

Art Ackerman Bonded At Mon. Board Palaver

School Nine Proposal Regarding Redistricting Of Of Schools 1 and 9 Tabled Till Next Meeting
Board Secretary Shader Receives Pay Hike

The Custodian of School Nine, Arthur Ackerman, was bonded for \$250,000, on resolution proposed by board member George Brown. Ackerman is bonded by the town of Belleville for \$300,000, and the question of bonding him for the Board of Education arose in Monday's special board meeting. Max Schwartz, chairman of the board, stated that not having the Custodian of School Nine bonded was "unthinkable." Chairman Boyd was opposed to the resolution because, as he stated, "it's a waste of money, since it has never been one before." The bond, for \$250,000, will run in the neighborhood of \$750. Ackerman handles approximately that same sum (\$250,000), what with teachers' payroll checks, etc.

On the problem brought up before the board concerning the redistricting of Schools One and Nine, the Board proposed tabling it until next meeting, June 17, when it will appear on the agenda.

The main problem is this: The first grade of School Nine was only about 10 pupils. What to do with these ten poses a serious problem. The Board has been transporting them to School No. 10, but the school is full. The Board is considering a plan to build a new school for these ten pupils. That is the problem that the Board is confronted with, and which it hopes to solve at the next meeting.

The problem concerning the insurance plan for the school is also being discussed. The plan will be given to the National Wide Mutual Insurance Co., with an amendment. That amendment erases the \$10 deductible plan.

Board Secretary Mrs. Shadler, who received a \$300 raise, Mr. Boyd objected on the grounds that she had a raise only last November of \$120. That wasn't exactly a raise, because Mrs. Shadler changed her position to Board Secretary. Her salary is \$5,800. The plan will be given to the school No. 3, who came in place of Mr. Julian. The latter could not attend due to a death in his family.

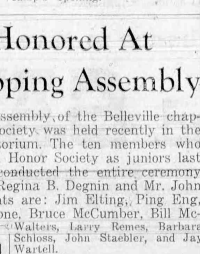

Recently received at the editor's office was a letter submitted by Mrs. Lee of School Number Nine which stated:

Somehow along the line we feel issues have become confused and we would like to make the public our case clear. A delegation of parents from School No. 9 went before the Board of Education and asked that these conditions be considered carefully before combining classes at our school. We now have a Teacher-Principal and feel that our children would not be afforded a fair chance for a good education.

"Due to the dwindling enrollment, and we do not feel this is temporary, it has been suggested by Mr. Thomas that we would have a combining of grades 1 and 2, and 2 and 3. Coupled with this, our Principal teaches 3rd grade and we feel that these conditions are not to the children's best advantage in the formative years. We did not presume to tell the Board what to do but offered these suggestions.

"In view of our poor economy to deprive a school of fine leadership and a greater understanding between faculty and parents, which we have had under Mrs. Spray.

"In the light of learning of overcrowded conditions existing in some of our schools, we suggested reasoning in the hope of alleviating this.

"We specifically suggested that children living on the east side of Washington Ave. could without any hardship be reassigned from School No. 5 to School No. 9.

"We feel that sentiment does not enter in and if conditions warrant changes, they should be made. One of the objects of the N. J. A. is to develop between parent and child, and the general public's united efforts will be secure for every child the highest advantages, physical, mental, social and spiritual education.

"We are proud of our school and would like to see it utilized to capacity.

"We were courteously received by the Board and were temporarily satisfied that they would study this problem carefully."

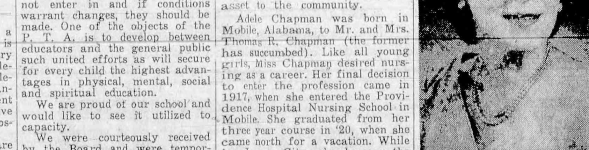

"Not Even A Thin Dime"

As befits such an authority which enjoys privileges refused to other common mortals, the New Jersey Highway Commission, which built and runs the Garden State Parkway, has not moved in the past fortnight since the sensible proposal was advanced by Nutley that Hoover Avenue be made a free exit and entrance point on the Parkway to ease the traffic congestion at Bloomfield Avenue by dispersing the flow of traffic and to set the Authority aright with the law.

The Highway Commission cannot be forced to do anything; it cannot be coerced or shamed or beguiled into doing anything. Enjoying its special privileges it does just what it wants; no more and no less. Apparently, right now, it does not want to do anything, especially anything which might cost it any tolls.

The Belleville Times-News contends that the Authority is indifferent to the rights of Nutley, Belleville and Bloomfield, as it is indifferent to the safety of the motorists who use these crowded ten miles through its corner of Essex County. Only a tragic accident with a high toll of dead can overcome that indifference—unless the State legislature awakens to the real fact that the Authority, in its present operation of the Parkway, is guilty of a violation of State law, specifically of the 1952 Assembly Bill which created the Commission and authorized the construction and operation of the Parkway.

That law provides that there shall be a toll-free section of the Parkway between Springfield Avenue, Irvington, and Belleville Avenue, Bloomfield. The law did not limit the toll-free section at Bloomfield Avenue, but the Highway Commission, in planning and building its Parkway, did. It provided no exit and entrance ramps at Belleville Avenue and as a consequence it is not possible to ride toll-free, as the law requires, to and from Belleville Avenue.

The Essex Toll Plaza spreads its hungry maw across the highway at Belleville Avenue. Since there are no ramps at Belleville Avenue, the Nutley, Belleville or Bloomfield motorists, or those passing through Bloomfield to Glen Ridge, Montclair, Verona or Cedar Grove via Claremont Avenue, must pass through the tollgate and pay 25 cents to reach the exit ramps at Hoover or Watchung Avenues. Rather than be taxed, in violation of the law, they get off at Bloomfield

Avenue and add to the confusion and traffic pile-up which is the cause of all the protest.

Mrs. Katherine White, the Authority chairman who listened to the proposals of Nutley and Bloomfield, in a regional conference a fortnight ago, pleaded poverty and cited some lawyers' smooth words which questioned the legality of cutting down the tolls income in the light of promises made to the bond-holders. Not a word about the legality or the illegality of the toll-trap which the Authority created at Belleville Avenue; not a word about the safety of our regional motorists. Only crocodile tears for the poor, starving bond-holders who invested their pitiful pennies in tax-free bonds paying a clear 3 1/2 per cent.

Mrs. White reached far out into thin air and came up with a contention that it would cost exactly \$500,000 to move the tollgate to a point north of Watchung Avenue. Mrs. White is not an engineer, nor even a mathematician. She is a politician who, for six years, was mayor of her home town and always voted a straight Democratic ticket. She is no more qualified to estimate the costs of the tollgate removal at such a handily round and impressive figure than she is to handle the dangerous traffic congestion problem.

Dudley Shepard, a professional engineer, who supported the Nutley proposal introduced by Commissioner John Lucy, director of public works, pointed out that it would not cost "a thin dime" to open one wicket of the tollgate in each direction and allow the trapped motorists to leave or to enter the Parkway at Hoover Avenue without paying tolls. It could be done by firing one toll-collector, stringing a row of stanchions and painting a few white lines. Total cost: less than "one thin dime".

Mrs. White promised to go back to Red Bank and ponder. She must still be pondering; the Authority has done nothing to investigate, on the spot, the Nutley proposal. Commissioner Lucy and Supt. of Public Works Shepard did something. They visited the tollgate plaza and they confirmed that since there are seven lanes at that point, one lane can be shut off for through traffic to become an entrance or exit lane for local traffic without increasing traffic hazards.

The Belleville Times-News did something, too. It sat on a grassy hillside, in this week's sunshine, and counted passing cars over a two-hour period at the middle of the day. Our count showed that only one car in every 337 which passed through the wickets, after paying 25-cents tolls, used the Hoover Avenue exit ramp. In other words, if one exit was set aside as a free-passage outlet—at the end of the legal free zone—for traffic using the Hoover Avenue ramp, it would cost the Authority only 25 cents out of every \$84.25 of tolls collected at the Essex Plaza tollgate. That amounts to about one-fourth of one per cent toll tolls. None of the bond-holders would need starve to death. Even an Authority lawyer, and they are many and magnificently remunerated, would be hard put to find an argument to support Mrs. White's claim that the Nutley proposal would be ruinous. In one year's time the lost toll income would barely equal the \$111,000 which the Authority pays its new "assistant director," a political job, pure pay, created last month for a worthy Democrat and filled by one of the Kenny Klan, from Jersey City.

The Belleville Times-News calls upon the Essex delegation in the State Assembly to bring to a vote the Sherman Bill which, alone, can bring the Highway Commission to its senses and compel it to put itself within the law by moving the tollgate to a point north of Watchung Avenue. R.E.H.
