Feb. 13 To Fill Posts
On Body, Pass Budget

Six Candidates In Running For Two Vacancies To Be Filled On Board Of Education; Voters Must Also Pass On Expenditures For 1957-58

Belleville voters will go to the polls Wednesday for the purpose of electing two new members to the Board of Education and approving the school budget for the 1957-58 school year.

Six candidates are in the running for election to the two-year term. The Board of Education is composed of seven members, three of whom are elected for the full three-year term, and the other for the two-year unexpired term.

Of the candidates, Rubino and Brown have been endorsed by the Belleville Conference as the group's nominees for the vacancies.

Light Campaign
There has been comparatively little activity in this year's election campaign.

Newly elected school trustees will be officially installed in their offices following the election when the full Board meets to reorganize and elect new officers.

**Boy Scout Week**

We find the Boy Scouts of America at its peak of membership as it celebrates its 47th anniversary during Boy Scout Week, February 6 to 12.

Today 3,300,000 boys are enjoying the "game of Scouting" through its three distinctive programs — Cub Scouting, Boy Scouting and Exploring.

This great work is made possible largely through the active sponsorship of churches of all denominations, schools and other community institutions. Perhaps of greatest significance is the fact that 1,300,000 adults serve as leaders, all of them volunteers, except for the handful of 3,157 men who are full time career Scout Executives.

In no other country in the world do we find so many men and women of good character willing to share their time as volunteer leaders with the boyhood of their nation.

Their is a devoted service. "Recognition Day" during Boy Scout Week has been designated as the time to honor the Cubmasters, the Scoutmasters and Explorer Advisors and their assistants — who bring Scouting directly to boys.

During Recognition Day ceremonies these leaders will be honored with presentations of the Freedom Foundations unit award plaques. These record the contribution Scouting has made to the nation last year through its Get-Out-the-Vote campaign.

"The tremendous task of distributing over one and a quarter million posters and thirty-seven million Liberty Bell doorknob hangers," says Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Chief

Scout Executive, "fulfilled a responsibility of vital importance to our country and in so doing, provided hundreds of thousands of young Americans with a citizenship training opportunity both challenging and worthwhile. There is probably no more important citizenship service than that in which our Cubmasters, Scoutmasters, Explorer advisors and their assistants are engaged."

**GOP Must Reform**

As Essex Republicans, a vast proportion of local voters were shocked by the sorry demonstration by the GOP county leadership, in pretending to "nominate" Senator Malcolm Forbes for the party's gubernatorial candidate by taking a poll of "21 County leaders", that nothing has changed. We are still at the mercy of the same political machine, the same "old pros" who in politics only for the big paychecks they can collect from county jobs.

**One Man's Opinion**

**King Saud's Visit Confirms That Oil-rich Arab Leads Far For Their Own Safety In Present Tension**

It is a strange twist of fate that in this Age of Oil we should be hampered in our political action in the Mideast by a religious enmity as old as Christianity itself, when the Mayor of New York City boycotted the arrival of the King of Saudi Arabia, has degenerated into a life-or-death struggle.

The Eisenhower administration in Washington, now armed with Congressional authority to impose its doctrine of "open purse" politics in the Mideast, realizes that in this Age of Oil, oil spells the difference between peace and war. And it is merely another twist of fate that most of the world's oil lies in untapped pools under the sandy wastes of the desert skeldoms where the intense religious fury is deepest rooted.

It is true, alas, that the enmity of Jews and Moslems cannot be divorced from the problem of preserving a free flow of oil, through a reopened Suez Canal. Nothing could be gained, therefore, by applying generally the policy of "boycott diplomacy" of Mayor Wagner. Those whose religious faiths are in cause irreparably harm by shutting down on oil, just as Egypt harmed the West by scuttling ships to close the canal.

Since oil is our source of power, the strength of the free world depends on an assured reserve of oil, in war as in peace. The visit of King Saud, the Moslem leader, has offered us the opportunity to assure the oil our Western allies need. They have all the oil they need in war, their contribution to the common cause will be slight. The lesson we play the great, or lose ours must be.

Since there is no precedent, it is difficult to comprehend the fantastic amount of oil already discovered. For example, the sandy skeldom of Kuwait, not far as a Texas oil well, has as much oil as the whole United States. Well lie so close to the coast that oil pouring out of them runs down to load the world's largest tankers.

Adventurous Production In Saudi Arabia one of America's finds is a vast pool that stretches across the desert as far as from Nutley to Baltimore.

In the United States most oil wells produce less than 100 barrels a day. In Saudi Arabia most produce more than 5,000 barrels a day. This one field in wartime could mean the difference between adequate supplies for the West and disastrous shortages. It probably contains more crude oil than the proven reserves of all North America.

Similar conditions exist in Iraq, Iran, and Qatar. These five countries have most of the world's oil. One authority sets their reserves at 230 billion barrels. Probably three-fourths of the free world's oil lies there near the Iron Curtain, far overseas from us.

These oil facts have profound Oil For Defense.

Our NATO allies depend on Mideast oil for industry, transportation, and power for war. The United States uses more oil than the rest of the free world combined, yet Western Europe's consumption increases twice as fast. Both civilian and military demand mount on a steep curve.

Our European allies appreciate this crucial change more than we do in the United States where we have coal, gas, rivers, and now nuclear energy as well as oil to satisfy our growing hunger for energy. Most European nations lack one or more of these. All depend on the Mideast for oil.

The Soviets realize full well that oil may make the Mideast intrinsically strong again. These lands have touched Aladdin's lamp. They have a concentration of energy never known before. What they now need are ample sources of water, strong government, and strong leaders of integrity and purpose. These will surely come in chaos and confusion can be averted.

Not Self Sufficient Some American leaders have said that the United States does not need Mideast oil. In 1955 the United States produced more oil than we produced. We kept up our reserves even though we took out of the ground some 7,500,000 barrels of oil, and natural gas liquids.

We imported about 1,250,000 barrels a day, but most of that came from South America and in meaning to the United States. They help determine the economic strength of the free world sea alliance.

An emergency we could call on our surplus capacity for a time. Yet we need oil overseas for our allies and for our forces stationed there. And we need it over all the seas in global war. We need it for our troops and planes in NATO, for our Sixth Fleet and its planes in the Mediterranean, for our air forces in North Africa, for our planes, tanks, and ships in the Far East.

Oil moves our supplies and makes our bases alive with power ashore. It fills the skies with winged power. Except for two atomic submarines, oil still drives all our ships wherever our power flows.

Without oil we could not protect our army and air forces

which makes Mayor Wagner's attack of King Saud all the more regrettable. That new information from Saudi Arabia discloses intense concern within the Saudi royal family over the degree of Communist penetration of Syria and Egypt.

This concern is causing leading royal princes to rise against their elder brother, King Saud, with whom formerly they had number of points of difference.

Specifically, Prince Faisal, who is Prime Minister and crown prince, and Prince Mishaal, Minister of Defense, now are believed to agree with King Saud that Communist influence among the masses, poses a threat to the autocratic rule of the House of Saud.

Formerly both Prince Faisal and Prince Mishaal had urged close ties with President Nasser of Egypt, the purchase by Saudi Arabia of Soviet arms, and a progressive breaking away from the West.

Saud Was Our Friend King Saud, through he never expressed himself publicly, was believed to have stood out almost alone in Saudi councils in believing that the United States was Saudi Arabia's most reliable friend.

Originally King Saud himself had fostered close ties with Colonel Nasser of Egypt, in order to embarrass Iran, traditional enemy of the House of Saud. Gradually, however, the Saudi monarch became convinced that Nasser was seeking to win the allegiance of the Saudi people for himself.

Observers said the King was disturbed by the fact that, on the occasion of Colonel Nasser's last visit to Saudi Arabia, the Egyptian leader received a more fervent popular welcome than did King Saud himself.

There is no firm indication that Prince Faisal and Mishaal now are anti-Nasser, despite their new area of agreement with King Saud. What is believed to concern the King's brothers is the race and form of Communist penetration of Syria, where the leftist group of Syrian Army officers holds real power in the country.

Soviet technicians reportedly are taking over responsibility for the training of Syrian Army Navy, and Air Force units, and Damascus is believed to be relying increasingly on Communist arms, ammunition, spare parts, and replacements.

Communist control of an Arab the Saudi royal family. For some time resentment has been expressed in Saudi Arabia at the relatively small amount of oil income which returns to the people in the form of schools, hospitals, road systems, and other public services.

The impression has been growing among Saudis that too much oil revenue is retained by the royal family for its personal use. The impression is believed to be shared by some Saudi Army officers and soldiers, who are influenced by the antiroyal views of Egyptian officers helping to train the Saudi Army.

Question of Loyalties At present King Saud does not appear to fear his Army may be a Trojan horse. This Army is believed to comprise four effective regiments, which are scattered widely over tortuous desert terrain, making it difficult for the Army to mount any coordinated coup.

Also, the King has as the hard core of his personal support, the Royal Guard Regiment, apart from the Saudi Army, stationed at Riyadh. Supplementing the royal guard is a "white army" of 16,000 tribal levies, so-called because of the white robes they wear. These Bedouin warriors are believed to be loyal to the person of the King.

King Saud is reported, however, to oppose the creation of an effective Saudi Air Force, on the promise that only the air force could cover ground fast enough to threaten him.

Currently the air force has two American B-26 propeller-type bombers, plus a number of British Meteor and French Mystere jet fighters.

So far, however, Saudi pilots cannot fly the jets, and the latter remain in hangars, wheeled out to show visiting VIPs. Saudi pilots are being trained by the Egyptian Air Force in Egypt, though it is believed relatively few Egyptian pilots have mastered modern jets.

In line with his concern over the Saudi Air Force, King Saud reportedly has not permitted any Saudi pilots on the Saudi civil airline to become full-fledged pilots. Pilots on the airline are American, Saudi co-pilots are said to resent the fact that they are not being allowed to progress.

On the nonmilitary side, King Saud some time ago was ready to grant a contract to a Polish firm to build the Hejaz Railway. The monarch now has been persuaded by advisers, including Americans, that he would be introducing Communist elements into the holy land of Islam. At last report the King has canceled his Polish plans, and had accepted an American survey of the Hejaz route.

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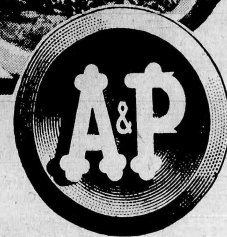
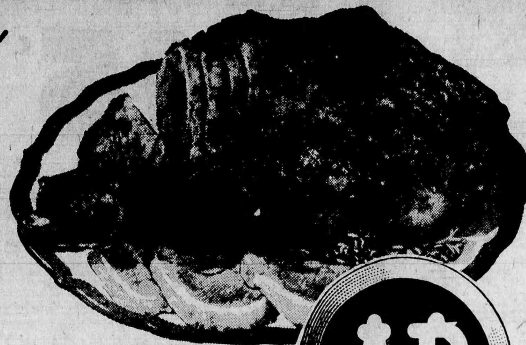
