

ARTIFICIAL TURF

Town explores funding options

Officials are looking to piggyback grant money from two county sources and one state source to help fund a new artificial turf field at the site of the chronically overused and torn up main football and soccer field at Municipal Stadium.

At a recent work session, the township council and manager talked about getting hundreds of thousands of dollars from each of the three sources, including the county Community Development Block Grant program, the county Open Space Preservation program and the state Green Acres Open Space program.

Township Engineer Thomas Herits said the town "would qualify for a \$400,000 grant towards" a turf field from CDBG. He said the project would need soil work where existing dirt fill is replaced with a lighter soil that has the consistency of pumice, about half the weight of the existing soil.

"That's so it won't settle anymore and also aids in drainage," Herits said. Estimating the cost at \$8 a square foot, he said that it would cost approximately \$800,000, and the total cost of the project would be approximately \$1.5 million.

"There's a lot you don't need to do to the underlying soil," Herits said of keeping the costs lower.

He said the county has \$5 million it needs to spend by June 2009, and if the township makes

the stadium turf a priority, officials can also obtain money.

First Ward Councilwoman Marie Strumolo Burke is taking the lead on the county open spaces program, and says that being a retired county employee she has spoken to county officials, and recently had a meeting with a state Green Acres official.

Township Manager Victor Can-ning agreed that, "The concept for getting all three is there now that we are in final compliance with the state. We are eligible for Green Acres. They are very thrilled. If we can get something like \$300,000 for each source, I think it's a home run, and we would gladly pay the difference."

He said Belleville's landscape makes the need for a turf field that will not wear down all the more important.

One thing that makes us unique is that we are so densely populated, with little open space," Canning said. "We have only one sanctioned field, for everything from varsity to peanut league.

Belleville officers respond to multiple fights

Three individuals were arrested last Friday, Nov. 28, after multiple fights broke out in a restaurant parking lot on Belleville Avenue. police said. A handgun was found at the scene.

Bloomfield and Belleville police officers arrested Kevin Kyle Dees, 24, of Maplewood after an anonymous person alleged Dees was carrying a nine-millimeter handgun

Judge drops police chief from lawsuit

Belleville Police Chief Joseph Rotonda has been dropped from all counts in a lawsuit involving a Belleville tavern manager, who claims local police falsely arrested him, while other defendants have had counts dropped as well.

Superior Court Judge Donald Coleman granted a motion for summary judgement on all seven counts against Rotonda, essentially removing him as a defendant in the case, said John O'Reilly, Rotonda's lawyer.

officers Anthony Weedo and Joseph DeRose falsely arrested Ehler on a drunk driving charge in June 2002, at the same time Ehler was dating the estranged wife of another Belleville police officer, Phillip Canning. The defendant has claimed that the arrest was made in retaliation for him engaging in that relationship, according to records.

In addition, several counts have been dismissed against other defendants.

All of the defendants in the case had been excluded in November from liability for punitive damages in the case, including the police chief and some high ranking Belleville police officers, O'Reilly said.

O'Reilly said that Coleman exempt from punitive damages in the case, which he said is a significant victory for the individuals and the township.

He said the case is now about whether the actions are within the scope of the officers' employment.

This new ruling is just the latest twist in a case that has seen several victories for the plaintiff before this defeat. Most recently,

Ehler's lawyer, Timothy Alexander, received a ruling that he would not have a gag order placed upon him.

O'Reilly said the gag order ruling helps the township's case because it excludes either side from calling the previous judge who has removed himself from the case. This comes after defense lawyers for the police said a remark the judge made about being in danger from Belleville police makes it impossible for the judge to remain neutral in the proceedings



Atlantic City's Council recently revoked their decision to restrict smoking in casinos, forcing casino workers to continue to risk their health every day while earning a living

The dangers of secondhand smoke are clear. Tobacco smoke is directly linked to nearly 1,000 U.S. deaths each day, with an estimated 37,000 to 40,000 deaths nationwide each year from heard and blood yessel disease caused by secondhand smoke.


The American Heart Association strongly supports the rights of all individuals to work in a safe and healthy environment free from the

dangers of secondhand smoke. We cannot continue to allow casino workers to face these dangers and risk their lives, while every other New Jersey worker is protected from secondhand smoke in the workplace.

Casino workers are not alone in supporting smoke free gaming floors. The New Jersey Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance Survey shows 93 percent of New Jersey adults support restricting smoking in casinos, including three out of four smokers.

Today, I along with many New Jerseyans will enter my workplace, take a deep breath, and be thankful that I do not have to risk my life to work in New Jersey. I hope that in the very near future I will be able to thank my elected officials for their work to protect Atlantic City's casino workers in the same way.



Rotonda suspended Weedo five days and referred him to a psychiatrist, who found Weedo needed therapy. This was after the county Prosecutor's Office wrote to the town saying that Weedo had previously falsified a different police report. Next, Krentz dismissed Ehler's Internal Affairs claim, saying that Weedo had probable cause to pull Ehler over for two violations.

Rotonda dismissed Ehler's internal affairs complaint in October 2002 after the department had received the Prosecutor's Office report of Weedo's previous false report, according to officials.

Ehler's lawsuit was first filed in 2003, and his lawyer before

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both the township and the police department as defendants, which officials said put the plaintiff at a disadvantage. That is because municipalities are shielded from any liability for the willful misconduct of an employee, unless it can be proven that the township and department tolerated the behavior, officials said.

That led to the lawsuit being dismissed by a Superior Court Judge in 2006, with the finding that Belleville could not be held responsible for Weedo and DeRose allegedly engaging in wrongdoing. Superior Court Judge Donald Merkelbach also ruled at that time that it was too late for Ehler's lawyer to add other officers as defendants in the suit.

From there, the appellate panel referred the case back to Superior Court trial court, where a judge ruled in October that Ehler's lawyer could add four others, Rotonda, Krentz, Weedo, DeRose and Canning, as defendants. Belleville attorneys sought to appeal the last decision, but were most recently denied by the Appellate Division, officials confirmed.

Without a settlement, the case could proceed to trial, officials confirmed.

As for the costs of the case for taxpayers, O'Reilly said defending the case may prove to be expensive, but the lawyer for the town doesn't duplicate service, and the town seeks the liability insurance carrier with the best rates, keeping costs as low as possible.



BHS FOOTBALL Four Bucs earn first team honors

For the second straight season, the Belleville varsity football team put together a .500 record.

Big deal, you might say? Well, consider this. The last time the program compiled two seasons of .500, or better football, was during the first Reagan Administration. Another words, the last time it happened was in 1984, when the Buccaneers finished 6-4 for the team's seventh straight winning season. Since then, Belleville finished at .500, or better in 1986 (6-3), 1990 (6-3) and 1993 (4-4-1) before last year's 5-5 mark, which, of course, was followed by a similar effort this fall.

For Belleville coach Chris Strumolo, the season was significant for him in many ways. This was Strumolo's first year as a head coach after a decade of serving as an assistant at Seton Hall Prep, Nutley and Newark Weequahic. In leading Belleville to a 5-5 mark this year, Strumolo matched Tom Testa's 1974 and Rocco Caffone's 1970 campaign as first year coaches with five wins at Belleville. Testa's '74 team was 5-4, but that was also Testa's second tenure as coach. Caffone was also 5-4 in '70 in his first year at the helm.

But Strumolo did something that neither Testa nor Caffone were able to do in their first season. Strumolo guided Belleville to a win over Nutley. So, it may be safe to say that Strumolo is the most successful first-year head football coach at Belleville in nearly a half century.

"It was obviously a good way to end the season," Strumolo said of Belleville's 22-12 win over the Raiders this past Thanksgiving. "The kids deserve the credit, as well as my coaching staff."

Strumolo found the campaign to be a learning experience in his coaching career.

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
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

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TAXES Council tables delinquent charge

BY RICHARD DICKON of Belleville Times

With so many residents facing money problems because of the economic downturn, an ordinance to add a 6 percent extra charge on delinquent taxes was tabled so that officials could determine if the move was placing too unfair a burden on property owners.

At the Nov. 25 public council meeting, resident Vincent Frantantoni said he understood that residents are already being charged a late fee percentage in the high teens, and adding another 6 percent might be too much and unfair.

"These are tough economic times," he said. "You have good people struggling to make it, and this would just add on top of that."

After officials could not determine exactly how much of a penalty struggling property owners would face under the resolution, the Township Council voted to table the resolution until a determination is made.

The resolution "authorizes an additional interest penalty of six percent on delinquent municipal charges unpaid to the end of the calendar year 2008," as allowed by state statute.

The statute defines a delinquency as "the sum of all taxes and municipal charges due on a given parcel or property covering any

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number of quarters or years. The \$1,500. governing body may fix a penalty to be charged to any taxpayer with a delinguency in excess of \$10,000 who fails to pay this delinquency prior to the end of the calendar year. The penalty, as fixed, would not exceed six percent of the amount of the delinquency?

According to tabled resolution, the township now has an existing resolution in place that provides for the rate of interest on delinquencies at eight percent on the first \$1,500 delinquency and 18 percent on any amount in excess of

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Frantantoni said the change would add a significant amount of money to an already strapped property owner's difficult situation, adding up to 24 percent for someone owing more than \$10,000. That five-figure amount is easier than ever for someone to be late on, thanks to ever-escalating local, county, state and federal taxes, he said.

After hearing the concerns, At-Large Councilman Kevin Kennedy said the resolution would be tabled.

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

ANTIBIOTIC POSES TENDINITIS RISK

Antimicrobial drugs in the fluoroquinolone family are used to treat certain bacterial infections. As effective as they may be at doing their job, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration is concerned that these drugs pose an increased risk for tendinitis and tendon rupture. The risk of developing fluoroquino-associated tendinitis and tendon rupture is particularly elevated in patients over age sixty; among those taking corticosteroid drugs; and among kidney, heart, and lung transplant recipients. Patients experiencing pain, swelling, inflammation of a tendon, or tendon rupture should be advised to stop taking their fluoroquinolone medication and consult with their doctors. They should also avoid exercise and should not use the affected area at the first sign of tendon pain, swelling or inflammation.

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Tips for our readers on how to submit photos to the Belleville Times

Organizations often hold a meeting, ceremony or fete and seek a mention of it in the newspaper. The event often can be summed up in a photograph, which, if done right, can be more attention-grabbing than a press release.

The standard "passing-a-check" or "line-'em-up-and-shoot-'em" photographs usually go unnoticed by readers. Recognizing this fact, Belleville Times is reluctant to publish photographs of static lines of people staring at the camera. Candid photos of people having a good time or actually doing something will draw readers' interest.

Changing the angle from which you are shooting can make significant difference in the aesthetics of a photo. Try shooting from a higher or lower angle. Photos of a few people, rather than a large group, are more noticeable, as readers respond to faces and the newspaper can identify them in a caption.

Editors choose photos that are of the best quality. Please make sure your group's best photographer is behind the lens and captures an imaginative image.

Please also include the photographer's name with the photo submission, and identify everyone in the photo, with their first and last names.

And, obviously, the photograph must be relevant to Belleville.


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
