

**NO CAUSE FOR ALARM SEEN IN ASIAN INFLUENZA**  
Health Officer Berry Tells People To Keep Calm; How Vaccine Will Be Used Here

The possibility of Asian influenza occurring in the Town of Belleville is no cause for anxiety, Eugene T. Berry, Health Officer, said today.

"The evidence from medical sources is that Asian influenza in persons otherwise in good health is mild and of short duration, about three to five days, provided complications do not develop," Berry said.

**Priorities Recommended**

"The State Commission of Health has recommended that the following priorities be followed in the use of Asian influenza vaccine in New Jersey. I strongly recommend that these recommended priorities be followed in our community. They are as follows:

**GROUP A**

"1. Staff and employees of hospitals.

"2. Employees of agencies and professional individuals providing direct health, pharmaceutical and religious services to sick persons.

"3. Personnel necessary for the maintenance of public utility services essential for the health and safety of the population. These should be limited to law enforcement, fire protection, health protection, water supply, sewage disposal and power and light distribution services.

Project Started

The Junior Woman's Club of Belleville launched an intensive drive this week to develop interest in the establishment of a child guidance clinic in this area. It has sent invitations to various organizations, city officials and industrial leaders in four communities — Belleville, Nutley, Bloomfield and Glen Ridge — to attend a meeting at the Woman's Clubhouse at Rosemore Place, Belleville, Tuesday, Oct. 8, at 8 P.M.

At that time, S. A. Rayburn, an official of Essex County Mental Health Association, will present two films describing a child guidance clinic and the function of and need for such a clinic.

Charles T. McElvaney, school psychologist, also will attend, along with Mrs. William Lapham, secretary of the Family Service and Child Welfare, whose interest in the creation of such an agency has long been known.

The Junior Woman's Club, in undertaking development of this project, again has established itself as an organization whose primary purpose and aim is to carry out a constructive community program each year.

Because of the tremendous need for care of mentally disturbed children, the Juniors are very much fired by their desire to begin work toward the creation of a clinic for these youngsters.

Along with Mrs. Lapham, they feel that many children are being denied necessary treatment because there are no facilities in this area for them to turn to, or because the parents can not afford the heavy expenses involved in private treatment.

The establishment of a child guidance clinic would mean that its services would be available to all mentally disturbed children in the area.

Mentally disturbed children seldom develop into well-adjusted adults.

By pledging itself to the creation of this clinic, the Junior Woman's Club of Belleville hopes to make the general public aware of the problem of mental health in children.

Mrs. Walter Keck, president of the club, is acting as general chairman of the development committee.

## Juvenile Delinquents Are Made, Not Born

Belleville, with the skyline of New York City on its horizon, is blessed with a freedom from the greatest scourge of the big cities — juvenile delinquency and its criminal expression in gang fights and killings. It is our contention that juvenile delinquents are not born criminals; they are a product of their unhappy environment.

With the reopening of our schools this week, the town's Summer playgrounds close but the valuable "Rec" program goes on through the Winter. Organized play has been proven to be the best antidote there is to delinquency. When there are idle hands, trouble is bred. Youthful energies and competitive spirit are served better in organized play than they are in gang conflict.

Belleville's "Rec" program is costing each of us \$1.35 this year. It provides organized recreation in six play areas for 4,000 children. The whole municipal budget for "Rec" for the year is \$48,783. That provides the competition of the boys' leagues for baseball, softball and basketball. The program is so varied and so complete that, around the calendar, no Belleville boy or girl should get into trouble because there is nothing else to do.

No town in this area offers a more complete recreation program, and none spends less, per capita, than Belleville. Commissioner Elmer Hyde's annual report, made public this week, shows that in contrast to the per capita cost of \$1.35 here, the average throughout Essex County towns is \$2.07 per capita and some communities spend as much as \$5 per capita.

As an insurance against delinquency, our "Rec" program is worth many times over the amount we invest in organized play.

Oder-Neisse Rivers Frontier May Be Another "Alsace-Lorraine" To Prevolve World War III  
As Germans Back Adenauer's Power Policies

The seeds of the next great world war have already been sown along the banks of the Oder and Neisse rivers, the "temporary" frontier between Germany and Poland, because if Moscow is prepared to defend by force its military frontiers, then they can only be changed by war.

That war need not be fought along the Oder and the Neisse. It may be fought in Syria or elsewhere in the Middle East; it may be fought in the torpid East, as it came near to being fought in Korea. If Russia has anything to say, it definitely will not be fought on the European continent where her own security is too directly involved.

Last week's West German elections in which Chancellor Konrad Adenauer obtained 50.3 per cent of all the votes and his Christian Democratic Union party will occupy 270 of the 497 seats in the Bundestag at Bonn makes it inevitable that German reunification and the recovery of the lost provinces of Saxony, Pomerania and East Prussia will continue to dominate relations between the

West and the Communist East.

In their joint pronouncement in Bregenz, last week, Tito and first secretary of the Polish Communist Party, said emphatically that they consider the frontier fixed by the Potsdam Conference as "temporary" and giving Poland a large slice of previously German territory, to be permanent and final.

It is obvious now that it can be changed only by force and

only when vast and radical changes take place in the present power pattern of Europe. It is equally obvious that the reunification of the 35 millions of West Germany with 17 millions of East Germany can occur only with the consent and on the terms of Moscow.

Clearly the major factor in the West German elections was West German prosperity. Yet foreign policy unquestionably played an important part in the balloting and the resultant composition of Parliament, specifically the Bundestag, will in the normal course control the direction of foreign policy for another four years.

## Aligned With West

In this sense the Adenauer victory is distinctly one for alignment with the West against the Soviet Union and for continued adherence to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

If the Soviet leadership under Nikita Khrushchev seriously wanted to help the Social Democrats, Dr. Adenauer's opposition, it is surely could have done so more effectively by induction.

Instead, Moscow embarrassed the SPD by open support of it, strengthened the Chancellor by personal attacks on him, and undercut the one foreign policy aspect of the Socialist's advertising their unwillingness to compromise on German reunification.

It rather appeared that Moscow preferred to have an outright opponent in Bonn than to have there a government which would raise hopes of an accommodation through four-power negotiations.

This way Moscow serves notice that it will not sacrifice Stalinist Walter Ulbricht and his hard-bitten crew of East German Communists even for favorable world opinion and a possible door into the Rhineland.

## Germans Distrust Moscow

Its only terms for German reunification are consideration between the genuine, popularly elected Adenauer government of West Germany and the bayonet-propelled dictatorship of East Germany. Adenauer will not negotiate on that basis.

As to their own choice, German voters, however much they may be beguiled by success of the free-enterprise policy of Economics Minister Ludwig Erhard, have shown they prefer the decisiveness of Chancellor Adenauer and the taught defiance which last fall West over a nebulous hope of reunification under an uncertain neutrality pact.

The abhorrence for military conscription and for atomic arms, on which the Socialists counted, and the very much faded under echo of the gunfire which last fall extinguished momentary Hungarian freedom.

What the election means for West Germany is evidently more of the same sort of government

it has had for eight years, including positive Adenauer leadership. The next four years should be vigorous ones for the West German Republic.

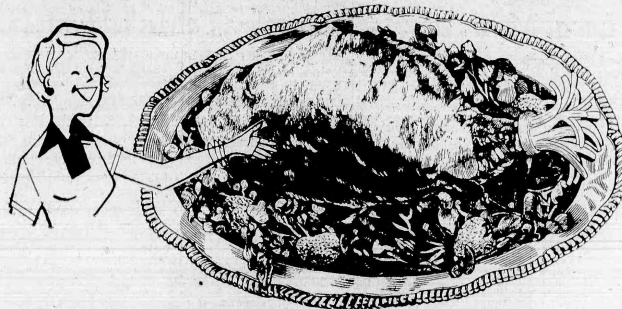

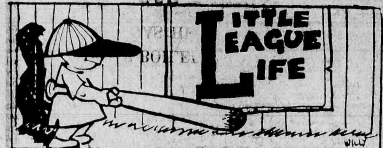
