning against arch rival Nutley. Kickoff time is 10:30 a.m.

Last Friday's game, in a steady rain, came against a determined Passaic Valley team, which was playing its season finale and needed the win to assure itself a .500 record.

"We ran into a good team," Strumolo said of Passaic Valley. "They threw the ball very well. When we watched film of them, we didn't see as much of the offense as we did tonight. They're a good team. We have to start preparing for Nutley now and that will be our top priority."

Passaic Valley (5-5) opened a 10-0 lead in the first half thanks to a safety and then a scoring run by Dom Coiro, followed by a two-point conversion pass from Frank Giardina to Matt Coiro.

Belleville cut the lead to 10-6 late in the first half on a quarterback sneak by Nick Herrmann. In the third quarter, Passaic Valley

extended the lead to 17-6 on a scoring pass from Giardina to Alan Bogoevski and then made it 24-6 in the fourth on Dom Coiro's second scoring run.

The Bucs added a touchdown late in the game on a 29-yard pass from Herrmann to James Colson, followed by a two-point conversion run by Herrmann that made the final score 24-14.

Belleville's running game, which will be without Calvin Cohen for the rest of the season due to a leg injury, was bolstered by the running of Eddie Feliciano in the Passaic Valley game.

"Eddie ran the ball very well, and that gives us a big lift heading into Nutley," Strumolo said. "Our running game hasn't been the same since Calvin originally got hurt in the Bloomfield game. Calvin came back and was playing well in the Paramus game, but he got hurt again and he's going to

Perry Mayers, a husband, father and fan

We lost another Belleville legend last week with the passing of Perry Mayers. A young man of 72, Perry was an example of the type of person I, and so many others in Belleville, grew up admiring.

Mr. Mayers (this is another in a select list of people who I called Mr., only because he was the type of person who gained that respect simply by saying hello) had the typical Belleville resume.

He, along with his wife Eleanor, raised three children, Diane, Perry and Scott, all of whom went through the Belleville school system. Mr. Mayers was a successful electrician who owned a business in town. He served and defended his country in the United States Army.

In other words, he worked hard, loved his community and wanted to provide his children the opportunity to be successful.

A loving father, he stood in the background and watched with pride as his sons played football for the Buccaneers.

I first met Mr. Mayers in 1978, when his eldest son, Perry, was a senior tight end for the Belleville High football team. That was my first season of covering the varsity football team for this newspaper, and it was an especially satisfying year for the new-look Buccaneers, who had just changed its moniker after being known as the Bellboys for a generation.

The '78 Bucs opened the season with a surprising 28-14 win over Livingston and went on to a 6-3 season under second year coach, John Senesky. That team was loaded with talented juniors, but had a

relatively small senior class, led by captains Angelo Santinelli and Joe D'Agostino, along with hard working seniors like Perry Mayers.

Watching the younger Mayers play football gave a clear indication of the work ethic instilled by his father. Senesky would often rave about Mayers' knack for making a key catch, or throwing a crushing block.

Perry Mayers, the football player, was his father's son in so many ways. He did his job on the gridiron in the same manner his dad did in life.

After many of those games in '78, I'd see Mr. Mayers waiting by the lockerroom, and we'd talk. It was the beginning of a 30-year friendship with a man who would never complain about the result of a football game, but would be filled with pride at the thought of his son making a good play.

Thirteen years later, Scott Mayers would lead the Bucs to some solid seasons. A hard nosed linebacker, Scott played with the same fervor as his older brother, and by his senior year, it was evident that Scott was one of the team's leaders.

After his children were graduated from Belleville, Mr. Mayers would continue to be a fixture in

town, attending high school sporting events when he had the opportunity. Most recently, I'd see him at The Stone Horse, where he'd always greet me with that solid handshake and gleam in his eye. I'd ask him how his family was, and he'd tell me about his children and grandchildren, and do so in such a way that one could tell this was a man of extreme faith and happiness.

When I heard about his passing, ironically while at The Stone Horse the other night, it was hard to believe. It seemed like I had just seen him recently, and he looked good.

Mr. Mayers' long lasting legacy to his family and friends will be something that sounds easy, but takes a great deal of work. He was a man. He did his job on earth by making this town a better place. In my opinion, no kinder words could be spoken.

Mr. Mayers has gone home to a Belleville long since removed, where he'll meet up again with such classics as Dick Baker, Robert Luongo, Rich Luzzi, Ed Berlinski, Jim Fusaro, Pete Spera, Sam Giuffrida, Elias Lamberti, Anthony Satriano, Mike Limongelli, Mickey Limongelli, Phil Chatham, Bob Killeen, Doug Cantarella, Bob Lefelbine, Mike Marotti, Mike Swinarski, Joseph Cozzarelli and Emil Nardachone, who all made a significant contribution to their community by simply being good, hard working men.

Thank you, Mr. Mayers, for including me in your life. May God bless your family.

So, here we go, with the week that leads up to the Belleville-Nutley football rivalry. For the current group of players, there's plenty of excitement, especially for the seniors.

Is there pressure? Well, you can probably call it that for a teenage athlete. For Belleville, it's the hope of breaking a long losing streak in this rivalry while for Nutley, well, it's the hope that Belleville doesn't break that streak on the current team's watch.

For the record, the Bucs and Raiders will meet at Doc Ellis Field on Thanksgiving morning at 10:30 a.m. Belleville last won a game in this series 12 years ago, in then head coach John Senesky's final game at Belleville, 20-0.

Nutley leads the overall series, which began in 1924 and has been played continuously since 1944, 45-18-4. Nutley has a 19-3-2 lead in the series since the rivalry moved to

Thanksgiving Day, or weekend, in 1984. (A few of the games were moved back to the weekend after Thanksgiving because of weather, or playoff games).

Over the next two weeks, we'll take a look at this rivalry over the past four decades, starting with 1969. If anyone would like to add to this feature, please write me at mike051893@aol.com. Here's a look at the games from 1969 to 1988. Next week, we'll look at the games from 1989 to the present.

1969- Nutley wins, 33-13 at the Oval over a game Bellboy team led by Joe Papasidero and Mike Albertine. Until 1984, this series was generally played on the third week of the regular season.

1970- In one of the more hyped games in a much hyped series, Nutley and Belleville play at Municipal Stadium. Both teams are unbeaten, but Nutley dominates and wins, 23-8. It was the first loss for Belleville coach Rocco Caffone, who had won his first two games.

1971- Joe Lotriglio scores Belleville's only touchdown and the Belleville defense does the rest

in a 7-6 win at the Oval.

1972- Belleville had one of its better defenses in '72, allowing just 49 points in nine games. Unfortunately, the offense couldn't get a score here and the Raiders win, 7-0, at Municipal Stadium.

1973- Nutley had a tremendous team in '73 and would be undefeated through six games before a classic scoreless tie with Westfield in a battle of the top two teams in the state. Raiders win easily over Belleville, 21-8, to improve to 3-0.

1974- Anthony Speer kicks a field goal for Belleville to give the Bellboys a 7-3 lead, but the Raiders rally back at Municipal Stadium to win, 7-3, in Tom Testa's first year back as Belleville's coach.

1975- Belleville's Chipper Bialore returns a punt for an apparent touchdown during a downpour at the Oval, but the play is called back because of a holding penalty. The Bellboys and Raiders finish in a scoreless tie.

1976- In Testa's final season at the helm, Nutley wins a 14-0 decision at Municipal Stadium.

1977- Senesky begins his 20-year tenure as head coach with a 7-0 loss at the Oval. The only touchdown comes on a blocked punt in the Belleville end zone during a driving rain storm.

1978- The Buccaneer era begins in Belleville in a big way as Belleville, behind Mike Nicosia, Ed Aulisi and Angelo Santinelli, prevails 31-0 at Municipal Stadium. This starts a six-year winning streak for Belleville.

1979- Aulisi hits Lenny Mendola with the game's only score in the third period as Belleville wins, 7-0, at the Oval.

1980- Quarterback John Melillo breaks free for a 42-yard touchdown run late in the game to snap a 7-7 tie. Bucs win, 13-7, in a rare night contest.

1981- At the Oval, Belleville, behind Frank Fazzini, Phil Cerza, Jeff Walsh and Angelo Centanni dominate the Raiders, 26-0.

1982- With both schools now a member of the NNJIL, the series moves to the fifth week of the season, with Belleville winning again, 10-3. Mike Murphy scores the

game's only touchdown on a 95-yard run.

1983- The teams meet on opening day and Belleville wins behind Murphy, Bill Walsh and Billy Baber, 12-6.

1984- The beginning of the Thanksgiving rivalry and Nutley pulls a stunner, 19-6, over a depleted Belleville team which had lost the previous weekend to Union in the playoffs and had a number of players out with injury.

1985- Raiders score late in the game to win, 14-0, at the Oval.

1986- Bucs, behind Jim Dunphy, Jeff Spilsbury and Jay Marchese jump out to a 27-0 lead and win, 27-16 at Municipal Stadium.

1987- Raiders take advantage of Belleville turnovers and win, 14-0.

1988- Nutley comes to Belleville with an outstanding team, perhaps its best, ever, and wins, 38-13 behind Derrick Hughes. Raiders were defeated in the state sectional finals by Randolph in a controversial ending.

Next week, we'll look back at the next group of games, from 1989 to the present.

Nutley coach Steve DiGregorio, who played for the Raiders from 1976-1978 and was 2-1 against Belleville as a player, is 4-0 versus his team's biggest rival as head coach.

Stuffing safety

Turkey and stuffing can bring smiles to the faces of friends and family this holiday. However, if improperly prepared, they can also bring something else to the table -- food borne illnesses. That is why it is important to maintain safety when preparing the Thanksgiving feast.

One of the first safety concerns should be with regard to stuffing a raw turkey and then cooking the stuffing and turkey together in the oven. Health officials advise against stuffing the turkey, primarily because salmonella and other microscopic pathogens may enter the stuffing from the raw juices of the turkey and then not be adequately eradicated during the cooking process. It is better to cook the stuffing and turkey separately. Once the turkey is nearly cooked through, the stuffing can be added to the bird's cavity and heated up so that the flavors will meld and it makes for a traditional presentation.

Turkeys come both fresh and frozen. A fresh turkey should be purchased no more than a day or two before it will be cooked. This is why many people opt for frozen turkeys, so that they can get the best deal and buy ahead.

Turkey should be cooked until the internal temperature reads a minimum of 165 F on a meat thermometer when the thickest part of the breast is checked. Baste the bird frequently to maintain moisture while cooking if you fear a dry bird. If you need to cook the turkey longer to achieve this internal temperature, consider tenting parts like the wings and breast which may burn or dry out with aluminum foil to redirect some of the oven heat.

It's easy to linger at a Thanksgiving table overflowing with food. However, it is not a good idea to package up foods that have been left out for more than two hours.



Grant approved for Cedar Hill Avenue

Gov. Jon S. Corzine announced the award of \$78.75 million in New Jersey Department of Transportation municipal aid grants to fund street improvement, rehabilitation and safety projects in 372 New Jersey towns.

Among the projects is \$291,181 for Cedar Hill Avenue in Belleville. The grants will create jobs and help keep property taxes in check statewide, according to the governor.

“Rebuilding the state’s infrastructure, from roads to bridges to mass transit, is going to be central to both getting us out of the recession and positioning New Jersey to take advantage when the economy recovers,” Corzine said. “This year’s municipal aid program will provide road improvements, property tax relief, and economic growth - three elements that are key to New Jersey’s turnaround and success.”

Municipal aid grants provide funding to municipalities that would otherwise devote local tax revenue to road improvement projects. Municipal governments maintain more than 25,000 miles, or approximately 70 percent, of New Jersey’s 36,000 miles of roadway.

Local property taxes seldom provide sufficient funds for proper roadway repair and maintenance.

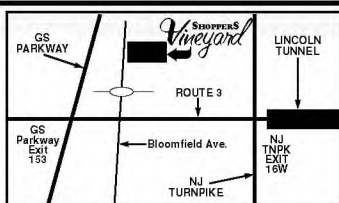

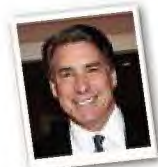

Compression stockings are regularly used following surgery to reduce the rate of deep vein thrombosis (a blood clot that forms in the vein). Cops win point in false arrest case

All of the defendants in the case involving a Belleville tavern manager who claims local police falsely arrested him have been excluded from liability for punitive damages in the case, including the police chief and some high ranking Belleville police officers.

John O'Reilly is the lawyer defending Belleville Police Chief Joseph Rotonda in a case that has

taken many legal twists and turns over the past several years.

O'Reilly said Monday that on Nov. 14 Superior Court Judge Donald Coleman ruled that all of the defendants are exempt from punitive damages in the case, which he said is a significant victory for the individuals and the township. He said that Coleman's ruling numbered 39 pages, and since the ruling several motions have been filed by the various lawyers for the different police officer defendants looking for summary judgements that would have the case thrown out.

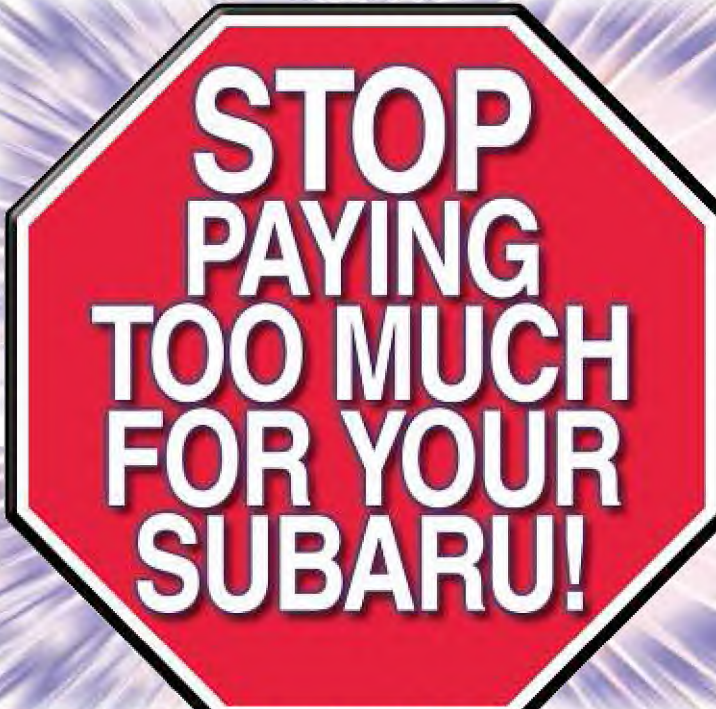

The lawyer for the plaintiff,

Darien Ehler, lawyer Timothy Alexander, now has until Monday, Nov. 24, to reply to the motions, and then the defendants' lawyers have until Nov. 26 to respond to

those, O'Reilly said.

"I do think this takes one part completely out of the case," O'Reilly said Monday. "I think it's great for us. We'll see what the judge

does with the rest of the parts. His decision was very well reasoned. It's a big weight taken off for us, since personal liability is now out of the case. Now it's about whether the actions are within the scope of the officers' employment."

The lawsuit claims that Weedo and Police Officer Joseph DeRose falsely arrested Ehler on a drunk driving charge in June 2002, at the same time Ehler was dating the estranged wife of another Belleville police officer, Phillip Canning. The defendant has claimed that the arrest was made in retaliation for him engaging in that relationship, according to records.

Weedo's report said Ehler repeatedly changed lanes, did not pull his vehicle over when police lights were turned on and had a great deal of difficulty walking when he exited the vehicle, and subsequently refused a chemical breath test.

This new ruling is just the latest twist in a case that has seen sever-

al victories for the plaintiff before this defeat. Most recently, Alexander received a ruling that he would not have a gag order placed upon him. In the meantime, a tentative trial date of Dec. 1 has been set for the case to possibly finally go to trial.

O'Reilly said the gag order ruling helps the township's case against him because it excludes either side from calling the previous judge who has removed himself from the case. This comes after defense lawyers for the police said a remark the judge made about being in danger from Belleville police makes it impossible for the judge to remain neutral in the proceedings.

On Aug. 18, Superior Court Assignment Judge Patricia Costello refused to place a gag order on Timothy Alexander, who represents the plaintiff Darien Ehler in the case, after lawyers for the township claimed he was trying to sensationalize the case, O'Reilly said.
