CLASS

In September, 1943, our little band landed on this planet. The name of our home for four years, we found, was Belleville High. In order to keep things running smoothly, we elected a governing body which consisted of Allan McAllister, president; Richard Cherin, vice president; Joan Bramhall, secretary; and William Donovan, treasurer. Our adviser was Miss Olga Nelson. Our principal was Mr. Burt Johnson, a newcomer to our little community. Our football coach also saw action for the first year, for Mr. Chapman replaced Larry Gates, who went into Uncle Sam's Navy. Bloomfield, our ancient rival, fell victim to our football team which finished the season with five wins and three losses. Under the leadership of our officers, our Christmas Dance became part of the social whirl of Belleville High. Our basketball team had a good record, winning twelve while dropping four. As a product of noon-time dancing, the B-Hive was established in our fair school. Another first was the National Honor Society in the school. Belleville was made a chapter of the National Honor Society of secondary schools. The tapping assemblies will be remembered for the suspense they created. The whole town read about our exploits in the "Belleville Times" in a column devoted to our activities. We contributed to the war effort by purchasing grasshopper planes through the sale of war bonds.

We earned a brief reprieve from our trials and tribulations. This reprieve took the form of a two months' vacation.

After our short vacation, we returned to the work of our Sophomore year. We promptly elected a new governing body. Our new officers were Allan McAllister, president; Jack Meyer, vice president; Nancy Fried, secretary; and George Moyes, treasurer. Our advisers were Mr. Harold Dufford and Miss Helen Hollberg. Our basketball team again won twelve games, this time dropping seven. Our big dance was the Sophomore Hop, as always. 1945 was a year of many firsts. The Student Council got its start in Belleville High. This was the answer to our dreams of student government. In the spring of '45 we elected Fred Kirms to the presidency of the first Student Council. The problem of school traffic was solved by a Traffic Committee composed of student monitors. We published a newspaper fittingly named "The Blue and Gold." This paper was a great contribution to journalism and its publication astounded the literary world. In May Germany surrendered, giving us just cause for rejoicing. With such a year behind us we were ready

to adjourn for a two months' vacation.

Just before we came back for our Junior year, we had another cause for celebration. The end of World War II had come in August.

After our return to school in September, we elected our new class officers. They were Lloyd Irving, president; Shirley Crisp, secretary; Nicholas Hagoort, treasurer; and Joseph Santiglia, vice president. Our advisers for this trying year were Miss Mary Dye, Miss Olga Nelson, and Miss Mary Bond. Mr. Wische will remember this year as the one responsible for some gray hairs, as most of the basketball games were decided by a margin of a very few points. We managed to gain an even split for the season with a record of nine wins and nine losses. We cannot forget the football team of this year, for they vanguished our old rival, Nutley, by a score of 7-6. This year will also be remembered for the spirited Student Council election during which we elected a member of our class to be president of the Student Council in the following year. After much campaigning by both sides, Joseph Bergen won a close victory over William Niebuhr. The Junior Prom was a big affair, being held in Newark in the Terrace Room to the strains of music by Richard Himber. We hope that this experiment was a success. With another year behind us, we again tore free of our bonds and escaped for two months.

We returned in September, this time for our last year of toil. Our class officers for this final year were William Niebuhr, president; George Moyes, vice president; and Shirley Sanford, secretary-treasurer. This student government carried us through our first dance, the Senior Winter Dance. This year, as in years past, we turned salesmen to sell Christmas cards. Our basketball team made up for our poor football record (one win and nine losses) by winning nineteen out of the twenty-three games and being placed second in the Essex County Tournament. With all this glory came our silver trophy as a runner-up in the county tournament. Our class held the distinction of being the fiftieth graduating class and this "Monad" is the product of our class. The Senior Play, "Life of the Party," played to packed houses. Under the Student Council student government reached a new high with the assistance of our principal, Mr. Kittle, who had returned from the Navy in our Junior year. The year went fast and we found graduation rapidly approaching. Our year ended with our trip to Rye Beach and our Dinner Dance with, of course, our commencement being the all-important happening of our final year.
