






Alma Mater

In token of our appreciation we, the class of 1950, dedicate our "Monad" to Herbert Mattick, an excellent teacher, a fine comrade, and a willing worker.






"Be My Valentine."



Belleville came into the news headlines many times this year with its marvelous football team. When the season opened it was favored to beat East Orange but due to a few complications lost (19-6). Not stopping there they regained their momentum long enough to bounce back on their rival Bloomfield and trounce them (12-0). That win started a successful streak of five straight games, the best of records for the B. H. S. team in twenty years. 


