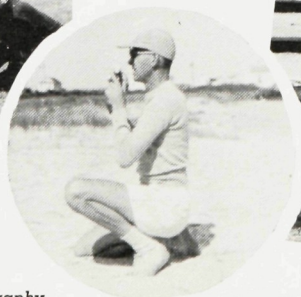

"Among Our Souvenirs"



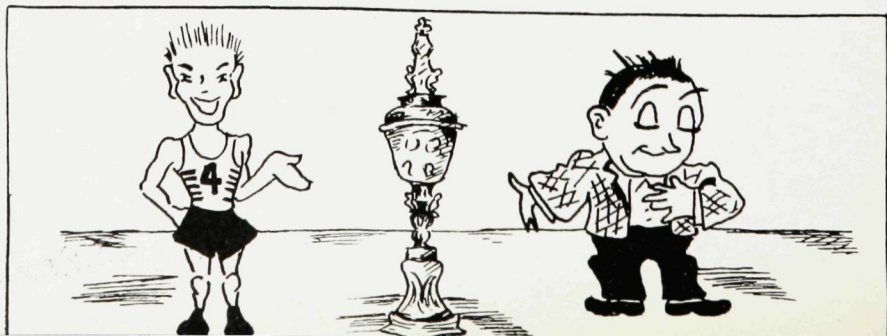

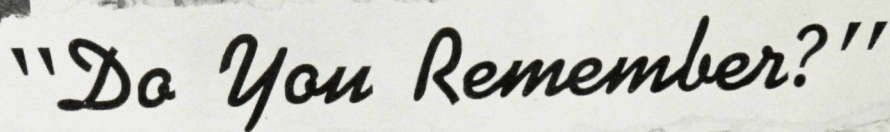

The singing, cheering, laughing rally which we all attended in front of Belleville High was only a partial expression of our pride and happiness. We were especially proud of the part our own "Stick," "Stef," Fred, and "Buster" had played in this triumph. These boys did a specialty number, "The Victory Song."

In rapid succession we prepared for new events, the first of which was a comedy play called "Boy Wanted" which co-starred distinguished acting and a pair of patched pants. In the midst of the flurry of excitement the background music swelled in an impressive and solemn melody which heralded the momentous National Honor Society tapping while outstanding juniors and seniors sang, "There are A's that make us happy; there are D's that make us blue." Next followed feverish preparation for the traditional grand finale in three parts; the Dinner-Dance, the Rye Beach Trip, and Commencement. They more than lived up to advance publicity. Finally as we stood arrayed in caps and gowns, feelings of completion, yet awareness of new goals and feelings of joy mixed with sadness, mingled within each of us. And so, as the curtain descends for the last time on this performance, the "Class of '50" gathers on its cherished stage, B.H.S., to express a heartfelt "thank you" to the directors, producers, and ever-changing audience for making our four years so wonderful.

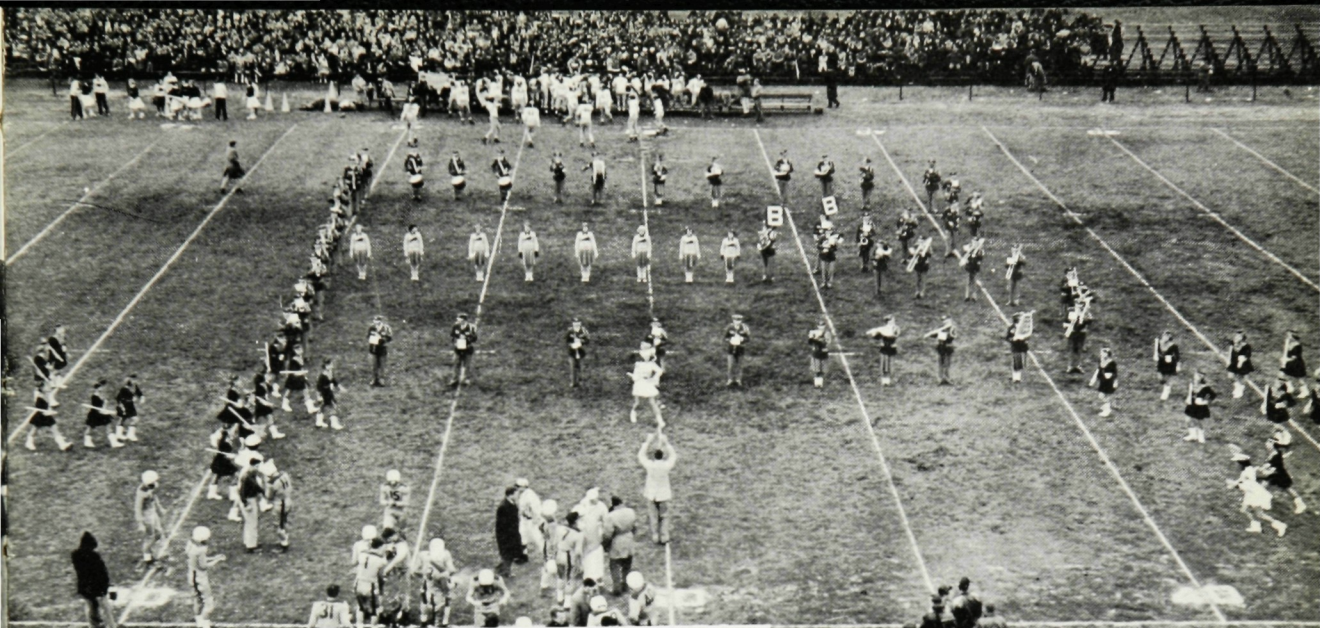

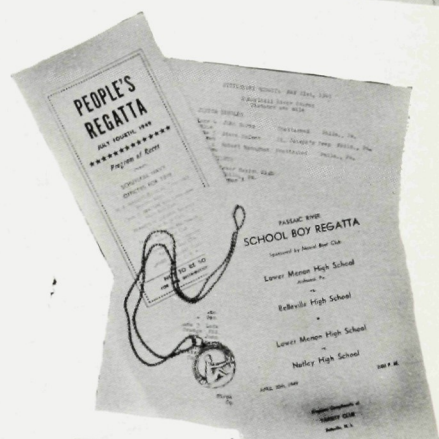

We'd like to say thank you to all the fans that followed the team whether in winning or in losing.

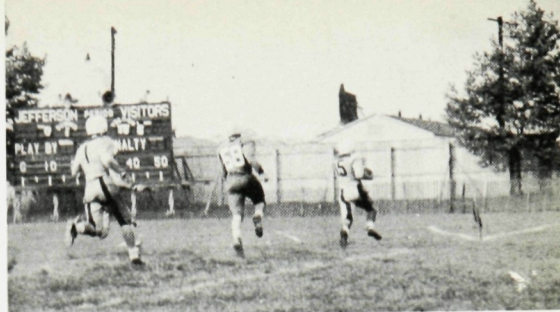

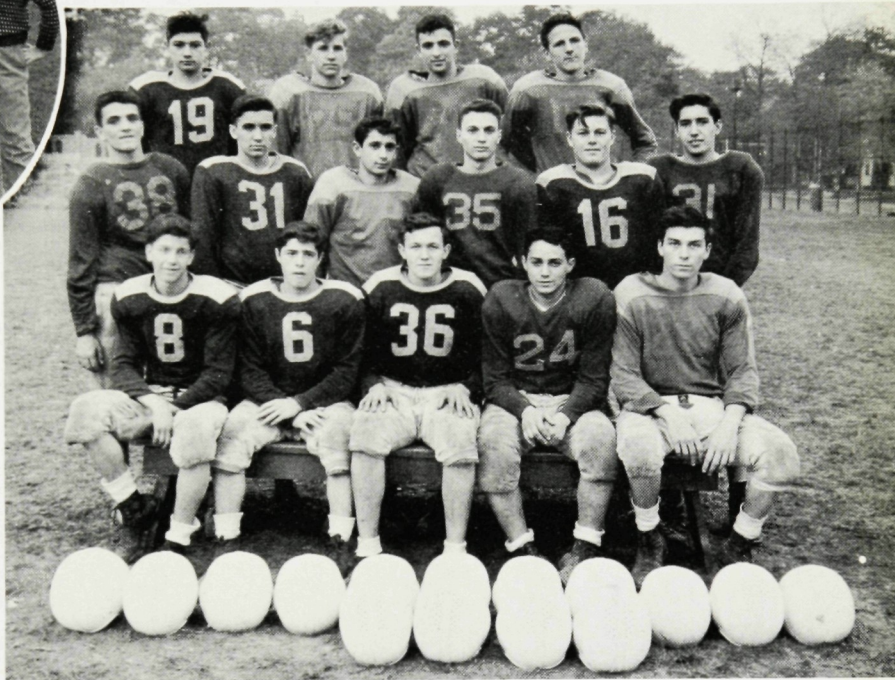
