From Persi to Perri

Product of the schools takes over the district's reins

Despite agreeing just one week earlier to keep Interim Superintendent Melindo Persi until June 30, a split school board voted Monday night to terminate Persi immediately and replace him with Deborah Perri in the interim job. Perri has been supervisor and director of student services, and

served in other supervisory and director posts recently.

This happened the same night that the middle school principal's involuntary transfer was rescinded, meaning he will

Middle School, and the elimination of nurses and other positions were rejected. Also, the board rejected a resolution to appeal \$914,000 in school budget reductions from the defeated budget, and the reductions outlined by the Belleville Township Council were approved as a guideline, all by a split 4-3 vote by the school board (see related stories on page 3).

All of this took place after a

more than two-hour delay as the board went into private session presumably to hash out the details of the changes, leading an angry crowd to began clapping for them to return at one point.

As for the interim superintendent slot, Perri said she thanked the board for its unanimous "vote of confidence."

200 Club of Essex adds Santucci to Honor Roll

The 200 Club of Essex County remembered fallen Belleville Ptl. Kenneth Santucci by naming him to the organization's Honor Roll last week.

At the 43rd Anniversary Valor Awards Presentation, Essex County Sheriff Armando B. Fontoura said Santucci was responding to a call when he died in a car accident on Sept. 6, 2008.

Santucci came from a family of police officers, and is survived by his wife and his three children, he added.

"We have lost 83 brothers and sisters since the club's founding. We always help the families," the sheriff said. "Last year was another costly year. ... We lost two of our own."

Fontoura's somber tribute to Santucci, and Dwayne Kelley of the New Jersey State Police, stood out at the otherwise celebratory event.

Addressing the crowd at Mayfair Farms, Newark Mayor Cory Booker said first responders' "day-to-day heroism" reflects the characteristics that were shown at famous battles and in the building of the United States.

He drew parallels to the American Revolution and World War II,

and called police, firefighters, sheriffs and state troopers "some of the greatest agents of democracy."

The 200 Club awarded 18 Public Safety Valor Awards to eight local fire and police departments, including the state police and the Essex County Sheriff's Office.

The club gave a special commendation to the West Essex Technical Rescue Team, which includes the Cedar Grove, Montclair, North Caldwell, Roseland and West Orange fire departments.

Last June, the team rescued a contractor who had been buried up to his waist in an 8-foot deep trench. The contractor was working on a waste pipe when a partial wall collapsed, and he was unable to free himself.

The team has trained to handle "unusual and difficult situations involving building collapse, confined space and trench rescues," according to Executive Committee Member Ira Cohen.

Its members shored up the trench, dug around the contractor and monitored his health, among other tasks, he continued.

"All were working under the constant threat that the trench could collapse and bury them as well," he said.

AG says local man part of title scheme

A former Motor Vehicle Commission clerk has been indicted on charges of creating phony titles for hundreds of luxury or low-mileage cars — some of them severely damaged — then selling the documents to towing companies and second-hand dealers, authorities said.

Thirteen other suspects also were charged in the alleged scheme, including Manuel Rivera, 42, a Belleville resident and owner of Manny's Auto Sales in

Board accepts council's monetary reduction

A split school board rejected an appeal of nearly \$1 million in cuts from the defeated school budget, choosing instead to use the Belleville Township Council's proposed reductions as a guide, despite objections from two board members.

A resolution to appeal the \$914,000 in school budget reductions from the defeated 2009-10 budget was defeated. The same four school board members instead agreed to approve the council's list of reductions.

Board members Vincent Strumolo, Jr., Carmen Bucco, Eric Schwartz and Judy Piscatowski rejected the resolution to appeal the \$914,000 reduction proposed by the council and accept its suggestions. Board President Joseph Longo and Vice President Bill Freda said the council's cuts are not realistic and may lead to a shortfall in funds during the school year.

Bucco spoke about why he supported accepting the council's cuts.

H said that the 8.9 percent of registered voters who voted and as a whole defeated the tax levy April 21 "spoke clearly" that they are concerned about "mass negative economic news."

Bucco said Gov. Jon Corzine has said the state's debt has tripled and that New Jersey residents pay the highest property taxes in the country, and that his "primary responsibilities are to the children and the taxpayers," while the state under funds Belleville's schools.

He said he was appalled by the reduction in force letters sent to more than 80 teachers, and he agrees with the council's cuts, which he said "keeps the teachers educating and the support staff." When more RIFs went out, he said, it was "politics with a capital 'P' for politics."

Bucco said he was proud of how well the board does "dealing with what we're dealt" and provides quality education despite sometimes have to use "smoke and mirrors."

"I'm proud of this school system," he said. "There were major disruptions that we're now correcting."

Longo and Freda had a different take on the rejection of the budget appeal to the Essex County superintendent of schools and the decision to go with the council's cuts.

"Some of these cuts are unrealistic," Longo said. He said health insurance costs are rising, yet the cuts call for a reduction of \$100,000, and trimming \$84,500 from utilities is not realistic. Cutting summer school is something "that will just go away if we don't appeal."

Later, he said that taking \$300,000 from a surplus of \$682,000 is dangerous when the district needs \$800,000 for roof repairs that are overdue for the high school and middle school. "That won't happen if the surplus is cut," Longo said.

Freda said the cuts will "negatively impact" the district and should be appealed.

"If we blow a boiler in one of the schools, it would be hard to find the money to fix it," Freda said. "With utilities, it will not be enough if we have a very cold winter."

Certain employees, including BMS principal, stay put

To applause Monday night, a resolution that would have eliminated school nurses, among other personnel, was voted down and the middle school principal's transfer to School No. 8 was rescinded, meaning Carmine Guinta will remain at the middle school.

A large crowd in the Belleville High School auditorium ready to protest personnel cuts instead thanked a four-person school board majority for rejecting a plan to eliminate nurses, among other positions, and keeping Guinta at the middle school. This came on the same night when a new interim superintendent was hired and decisions were made on the \$914,000 in reductions to the

defeated 2009-10 were all made (see related stories on page 1 and 3).

Because the four-member majority on the school board is aiming not to cut any teachers, support staff or programs, the reduction in force letters sent to more than 80 teachers facing possible termination were removed from the evening's agenda, as were any further involuntary transfers of personnel.

At one point, parent Sabrina Vasquez brought a group of children from School No. 4 to each thank the board majority for not firing their nurse or any of their teachers.

Many of the other parents who planned to speak against the proposed cuts, which would have also included the athletic trainer and

coaches, and the Child Study Team, said they no longer needed to speak because the changes had been removed from the agenda.

Carmen Vellon, School No. 5 Home and School Association president, thanked board members Vincent Strumolo Jr., Eric Schwartz, Carmen Bucco and Judy Piscatowski for "making the right decision. It truly tells us you have the best intentions of the children at heart. You have inspired me."

Board President Joseph Longo, Vice President Bill Freda, and board member Peter Zangari voted for the changes.

Lisa Kistner is the Consolidated Home and School Association president. She had urged the school board a week ago to use the township council's proposed cuts as a guide to not reducing the

teaching or support staff.

She told a story about her father, who was an executive at a corporation. Kistner said employees looked up to her father for guidance, praised him and made his job much easier.

"My father told me, 'A happy employee is a hardworking employee.' Please keep that in mind going forward," Kistner said. She was making reference to what she said is a morale problem brought on by the rumors of firings and the involuntary movement of personnel.

Ralph Vellon, who ran for school board in 2008, said he wanted to acknowledge "the people behind me [in the audience], who spent countless hours, saw the tears among teachers, children and parents before tonight."

He quoted from the New Jersey Department of Education's Code of Ethics for school board members, focusing on passages that said a board member should "refuse to surrender their judgement" to "a partisan group for personal gain or the gain of friends."

School No. 4 Home and School Association President Shyma Keykorum said she wanted "only to thank the four board members who made the right decision."

Bucco, who also spoke specifically about the budget, said he was "appalled" by the reduction in force letters that went out to teachers and staff warning them they might get fired.

"There have been major disruptions that we are now correcting," he said.

A turning point in running the schools?

There has been a decided lack of dignity shown to many people involved in the Belleville Public School System in recent weeks. Monday night, steps were taken to listen to the will of the people who have mobilized against cuts in staffing, and the district seems finally to be moving forward.

Beginning with the involuntary transfers of principals and teachers, and the reduction in force letters sent to more than 80 teachers, an air of confusion and misery was expressed by teachers and parents alike. The changes were made and firings considered, but Monday night a passionate crowd of parents saw a split-board majority reverse the fate of the middle school principal, reject the termination of school nurses and immediately replace the interim superintendent.

After a Board of Education campaign that saw a two-term former board president defeated, up to and includ-

ing the public firing of an unsuspecting interim superintendent, politics seemed to be forming important decisions for the district.

At the Monday meeting, however, the four board members who rejected the reductions in staff and the full board's endorsement of Deborah Perri as interim superintendent may have marked a turning point toward more positive decision making.

Outgoing Interim Superintendent Melindo Persi deserves high marks for trying to involve the public more in decisions, but at the same time he seemed to try and make too many sweeping changes at once, which ultimately led to his downfall.

Now Perri comes in as a former Belleville student who has served in many different roles in the Belleville school district. She brings a reputation for always putting students first, promoting positive aspects of the

district, and working very hard.

Questions can be raised about Perri's qualifications in an age of doctorate degrees and experience as a superintendent elsewhere seeming to be at a premium. However, at least for now, her appointment represents a move toward promoting from within that might be in Belleville's long-term interests.

Whatever the future holds, the parents who made their voices heard loud and clear in recent weeks need to stay involved as further decisions still remain. They have proven that their opinion can sway a board to act in their interests. It can only be hoped that the damages to the dignity of so many did not happen in vain, but instead ushered in an era of community participation helping to shape the district's future.

Regular education enrollment in the program is limited and will be determined by lottery.

To be eligible for the lottery, the child must be either 3 or 4 years old on or before Oct. 1, 2009.

Four-year-old applicants are considered first for program admission. If there are not enough 4-year-old applicants, then 3-year-old applicants are considered. A

birth certificate and proof of Belleville residency will be required.

Applications may be obtained at the Department of Special Services, 100 Passaic Ave. in Belleville between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Applications are due at the department no later than 4 p.m. Wednesday, May 27.

The lottery will be held on Monday, June 1, at the department. Applicants will be notified of their child's status by mail. For additional information, call 973-450-3500, ext. 3903.

Rotary meeting mixes grim news with a pep talk

Virtually every small business owner in Belleville has likely felt the pinch of tough economic times. For one afternoon at least, a group of business owners heard some good news and a pep talk.

A group of local business owners on May 6 heard from a business counselor and a representative of the federal Small Business Association about how to survive the economic hard times that have hit Belleville as well as the entire country's and world business communities.

First, Al Pearl of SCORE, counselors to America's small business, spoke about marketing strategies in troubled times. Then Frank Burke, assistant district director of the U.S. Small Business Administration, talked about impacts of President Barack Obama's stimulus package on small business and resources and programs available at the SBA that can help.

Unfortunately, Burke's accounting of the SBA's help for small businesses reflected the economic downturn.

"Our level of financial assistance has been impacted" by the poor economy Burke told the group at the meeting of the Rotary Club of Belleville.

In 2007, he said 100,000 loans totaling more than \$20 billion were made, a number that dropped 30 percent from the previous year and then dropped 60 percent in New Jersey, from \$660 million to \$440 initially and then much lower.

"We guarantee loans by private companies, and they have tightened up the criteria," Burke said.

The afternoon started on a much more positive note, with what could only be described as a rousing pep talk from Pearl.

Discussing marketing a business, Pearl said the term is somewhat misunderstood.

"It's really about whether you are ready and prepared to sell what you have to sell," he said.

To start, Pearl told business owners to look at their business cards, and urged them to put across on the cards "what you do," in addition to a name and a number.

"You make an impression - good, bad or indifferent," he said. "They may not remember your name, but what you do, they must remember. It's basic and critical." Using the back of the business card for further information is key, Pearl said.

He said everybody talks about tough times, but things are always hard for small businesses. One secret, Pearl said is to advertise, but to do so consistently.

He used the old ad campaign for Winston cigarettes, giving the opening line, "Winston tastes good," and most in the room finished the ad line, "like a cigarette should."

"They spent so much on advertising, that it's imprinted," Pearl said. The key with ads is to buy the same ads consistently, so people get used to seeing or hearing the ad.

Next, he said, "Stay in touch." Pearl said that by making a certain number of calls per day,

"You'll talk to everybody. Anything you can do. If you're not in the customer's face, somebody else will be." He said to call present customers to let them know you're ready for them when they're ready to buy. "Keep asking them, 'What can I do for you?' They have to believe that you care about them," Pearl said.

Overall, Pearl said, "Understand your markets and competitors, and think out of the box."

Finally, he said, it might seem obvious, but be sure that customers can pay.

"Set the price before you perform your service," Pearl said. "Develop loyalty, know where your customers are, and see them face to face. That's really where you have to be."

Pearl said any business owner can call the Newark office, where they have 45 counselors, experts in virtually every field, at 973-645-3982.

Burke went painstakingly over every opportunity that the SBA offers, including the stimulus money. The number for the SBA is 973-645-2434, also in Newark. He said he wanted small business owners

to know the administration operates much more effectively than it did in the 1970s and 1980s, so anyone with a negative previous experience should give them another shot.

Philip Nobile of Rotary said the speakers are part of the club's commitment to community service.

"Small business owners need to help each other stay profitable in these troubled times," he said.

Etta James at the Taj Mahal, the 'Ghost Whisperer' at the Hilton

New Audubon Place group still working on issues

The tenants of the Audubon Place apartments near Branch Brook Park, coming together because of a list of complaints, have elected officers for a newly formed tenant organization.

Al Harris is the group's vice president, and he laid out the list of grievances the tenants group has against its landlord.

He said a change on the management side might help.

"We're looking to work with the new manager to try and get things up to where they should be," Harris said. "When the new owners took over, things were fine for

awhile, but now we have maintenance, cleanup, heat and hot water issues. People are just tired of it. The new owners came in with such high expectations."

He said the better services "suddenly just stopped last October to nothing." Now, Harris said, things like landscaping have fallen off, but now seem to be coming back.

"It seems like every time we have a meeting, something gets done," he said.

The turnout of 25 to 30 people for the meeting to elect officers was not great, Harris said, "but it's a start. Now that people know, more people should come aboard."

Among other issues for the tenants group are asking police for

neighborhood crime watch signs, and asking for the speed limit on the streets in the apartment complex to be lowered to 15 miles per hour.

"Kids are around, and people fly through here at 40 miles per hour," Harris said.

He said the when Officer Gary Souss had the community policing van at the site, crime was down. Now, Harris said people are finding drug paraphernalia around.

"We're looking to get everything back on track," he said. "The new owners came in like gang busters. Now a lot of people are moving out because of the downturn. The owners are only hurting themselves."

First Ward Councilwoman

Marie Strumolo Burke attended the meeting. She said Audubon Communities Management LLC has been fined \$15,000 for sewer problems by the state Department of Environmental Protection.

"It don't think they want to continue to keep paying out like that," Burke said.

At the meeting, tenants were assured that a new property manager "will get to everything. She said she just needs some time. If the tenants stick together, they will get everything they need," Burke said.

One thing they still need is a lawyer to work at no cost for them, the councilwoman said.

"I think somebody out there can help," she said.

About 60 or so residents turned out for a previous meeting, including Burke, and two representatives from Essex County, who advised those present how to run a tenant association.

According to Burke, no one representing Audubon Communities Management, the property's owners were at the first meeting, despite being asked to attend on several occasions.

Harris said previously he documented 20 days this winter in which the apartments were not

Bucs edge West Essex Regional, 6-5

In a week where the Belleville softball team lost its starting pitcher to an injury and missed two other starters for a key Essex County Tournament game, the Bucs displayed a winning character that could help make the 2009 season a special one in the storied history of the program.

Chris Cantarella's team defeated West Essex, 6-5, in the county quarterfinals to earn its first semifinal berth since 2001 tomorrow evening, at Ivy Hill Park in Newark, against defending champion Mount St. Dominic of Caldwell. Belleville lost NNJIL games last week to Immaculate Heart Academy of Westwood, 10-0, and Paramus Catholic, 4-1.

Belleville was 14-4 heading into yesterday's game with Bergen Tech of Hackensack. Tomorrow night's game with Mount St. Dominic is scheduled for 7 p.m. For those who haven't been to Ivy Hill Park, the field is located adjacent to the campus of Seton Hall University.

The other semifinal will match Cedar Grove against surprising Livingston, which upset Nutley last Saturday, 1-0.

Last week, the Bucs lost starting pitcher Gabby Chimento, perhaps for the season, with a broken thumb after being hit with a pitch during a batting cage drill. In addition, Cantarella was without two other starters for last Saturday's contest at Pulaski Park with West Essex.

"I thought our kids played with

a lot of determination in coming back against West Essex," Cantarella said. "It was a crazy week for us, but we showed resiliency and now have a chance to make the county finals."

Mount St. Dominic is obviously a very good team, and we'll need to be at our best to beat them."

West Essex, the eighth seed in the tournament, took a 3-0 lead after two innings, but top seeded Belleville responded with a scintillating third inning that produced five runs.

Erika Giangrande started the rally with a single and Vanessa Gomez, a freshman batting in the ninth spot, followed with a hit to put runners on first and second. Leadoff batter Nicole Velardi then drew a key walk to load the bases off of talented West Essex pitcher Austin Leigh, fouling off a number of pitches before taking ball four on a tough inside change up.

"Nicole's at bat was big for us," Cantarella said. "First, you have to credit Erika and Vanessa for their hits and then Nicole gets that walk on a 3-2 count, and that wasn't an easy pitch to lay off."

Velardi's walk set the stage for sophomore first baseman Jessica Benacquista, who also went to 3-2 on Leigh before hitting a long homer to left centerfield that gave Belleville a 4-3 lead.

"I figured she would pitch me inside and I got a good swing on it," Benacquista said. "It felt really good off the bat, and I was hoping it would get out."

Two batters later, winning pitcher Alexa Veniero, who struck out

looking in her first plate appearance, laced a solo homer to extend Belleville's advantage to 5-3.

"We never gave up," Veniero said. "We felt we could get something started against (Leigh). It was just a matter of being patient."

Veniero pitched a solid game for Belleville, allowing five runs on five hits while striking out one and walking four. Through the final five innings, she yielded just three hits.

In the fourth inning, Belleville took a 6-3 lead, thanks again to Giangrande and Gomez, who both hit one out singles. Velardi was hit by a pitch to load the bases, and Benacquista followed with a RBI

sacrifice fly.

West Essex narrowed the deficit to 6-5 with runs in the fifth and sixth innings, but Veniero finished the game with a strong seventh, along with a key defensive play.

Veniero had retired the leadoff hitter and appeared to have struck out Michelle Bertscha for the second out, but the umpire ruled the pitch outside and Bertscha eventually walked.

Bertscha then stole second, but when Alexa Ramos hit a sharp grounder to shortstop Mariah Lucena, Bertscha broke for third and Lucena threw a strike to third baseman Gianna Veniero who

tagged Bertscha out. Alexa Veniero then recorded the final out on a fly to left.

NOTES: Belleville and Mount St. Dominic last met in a 2002 county quarterfinal game at Clearmon Field, which Mount St. Dominic won.

In 2000, the schools met in the county semis and Mount St. Dominic won 5-2. A day earlier, the teams were playing in the semis and Belleville had a 3-1 lead before rain ended it, necessitating a replay of the game the following day. Belleville defeated Mount St. Dominic 9-6 in the 1999 semifinal.

The team, and roughly 50 rescue workers, freed the contractor after almost three hours, according to Cohen.

The club honored Verona Police Sgt. Michael Ruglio and Pts. Joel Martin and Steven Young for their handling of a domestic disturbance call.

Fontoura said that on Sept. 17, 2008, officers arrived at a Verona home to find a distraught husband at the front door.

"The husband told the officers that he and his wife were having a verbal disagreement," he said. "When the officers asked to see the wife in the interest of her safety, the husband slammed the door

in the faces of the officers."

After police repeatedly rang the doorbell, the wife answered and told the officers of an ongoing domestic dispute with her husband, the sheriff said. The officers advised the wife of her domestic violence rights, she said she wanted to talk with her husband and went inside.

"Moments later, Ruglio, Martin and Young could plainly hear the wife say that her husband had a history of throwing knives at her," Fontoura said. "At this point, the officers entered the residence where they observed the husband, who was brandishing two 13-inch carving knives.

"From the top of a landing, the hysterical husband threatened to kill the officers, and then he repeatedly shouted 'Shoot me!'"

The officers pleaded with the man to drop the knives, according to Fontoura. "Ignoring the officers' requests, the husband lunged violently at them, swinging the knives in stabbing motions."

The sheriff said Ruglio pulled the wife out of harm's way, and attempted to calm the husband while Martin and Young escorted her to safety.

"Ruglio continually attempted to calm the husband and get him to drop the knives," he said. "The armed suspect countered with shouts to 'Shoot me!'"

After four hours of failed negotiation, authorities made a forced entry and took the husband into custody, he stated.

In response to comments by parents about the board's previous actions to involuntarily transfer principals and fire teachers, Perri said, "I will work to reconstruct the bridge" between parents, residents and the Board of Education.

"I've been involved with the Belleville schools for a very long time," Perri said, adding that she grew up in the school system, came back as a teacher, substance abuse coordinator, supervisor, mentor and director, and "always tried to fulfill my jobs to the best of my abilities."

"My first interest has always been the children, and some of the decisions I've had to make were tough, but I had to put my head on the pillow at night knowing I'd done what was in the best interests of the children," she said.

Persi said he wanted the public to know that he could never have unilaterally fired any teacher or involuntarily transferred principals and teachers without the consent

of a majority of the school board. He began the meeting by listing his accomplishments in his time as superintendent, which began last Oct. 1.

He said he met with teachers who had been give reduction in force letters, meaning they could be fired, personally "out of courtesy."

School No. 4 Home and School Association President Shyma Keykorum had angry words for Persi, at one point quoting from an alleged e-mail exchange between her and Persi. She questioned whether or not a search for a permanent replacement had begun, and it the job had been posted. This was before the announcement that Perri had replaced Persi as interim superintendent.

Consolidated Home and School Association President Lisa Kistner had told the board earlier that the Board of Education needs "to fix the bridge that has been broken" and "move us forward."

Perri received a standing ovation upon her hiring, as did retiring Assistant Superintendent Dennis Villano.

properly heated or lacked hot water. He said when he contacted the landlords about the problem, he was told they were in the process of fixing it.
Co-owner of Audubon Communities Management Charles Reyher told the Times during a previous interview that an engineering report would be completed soon, allowing them to perform wiring and ventilation work, pending township approval.
He explained the heat issues

originated from a specific boiler that had been leaking. After contractors were unable to repair it, the owners decided to replace the heat exchange, he said.
Reyher also said that some of the fines were for problems unrelated to heating, like location of the Dumpsters. Harris said the location of the trash bins had an impact on the ability of collectors to access them, leading to build up.
One chief concern from the residents is the installation of new backdoors on their apartments. According to Harris, the doors don't contain deadbolt locks, and the renters are asked to vacate

their dwelling for eight hours during the installation.
The association has distributed fliers to residents, asking them to outline their maintenance problems. These forms in turn will be given to the landlord, Harris said.
Some complaints received through the fliers so far have been reports of window leaks, low water pressure and a broken dishwasher, Harris said.
An annual inspection of the complex by the state's Bureau of Housing was conducted earlier in the month, according to Burke.

Newark. The operation allegedly began in January 2006 and continued for nearly two years, according to the state Attorney General's Office. Seven more defendants are awaiting sentencing after they admitted to obtaining fraudulent titles, the office said.
In all, 378 vehicles were involved, including BMWs, Lexuses, and other luxury cars; and relatively new, low-mileage models from other manufacturers. The fraudulent titles obscured

the cars' histories, including liens and information indicating that they had been damaged in accidents or other mishaps; some classified as salvage.
Some cars apparently were stolen or abandoned by their owners, investigators said. The operation's buyers, bearing apparently legal titles, could take possession of the vehicles, then sell them.
Attorney General Anne Milgram said the case was troubling because an employee allegedly used his public position for profit.

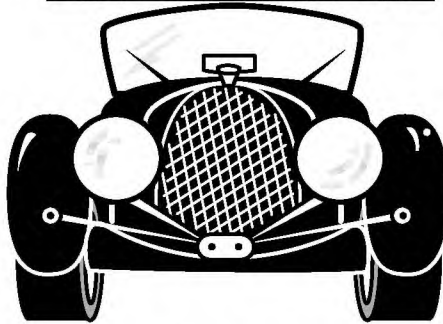
