

VARA SEES BIG VOTE FOR MEYNER; URGES DEMO VOTE

Democratic Leader Here And Associates Confident Party Will Triumph In Belleville

The Belleville Democratic organization this week expressed confidence that its party will achieve one of its outstanding triumphs in recent years on General Election Tuesday.

Ralph A. Vara, Town Democratic chairman and spokesman for the group, said the prediction was based on the fact that the party has been "in the county ticket with in-vincible and whose campaigning has been a great asset to the party in the over-all campaign."

The town chairman said the committee and "the many friends" of Governor Robert B. Meyner, Ronco and others on our ticket, "have arranged 'innumerable meetings at which the ticket has been represented.' These gatherings, he asserted, 'have included County Committee meetings, house calls, lawn parties, teas and cocktail affairs.'"

"Never in my experience as Democratic chairman has the response been more gratifying," Vara pointed out. "It is interesting to note that the enthusiasm is centered not only about the candidacy of Governor Meyner, who probably will receive the best vote ever given to a Democratic gubernatorial candidate in Belleville, but many persons are interested in the election of the entire Assembly ticket in order to provide the Governor with the support he needs for his legislative program."

Golden's "Bombshell" At Board Meeting A Dud

James R. Golden, 62 Tappan Avenue, who appears at Board of Commissioners meetings from time to time to voice opinions on a variety of subjects, turned his attention to school matters Monday evening, Oct. 28, and presented some complaints and recommendations to the Board of Education.

He asked a number of questions relative to the purchasing practices followed by the administrative staff of the school system and made some suggestions about procedures which he thought would lead to an increase in efficiency.

Mr. Golden said of several changes having fewer than the standard number of pupils and this led to remarks by the school board that a restructuring survey was under way as a step toward correcting this situation.

While he was not a proponent of a junior high school if it means the erection of a new building, Mr. Golden said it was considered important to have this type of school he offered the opinion that perhaps School Eight could be used for this purpose.

All these remarks were received with a word or two of comment or explanation by one or more members of the Board or Superintendent of Schools Evan H. Thomas.

Mr. Golden dropped a bombshell into the normal sequence of the meeting when he stated he had reason to believe that a school system truck had been used to transport lumber to a teacher's home.

It is 30 years since any Yugoslav had a chance to vote; 21 years, since 1936, since a Pole could vote to the polls. Albania has not had an election since 1935, Bulgaria since 1937, Rumania since 1939, China since 1929.

Don't be a "satellite American." Exercise your prerogative and your privilege to vote. Go to the polls on Tuesday and prove that you appreciate an electoral privilege which half of the world is denied.

A great deal will depend on a national

level, on how New Jersey votes for its governor on Tuesday. If it is a Democratic victory, it will enhance the prestige of Governor Meyner as a potential candidate for the Presidency and it will, at the same time, be a slap at President Eisenhower. Coming on top of the recent Republican defeat in the Senatorial election in Wisconsin, it will confirm a national trend away from Eisenhower and away from the Republican party.

New Jersey is traditionally a Republican state. Yet in 1953 a combination of intra-party squabbles and the timely injection of the Fay letter defeated Paul Troast and played into the hands of young Bob Meyner.

NEW PHYSICAL ED. DEPT. IN SCHOOLS LAUDED BY THOMAS

Full-Time Plan Working Well, Says Superintendent; Wishe, Berlinski Appointments O.K.'d

When a resolution was presented at the Board of Education meeting Monday evening, Oct. 28, approving appointment of Dr. Donald S. Brown as athletic team physician at a salary of \$700, Edward T. Berlinski as head football coach at a salary of \$1200 and Herman B. Wishe as line coach of football at a salary of \$600, Superintendent H. Thomas grasped the opportunity to say a few words about the newly created department of physical education and athletics.

Mr. Wishe was appointed director of this department at the start of the current school year. This activity had been operated on a part-time basis in the past.

Mr. Thomas said that in spite of the newness of the department, reports have come to him from within the school system and from outside sources to the effect that it was working successfully and was bringing about a well-rounded program in physical education.

Mr. Wishe's and Mr. Berlinski's appointments were approved. That of Dr. Brown was deferred pending discussion of the fee attached to the job.

The \$700 allowed for Dr. Brown's added duties represents an increase of \$200. The question was raised as to whether the salary of Frank J. Noonan, the other school physician, should not be increased at the same time. This is the point to be studied.

Christmas Club Money Soon To Be Mailed By Two Banks

In the next two weeks nearly three quarters of a million dollars in Christmas Club money will be distributed by Belleville's two banks.

Peoples National Bank & Trust Co. will mail its checks Nov. 8 to more than 2300 club members. The total amount of the distribution will be about \$315,000. This year's total sets a new record for the bank, the previous high having been \$285,000.

Checks will go out of Fidelity Union Trust Co. in time to arrive at the more than 2250 club members' homes Nov. 18. The distribution by this bank will exceed \$350,000. This is about the same amount as was saved by club members last year.

It was explained by a bank official that the several strikes experienced here during the year doubtless was responsible in large part for the absence of a greater increase in the amount of Christmas Club savings.

WIRING AT SCHOOL TO BE REPLACED, ROOFS REPAIRED

Board Of Education Takes First Step Toward Job At School 3; H. S. Work Awarded

A considerable portion of the Board of Education meeting Monday evening, Oct. 28, was devoted to the discussion of the wiring at School 3, which is scheduled to be replaced by the electrical wiring in School Three.

A survey made by A. P. Muzio, Inc., of North Arlington was the basis for the discussion, which grew out of a fire at the school several weeks ago. When the fire was a small one and classes were not disturbed, the incident was looked upon as a warning that something serious could happen if action were not taken to re-wire the building.

Harold A. Dufford, Assistant Superintendent in charge of business affairs, was directed by the Board to obtain the services of the C. C. Fruehauf Electric Co. for the wiring job.

The discussion of wiring was interrupted by a motion picture showing other schools in the system -- including the one in which the meeting was being held that were in need of similar attention. No action was taken on any building other than School Three.

Approved at Monday evening's session were the purchase of a long list of musical instruments and filing cabinets and the awarding of a contract for \$1,441 to Fort Lee Roofing Co. for the repair of the extension roof at the high school.

"Mischief Night" Here Worst Ever, Police Say

"Mischief Night" struck Belleville like a hurricane Wednesday night, Oct. 30, with the police department reporting considerable damage to homes, much loss of property as the result of severe vandalism on the part of young people in the community.

All off-duty patrolmen plus the entire auxiliary force were on duty to try to cope with the hundreds of complaints and jammed the police switchboard.

One member of the police department stated that this was the worst year in the history of Belleville for Halloween vandalism.

The fire department answered five false alarms. While it was answering one, a call came in that Plinger's Farm was on fire. Three trucks responded to extinguish a fire, set by boys, which was destroying several hundred crates. The fire was brought under control before it reached several crates piled 300 feet away.

Mrs. Rose Pusaro, of 99 Little St., reported to police that black paint was thrown on her porch and front door while she was out. The incident was not discovered until after she returned home and walked through it into her home, causing considerable damage to the porch and front door.

Many instances of egg throwing into places of business and homes were reported with the front of one store on Washington avenue resembling a "scrambled egg" because of the many eggs peppered at it.

Other damage was caused by stone throwing, resulting in broken windows and doors. Leaves in the street were scattered.

Saturday Classes In Music Instruction Still Being Debated

Board Of Education Continues Discussion Of Subject; Eugene Kelly Alone Advocates Subsidizing; Music Dept. Expresses Views

At the Board of Education meeting on Sept. 24 the question was raised as to whether extra-curricular music instruction classes should be made part of the regular school curriculum or, as has been and is the practice, continue them as special classes paid for by those attending.

Eugene Kelly created the issue and argued in favor of incorporating the extra teaching into the classroom program. The other members of the Board, led by President William A. Boyd, felt differently. They were of the opinion that, as these were extra instruction classes, above and beyond the regular music instruction schedule provided within the school system, they should not be paid for by the taxpayers at large.

The matter was deferred at the September meeting for further study.

Community Chest Fund Drive Is Lagging

The hope expressed in The Times-News editorial last week -- that the Community Chest campaign for funds would reach its goal before the end of October -- has not materialized.

Chest drive officials stated this week that, with the fundraising effort in the final stage, there has been a mounting offering in individual contributions by Belleville residents. Volunteer workers who are covering the town, the Chest reported, "are discouraged by the small amounts of money being offered there. They report that donations of 25 cents and 50 cents are being offered at homes where it is apparent the occupants can afford much more."

This is a serious -- and sad -- reflection on the generosity of the people of our town," the Chest leaders stated. One of the most common excuses reported by campaign workers, the officers of the Chest drive said, is "We gave at our place of business or employment."

While this may be true, the Chest pointed out, unless the contributor is in business or is employed in Belleville, the Community Chest must share in the loss of the contribution.

George Toto, Chest treasurer, put the situation tersely and in its proper perspective when he told a local union last week: "The Community Chest must raise its own funds; no help is received from other towns."

The drive continues in full swing. Despite the discouragement, the volunteer workers seeking \$36,000, said at seven important welfare agencies are not pessimistic. They still have faith in the residents of the community and hope that their remaining calls will meet with greater success, and that the goal will be reached within another week.

# Unalterably OPPOSED To State Sales Or State Income Taxes In Any Form

Attention Homeowners

Up to now, in New Jersey, Real Estate taxes have been levied on approximately the following percentages:

Railroads	100%
Industrial Plants	60% to 80%
Stores	30% to 40%
Homes (Depending on Community)	30% to 40%

However, under this new 100% True Value decision of the courts all real estate must be assessed at 100%.

This will mean a stiff tax wallop for already heavily taxed homeowners. Railroads and corporations pass along the higher taxes to riders and customers in higher fares and prices. But homeowners will be stuck for they have no such relief.

To protect hard pressed homeowners from additional excessive taxation Lynch proposes a Homestead Exemption, similar to the Florida provision, which will allow homeowners several thousands of dollars exemption. 

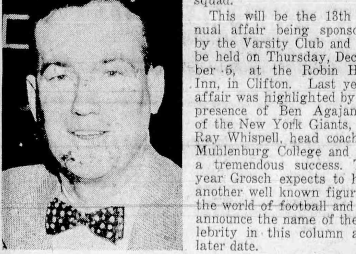

touchdowns in leading Belleville to a 38-13 rout of Irvington. The fullback was tremendous. Of the 275 yards he rolled up on the ground, he accounted for 276, averaging 15.3 yards per carry in 18 attempts.

Just as brilliant as Barra's performance was that of the defensive line which kept the Blue and Gold from getting any of their next three games in succession and hike their winning streak up to five in a row. Following Garfield, Belleville will play host to South Side and Kearny on successive Saturday afternoons at Municipal Stadium and should win both.

On the first play he took a pitch-out and went all the way. Irvington took the kick-off and penetrated Belleville's territory for the first time. The visitors' attack stalled on the 38, however, and they punted. The punt was good and put Belleville on its own 47-yard line. This didn't bother Barra, who, again on the first play, went 92 yards to score his third TD of the afternoon.

The next time Belleville got the ball it waited two plays before it opened a hole for Barra to go. Barra, who went off tackle for 63 yards and the score. That made the score 25-0 at which point it remained until the third quarter.

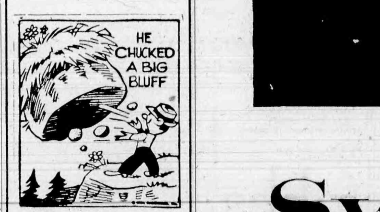

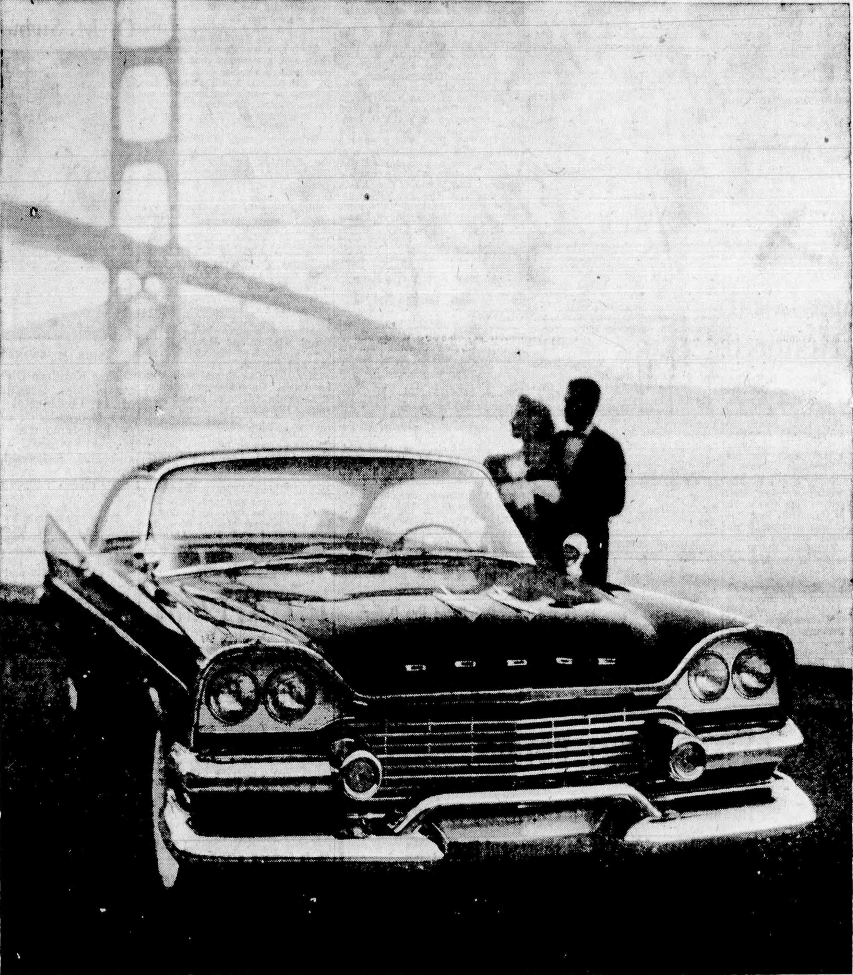

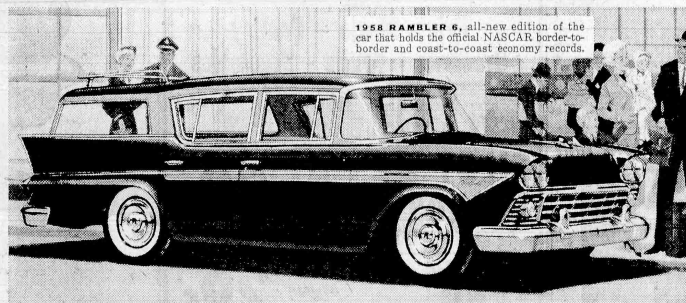

Three years later, in 1956, however, the GOP closed its ranks and the Republican national ticket led by Eisenhower swept the state with a historic victory. That Republican trend can continue, on Tuesday, only if the intraparty squabbles have truly been settled. If he is defeated, it will not be the fault of Senator Malcolm Forbes. Since many months he has campaigned 18 hours a day, seven days a week. In this campaign he has come to Nutley six times and he is due back again for dinner Sunday night with the Republican "untouchables."

If there is a Republican defeat on Tuesday it will stem largely from indifference.

Governor Meyner could not be re-elected on Democratic votes alone because there are not enough of them in New Jersey. He can vote re-election only if many Republicans vote for him and if many other Republicans fail to go to the polls.

That explains why Vice President Nixon came here in the final phase of the campaign. "New Jersey must reverse the defeat in Wisconsin," Mr. Nixon explained.

More than the election of a governor, more than the retention of the Republican majority in the Legislature in Trenton and on the Board of Chosen Freeholders in Newark is at stake. A Forbes victory on Tuesday, upsetting the Democratic incumbent after one term, would be, in Nixon's own words, "a great stimulus to the cause of Republicans throughout the country" and "an upset which involves the kind of support and the kind of inspiration that any national party is glad to have."

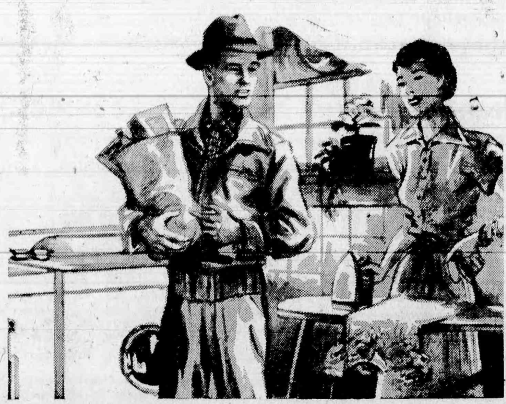

**SUGGESTS SCHOOL BOARD LET PEOPLE HELP SOLVE RED-DISTRICTING PROBLEM**  
Editor, The Times-News:

Reports from the Board of Education and Superintendent's office indicate that a study is now being made by the administrative staff concerning red-districting our schools.

It has become fairly obvious that such a move is long overdue for many schools in Belleville. The solution to the problem of pupil distribution is a problem which one to reach, particularly when so many people are involved. Everyone seems to have something to say on the matter and many are constantly raising new objections or new considerations.

I would suggest that the Board of Education, upon receiving the statistics from the Superintendent of Schools, then appoint a committee composed of two members from each Parent-Teacher Association and five interested citizens to sit down with the Board and discuss this problem logically and efficiently. This would enable the people of Belleville to have the complete picture as to the reasons for each decision and thus to understand and appreciate the problems involved.

The problem of red-districting is too important to simply have the Board of Education decide secretly how to re-district and then insist that everyone accept its decision per se. Let the people know and see for themselves how important executive decisions are made.

I have always been a strong advocate of knowing when and where and how to delegate authority. Let the people know and have more of an active part in the accumulation of facts and suggestions. There is always room for improvement in our schools, and the parents, teachers and even the children are a valuable source for suggestions and constructive criticism.

The schools belong to all of us and we naturally want the best for our children. The Board of Education is interested in having the best schools but they cannot and should not try to do it all by themselves. They make the final decisions, but those decisions should be influenced by a comprehension of the entire problem, taking everything into consideration.

A sincere, hard-working Board of Education wholeheartedly supported by an interested, well-informed citizenry will always stride forward in making the Belleville schools institutions wherein our children can receive the best education and training necessary to cope with life's problems.

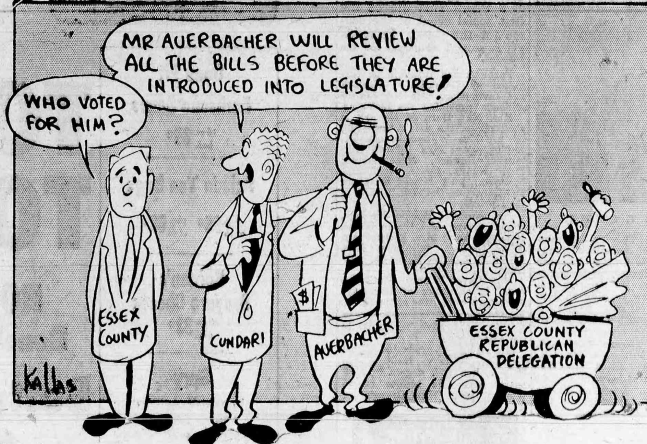

## Some Pertinent Questions

FIVE days filled with explanations have passed since this newspaper disclosed that Essex County's Clean Government Assembly delegation has abdicated its legislative prerogatives at Trenton.

When these 12 Assembly members go to Trenton Thursday they presumably go to represent the people of Essex County who elected them. But let's see. Does the delegation in fact represent Essex or has that function been surrendered to Assemblyman Cundari, its leader, and Louis Auerbacher Jr., its well-paid baby sitter?

Here is an excerpt from the news columns of The News which gives us a clue as to the men who really represent the county at Trenton:

"At the Jan. 2 meeting Cundari informed the delegation that no bill was to be introduced (in the Legislature) by an Essex lawmaker unless it first had been reviewed by Auerbacher and then initiated by the leader, Cundari."

Mr. Auerbacher is classified as the delegation's secretary. But don't let this lowly status fool you. He is a man of many talents and among them is his ability to draw down \$14,500 a year from the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission for a part-time job as counsel.

Now it isn't particularly important that Mr. Auerbacher has thus made a good thing of political baby sitting, nor that assemblymen submit meekly to this use of state funds.

What is important is that members of the Legislature—any member—should so supinely accept political dictation.

Clean Government's leadership ought to take a critical look at its position and relationships. Otherwise Essex voters could do it for them next November when a new state and county ticket is to be elected.

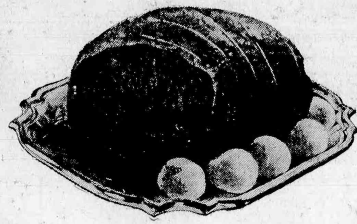
