

Commissioners Oppose Mayor's Cool Request

A proposal by Mayor Isadore J. Padula to air-condition the revenue and finance offices in the Town Hall last night met a hot blast of opposition from Commissioners Elmer S. Hyde and Kenneth D. Smith. The matter was tabled pending a survey of the entire building for air conditioning.

Hyde's opposition later prompted Padula to cast the decisive vote defeating an ordinance by Hyde to install partitions to make offices in the Public Works Department more comfortable.

MEETING HELD IN REFERENCE TO PLANE COMPLAINT

Mayor Padula Calls Session After Receiving Letters Concerning Low Airplanes

An influx of air traffic from Newark, Teaneck, and Idlewild Air Ports has created a disturbance to many of the town's residents. Mayor Padula, because of many letters of complaint, called a discussion meeting on Monday afternoon among town spokesmen and representatives of the National Air Transport Coordinating Committee. The latter were John Graves, technical adviser of NATC and Jack F. Ramberger, assistant to executive director of the committee.

Hyde immediately objected. "If you do it for your department, do it for all departments," he said. "Why do it piecemeal?" In answer to a question by Smith, Padula said the machine would be financed from a budgeted item, the deputy mayor's salary. There is no deputy mayor. Part of the \$3,000 pays the salary of the assistant town attorney and the rest is ordinarily returned to surplus.

In a heated exchange, Smith accused Padula of deceiving the town during the budget hearings in March by promising to save the town money on the expense of the machine. Hyde, who opposed the measure, Padula cited Hyde's opposition to the air conditioner, and the town's reopening in 1956 when the machine was installed. Hyde said this "piecemeal" Hyde accused both of "playing politics."

Michael F. Leonard retired from Esso Standard Oil Company's N. J. Sales Division July 1, 1957, after 36 years' service.

He launched his career April 4, 1921, as a cash and delivery equipment assistant inspector. For the next three years he held various labor jobs before assuming motor tank helper duties at Newark in late 1924.

A soldier over two years, he participated in two notable events as a member of the anti-aircraft corps. He was in the campaign north of Verdun during October, 1918 and also took part in the defense of the central sector of Haute-Alsace in late summer, 1918.

NIECKOWSKI IS SUSPENDED TEN DAYS BY BOARD

Walt's Tavern Proprietor Granted His Request After Making Non Vult Plea

The liquor license of Walter Nieckowski, owner of Walt's Tavern at 501 Washington Avenue, was ordered suspended for 10 days, last night by the Town Commission. Nieckowski had pleaded non vult before the commissioners June 17, a charge of serving three minors.

The commissioners, sitting as an excise board, granted Nieckowski's request that he be given a "minimum penalty" of 15 days suspension, less five days for his plea. He also asked that the suspension begin July 1, which the commissioners agreed to.

The minors, all boys, did not appear at the June 17 hearing and no testimony was taken at that time. Nieckowski contended that the boys showed him draft cards as they were over 21. He has no previous convictions for serving minors.

Police said two of the boys were arrested, May 16, in Paramus on charges of breaking into two gas stations there. After their arrest, they claimed they had been served beer in Nieckowski's tavern before going to Paramus.

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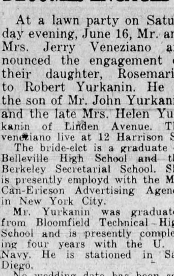

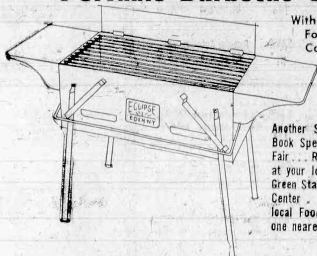
