Looking Ahead To Jets

It is only a question of time until New-ark Airport will be opened to jet-propelled airliners and for that reason, if not for to-day's intolerable noise which can be blamed day's intoicrante noise wince can be brained on a violation of the 2,000-foot ceiling pledge. Belleville is, really, fighting the fight of other Essex suburban towns in seeking a permanent solution of a problem which will become serious when the noise of incoming and outgoing planes. is intensified as jets replace motored transport planes.

Mayor Isadore J. Padula, in throwing Mayor Isadore J. Paduia, in throwing Belleville's support to the move to end the air nuisance, said that Belleville police have been swamped with complaints of the pass sage overhead of planes at alarmingly low altitude "with almost highway traffic fre-

Noise is only one of the basic complaints. There is a danger to the safety of almost, one million people, in Newark and this suburban area, for whom life is made miserable by the noise, the vibration and the frighten-ing propensities of low flying planes. Television sets vibrate, windows and household furnishings rattle; sleep is broken and the peace, tranquility and health of that million people is hampered.

Four years ago, Governor Robert Meyner pointed out that Newark Airport, hemmed in by massed population and high-ways, is obsolete and that a new major airport should be constructed in central New Jersey, on convenient major highways, to replace it. He proposed that Newark Airport become a helicopter port with a flight link to the new central airfield.

It is a matter of record that in 1952 an agreement was reached with the Air Trans-port Coordinating Committee that planes using the north and south flight patterns at Newark and Teterboro airports should be routed over the Kearny meadows at an altitude of not less than 2,000 feet. It is that agreement which is being violated daily. For the immediate relief of this suburban population of one million, the planes should be forced to conform to that pledge, but of far greater importance is a solution now for the future - for that future when jets, flying at the speed of sound, will be introduced for passenger service at Newark Airport.

Opportunity For Political Acumen

Governor Meyner is a man with a quandary, born of a too-great plenitude of opportunity. Within the next few weeks, he must name two new justices to New Jersey's seven-member Supreme Court and, on top of that, he must designate a new Chief Justice for the state's highest tribunal.

And just by a coincidence, Mr. Meyner is running for re-election in November. From here it looks like a Heaven-sent opportunity, because the right selection of appointees aild do much to assure the Governor's re-

election. By the same token, an unwise choice of jurists, too heavily doxed with po-litical opportunism; could have an adverse effect on his political career. Meyner, ob-viously, is looking farther afield than New Jersey and he knows better than anyone a defeat here in November will spoil his chances as a potential candidate, on a national level, for the Vice Presidency.

To his disadvantage, however, the Gov ernor is under considerable pressure to make his appointments political instead of judici-al. A jurist's political affiliation, doubtless, al. A jurist's political affiliation, doubtless, will have more influence on his selection than his record on the bench. Before the death of Chief Justice Arthur T. Vanderbilt last week, the Supreme Court was composed of four Republicans and three Democrats. It is a foregone conclusion than when the new appointments are made; the majority will—swing to the Democratic party, either four to three or five to two, if the Governor is going to be piggish about it.

This would give the Democratic party, either four the first time since the court was formed in 1947 under the new State Constitution.

The Governor is under considerable pressure from two of the state's largest counties—Bergen and Hudson—for representation in the court. In the November balloting he must do well in both counties, most political observers concede, if he is to win reelection.


