6. Keeping secure our three freedomsrepresentative political democracy, religious and other liberties, and private enterpriserealizing all must stand or fall together.

If we keep these resolutions in mind, maintain these national aims, all of us as individuals can look forward to a happy and prosperous New Year and many more to come.

A PROGRESSIVE PETITION

A petition in resolution' form was submitted to the Board of Commissioners by Mayor William H. Williams this week for approval and transmission to the State Board of Public Utility Commissioners to have the grade crossing at Mill street and new North Sixth street eliminated, and to have constructed an overhead bridge for the Erie Railroad.

With the construction assured of the erection of a modern industrial plant to employ over 1,000 persons in the immediate vicinity, and with the completion of Franklin avenue from Belleville avenue to Mill street, heavy traffic can be anticipated in this neighborhood.

The favorable reception by the State Board will give Belleville a splendid improvement, and particularly pleasing is the fact that the work may be done at no direct cost to the taxpayers of Belleville, and that the Board of Freeholders will save fifty per cent of the cost-\$35,000-as approval will permit the balance to be paid from State railroad crossing elimination funds.

If the cost of government is excessive, it saps the purchasing strength of the taxpayers, and weakens their ability to save. Both purchasing power and savings are essential to our economic

life, and, if high taxes strangle them, increased, unemployment is the inevitable result.

There is only one way that taxes can be reduced—and that is through reduced governmental spending. It is useless to attempt to "broaden the tax base" by the creation of "experimental" taxes, purported to ease the burden of taxation. Such attempts invariably bring an increase in the total tax "take," that is shared by all groups of taxpayers. This fact is clearly demonstrated by modern atnietic plant. The near an impartial study of the history of other it? states which have experimented with new taxes.

New Jersey's experience is an admirable example of the effects of reasonable taxes upon employment. Year after year the organized taxpayers of New Jersey have resisted the imposition of new taxes. New Jersey has remained a "stand-out" state while other states have yielded to the pressure for new tax levies.

As a result hundreds of new industriesproviding employment for many thousands of New Jersey's residents - have been established here during the past few years. We cannot afford to allow any tax "experimentation" to disturb this increasingly favorable picture.

The M.D. Says

Many Cases of Defective Hearing Can Be Prevented.

Most cases of defective hearing are due to infection of the inner ear. The avoidance of infection is therefore the means of prevention. The cars should be carefully watched by the attending physician during the duration of any childhood illnesses because these are occasionally complicated by ear infections.

Cleanliness helps to prefent ear infection. Washing the ears every day is unpopular with many chil dren but once the habit is acquired it is no longer distateful. The ear should also be guarded against injury. Wax should not be removed with a hairpin or other sharp instrument. A clean, soft cloth is equally effective and less likely to be injurious. In athletic contests proper equipment should be provided to protect the ears insofar as that is possible.

The use of audiometer tests in schools is recommended as a means of learning which children nave impaired hearing. It is pos sible to help many of these children through proper medical at-

tention. It is estimated that five per cent of school children have some de-gree of hearing impairment. Obwould help to prevent future cases.
