

Scientists Offer To Aid School System Better Curriculum

Group Of Engineers, Chemists, Etc. Formed To Help Carry Out President's Suggestion; Thomas Offers Similar Idea

Two proposals for following the suggestion President Eisenhower made in a speech Nov. 14 that science and mathematics curricula of high schools be examined were submitted to Belleville Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening, Nov. 25.

One was presented verbally by Jesse Starkman, assistant technical director at Van Dyk & Co., Inc., Belleville, and a candidate for the Board of Education in next February's election.

The other was contained in a letter to the Board from Superintendent of Schools Evan H. Thomas.

Mr. Starkman, speaking during the open forum period at the meeting, said a committee of engineers, educators and technicians, but one of whom either lives or works in Belleville, had been formed immediately after the speech to effect the services of these experienced and practicing scientists to "appraise science facilities in the area, to recommend possible additions or deletions from the present curriculum, to help wherever needed and to investigate scientific industry in Belleville with the schools and faculties."

The committee, to which there may be additions, Mr. Starkman said, included, in addition to himself, the following active industrial scientists and educators: Dr. James Pittman, Al Korn, Dr. Herbert Prince, Dr. Frank Essox, Samuel Sifton, Kenneth Kochua, Kenneth Murray, Robert Reilly, Howard Iserman.

Mr. Starkman said he was present to inform the board of the formation of the committee and to request that the following be added to the group already mentioned: Hugh Kittle, high school principal; Nova Babb, chairman of the Science Dept. at the high school; Dr. Frank Duke, General Supervisor and Curriculum Director of the school district; Samuel Sifton, Guidance Director at the high school; a representative of the Board of Education.

As reported by Mr. Starkman he completed his presentation, Board Member Eugene Kelly lauded the proposal and the committee named, said he knew most of those mentioned, regarded them highly and felt that the group already mentioned should have taken action on the President's idea without waiting for outsiders to call it to the Board's attention.

At this point Michael Rubino introduced Superintendent Thomas. Superintendent Thomas' letter was a copy of the letter he had sent Nov. 18 to the following: "I am writing you on a committee to examine into areas in our own programs that might be improved by the services of a committee of engineers, chemists, physicists, James F. Fitzgerald, George T. Lees, Hugh D. Kittle.

Authority Gives Priority To Town's Parkway Proposal

No Decision Taken On Opening Of Wicket In Tollgate To Allow Free Use Of Hoover Avenue Ramps, Although The Idea Is Lauded

Nutley's proposal for the opening of the Essex Plaza tollgate on the Garden State Parkway to allow area motorists to use the free section of the highway through Essex County without paying a 25-cent toll, by the creation of a free wicket leading to the Hoover Avenue ramp, survived but is subject to a new delay of at least three months following a conference of interested municipalities with Highway Authority officials, yesterday.

Mrs. Katharyn White, authority chairman, submitted a voluminous report, drafted by a hired firm of engineers, which set the cost of the Hoover Avenue project at \$300,000, an estimate likely disputed by Commissioner John Lucey and Director of Public Works Dudley Shepard who told the conference that the opening of a wicket and the marking off of a lane leading to the Hoover Avenue ramp by the use of stationing would not cost more than \$150,000.

The report estimated that it would cost \$2,240,000 to build exit and entrance ramps at Belleville and advance the free section of the Parkway starts at the toll gate. The act of legislature which authorized the construction of the Parkway. The engineers recommended that the Hoover Avenue ramp be shelved at this time, but despite the comparative cheapness of the Hoover Avenue proposal they said in their report that it would lead to "traffic congestion in the area."

Salaries Of School Principals, Others In System Raised

All Action On Increases Approved By Divided Votes; Boyd Hits "Timing" Of Move; Dr. Burde Calls For Ratio Plan

The principals of all public schools in Belleville, Assistant Superintendent Harold A. Dufford, Dr. Samuel W. Peck, Director of Music, and P. Webster Dyer, Director of Art, were granted pay increases by the Board of Education at its meeting Monday evening, Nov. 24—all by divided votes.

The principals were given across-the-board raises of \$400 each by the close vote of four-to-three. Those voting for the increases were Dr. Frank D. Ruggiero, Eugene Kelly, Michael Rubino, George Brown, Theodora M. Dufford, and William A. Boyd, Dr. Palmer Burde and William Kintzing. Dr. Burde, in voting no, expressed his disapproval of the principle of granting increases to the heads of the several schools without increasing the salaries of the teachers. He said the raises should have been flat additions of any set amount but should have been arrived at through a ratio formula. He stated that during his four years as superintendent of the city schools he has been requesting the establishment of such a ratio formula for the entire school year and not acted on in mid-term. In all instances, the increases were retroactive to Sept. 1.

A Proclamation

By the President of the United States of America

At the autumnal season of the year our hearts move us to follow the wise and reverent custom, inaugurated by our Pilgrim Fathers more than three centuries ago, of setting aside one special day for expressions of gratitude to a merciful Providence for the blessings bestowed upon us.

It behoves us to dwell upon the deep religious convictions of those who formed our nation out of a wilderness, and to recall that our leaders throughout the succeeding generations have relied upon Almighty God for vision and strength of purpose.

As a nation we have prospered; and we are enjoying the fruit of our land and the product of our toil; and we are making progress in our efforts to translate our national ideas into living realities, and we are at peace with the world, working toward that day when the benefits of freedom and justice shall be secured for all mankind.

For such blessings let us be devoutly thankful, and at the same time let us be sensitive and responsive to the obligations which such great mercies entail.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER, President of the United States of America, having in mind the joint resolution of Congress approved December 26, 1941, which designates the fourth Thursday in November of each year as Thanksgiving Day, do hereby call upon our people to observe Thursday, November 28, 1957 as a day of national thanksgiving. On that day let all of us, in accordance with our hallowed custom, foregather in our respective places of worship or in our homes and offer up prayers of thanks for our manifold blessings. Let the happiness which stems from family reunions on Thanksgiving Day be tempered with compassion and inspired by an active concern for those less fortunate in our own country and in other lands; and let us ask God's continuing help and guidance in our conduct, both as individuals and as a nation.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States of America to be affixed.

DONE at the City of Washington this eighth day of November in the year of our Lord nineteen hundred and fifty-seven, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and eighty-second.

ended as director of public safety of Belleville.

The Nutley Sun, which pioneered the regional protest against the violation of the legal requirement to provide toll-free use of the Parkway in Essex County, was shut out of the conference at the club.

About 400 representatives of the five towns and County Engineers Curtis Covelli attended the day-long on-the-spot visits and the conference. State Highway Commissioner Director James G. Fox, who promoted the conference, and Mrs. White.

The report opposes the creation of free wickets for the Hoover Avenue ramps, although anticipating a reduced toll. With a toll of 25 cents, the report estimates the loss in revenue at Hoover Avenue at \$40,000 a year.

In its conclusion, the report recommended that no ramps be built at Belleville, but failed to take a definite position regarding the two Hoover Avenue ramps other than to state that "even though it would cost only \$308,000 they would not provide satisfactory solutions to the mutual problems of the Authority and Bloomfield."


