No one seemed to know the answer and the question just seemed to hang in mid-air. So this year we Seniors decided to explain the meaning of the title of our yearbook and its origin.

The word "Monad" comes from the Latin and Greek languages and means a unit. In philosophy it is often applied to mean an individual element which represents the whole universe. Thus this little, old word applies directly to us, a group of individuals, working as one but representing the school as a whole.

The "Monad" originated because students who graduated in 1923 felt that they should have a school newspaper to report the activities and doings around B.H.S.

After that, they had to decide on a name. Someone, history of B.H.S. does not tell us who, suggested "Monad" and it was accepted.

The paper was successful but after some years it was dropped. The yearbook was then started and the old name was kept.

The word is symbolized by an emblem, which is a circle with a device inside resembling an S. This emblem was used on class rings for several years.







We, the Class of 1944, dedicate our Monad to Herbert Bitterman, former teacher of Belleville High, who died this past year. Every Belleville High School student feels his loss as he was more than a friend to all. He helped many a Monad to success; made many a class brighter with his wit; won respect from all by his intellect; and left a vacant feeling in all hearts.

Football season rolled around and Bill Chapman became the new coach for the Zebras. The most outstanding event of the season was the victory over Bloomfield! Everyone reeled with happiness when they saw the final score. The traditional jinx was finally broken! Naturally the dance that followed was a tremendous success.

The customary Hallowe'en Dance was replaced by a Sadie Hawkins Dance. Following the tradition of Sadie Hawkins Day, girls could invite fellows to the dance. It certainly was a gala occasion.

Burt Johnson, our new C. O., had many new ideas for Belleville High School. Having a school newspaper was one of them. With much enthusiasm plans were made to print the news of B.H.S. in the local paper.

About this time the Seniors were having trouble trying to keep their Christmas Card money straight. But it wasn't long before Christmas was over and their worries too.

At lunch hour now, strains of sweet swing could be heard coming from the Girls' Gym. It was planned by the Senior Senate after many meetings to devote the last half of each lunch period to dancing.

In January, the Monad Staff was chosen. Since a March-the-first deadline was set, everyone worked feverishly to get all the material in.

The announcement of tryouts for the Senior Play caused much excitement. Betty Strange received the lead in "Junior Miss" after many eliminations.

With many happy memories we leave B.H.S. Some of us will go on to college and become commissioned officers, while many of us will come in contact with the enemy, but we will all work to speed victory.
