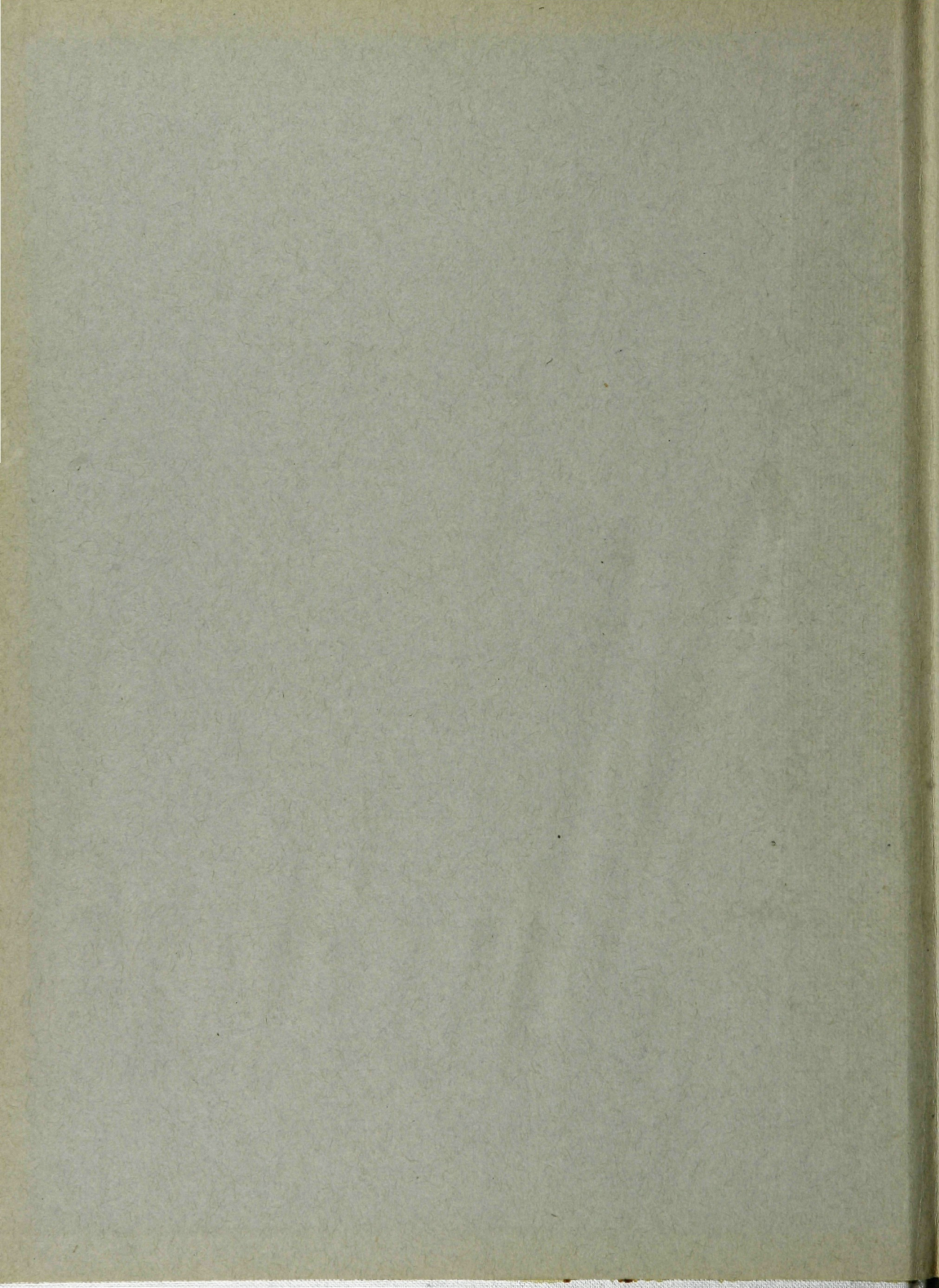


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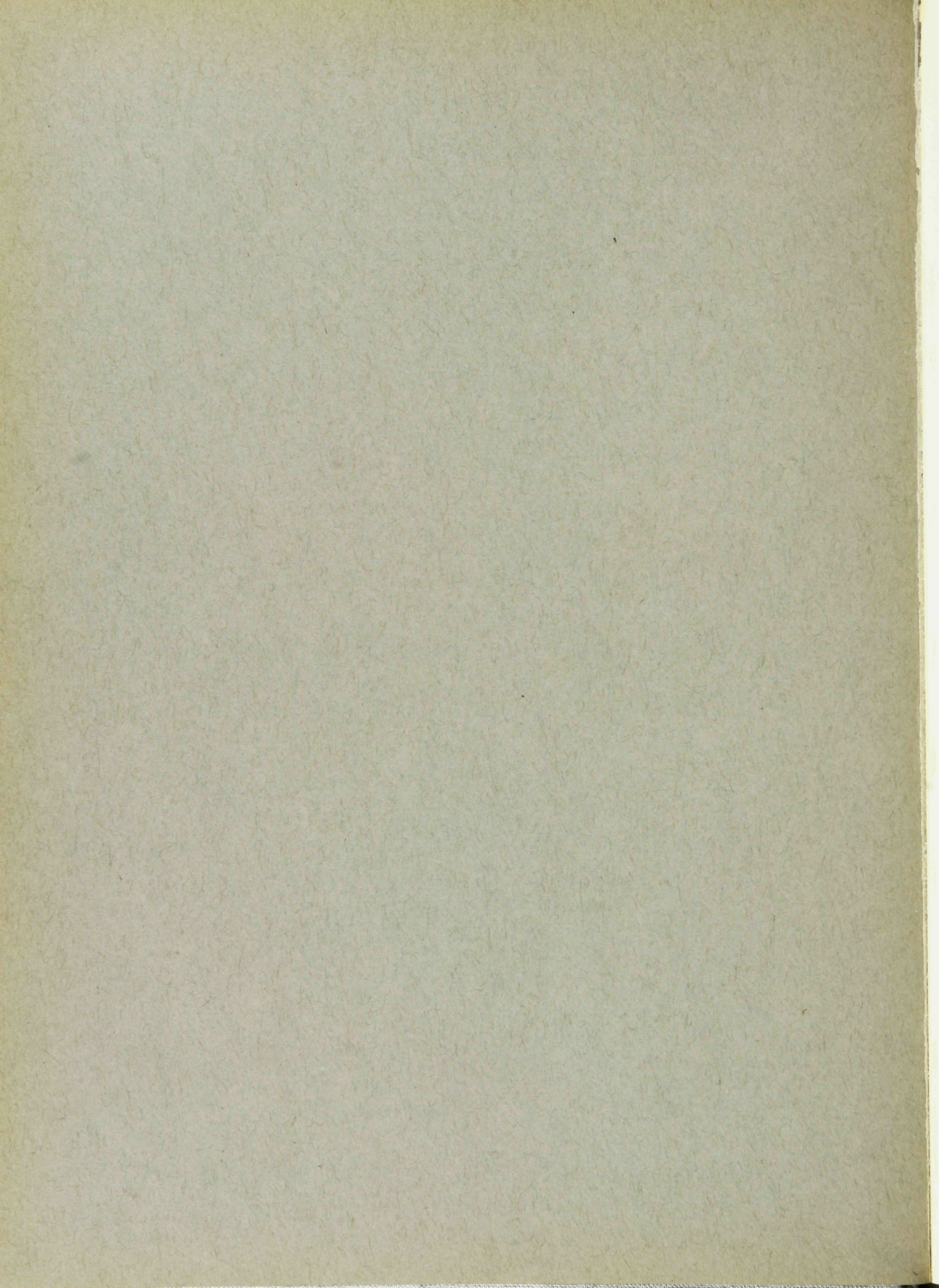


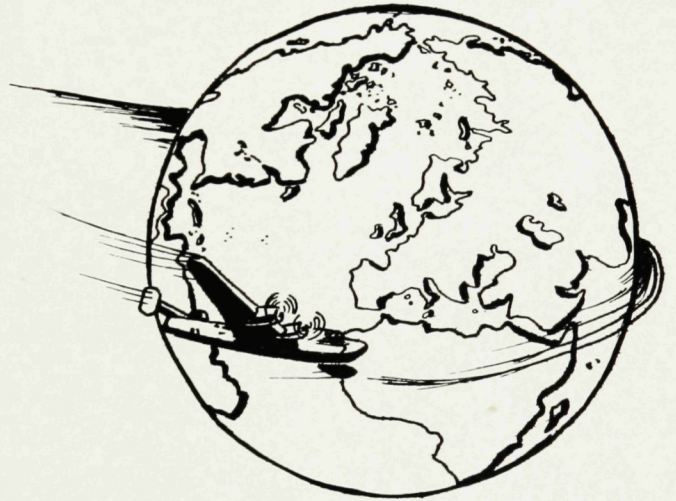
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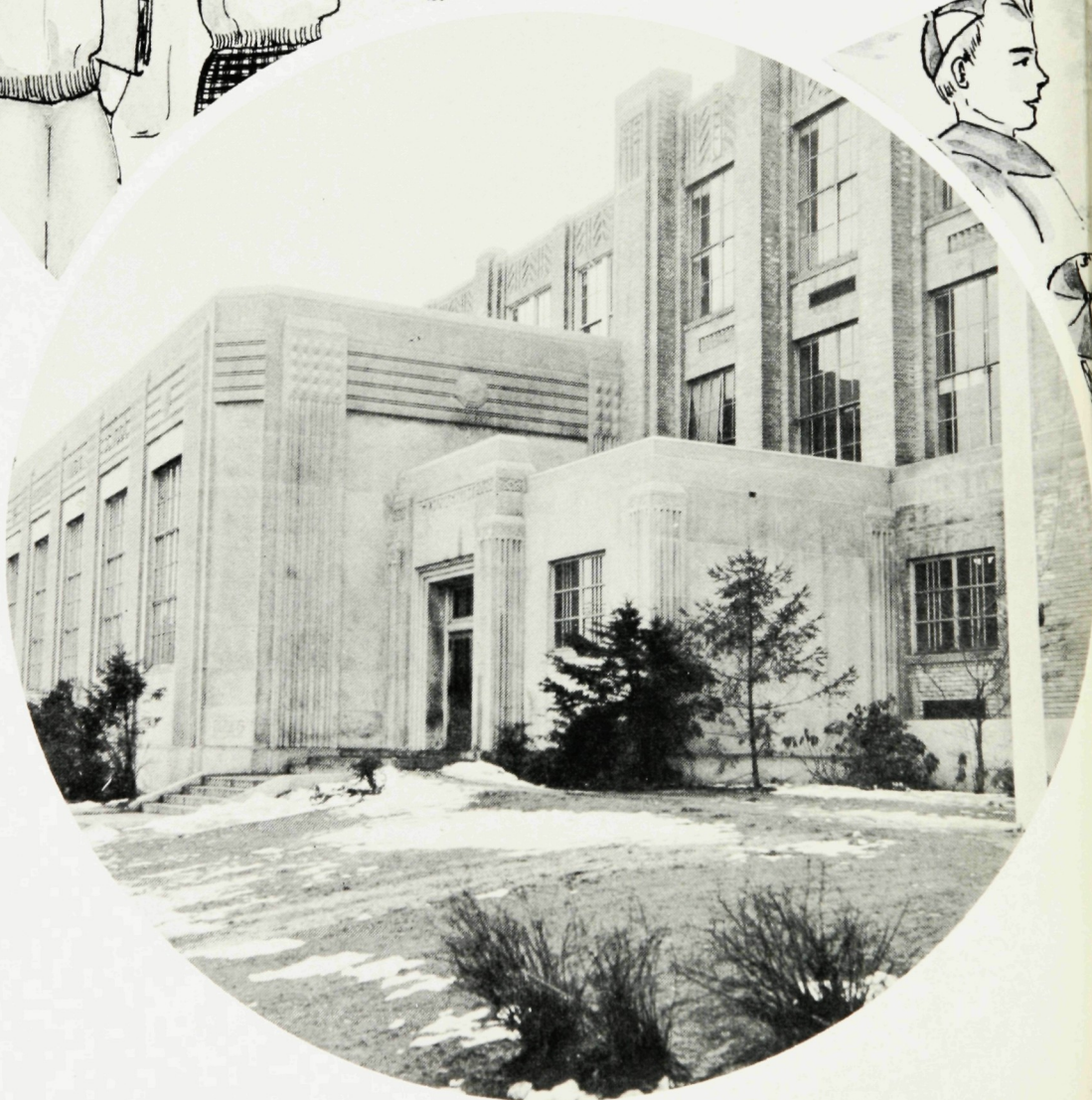


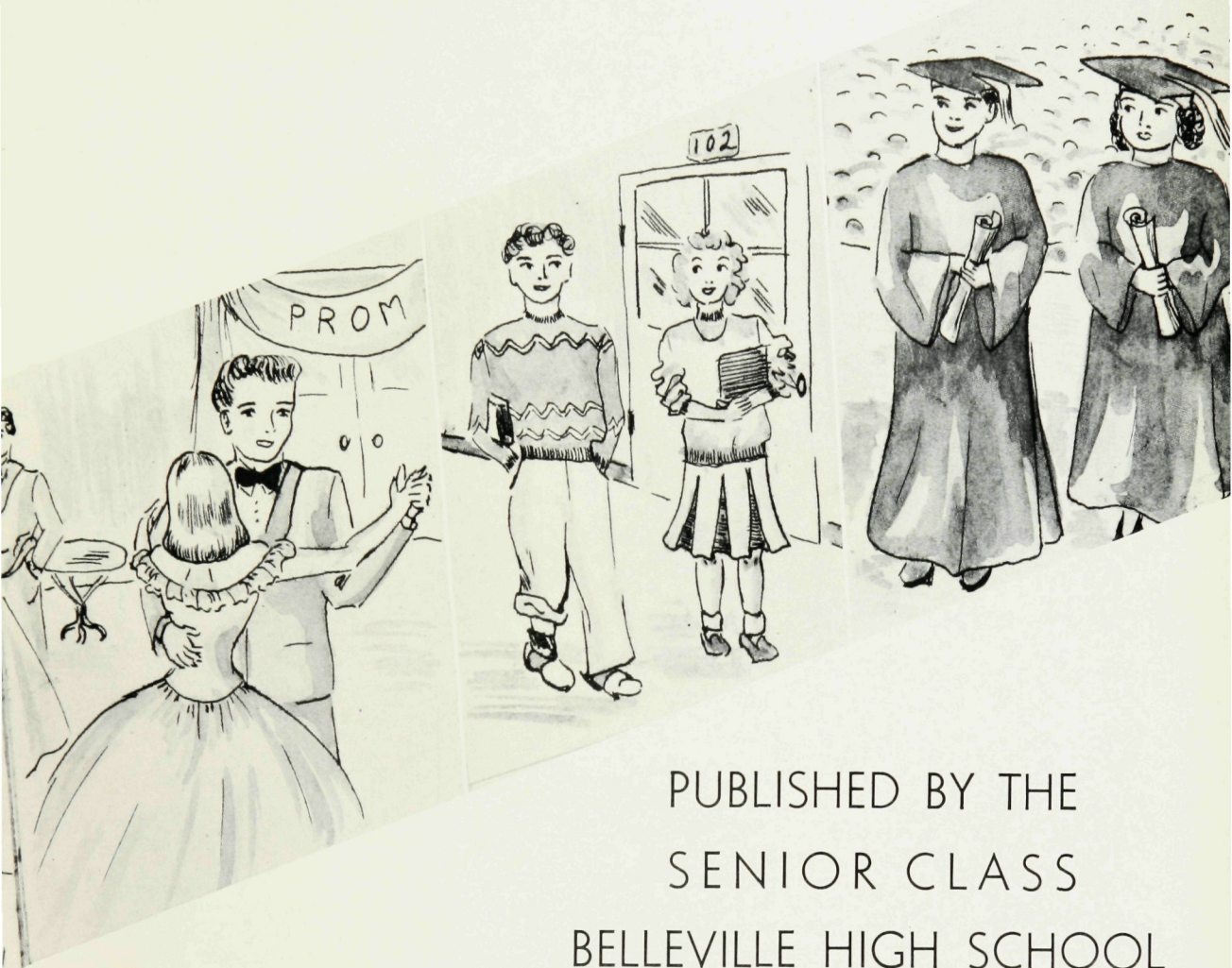
FOREWORD

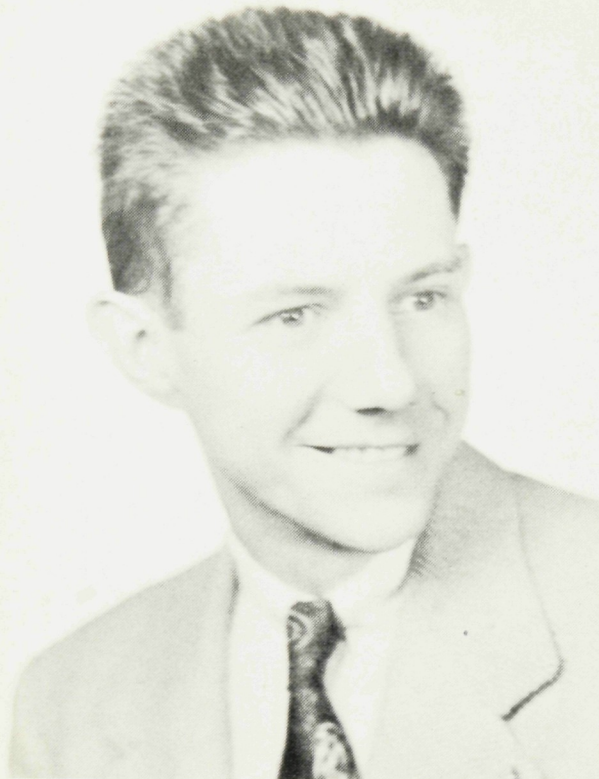

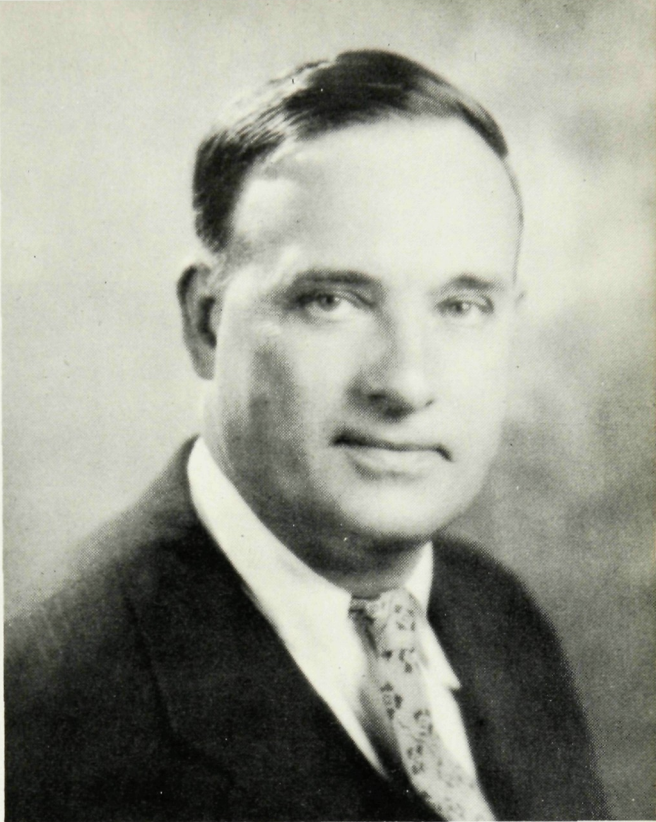
His death was a great loss, not only to us who knew him at the high school, but to his family and all of his devoted friends with whom he had worked in many organizations.

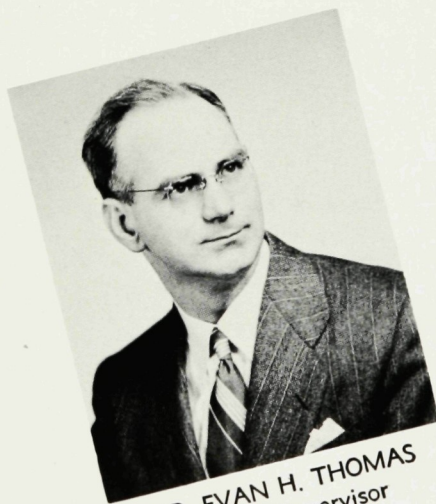
Who're those distinguished-looking men in the back of the room?"

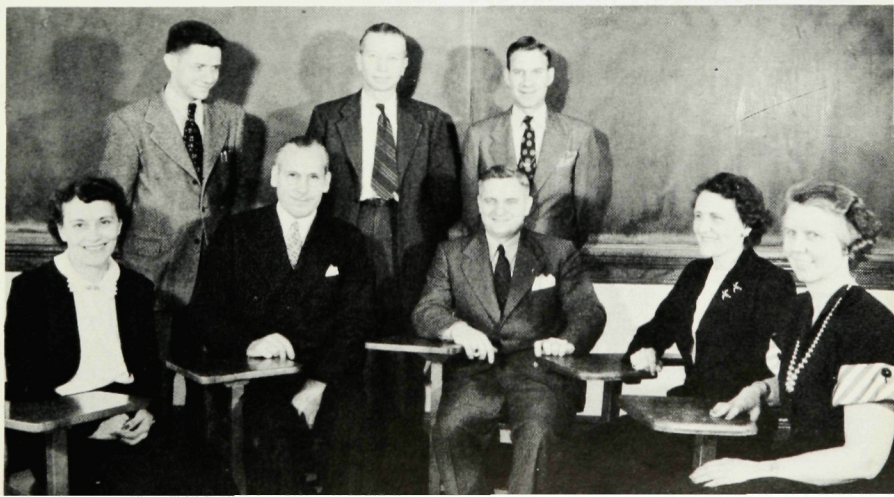
SENIOR SENATE

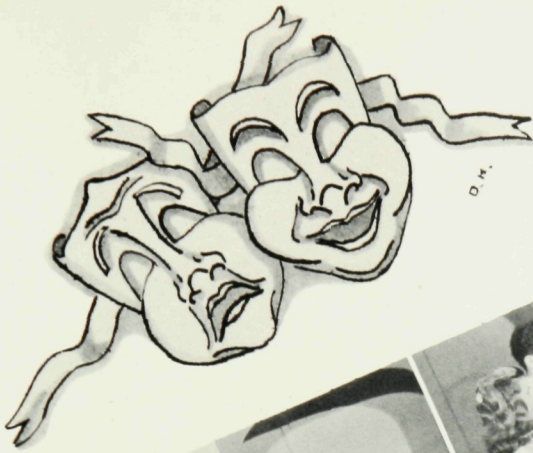

Anxious to get back in swing again, we flocked back to school—Sophisticated Sophs. Several weeks later Mr. Kittle bade farewell to the U. S. Navy and resumed his task of trying to make human beings (or a reasonable facsimile thereof) out of us. In this, the Year of the Nosey Book, we elected John Distasio to preside over us; Rene Flory was the vice-president; Mildred Faiss, secretary; and Lou Vitelli, treasurer. Our Sophomore Hop was a huge success. We jumped and jived to Harry James and swung and swayed to Sammy Kaye—on records. (It says that here in little print!) We somehow managed to get through the dissection of those frogs in biology, and before we knew it, everyone was signing MONADS and the year was over.

1946. Upper classmen! The exuberance we felt is indescribable. It seemed that every time we turned around our senators were trying to sell something else—pennants, football and basketball pins, peanuts, popcorn, chewing gum, and radar sets used for communication in the auditorium study halls. Rugged young veterans thirsty for education (so they said) graced our hallowed halls and were immediately followed by Lena the Hyena. They both caused quite a sensation. Popular Fred Arena bounced back for a return engagement as president of the class; Harvey Turner was the vice-president; and Anna Wastog our very competent secretary. It was our turn to give the annual Winter Dance, and it was lovely. But the biggest thrill of all was on May 29, 1947, when we glided to the strains of Ray Eberle

and his orchestra at our Junior Prom. We were the first class at Belleville High to have the "Night of the Year" at Frank Dailey's Meadowbrook. Suddenly we found ourselves feeling very important as we stood in the town's voting machines and selected the 1947-48 Student Council officers. Rene Flory walked off with the coveted position of president; Harvey Turner snagged the treasurer's book; and Marty Bucco walked around for weeks memorizing "Robert's Rules of Order." The final bell clanged on June 18th and everyone made a mad dash for Ye Olde Swimmin' Hole; followed by a summer of hard work.

Then—with halos on our heads and a gleam in our eyes—we started on the last lap of our trip. All things in the universe came to a halt, and we, the Mighty Seniors, did nothing but eat, sleep, and breathe the exotic existence of being a SENIOR.

Marty Bucco came front and center as the class president; John Distasio the vice-president; and Harvey Turner, secretary-treasurer.

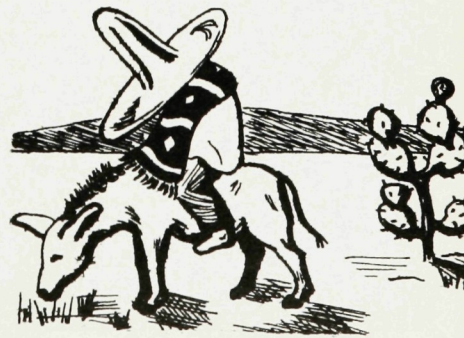
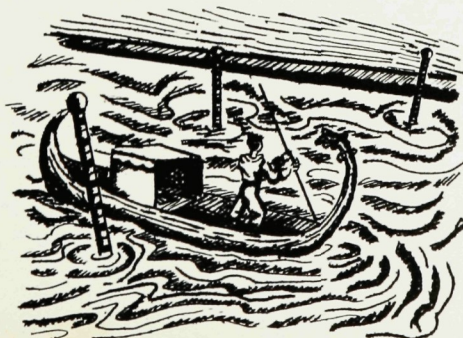
Our chests expanded with pride as we followed our new major-ette and twirling squads through their antics on the gridiron, and we wonder who cheered the loudest when Coach Eddie Berlinski turned out a top-notch football team. The victory over Bloomfield was particularly gratifying, and we packed a full house at the Senior Victory Dance. Next on the agenda was the Hallowe'en Dance—corn stalks, jack o'lanterns, et al. Valentine's Day was the Hearts and Flowers Dance, with our fav'rite senior couple, Eleanor Riker and Nelson Landon, wearing the crowns as King and Queen, and dancing in the spotlight to the tune of "Dancing in the Dark."

'Twas a big day when we walked hysterically into the auditorium and were greeted by signs "Bellboys—Champs" and deafening roars of gratitude for Coach "Jitty" Wische and his all basketball squad, who had just won the Essex County Basketball Tournament.

Everyone wondered where those blood-curdling screams came from and who it was that was going to take a bath. But by March 18th everyone realized it was only Jeanne Roelke exercising her lungs and George Stickler trying to come clean for their roles in the Senior Play, "Out of the Frying Pan." But we must admit that Grace Tefankjian stole the show in the leading part as the bloody body.

The trip was over, and as we pulled into home port, the last few moments flew by in a mad rush of final exams, ice cream in the chem lab., a riotous trip to Rye Beach, a dreamy Dinner Dance, MONADS and leaky pens and the final tears and running noses at graduation. We eventually learned to step in time to Mr. Peck's stirring "Pomp and Circumstance" and to sit down in unison without turning around and looking at the seats. Now it's all over, but the memories and the precious recollections of four unforgettable years in Belleville High will always be with us to help us remember our trip around the world.

A million thanks to our teachers and advisers who have made possible this journey. They have been patient and understanding at all times. We should like to depart with a firm handshake to each of them, and the suggestion that perhaps they should now take a vacation 'round the globe by themselves to recover from their wild adventure with the class of '48.

After the football season, more serious work began. In February the Band was heard over a local radio

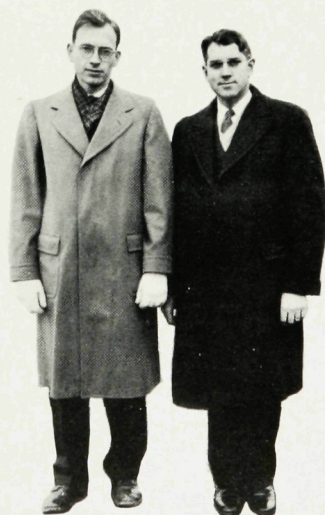
station. We all remember "Belleville High on the Air" and the numbers our students performed there were also given in an assembly program soon after.

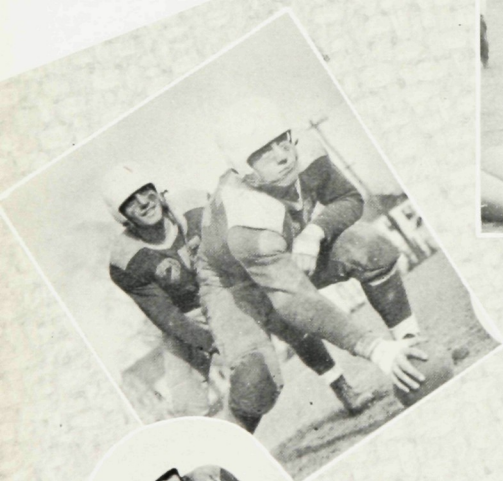


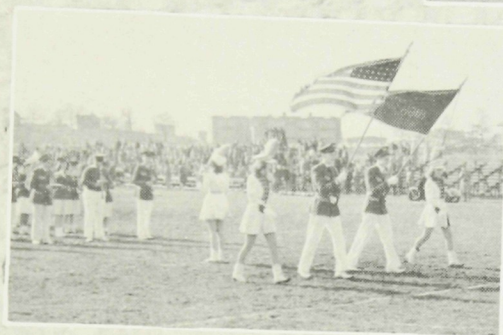
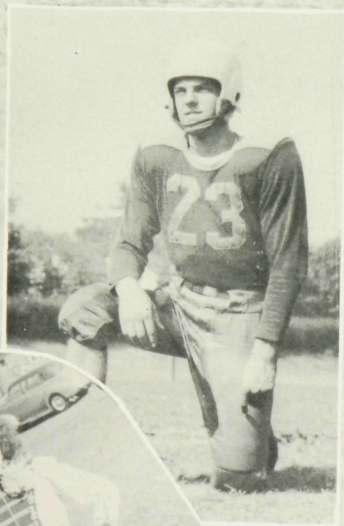
CHEERLEADERS

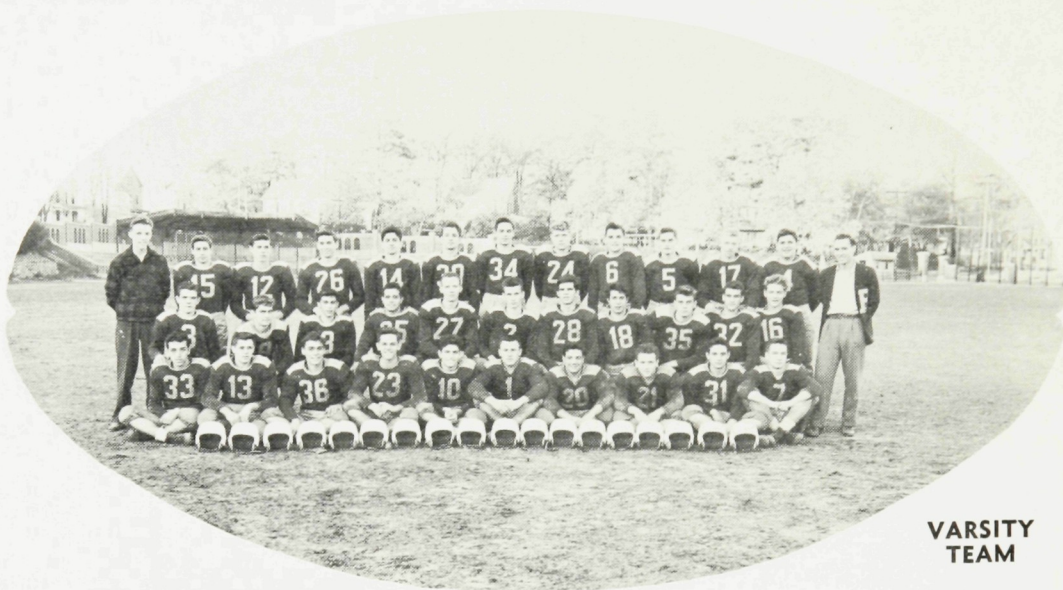

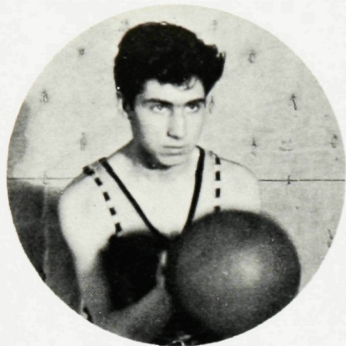

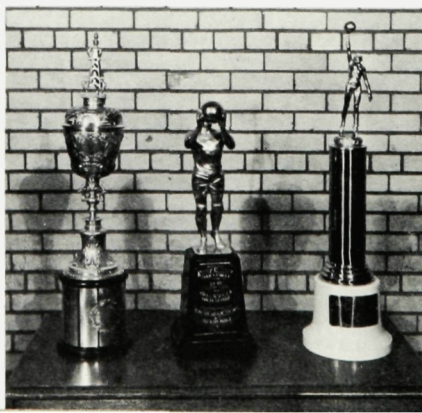
BASKETBALL

Credit is also due to Layton Smith, an excellent manager throughout the season.

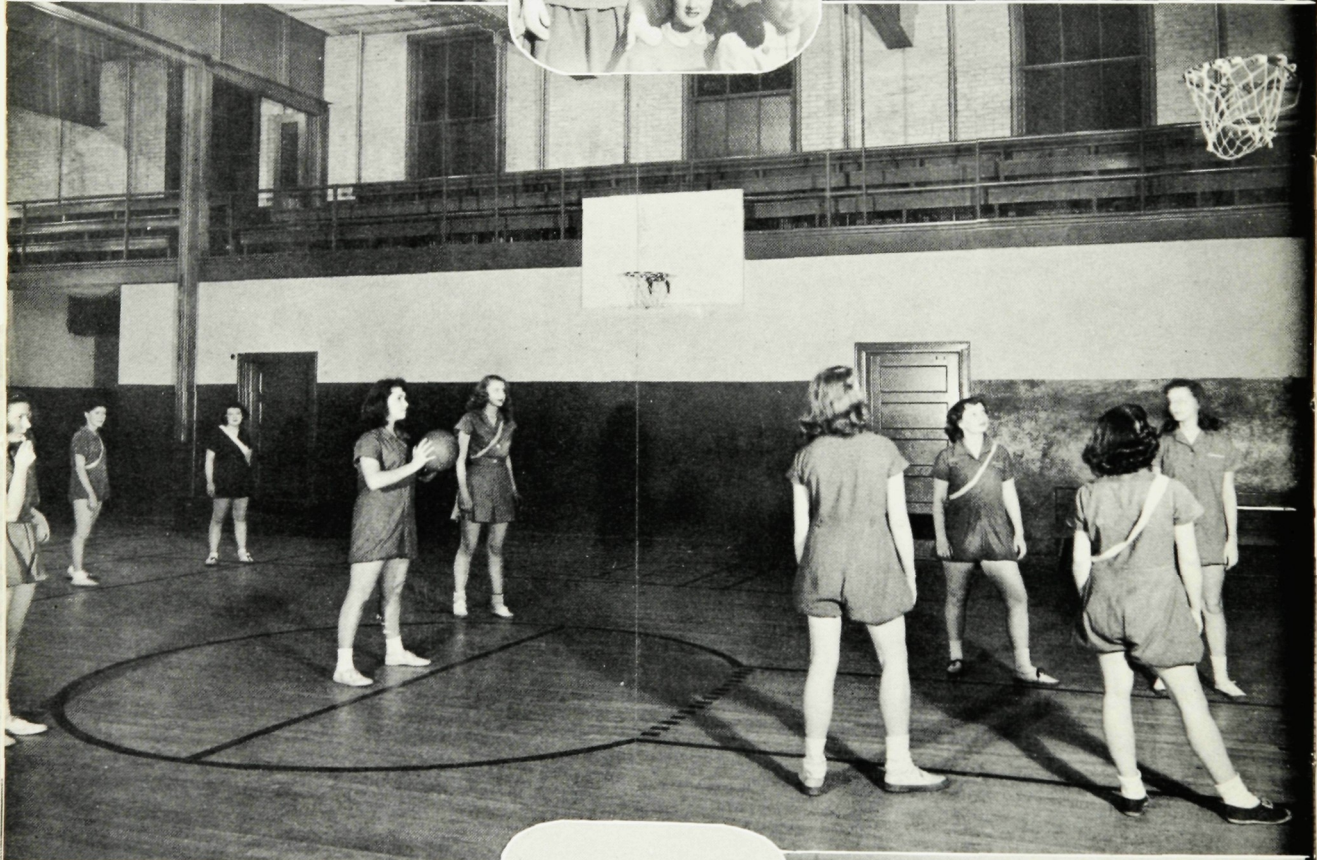
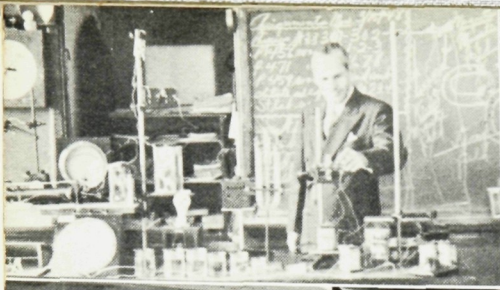




BELLEVILLE'S NEW SCORE BOARD

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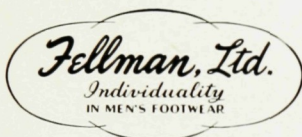
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
